The Texas Water Resources president of the White River board board had tentatively approved the plan in October pending receipt and action upon the White River Municipal Water district's format application for a \$1,300,000 loan from that state agency.

What comes next? That's the first question on the lips of most citizens who eagerly are awaiting the start of construction on the big dam and pipelines to the four participating towns which by engineers' estimates will guarantee each an ample water supply for the rest of the 20th century.

The answer is -water contract elections.

### Responsibility at our doorstep

feeting only a small minority of young Texans. but the various factors surrounding juvenile detinquency constitute many problems facing today's children and youth.

During the last few weeks. Post has had more than its share of cases involving juvenile delire quents, and it was by no means the first outherak here and won't be the last. That in itself, however, does not mean that more than a handful of Post youngsters ever get into sermus trouble. The proportion here is about the same as it is elsewhere

Extensive studies of delinquency, its causes and cures, have been conducted by the Governor's Committee for the 1960 White House Conference on Children and Youth, and much of the responsibility, it was found, him on the doorsteps at the communities

Because of its findings; the Committee recommended that communities tackie the problem on an every-day basis on the following areas:

Schools, law enforcement, juvenile cours, and probation, churches, youth purticipation and itscreation, youth employment and health-

Emphasis was placed on the need for contimiing work within communities to prevent delin- our problem here in Post'-CD

Juvenile delinquency in itself is a problem af- quency by affirmative action in those areas which affect youth development.

Highlights of the Committee's findings in-

1. The moral, religious, and value decay within many homes has given rise to growth of de-

2 In the field of law enforcement, there is an mability to cope with the lack of respect by youthful offenders for the individual and property right of citizens, insufficient personnel trained in serwicing prospective delinquents and community action to utilize resources available to deter delin-

The Governor's Committee cited numerous individual problems which contribute to the delinquency of children. Muny of these revolved around the home and the relationship between the child and his parents. The studies showed that is great majority of the Texas public feels that parents today even't desire as good a job of raising their calidren as did purents of yester-year. The general opinion was that youth is losing out on the values of family togetherness, the time, attention and personal care of their own parents.

To sum it up, the studies show that the specille problem of juvenite delinquency can best be coped with on a community basis. Let's go after

Again this year, the stork miss-ed Post on his New Year's day rounds, but the first 1960 baby contest still goes. The annual registration of aliens in the United States got under way Saturday at the post office

The registration, carried out by post offices for the Immigration and Naturalization Service, is intended to get listings of the current addresses of all aliens in the Inited States.

Registration cards (form 1-53) may be obtained at the post office here. They must be picked up in person must be filed in person after they are filled in.

Wilful or inexcusable failure to file a registration card may be punished by a fine not to exceed \$200 and imprisonment not to exceed 30 days. Aliens who fail to register are also subject to deportation, according to Immigration and Naturalization Service offici-


