## ADA will soon have its impact in Garza Co.

(Editor's note: Sianez is an intern working with the Post Dispatch through Texas Tech University).

The American Disabilities Act soon will impose its regulations on Post and Garza County.

The act, passed by Congress in 1990 requires that all public and government services and locations be accessible to the disabled.

A report published September 24 by Oller Engineering and Adling Associates Architects designated four government buildings in Post which will have to remodel to meet legal requirements. The Garza County Courthouse and Law Complex, the Garza County Museum, the Garza County Appraisal District and the public library were listed. Private businesses which serve as public result on commerce are also affected.

Private businesses in Garza County were not included in the ADA accessibility survey, only the four buildings owned and operated by the county were surveyed.

The survey examined structural barriers, including door openings and restrooms. Also examined were non-structural barriers such as furniture arrangements and office space.

The survey of the county courthouse and law complex cited structural and non-structural barriers in eleven services and programs from driver's licensing to the County Attorney.

The courthouse building was also given four recommendations on how to improve accessibility for the disabled.

The report listed advantages of building a new courthouse and the disadvantages of the expense to Garza County taxpayers.

The County Appraisal District was reported in the survey as having four barriers, two of which were non-structural. The Garza County Museum was found to have very few barriers, but the museum is on the list of National Regiser of Historic Places. Any changes in the museum would have to first be approved by the Advisory Council on Historic Preservation.

The library was found to be free of barriers although the employee restroom was not accessible.



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



### Living on the Edge of the Caprock

by John Senter Garza County Extension Agent -COLD SEASON CATTLE BOOSTING

Note: this is the first in a two part

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period.

We all have different thoughts that the cold weather brings on. If you recall, the first cold snap, in younger days might have been a good snowman-making snowfall. Later in life, maybe thoughts of closed schools were more common. Then, for many folks, the next phase of thinking might be busting out the camouflage coveralls, deer rifles and outdoor gear.

However, there is one specie of beast that has the same thought process just about every year, when cold weather hits - that is the beef cow.

Cattle require increased management in the cold season of the year. They don't have the ability to cozy up to a fire with a good ballgame and a turkey leg. Therefore, planning and some simple understanding of their needs can help you get your cattle through the winter and maintain productivity at the same time.

It is no secret that cattle graze pasture all year, but the nutrient composition changes with the season, fall and winter diets are generally lower in protein, minerals and vitamins and thus usually inadequate for grazing cattle.

Once grass has stopped growing Thornton Wilders' Pulitzer Prize and loses its green, lush appearance, it becomes coarse and fibrous and less attractive to cattle. Crude protein of grass falls and the forage becomes harder for cattle to

Animals consuming diets low in protein lose their appetite, develop High School. Reserved seats are \$3 a rough appearance, become weak and poses lowered resistance to suffer greatly.

Some schools of thought say cattle can simply consume more to make up the needed nutrients. But, since grass is slowly digested, consumption is lowered and the animal receives even less needed

If protein is added to this type of diet, digestion will increase and eventually, the low will eat more.

Protein supplements are available in many types and forms, such as cubes, cakes and liquids. Keep in mind that each will vary in nutrient composition and concentration, and producers will be well advised to make note of the protein amount of the type of supplemental feed being considered.

Since protein is required for growth and milk production, protein requirements for developing heifers and lactating cows are higher than for dry, pregnant cows. For example, a mature, dry 1000 pound cow needs approximately 19# of quality dry matter per day and should also have 1-1.5 pounds of protein per day. On the other hand, a mature 1000 pound cow, nursing a 3 to 4 month old calf must have 21 pounds of quality dry matter and 2-2.5 pounds of protein

of protein per day.

It is not secret that bringing cows through a winter in good body condition can pay big dividends the following spring in terms of reproduction efficiency, increased stamina, bigger calving weights and even dollars returned to your pocket. Keep your cattle in mind early this winter and you'll pay yourself back, for expenses next

Next weeks column will deal with a cow's performance as related to nutritional status. For now, get cozy, find your favorite game on the tube, have another bite of turkey leg and most of all have a very Happy Thanksgiving!

Contel's intraexchange DS1/DDS Service will be offered pursuant to the rates proposed with this filing and will no longer be available through Contel's current private line tariff rates. Existing customers with DS1/DDS Services will not be affected by these rate changes. DS1 1.544 Megabits per second (Mbps) Service and Digital Data Service (DDS) will normally be used for the transmission of data communications or large volumes of voice communications between two locations. These services are optional and will not affect the existing rates of customers who do not order these services. The estimated annual effect on GTE-SW's revenues in the first year is \$1, 080, 567. The estimated annual effect on Contel's revenues in the first year are \$42, 383.

#### **DS1** Service

DS1 Service is an intraLATA Private Line Service which provides a dedicated, high capacity channel which may be used for simultaneous two-way transmission of voice data or other digitally encoded customer information signals. DS1 Service provides a transmission speed of 1.544 Mbps and is designed to provide an average performance of at least 95 percent error-free seconds of transmission over a continuous 24-hour period.

DS1 Service is available in and between all exchanges of GTE-SW and Contel where digital facilities exist. DS1 Service is available on a point-to-point intraLATA basis between two Customer Designated Locations (CDL), between a Serving Wire Center (SWC) and a CDL, between a CDL and a point of connection with another service provider or between two SWCs.

IntraLATA DS1 Private Line Service is comprised of three rate elements: DS1 Local Loop, DS1 Transport and DS1 Transport Termination. Each element is described below.

#### DS1 Local Loop

This rate element is for the cable facilities from the CDL to the SWC. The customer has two payment options for the purchase of DS1 Local Loops. There is a month-to-month plan or term contract Optional Payment Plan (OPP).

The month-to-month payment basis allows the customer to establish and disconnect DS1 Services, without penalty, other than to meet the minimum service interval of one month's service, as needed. Under the month-to-month service, the additional DS1 Local Loop rate applies only when the additional DS1 Local Loop (s) is (are) ordered at the same time and between the same two CDLs as the first DS1 Local Loop.

The OPP plan allows the customer to select a term of service (1 YR, 3 YR and 5 YR) with lower monthly rates associated with longer term contracts. If the customer selects an OPP, additional DS1 Local Loops may be ordered and installed at the Additional DS1 Local Loop rate between any SWC and CDL covered by the OPP, at any time during the term of that OPP.

#### **DS1** Transport

This rate element is for the mileage sensitive charges for transporting a DS1 signal between Serving Wire Centers. Iransport occurs only when the two CDLs being connected are served by two different SWCs.

#### **DS1 Transport Termination**

DDS provides a transmission path for digital data signals within the same LATA.





#### This ANN That-

The holiday season is notorious for the unwelcome weight gain that often follows. The reason is simple: Tempting high fat, high calorie dishes are the main fare of holiday celebrations, from the formal Christmas fete to the impromptu New Year's get

Also, excuses for holiday overindulgence are as easy to find as holiday cheer-the-food looks and tastes so good; everyone else is eating; it's a special occasion; no one wants to offend their host by not eating; and then, there is always tomorrow, or after the holidays.

For many Americans, giving in to these excuses often translates into post-holiday bad news on the bathroom scales. Making an effort to eat nutritiously doesn't have to put a damper on your holiday season, since relatively simple modifications can reduce calories as well as fat and sugar.

Calories are influenced by portion sizes and the way the food is prepare. Here are some tips to help you cut calories:

\*Watch serving sizes. For example, cutting meat portions from six to three ounces can reduce calories by one-half. Remember, most foods are okay once in a while. Just don't over do it.

\*Use turkey or chicken broth instead of fat when making gravy.

Fat can be reduced by a third in gravies, sauces, puddings and quick breads. Yogurt or cottage cheese may be substituted for sour cream in some recipes for sauces, dips, dressings, and main dishes.

\*Have baked or mashed potatoes with plain low-fat yogurt or cottage cheese instead of a lot of butter, margarine or sour cream.

\*Cut down on high fat foods such as butter, margarine, salad dressing, fried foods, fatty meats, cream sauces, gravies and whipped dessert

\*Cut down on sugary foods such as candies, soft drinks and other sugar-sweetened beverages (fruit punches and ades) jams, jellies, syrups, honey, fruit canned in heavy syrups, pies, cakes and pastries. Sugar can be reduced by a third in many holiday desserts. If a recipe calls for one cup sugar, for example, use two-thirds cup. This works best in fruit-based recipes and in making puddings and custards. The sugar in cookies and cakes can also be reduced, but requires some experimenting to find an appropriate amount. I can send you a chart which lists minimum requirements for ingredients for various foods if you request it.

\*For holiday parties, make hot chocolate with skim milk and sugar-free cocoa mix. Limit the eggnog; try hot apple cider for a nofat, no-cholesterol warm-up.

\*Select cooking methods to help

cut calories. Cook food with little or no added fat and avoid deep-fat fried foods. For meat and poultry, trim off visible fats, eight boil or roast on a rack. If braised or stewed, drain meat to remove fat. For fish, broil or bake. For vegetables, steam, bake or boil or stir-fry in a small amount of

vegetable oil. increase your exercise to help burn the extra calories.

Walking briskly for 30-40 minutes each day, riding bicycles or playing basketball with the kids, taking a hike while the turkey is in the oven or doing exercises during half-time of the televised bowl games are just a few ways you can work more exercise into your holidays.

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

Texas Tech's agricultural communications program would not exist today if it had not been for Lewis Eggenberger, a department professor who devoted his time and energy as the program's first adviser when it began in 1978, Vaughn said.

When the program began as a specialization, five students were enrolled. The program, which was granted degree status this year by the Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board, now has more than 80 students. Terry was named as the program's adviser in September 1991.




