

## Clinic near in family planning

The Garza County Community Action Committee was told Tuesday night by County Coordinator J. R. Johnson that plans are moving ahead toward the establishment of a new family planning clinic in the service center here.

He said that South Plains Community Action has consented to fund the clinic here if Dr. Ricardo Rodriguez, local physician, will accept the assignment.

Jack Alexander, chairman of the community action board, reported he is negotiating with Dr. Rodriguez on his charges which would be paid with federal funding.

In recent years local women interested in the program have had to travel to Tahoka twice monthly and spend almost a day each trip because of the bus transportation. Interest in the program has dwindled considerably here because of the heavy time requirement.

Johnson said he hopes to have the clinic here rolling "within four to six weeks."

In board actions, a large turnout voted unanimously to request Garza participation in a new VISTA program which would be designed to help migrant and seasonal farm workers; and also approved a plan presented by Johnson to remodel the front part of the center into permanent offices.

Johnson said the project could be accomplished by CETA workers here in a week to 10 days at a cost of about \$800 which would be federally funded. He said the open office area which has been divided up into separate offices only by screens, could be converted into an additional examining room for clinics and six or seven roomy and permanent offices.

At the start of the meeting, board members toured new permanent offices in the former livestock area of the former 4-H building. The area has been

## RULING HERE STILL MURDER-SUICIDE—

### 'Scared kids' believed in 2nd car at shooting

Lubbock news reports to the contrary, the word here is that there's no mystery about it. The double slaying in the David Nichols baseball park here early Feb. 22 was a murder-suicide.

Lubbock Justice of the Peace L. J. Blalack created the Lubbock "excitement" Tuesday when he issued a preliminary ruling of homicide — or murder — in the death of Mohammad Ali Shokouhi, 23, the Iranian Air Force sergeant.

He said he had issued the finding because of reports from the two Garza deputies who found the death car in the park that a second car had been seen speeding from the shooting scene only moments earlier.

Blalack will officially rule on the Iranian's death because Shokouhi died enroute to Lubbock by ambulance, presumably in Lubbock county and not Garza county.

Justice of the Peace Pat Kitchens last week entered a final ruling here of murder-suicide in the shootings after receiving evidence back from the Texas Ranger crime lab in Austin.

### Many hospital gains cited to Rotarians

Hospital Administrator Ed Zintgraff in a talk on Garza Memorial Hospital operations before Post Rotarians Tuesday noon praised the hospital's five-member board of directors for their many contributions.

He said primarily through an election which increased hospital district tax limits two years ago, the hospital went from an \$87,000 loss in 1977 to a \$67,000 operating profit in 1978. (Editor's note: The profit was spent on badly needed hospital improvements with new water lines and electrical wiring.)

Zintgraff said the hospital's bad debts were reduced from \$54,000 two years ago to only \$15,000 last year.

Her verdict was that Shokouhi had killed Linda J. Casaus, 20, of Clovis, whose body was found in the back seat of her car and that Shokouhi then shot himself in the head with his own gun.

### Lubbock man killed in car-truck crash

Garza County got its second 1979 traffic fatality early Friday morning on rain-slick US-84, 12 miles southeast of Post, when a passenger in a car was killed when the car skidded under a jackknifed trailer.

Gregory Allen Coppedge, 21, of Lubbock was pronounced dead at the scene from massive head injuries by City Judge Louise Greene.

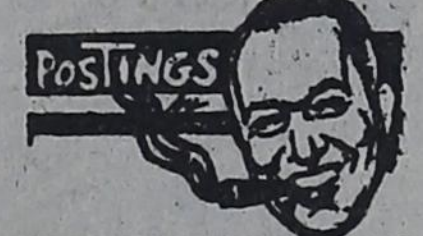

### Thompson is choice

David L. Thompson, 35, head football coach of the tough, Class A Stanton Buffaloes the last three years with a 19-9-2 record there, accepted the dual position of athletic director and head football coach for Post High School Wednesday.

He was chosen Tuesday night by Post school trustees in a long special session in which Thompson and two other coaches were interviewed for the position.

He will succeed Jackie Brown, whose recent resignation will become effective Monday.

A 6-foot, 210-pounder, Thompson has had 13 years of coaching experience including assignments at Hobbs, N. M., Frederick, Okla., and Ralls, Floydada, Electra and Alice here in Texas before becoming a head coach for the first time at Stanton for the 1976 season.

## Wherefrom the wind bloweth at sunrise?

Over 200 farmers, ranchers and businessmen were expected to turn out at sunrise today — shortly before 7 a.m. — to see how the 1979 crop prospects fare in the annual Taba'na

Yuan'e ceremony.

The expanded event was to be held at the new junior livestock pavilion with farmers and ranchers as guests of the Post Chamber of Commerce for a catered

breakfast and a drawing for \$350 worth of gift certificates following the "sunrise wind" ceremony.

The direction from which the wind blows at sunrise March 22, according to an Indian legend which has been checked here annually since 1906, will determine the success of that year's crops.

According to Noah Stone, who got up early for several decades to test that sunrise wind, the forecast has proven remarkably accurate.

Frank (Chief) Runkles has an expanded Indian ceremony for this year which includes two members of the nationally known Quahadi Indian Dancers of Amarillo, besides others who have assisted him before.

Since National Ag Day was scheduled for March 19, the Chamber converted the Taba'na Yuan'e ceremony into an Agriculture Appreciation Breakfast in recognition to this important segment of the Post economy.

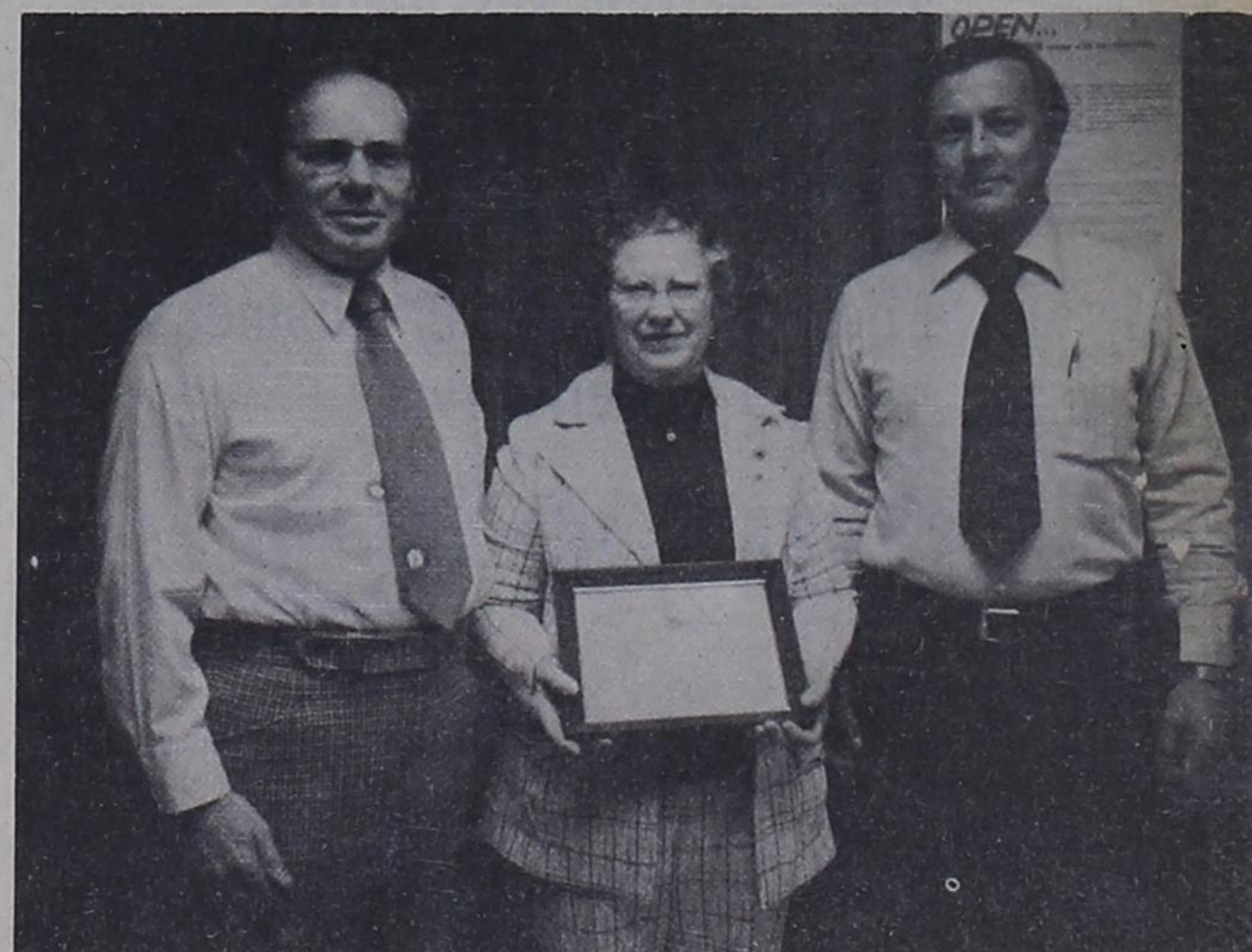
### Full slate in hospital race

## Weather jitters time again

Governor Bill Clements officially opened the Texas 1979 tornado season last week by declaring it Severe Weather Awareness Week. And just to make him look good a few small twisters popped in and out of the clouds in some parts of West Texas Saturday evening.

So thus the spring hullabaloo is on.

Only two Texans were killed by tornados last year, but still the Lubbock Avalanche-Journal got its more shakey readers up tight Sunday by heading "Area's Deadly Season Looms."

No one will dispute the fact that a huge tornado is a terrible thing and since our weather people have no idea how to stop them, spring weather precautions are necessary.

Credit the U.S. Weather Bureau with the development of a better and better tornado alert system. Thousands of volunteer sky watchers are strategically located and given instructions on what to look for and what to report.

The radio and television stations offer an electronic way to alert Texans in homes, stores and offices. You can even buy a direct receiver just for such weather bureau warnings.

What success this approach has had on cutting down our tornado death toll in recent years is quite problematical. There is no way to measure the good.

## Dull maybe on purpose

Virtually unnoticed by the American public, congressional television began Monday.

The first telecast of a congressional session came when the House of Representatives made its TV debut. It "bombed."

None of the national commercial TV networks carried the program. The Public Broadcasting system offered a "live feed" to its 280 stations, but many of them ignored it for other commitments.

The script was poison. There was a debate on revisions to the proposed strategic materials stockpiling act and rules for the international shipment of lottery materials.

Only a score of congressmen of the 435 were on the floor when the program got under way.

The cost to taxpayers was two million bucks for the house television system which features an array of sophisticated technical equipment, including six remote-control color cameras.

But one can measure some of the ill effects the tornado warning system has on the public. It scares the heck out of a large proportion of people.

A good spring rain with a little thunder and lightning now kindles fear in thousands of hearts. They say this generation is the first to be raised on television. We can wonder what effect the hundreds of special weather reports which soon will regularly be interrupting our television shows will do on the impressionable youngsters.

We are not saying that a tornado is not highly dangerous. The most practical approach of course, it to build your home underground and stay in it all the time and forget the threat. The next best is to build a backyard shelter and keep spiders and snakes out of it.

If you rent, or can't afford that then keep your car's engine tuned for quick starts and plenty of gas in the tank and become "a rabbit." A rabbit is an individual who takes off in his car and drives out of the danger zone.

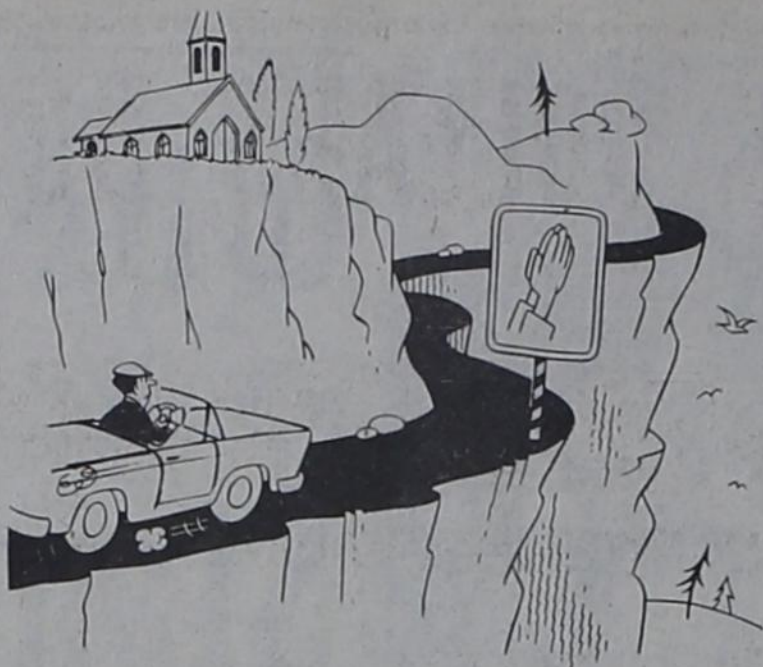
The 1979 tornado probably will not be any more dangerous than 1907 models. Our weather isn't changing that much. But we can allow ourselves, with constant electronic battering, to become a lot more upset by stormy weather than we should because of the danger it represents.

The house also has its own television rules. There is no narrator, no instant analysis, no artistic cutaways, no unflattering closeups, no replays and no wide-angle shots of a chamber that often is virtually empty except for the member who has the floor.

The camera covers the legislative process only. Nothing else. Thus came the televised start of our lawmaking process. That doesn't mean that it will end that way. With the possibility for eventual wide national television exposure, some smart politicians will find a way to take advantage of it.

One congressman who took the opportunity to make a free one minute speech on any subject devoted his to television. He said when the house "gets more comfortable with these changes" the news media will be allowed to bring in their own cameras.

It's not hard to look into the future and see some momentous changes in the national legislative process caused by television. But whether these changes will turn out to be good or bad is a bit difficult to determine after television's inconsequential first day in the chamber.

## Wyoming antelopes stocked on ranches

LUBBOCK — For the first time since the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department started stocking antelope in 1938, out-of-state animals have been brought in and stocked on three northwest Texas ranches.

Fourteen P&WD personell went to trap surplus antelope on the F.E. Warren Air Force Base near Cheyenne, Wyoming, and they came back with 87 animals to be stocked on traditional antelope range.

"A helicopter from Provo, Utah, was used to round-up the antelope and drive them into a wing trap where they were caught and transported to a ranch near Claude in the Panhandle and two ranches near Wichita Falls and Abilene," said George Litton, antelope project leader.

"The Safari International Club of Amarillo picked up the \$2900 tab for the cost of the helicopter which was an essential part of the trap-

ping operations." Litton continued.

The trips from the air base to Texas averaged 20 hours and were made without incident. A two-inch fresh snow and 10 degree weather at the trapping sites did not seem to hinder the operations.

P&WD biologists noted that the Wyoming antelope are larger than the Texas antelope. Several of the antelope actually jumped over the traps while being herded by the copter.

Over 5,200 antelope have been trapped and restocked back onto traditional antelope range since 1938. Studies about the fleet animals have shown that Texas once had large herds of antelope numbering into the millions. 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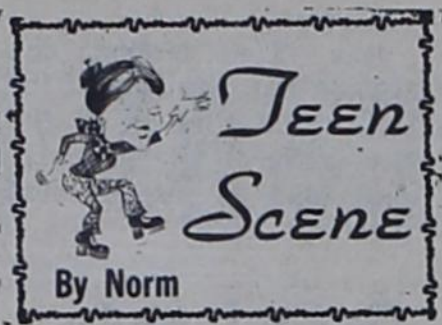
## Speech team enters forensic tournament

## Sales tax in dive here

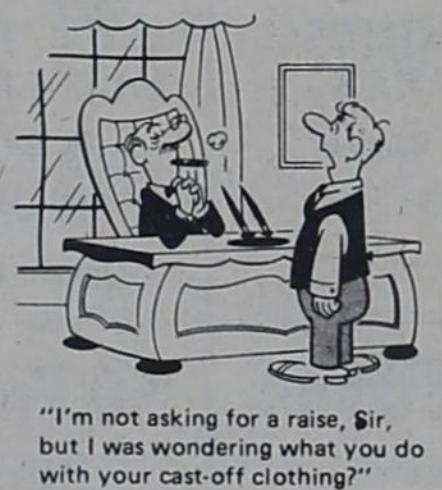

He played three years for Seminole, Okla., high school and four years of football for Southwestern State College at Weatherford, Okla.

Thompson holds a bachelor of arts degree from East Central State College and his master's of education from Southwestern State College at Weatherford, Okla.

He began his coaching career at Hobbs high school where he coached B team football and ninth grade track in 1965-66. The next season he became first football assistant and defensive coordinator and head track coach at Frederick high school. He then served in the army for two years. In 1970 he moved to Ralls high school also as first assistant and defensive coordinator and head track coach.

From Ralls he moved to Floydada for three seasons as football defensive coordinator.

In the fall of 1973 he became first assistant and defensive coordinator at Electra high school and head track coach. After one year he took the same coaching assignments at Alice high school before accepting his first head coaching job at Stanton.

Thompson's teams have been noted throughout his career for their hard-nose defense. He uses a split-six defense which he considers one of the best all-purpose defenses and easily adaptable to all types of personnel.

On attack, Thompson employs a multi-set offense in which the same plays are run out of a number of different looking formations. This enables the offense to strike up the middle, over tackle, or go wide equally well.

Coach Thompson adds that "a good football team has to be able to throw the football" because of the structure of current defen-

ses.

He says offense is "the ability to score and regardless of the type of offense used you must keep it simple and find the offense to fit the type of young men that you have for that season." He said he would have to study Lope personally before deciding the offense he will employ in Post.

Thompson's views on the overall athletic program include coordinating from the varsity level to the lowest level in all sports, stressing each sport in its season, treating all kids as you would want your kids treated, getting a maximum number involved and play every one with the exception of the varsity level and consistent discipline.

Thompson also stresses putting one of his best coaches in charge of the junior high athletic program with responsibility for that entire program. He thinks it best to have a woman coach to handle girls athletics.

Coach Thompson's wife, Juanita is a teacher with seven years of classroom experience. They have two sons, Rance, 6, and Richie, 2.

He is a member of the Church of Christ.

converted in the last five weeks by Johnson's CETA crew into 2,050 square feet of permanent office space for the state department of health resources at a cost of only \$7.50 per square foot including labor.

The health resources department, which had been given space in the earlier renovated area in the front of the service center had required permanent offices so confidentiality with clients could be maintained.

Louie Perez of Levelland from the South Plains Community Action in reporting on the upcoming new VISTA program gave figures which showed that Garza County has far fewer migrant and seasonal farm workers in the county than any other in the eight-county area in the South Plains Community Action fold. Garza's poverty incident was next to the lowest of the eight counties at 22.6 percent as compared to up to 37.2 percent for Hockley county and several others above the 30 percent line.

The board heard a report that out of the \$15,000 available in funds for utility assistance to the poor in the eight-county area, 46 of Garza's 53 applications have been accepted with \$2,933.45 in high winter utility bills paid for Garza Countians.

Two workers of the state health department from Tahoka, De Lane Davis and Bebe Boren, reported that adult health testing is conducted at the service center here on the first Wednesday of each month, that a well baby clinic is conducted on the second and fourth Wednesdays and an immunization clinic on the third Wednesday.

They reported they have some problems with facilities here but were promised what they needed in the upcoming renovation of the center by Johnson.

Johnson said his CETA crew has gotten back to work on the weatherization program, as of last Friday, after completing the addition to the service center. He said three houses have been weatherized here and the eight local homes selected can be completed in the next five weeks at a cost of between \$400 and \$500 per home. Ordered materials, he added, have been received.

The board was highly complimentary of the work of the unskilled CETA construction crew with their work on the service center.

Jolly said the second car was a brown 1972 to 1974 model Oldsmobile Cutlass with several persons inside. It was too dirty to get a license number, he said.

"We had just left the station on patrol and were checking the city-county park," Jolly told The Dispatch Wednesday morning. "When we turned in at the park we noticed the two cars in the baseball park both with their lights on."

"We saw the second car — the one that drove away — drive up to the death car, then back up, turn around and speed out of the park into Post past us," Jolly told The Dispatch.

"We turned around and drove into the baseball park and found the death car with its lights on and motor running and notified authorities."

Jolly said in his opinion the shooting had occurred no more than 20 or 30 minutes before the officers arrived. He said the girls body was "still warm."

Justice of the Peace Kitchens said that Texas Ranger Joe Hunt who is in charge of the Lubbock office had brought a report to her from the Austin lab that the bullets which killed both young people were from Shokouhi's gun which he had illegally obtained in Clovis.

The gun was found "under Shokouhi's body, right under his hand," Jolly told The Dispatch.

JP Kitchens said no fingerprints could be gotten off the death weapon.

She said it was obvious from the bloody pictures of the two found in Shokouhi's room in Clovis, as well as notes he had left there, that he intended to take both the girl's life and his own.

She said Ranger Joe Hunt planned to meet with Lubbock JP Blalack Wednesday to acquaint him with all the facts in the case.

As for the trucker who was reported in his cab near the slaying scene, Jolly told The Dispatch that the trucker had pulled off the highway against the guard railing on the curve to the railroad overpass and was about 300 yards from the death car.

"He was so sound asleep in the bed behind the cab we had to pound on the door to wake him," Jolly said. The truck's engine was running. He hadn't heard a thing.

Of course officers would like to find those who fled the baseball park that morning just before the two deputies discovered the shooting, but they say they are all convinced — including the Texas Rangers — they were just "scared kids."

The ceremony has yet to record the proper wind direction for a bumper crop. Although 1973 produced the area's all-time record cotton crop it wasn't predicted as bumper by the sunrise wind that March 22.

That was the first Taba'na Yuan'e and about 100 early risers watched Chief Runkles point dramatically to the northwest signaling a "fair crop." Stone told The Dispatch the following year that the record crop of 1973 came not from a bumper yield but simply from a record acreage harvested and an all-time high price.

The Dispatch story of that year pointed out that the ceremony was "a television carnival." That it has remained despite poor natural light of that time of day.
