said, "We meet to discuss ways and means of avoid carring the same item. We Get Along!"





Garza County's Dorward Field gained a producer when Exxon Corp. completed the No. 3 Jim Hall four miles southeast of Justiceburg.

The well indicated ability to pump 48 barrels of oil per day, plus 144 barrels of water. It was taken to a 2,585-ft. bottom, and produces from perforations commingled in the San Andres and San Angelo Formations, ranging from 1,901 to 2,505 feet into the wellbore.

The operation is located in an 80-acre lease in the H&GN Survey.

The No. 1 Slaughter Estate, an 8,480-ft. wildcat well, is scheduled to be drilled in Garza County. Coastal Oil & Gas of Midland is

The No. 4 Jim Hall is located four miles southeast of Justiceburg. Drilling operations commenced June 30, and the well was bottomed at 2,580 feet.



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
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
