City Council Meeting

Junk Vehicles Get Special Attention

Junk vehicles parked on city streets, front yards, driveways or "out-back" are the subject of a campaign to rid the city of these eyesores through the enforcement of a city ordinance, discussed at Monday evening's regular Post City Council meeting.

City manager Becky King was directed by the council to continue the enforcement and was given a show of support for the city staff's efforts.

The council also praised the city crews for their recent alley improvements and Mayor Giles McCrary authorized a special letter of appreciation from the council to crew members for their work.

Council members voted to approve a zoning variance for Mr. and Mrs. Dennis Bassinger for construction of a welding shop in the Gail Hwy., which is located in a residential area.

After discussing the potential problems and agreeing to a set of special restrictions, the vote to approve the variance split three to two, with council members Jack Alexander and Maxine Earl opposing the permit and Jim Jackson, Bill Pool Jr., and A. C. Cash in favor of the change.

The council accepted the bid from Bee Equipment Sales of Lubbock of \$7,000, which reflects \$500 in rental fee for a street roller. No other bids were made.

In an emergency action, the council approved the installation of stop signs at Highland and Burlington Places on Ave. S, with ordinances to be published.

Sue Cornell and Charles Adams were

reappointed to serve on the library board and the council accepted the resignation of Ruth Ann Newby, naming Wesley W. Burnett to serve her unexpired term.

Burnett was also selected to serve as regional library representative.

City manager King was authorized to apply for CETA funding through the federal program for five to six people to work on a community service project on a seasonal basis.

Recommendations for scaled down renovation of city hall will be presented at the June meeting, or sooner, in order to correct building maintenance problems.

A joint meeting of local government units will be scheduled to consider contracting with the firm of McCreary, Huey and Veselka of Austin for collection of delinquent taxes.

Trash receptacles for the downtown business district were authorized to be purchased and placed to help in the continuing problem of trash on the streets.

Harold Lucas and Bryan J. Williams presented recommendations to the council on additional insurance coverage, which have been suggested by the Texas Municipal League and the Texas Association of County Governments.

If approved, the new liability and medical coverage would total \$102 for property and \$504 for vehicles for one year.

Williams and Lucas explained that the city and county have a gap in their liability coverage which might result in expensive litigation.

In other action, the council emphasized the importance of enforcing the ordinance prohibiting tent shows or outdoor traveling shows, citing recent problems with various carnival operators.

The city manager was requested to seek voluntary cooperation from eating establishments to comply with state and local health certificate requirements for cooks.

The one thing that I would really be happy to see us do to help our town feel better is to plant some four-to-five feet tall trees all over . . . on residential as well as our business streets.

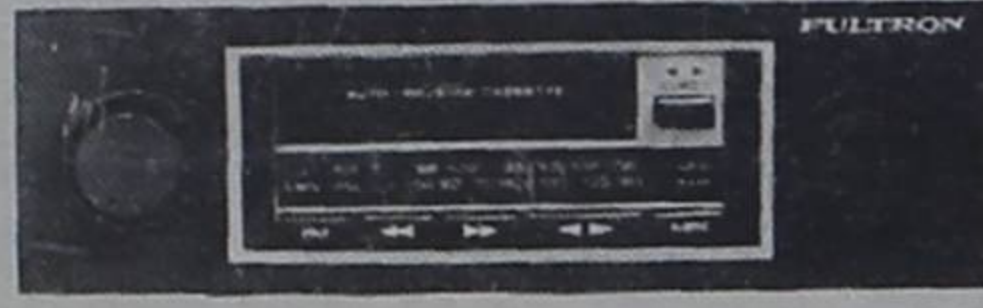

Take Care on Exercises

With warmer weather and the bathing suit season drawing near, countless Texans will join the rush to trim down and shape up through exercise.
But the exercise program you start today could develop into a lifetime health habit if done sensibly.
To make fitness a

habit that is hard to break, start with a physical activity you really enjoy.
That activity might be tennis, swimming, running, dancing or even walking.
Try different activities until you find one that is right for you on a regular basis.
Once you have chosen an activity, get a friend to join you.
Having a commit-

ment to someone else will provide motivation when you're not so eager to exercise.
The way in which you actually do the physical activity is critical for building the fitness habit.
The person who gets muscle aches and injuries or feels exhausted after exercise won't stick with it very long.
So avoid these problems, by being sen-

sible about exercise.
First, prepare for physical activity by doing five to 10 minutes of warm up exercises.
A warm up period decreases the likelihood of straining or pulling a stiff muscle.
It also helps you get over the "lead in the feet" syndrome that keeps many people from getting started with their exercise in the first place.
Second, plan a reasonable schedule for your physical activity, and always a-

void overdoing it.
Let your body set the pace.
After all, your circulation, breathing capacity and muscle mass can improve only so quickly.
By setting unrealistic expectations, you may become discouraged about continuing on an exercise routine.
Finally, finish your physical activity with a cooling down period.
Simply slow down your activity or do some stretching exercises for a few min-

utes.
A cooling down period allows the muscles to relax and helps prevent muscle cramps or sudden dizziness.
Make sure that your physical activities are enjoyable and sensible, and you will be motivated to make fitness a part of your life.

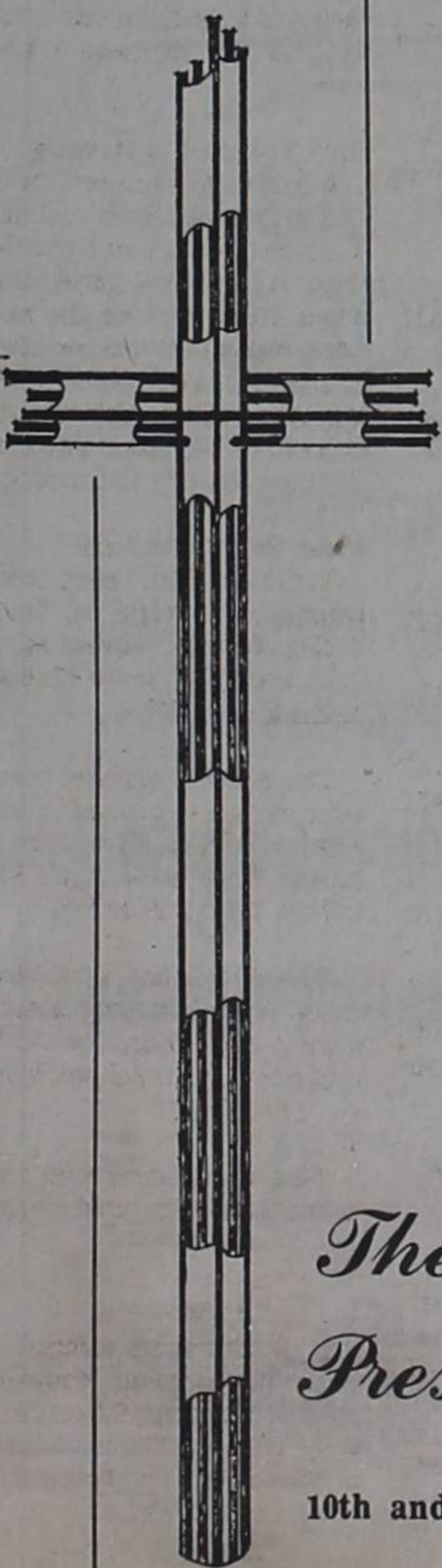

Wind Erosion Control Prevents Dust Storms

 During this time of the year, wind is a natural occurrence in this part of Texas. This usually means wind erosion or soil blowing on the cropland in Garza County. But there has been less erosion by wind this year as in past years. This may be due to several different factors or considerations. Several factors for less soil blowing can be weather related.

There has been less windy days and thus less chance for erosion to occur than in recent years. Also there was more snow on the ground for a longer period of time in critical December and January.

This reduced the chance for soil erosion by wind during this period of time. The conditions caused by weather can have a big effect on wind erosion.

The majority of the cropland in the county has been listed or bedded in preparation for planting. Less soil particle movement occurs on ridged surfaces such as listed land than on flat land or smooth surfaces.

Also due to the subsoil moisture from earlier snows, the listed land has produced a larger number of clods.

Cloddiness of the soil surface helps in reducing soil erosion. The more clods and

the larger the size of clods means less chance of soil blowing.

The amount of crop residue on the soil surface during this time of the year is one of the most important factors when considering the chance of wind erosion.

Several farms have wheat or rye planted and this provides excellent soil protection. Also stalks from hay or milo have been left standing or laying on the soil surface. This residue helps to hold the soil in place.

Another factor or consideration that has helped to reduce wind erosion is the planting of terraces to wheat or rye. Several farmers have done this practice.

The construction of terraces is a widely accepted practice in Garza County to control or prevent water erosion and for the

conservation of water. This practice of planting the terrace to wheat or rye or some other cover crop to control wind erosion is just another added benefit.

Similar to this practice is the use of strips across the prevailing wind direction spaced at various intervals to control soil blowing.

It is a relatively new conservation measure that is being tried to protect the soil. Several farmers have indicated that they will plant strips this year in an effort to conserve one of our most vital resources, soil.

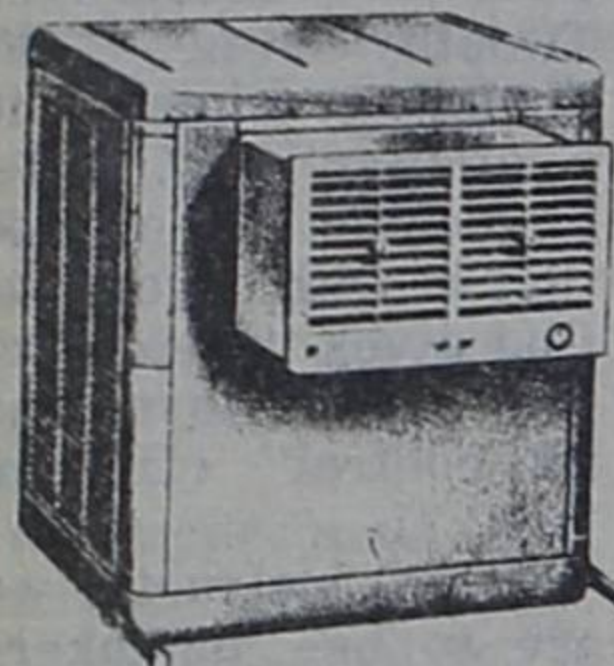
The strips may consist of wheat or rye planted during the fall or spring annuals such as forage sorghums. Als perennial strips such as different kinds of grasses could be planted with longer lasting results.

These are just some of the reasons for less severe wind erosion this year. The use of these strip crops and the planting of high residue crops this year may further reduce wind erosion on cropland

Cotton Exports Increased

Net export sales of U. S. cotton for the current marketing year increased 39,000 running bales during the week ended April 7, according to the U. S. Department of Agriculture. Sales for 1983-84 delivery increased 102,000 bales. The major buyer for the current year was Japan, with a net increase of 31,800 bales. Other major buyers were South Korea, 20,800 bales and West Germany, 13,500.

Cancellation of 44,000 bales to Russia was announced. No one is certain why Russia canceled its purchase. Russia bought at least 400,000 bales of U. S. cotton in late February and early March after its officials revealed the country's high-grade yields would be much smaller than expected, according to the National Cotton Council.

STOCKS MAY NOT COVER PIK NEEDS

The U. S. Department of Agriculture reports the Commodity Credit Corporation may not own enough cotton for the payment-in-kind program and that a program to acquire excess stocks from farmers may have to be implemented.

Charles Cunningham, ASCS deputy director, said the Department should know by mid-May if an acquisition program for cotton will be implemented.
