# Twin Lakes to Provide Water, Money

are optimistic that both the Justiceburg and the Post dams will answer the critical water needs for Lubbock and this area well into the next century," Lubbock Mayor Bill guests here last week.

of Commerce's Joe Harkey, presented a program explaining the projected water requirements of Lubbock and reasons the Justiceburg and Post lakes are so important to the future growth on the South Plains.

"How does a city go about making itself stop growing?" McAlister opened up his talk.

"Lubbock population growth projections show us living in a city of 200,000 by 1990 and 254,000 by the early 21st century," he continued.

"We have currently enough water to "We feel we have a good plan, and we supply a city of 200,000, but we must look beyond the next seven years and be ready for the water demands of the future," McAlister added.

"Since 1968 the Lubbock city, council has McAlister told Post Rotarians and their studied the long range water situation, and the first report was presented in 1971 and up McAlister, along with Lubbock Chamber dated in 1975, with recommendations on the Post and Justiceburg sites as the best alternatives," he explained.

> Engineering studies show that the Post Lake, to be situated five miles northeast of Post just north of U. S. Hwy. 380, would provide eight to nine million gallons of water per day.

The Post lake, to be operated by the White River Water District, would also serve as a reservoir for the larger Justiceburg

"The research on the Justiceburg site

spoke to the local Rotary Club at its noon meeting last Tuesday.

indicates that 23 million gallons of water per day could be expected," McAlister added.

"The Justiceburg lake will be long and deep, thus providing less evaporation," he continued.

The Justiceburg lake would be dammed near Justiceburg on the Double Mountain Fork of the Brazos River and back up several miles to near the caprock.

Lubbock is estimated to need 40 million gallons of water per day by the 1990s, and by using the Post lake as a reservoir, water from the Justiceburg and Post lakes would provide enough water.

Because the Post lake by itself can only supply up to nine million gallons a day, McAlister explained that it alone would not be economical for Lubbock, but by pumping water from Justiceburg to Post, the additional water would be available.

The current legal status of the April 7. Justiceburg dam permit is in the rebuttal stage on testimony by a hearing examiner retroactive to April 15. for the Texas Water Rights Commission.

The project is opposed by several land owners in the Justiceburg lake site.

make a recommendation to the Texas Water form with them in delinquent tax suits? Rights Commission in May, and commission hearings probably will open in September and a permit could be issued in the fall.

The permit for constructing the Post lake has been issued, requiring work to begin within two years.

**Construction Impact** 

"When the construction of the dam begins," Harkey commented, "Post will see a three-year boom, with up to 100 well-paid construction workers located here."

"And, you'll find the dam and lake to be a major industry for your city," Harkey added, "just look at other cities in Texas who have had lakes built nearby."

He cited a chamber of commerce study of Grosbeck, near Waco, which is near Lake Limestone.

"Grosbeck went from 2,396 population in 1970 to 3,373 in 1980 and has seen a spurt of new home construction, new motels, mobile home park, shopping center and hefty increases in tourism and recreational dollars," Harkey explained.

The growth of Granbury was also cited as an example of what happens to a town with a new lake near a larger metropolitan area.

# City-Wide Clean-up Campaign

The City of Post, in support of citizens, both business and residential, will offer special services for property clean-up not usually available to individuals.

Beginning with the month of May, the City will arrange for the handling, hauling and demolition of junked and abandoned motor vehicles upon the request and legal permission of the vehicle owner, property owners or after legal action by the City.

All owners of motor vehicles are encouraged to properly house or store unwanted, unused vehicles not bearing a current valid license and inspection sticker or that are presently inoperable, within closed buildings or behind fenced areas.

Those not meeting these and all other City Ordinances will be filed on for violation. Residents may request the removal of any junked or abandoned vehicle located on public or private property by calling the City Manager with the location, description and owner, if known.

and or hauling will be accepted after arrangements are made for expenses, if necessary, between the property owner and the City.

Limbs and cuttings from yard and properties will be picked up on a scheduled basis when piled next to dumpsters; City employees can not enter onto private property.

Cuttings need to be bagged and when done so, may be put inside the dumpster. Citizens are asked not to fill dumpsters with loose cuttings as these are impossible to control during pick-up. Larger materials and limbs often cause damage to the dumpster and take space needed for residential trash and garbage. (Continued on P. 2)

increased research allocations to Texas by the National Society. "The ACS is currently sponsoring research investigations in nine major Texas hospitals, medical schools and universities totalling

over \$3.8 million," Stelzer added. "Because Texas has so many research institutions, the National Society allocates additional funds here."

"In spite of severe inflationary trends, we were able to keep tight control over our administrative costs and keep them within acceptable limits as this breakdown indi-

cates," Stelzer commented. ACS programs such as patient services and rehabilitation (Reach-to-Recovery, esophageal speech lessons, etc.) public education (films, pamphlets, exhibits, the Great American Smokeout) and professional education for the medical community are mainly administered through the Society's volunteer system.

"Volunteer manpower helps maintain these impressive figures," Stelzer said.





The other night at the Parent-Teacher meeting, the program subject concerned five questions of youth. For the final question what does youth expect from home, school and community — three local teenagers had been invited to the meeting to express their viewpoints.

After the teenagers' viewpoints on home and school had been expressed, the question was asked: What do you expect from your community?

The answer may surprise a lot of people. Two items were listed and a recreation center "to give us something to do in a group rather than just drive around" was cited. But the recreation center wasn't No. 1.

The first request was for a municipal law enforcement agency. The teenager who answered the question well recognized the need for a city police force just as do most thinking adults. The destructive vandalism of highway

equipment and the burglary of four more local places of businesses last week again point up the need. While Main street has at least one guard

these nights - sometimes two through a good part of the night — it is obvious that a growing community like Post needs a uniformed police department of its own.

The sheriff's department at the county level has too many duties to devote its full time to guarding property throughout Post.

Somebody the other day told us they thought the appointment of a citizens committee to look into the need for a police department here, to report community sentiment on the plan, and to make recommendations to the city council would simply result in the burial of the problem. We disagree.

The Dispatch is a firm believer in citizens committees to study and firm up community thinking of a wide variety of community problems. Sometimes such a committee isn't successful, but given a fair chance to operate it most always is.

The citizens committee now studying the police proposition here has been giving the matter considerable thought. In its own time it should come up with a workable set of recommendations. Then it will be up to the city council to grab the ball and run with it.
