## Survey results mixed

Results from the Post ISD public survey asking input on the need for a new high school gymnasium/public meeting facility were mixed. Dr. Bobby Bain, superintendent of schools presented the Post ISD Board of Trustees with the results of the survey during the board's Tuesday, November 10 meeting. A majority of the 90 surveys returned (62.2 percent) said that current facilities at the high school were inadequate. "Let's build a facility that is adequate and one we can be proud of," was one of the comments on the surveys returned to the district.

Another one took issue with the scheduling of teams who use the facility, "We have 10 basketball teams trying to work out and play games in one and a half gyms. We also have several P.E. classes using the facility. We have no adequate facility to handle graduating ceremonies and other community programs." "If we're going to have an athletic program then we need facilities to meet the needs. What we have now is totally inadequate," stated another response. When it came to floating a bond issue to pay for new facilities, fewer people supported the idea, (41.1 percent for and 48.7 percent against with eight percent undecided).

The most common theme among dissenters to a new facility was that of cost. "There should be other priorities rather than a gym," said one person. Another called for "No property tax increase," while a third said "I feel money should be used in other areas of education. Sports are important, but not in my opinion, as important as dealing with the children's ability to deal with the problems of our

world today and in their future. To me, more emphasis should be placed in these matters and not sports."

Board president Barbara Hardin later said she was surprised at the closeness of the bond election issue. Board member Mark Kirkpatrick voiced concern that in light of the narrow margin separating those for and against a bond election, pursuing the idea could polarize the community. Survey respondents, by an almost three to one margin (66.7 percent to 26.6 percent) said that if a new facility were to be built, it should include enough seating capacity to provide a place for high school graduation ceremonies and other community programs.

### Other business

The board tabled discussion on renovating the old agriculture shop for use as administrative and central offices.

Board members felt that they as a board should keep a tight rein on spending for projects and approve them in an orderly fashion.

"We need to list our priorities," said Kirkpatrick. "At \$75,000 a pop, it's not long before you spend \$1 million."

The board, on a split vote, approved the bid from Vibra Whirl for \$9,494 to re-coat the high school track Gary Workman and S. Rafe Foreman voted against while Royce Hart, Barbara Hardin, Kirkpatrick, Jeff Lott and Rex Chapman voted to approve the bid.

## Bill Mueller wins People's Choice award at annual Caprock Photographers show

Bill Mueller's striking color print of lightening was selected as the People's Choice winner in the annual Caprock Photographers Fall Show. Mueller's picture was among 317 photos submitted by 80 photographers that were entered in this year's event.

Entries came from three states and as far away as Long Island in New York.

There were three top categories in the show. Along with the People's Choice (the winner was selected by the viewing audience) there were two Juror's choice awards, one for black and white entries and another for color. Each Juror's Choice winner received \$100 and Rosette and the People's Choice winner received \$50 and Rosette.

Steve Smith's color print and Leigh McLeod's black and white picture were the Juror's Choice winners. Smith's picture was also named best of show.

Rebecca Reed and Bill McKelvey, both from Lubbock, received the show's other top prizes, wildlife photography trips to the Ben Miller ranch in southern Garza County. Reed and McKelvey's names were drawn from all blue ribbon winners in the show.

The awards were presented Sunday, November 15 at the Algeria Art Center in Post.

According to Mueller, vice president of the Caprock Photographers, the Post show has been one of the largest open jury photography exhibits in Texas since 1988.

"The numbers aren't as important as the quality," said Mueller. "And we had excellent quality."

Laurence Parent of Austin served as the Juror for the show. Parent is a freelance photographer and writer specializing in landscape, travel and nature subjects. His photo article credits include: Sierra Club, Audubon and Kodak calendars; National Geographic Traveler, Outside, Backpacker and Sierra.

He contributes regularly to Texas Highways, Texas Monthly, Texas Parks and Wildlife and New Mexico Magazine. He has also authored several books including The Hikers Guide to Texas and has several other books in progress.

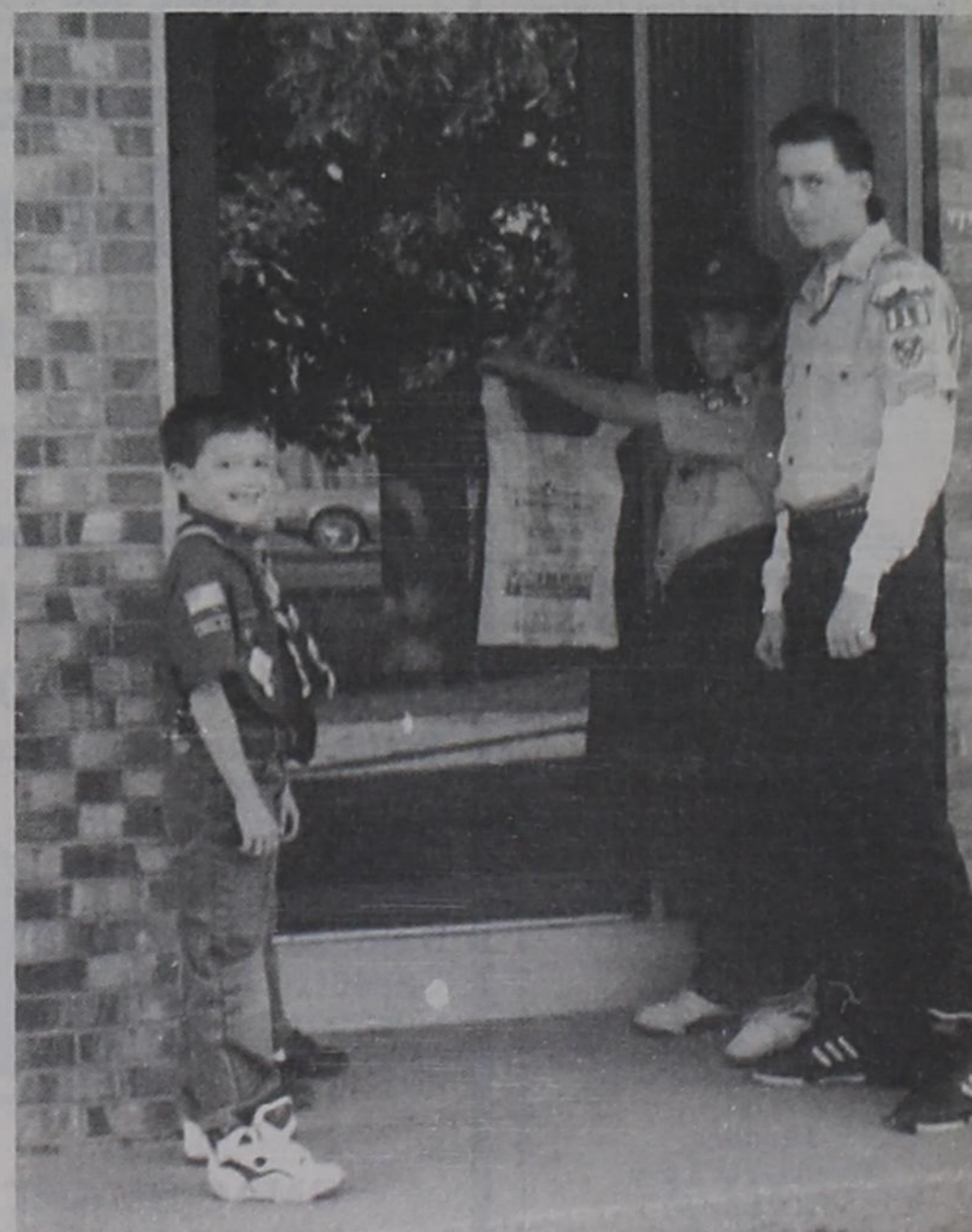
### Chamber holiday contest

The contest judging will be held at 9 a.m. November 21 in El Centro Lounge of the College of Home Economics.

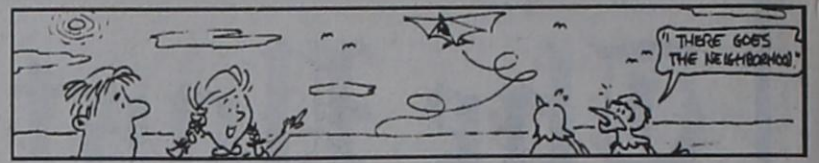
Winners will be selected from four categories: adult (25 years and older), senior (17-24 years), junior (13-16 years) and pre-teen (ages 12 and under).

## Gimble to conduct fiddle workshop at SPC

Johnny Gimble, famous for his work on fiddle with Bob Wills and the Texas Playboys and contemporary country music artists like George Strait, will conduct a fiddle workshop November 20 at South Plains College in Levelland.

The workshop is scheduled from 8-10 p.m. in the SPC Tom T. Hall Production Studio. There is no admission charge. Gimble's appearance at SPC is in conjunction with his performance November 21 on the West Texas Opry in Lubbock.

"Gimble has won the Country Music Association's Instrumentalist of the Year award from 1975-87 and again in 1989," said Joe Carr, SPC assistant professor of music who is coordinating the workshop.

He was also named Fiddler of the Year by the Academy of Country Music. "He's considered the best swing fiddler around today."

"Gimble will perform one or two things with a small group to kick things off and then the floor will be open to questions about specific fiddle techniques, his experience in the music business working with famous performers and other topics," said Carr.

Gimble joined Bob Wills and the Texas Playboys at the age of 23, performed with the group for three years, and then went on to perform with such country music greats as Ray Price and Marty Robbins.

He became known in the 1960's and 1970's as one of the top fiddle session players in Nashville, performing for virtually every country music recording artist, including George Strait.

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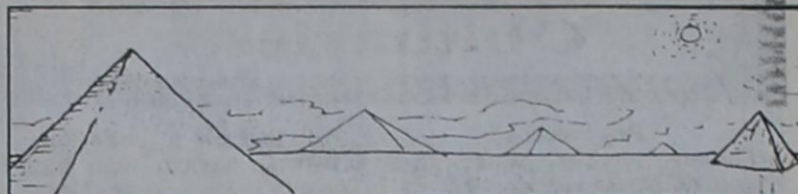

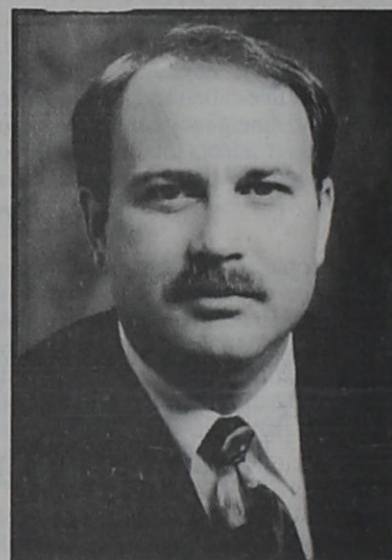

## Excessive vitamins can harm children

Children will get the vitamins and minerals they need if parents sidestep the supplements and focus on the four major food groups, says Dr. Kathleen J. Motil at the USDA's Children's Nutrition Research Center in Houston.

"Even the most finicky eater will get enough vitamins and minerals with a varied diet including meat, dairy products, grains and fruits and vegetables," says Motil, assistant professor of pediatrics at Baylor College of Medicine.

"Children's vitamin and mineral preparations really treat the parent rather than the child. They provide parental peace of mind," she said.

Motil urges parents to exercise caution if they insist on over-the-counter supplements.

"Vitamins can be potentially toxic, she warns. More is not always better, and megadoses of vitamins can be harmful.

"Too much iron can be fatal, and there are cases where excess Vitamin A and D can damage the kidneys, heart, and brain," she said.

Motil believes supplements should only be given under the care of a physician for specific medical reasons such as a chronic illness, teen pregnancy, or eating disorders.

However, she points out that a pediatrician may decide to recommend a fluoride supplement, available alone and in combinations with vitamins, if there is insufficient fluoride in the drinking water.

Why are supplements so popular? "We are only two generations removed from the era where vitamin deficiencies were real. Vitamins were even identified as required nutrients in the 1930's" Motil said.

"People began taking vitamins because they thought they were the

cure-all for a number of ills. Like all things it takes two or three generations to see a change in attitude."

For parents who want to leave supplements behind, Motil provides the following dietary refresher:

To make sure your child gets adequate iron, serve red meat and liver, poultry and fish, legumes, fortified cereals, enriched whole-grain breads, dark-leafy vegetables and dried fruits.

Calcium is found in milk, cheese, yogurt, salmon and broccoli.

For vitamin C, try citrus fruits, green peppers, tomatoes, broccoli and strawberries. Cantaloupe and apricots are rich in Vitamin A.

The B vitamins can be found in meats, fish, poultry, grains and cereals, sweet potatoes, bananas and eggs.

## Sleeping babies' bottle feeding can cause serious tooth decay

The Texas Department of Health (TDH) Bureau of Dental Health Services warns parents that the practice of calming a baby for sleep by giving it a bottle of milk, formula or juice can cause serious harm to the infant's teeth.

Dr. Donald Crow, chief of the bureau, said that prolonged bottle feeding of babies with sugary liquids during sleep can lead to a condition called "baby bottle tooth decay." The condition is a leading cause of oral health problems among children younger than 3, and often is the start of severe, life-long dental problems which can affect the patient's general health and nutrition.

While about 60 percent of Texas children have some tooth decay, about 16 percent is caused by baby bottle tooth decay, according to Dr. Crow.

Dr. Crow explained that when children feed from bottles while they are awake, saliva helps to wash away concentrations of sugar and acid that can damage teeth. However, while sleeping, a baby's saliva flow is greatly reduced. Consequently, sugar concentrations may remain in a sleeping baby's mouth for hours, allowing bacteria to convert more sugar into harmful acids.

The resulting decay, Dr. Crow explained, can rapidly affect several teeth and cause severe pain. The upper teeth are the most likely to be damaged, although others are susceptible. Pain and infection can discourage eating. It also can cause premature tooth loss, which can result in crooked or crowded adult teeth.

To avoid baby bottle tooth decay, TDH recommends that parents:

- \*Fill the baby's bottle only with water for naps and bedtime.
- \*Do not let a child sleep with a bottle of milk, formula, juice or soda pop.
- \*Do not give a child a pacifier dipped in any sweet substance.

IntraLATA DS1 Private Line Service is comprised of three rate elements: DS1 Local Loop, DS1 Transport and DS1 Transport Termination. Each element is described below.

### DS1 Local Loop

This rate element is for the cable facilities from the CDL to the SWC. The customer has two payment options for the purchase of DS1 Local Loops. There is a month-to-month plan or term contract Optional Payment Plan (OPP).

The month-to-month payment basis allows the customer to establish and disconnect DS1 Services, without penalty, other than to meet the minimum service interval of one month's service, as needed. Under the month-to-month service, the additional DS1 Local Loop rate applies only when the additional DS1 Local Loop (s) is (are) ordered at the same time and between the same two CDLs as the first DS1 Local Loop.

The OPP plan allows the customer to select a term of service (1 YR, 3 YR and 5 YR) with lower monthly rates associated with longer term contracts. If the customer selects an OPP, additional DS1 Local Loops may be ordered and installed at the Additional DS1 Local Loop rate between any SWC and CDL covered by the OPP, at any time during the term of that OPP.

### DS1 Transport

This rate element is for the mileage sensitive charges for transporting a DS1 signal between Serving Wire Centers. Transport occurs only when the two CDLs being connected are served by two different SWCs.

### DS1 Transport Termination

This rate element is for the equipment to terminate DS1 Transport at the SWCs. This charge applies only when DS1 Transport is required for the service configuration of the customer. One transport termination charge applies at each end of the DS1 Transport.

### Digital Data Service

Digital Data Service (DDS) is an intraLATA Private Line service which supports synchronous, full-duplex transmission between the CDL and the SWC or the point of connection with another telephone company at transmission speeds of 2.4, 4.8, 9.6, 19.2 and 56 kilobits per second (Kbps). DDS provides a transmission path for digital data signals within the same LATA.

DDS Service is available in and between all exchanges of GTE-SW and Contel where digital facilities exist. DDS Service is available on a point-to-point intraLATA basis between two CDLs or between a CDL and a point of connection with another service provider.

IntraLATA DDS Private Line Service is comprised of three rate elements: DDS Local Loop, DDS Transport and DDS Transport Termination. Each element is described below.

### DDS Local Loop

This rate element is for the cable facilities from the CDL to the SWC. The customer may establish and disconnect DDS Local Loops without penalty other than the minimum service interval of one month's service, as his/her needs demand.

### DDS Transport

This rate element is for the mileage sensitive charges for transporting a DDS signal between SWCs. Transport occurs only when the two CDLs being connected are served by two different SWCs.

### DDS Transport Termination

This rate element is for the equipment to terminate DDS Transport at the SWCs. This charge applies only when DDS Transport is required for the service configuration of the customer. One transport termination charge applies at each end of the service.

## Perry says trade sanctions to help Texas Agriculture

Agriculture Commissioner Rick Perry said recently that U.S. trade sanctions against certain European products could benefit the Texas wine industry, as well as cotton, soybean and other oilseed farmers.

The strong U.S. action would benefit oilseed farmers if it is successful in opening up the European Community market to U.S. oilseeds, the commissioner said.

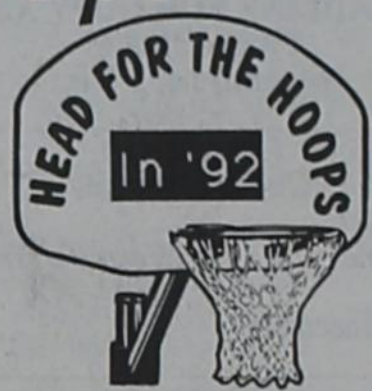
"Full-scale trade wars help no one, especially farmers," Perry said. "However, the European Community's insistence on oilseed subsidies is not only unfair to U.S. farmers, but it also inhibits what until now has been a movement toward freer trade that will help consumers worldwide."

Because of subsidies, European Community soybean farmers receive about three times as much as U.S. farmers for their beans. On two separate occasions, resolution panels of the General Agreement on Tariffs and Trade have found the EC soybean subsidies to be improper. U.S. oilseed producers are estimated to lose about \$1 billion each year in sales to the EC because of these subsidies.

If a resolution is not reached, 200 percent tariffs on \$300 million worth of EC wine, canola oil and wheat gluten are scheduled to be levied on December 5.

 certain all children feel good about themselves.

-Spending time together means families enjoy being together and doing  
 activities together. Togetherness does not just happen-it is planned.  
 Eating meals, recreation, and work are all part of planned togetherness.

-Good communication patterns are open and permit spending time  
 together. Good listeners convey the message, "I respect you enough to  
 listen to what you have to say."

-Commitment to each other and the family unit strengthens families.

 though demands of everyday living may pull them in different directions.

-Devotion to a set of values and spiritual concerns also strengthens

 other.

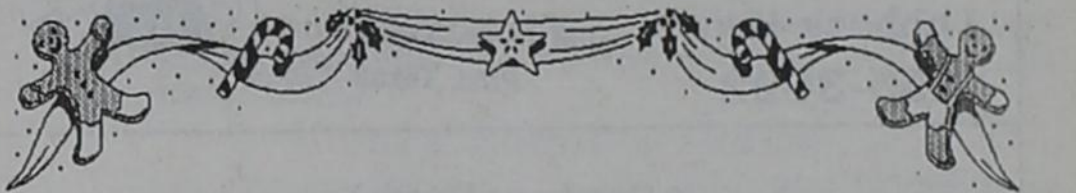
Consider the characteristics of strong families and try to develop some

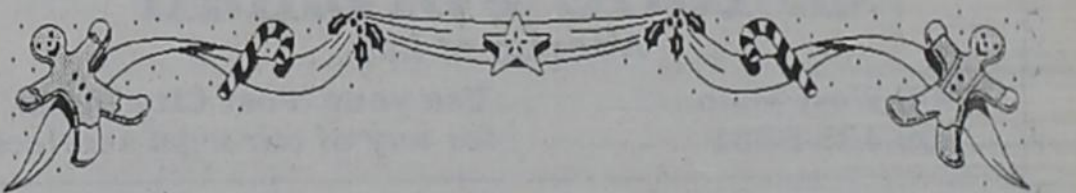

## November 19 is the Great American Smokeout

When the news reports a killer is on the loose, most people lock their doors. Yet millions of Americans let a killer into their lives every day--whenever they light a cigarette.

Everyone knows smoking causes cancer. The problem for smokers, though, is stopping.

Potential quitters who pledge to stop smoking "next year" often let their best intentions go up in smoke.

"You might have a little more success if you try to make quitting as much fun as possible," says Larry Laufman, Ed.D., stop smoking coordinator at The Institute for Preventive Medicine in The Methodist Hospital in Houston. "And, the best time to try is the 'Great American Smokeout,' sponsored by the American Cancer Society November 19."

Last year, a record 5.8 million smokers were able to stay off cigarettes for longer than 24 hours.

Laufman stresses, to be successful at quitting, people must want to quit for themselves. Nagging a friend or loved one will only defeat the

purpose.

However, once you're ready to take the plunge, here are some tips on how to avoid smoking:

- \*Plan ahead by targeting a quit day;
  - \*Write down situations that make you want to smoke and change your normal habits connected with smoking. For example, leave the dinner table soon after eating to avoid the desire to light up;
  - \*On quit day, throw away all cigarettes, matches, lighters, and ashtrays;
  - \*Stay busy. Hold a pencil or pen instead of a cigarette;
  - \*Drink lots of water and fruit juice to flush out nicotine;
  - \*Go places where smoking is not allowed;
  - \*Reward yourself for successes.
- "Remember take one day at a time, and if you slip up that's okay. Just keep trying and remember your goal," says Laufman. "Eventually, you will be able to kick the habit. It's toughest getting through those first few weeks."

As part of the Great American Smokeout, Methodist is offering free spirometer (lung capacity) testing--which measures the amount of air in the lungs--along with information on how to quit smoking on November 19, 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. in Dunn Tower rooms J and K.


