Survey results mixed

Results from the Post ISD public survey asking input on the need for a new high world today and in their future. To me, more emphasis should be placed in these school gymnasium/public meeting facility were mixed. Dr. Bobby Bain, superintendent of schools presented the Post ISD Board of Trustees with the Board president Barbara Hardin later said she was surprised at the closeness of results of the survey during the board's Tuesday, November 10 meeting.

A majority of the 90 surveys returned (62.2 percent) said that current facilities in light of the narrow margin separating those for and against a bond election, at the high school were inadequate. "Let's build a facility that is adequate and one we can be proud of." was one of the comments on the surveys returned to the

Another one took issue with the scheduling of teams who use the facility, "We have 10 basketball teams trying to work out and play games in one and a half gyms. We also have several P.E. classes using the facility. We have no adequate facility to handle graduating ceremonies and other community programs."

"If we're going to have an athletic program then we nee facilities to meet the needs. What we have now is totally inadequate," stated another response. When it came to floating a bond issue to pay for new facilities, fewer people supported the idea, (41.1 percent for and 48.7 percent against with eight percent undecided).

The most common theme among dissenters to a new facility was that of cost. called for "No property tax increase," while a third said "I feel money should be used in other areas of education. Sports are important, but not in my opinion, as important as dealing with the children's ability to deal with the problems of our voted to approve the bid.

Survey respondents, by an almost three to one margin (66.7 percent to 26.6 percent) said that if a new facility were to be built, it should include enough seating capacity to provide a place for high school graduation ceremonies and other community programs.

The board tabled discussion on renovating the old agriculture shop for use as administrative and central offices.

Board members felt that they as a board should keep a tight rein on spending for projects and approve them in an orderly fashion.

"We need to list our priorities," said Kirkpatrick. "At \$75,000 a pop, it's not long before you spend \$1 million."



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

"Gimble has won the Country Music Association's Instrumentalist of the Year award from 1975-87 and again in 1989," said Joe Carr, SPC assistant professor of music who is coordinating the workshop. He was also named Fiddler of the Year by the Academy of Country

Music. "He's considered the best swing fiddler around today."

"Gimble will perform one or two things with a small group to kick things off and then the floor will be open to questions about specific fiddle techniques, his experience in the music business working with

famous performers and other topics," said Carr.

Gimble joined Bob Wills and the Texas Playboys at the age of 23, performed with the group for three years, and then went on to perform with such country music greats as Ray Price and Marty Robbins.

He became known in the 1960's and 1970's as one of the top fiddle session players in Nashville, performing for virtually every country music recording artist, including George Strait.

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

Sleeping babies' bottle feeding can cause serious tooth decay

The Texas Department of Health (TDH) Bureau of Dental Health Services warns parents that the practice of calming a baby for sleep by giving it a bottle of milk, formula or juice can cause serious

harm to the infant's teeth. Dr. Donald Crow, chief of the bureau, said that prolonged bottle feeding of babies with sugary liquids during sleep can lead to a condition called "baby bottle tooth decay." The condition is a leading cause of oral health problems among children younger than 3, and often is the start of severe, life-long dental problems which can affect the patient's general health and nutrition.

While about 60 percent of Texas children have some tooth decay, about 16 percent is caused by baby bottle tooth decay, according to Dr. Crow.

Dr. Crow explained that when children feed from bottles while they are awake, saliva helps to wash away concentrations of sugar and acid that can damage teeth. However, while sleeping, a baby's saliva flow is greatly reduced. Consequently, sugar concentrations may remain in a sleeping baby's mouth for hours, allowing bacteria to convert more sugar into harmful

The resulting decay, Dr. Crow explained, can rapidly affect several teeth and cause severe pain. The upper teeth are the most likely to be damaged, although others are susceptible. Pain and infection can discourage eating. It also can cause premature tooth loss, which can result in crooked or crowded adult teeth.

To avoid baby bottle tooth decay, TDH recommends that parents:

*Fill the baby's bottle only with water for naps and bedtime.

*Do not let a child sleep with a bottle of milk, formula, juice or soda pop.

*Do not give a child a pacifier dipped in any sweet substance.

DS1 Service is available on a point-to-point intraLATA basis between two Customer Designated Locations (CDL), between a Serving Wire Center (SWC) and a CDL, between a CDL and a point of connection with another service provider or between two SWCs.

IntraLATA DS1 Private Line Service is comprised of three rate elements: DS1 Local Loop, DS1 Transport and DS1 Transport Termination. Each element is described below.

DS1 Local Loop

This rate element is for the cable facilities from the CDL to the SWC. The customer has two payment options for the purchase of DS1 Local Loops. There is a month-to-month plan or term contract Optional Payment Plan (OPP).

The month-to-month payment basis allows the customer to establish and disconnect DS1 Services, without penalty, other than to meet the minimum service interval of one month's service, as needed. 



Perry says trade sanctions to help **Texas Agriculture**

Agriculture Commissioner Rick Perry said recently that U.S. trade sanctions against certain European products could benefit the Texas wine industry, as well as cotton, soybean and other oilseed farmers.

The strong U.S. action would benefit oilseed farmers if it is successful in opening up the European Community market to U.S. oilseeds, the


"Full-scale trade wars help no one, especially farmers," Perry said. "However, the European Community's insistence on oilseed subsidies is not only unfair to U.S. farmers, but it also inhibits what until now has been a movement toward freer trade that will help consumers worldwide."

Because of subsidies, European Community soybean farmers receive about three times as much as U.S. farmers for their beans. On two separate occasions, resolution panels of the General Agreement on Tariffs and Trade have found the EC soybean subsidies to be improper. U.S. oilseed producers are estimated to lose about \$1 billion each year in sales to the EC because of these subsidies.

If a resolution is not reached, 200 percent tarrifs on \$300 million worth of EC wine, canola oil and wheat gluten are scheduled to be levied on



November 19 is the Great **American Smokeout**

When the news reports a killer is on the loose, most people lock their doors. Yet millions of Americans let a killer into their lives every day-

whenever they light a cigarette.

Everyone knows smoking causes cancer. The problem for smokers, though, is stopping.

Potential quitters who pledge to stop smoking "next year" often let their best intentions go up in smoke.

"You might have a little more success if you try to make quitting as much fun as possible," says Larry Laufman, Ed.D., stop smoking coordinator at The Institute for Preventive Medicine in The Methodist Hospital in Houston. "And, the best time to try is the 'Great American Smokeout,' sponsored by the American Cancer Society November 19."

Last year, a record 5.8 million smokers were able to stay off cigarettes for longer than 24 hours.

Laufman stresses, to be successful at quitting, people must want to quit for themselves. Nagging a friend or loved one will only defeat the

purpose.

However, once you're ready to take the plunge, here are some tips on how to avoid smoking:

*Plan ahead by targeting a quit day; *Write down situations that make you want to smoke and change your normal habits connected with smoking. For example, leave the dinner table soon after eating to avoid the desire to light up;

*On quit day, throw away all cigarettes, matches, lighters, and ashtrays;

*Stay busy. Hold a pencil or pen instead of a cigarette;

*Drink lots of water and fruit juice to flush out nicotine;

*Go places where smoking is not allowed;

*Reward yourself for successes.
"Remember take one day at a time, and if you slip up that's okay. Just keep trying and remember your goal," says Laufman. "Eventually, you will be able to kick the habit. It's toughest getting through those first few

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
