



### Law enforcement 1960 election issue,

ginning to shape up. A few candidates have flipped their lids-into the circle. And you can hear a lot of talk about who is "thinking about" running.

Post and Garza County in the 1960 elections will get to make a choice on law enforcementat least we presume by the time all the filings are in there will be some choices.

The law enforcement problem has been kicked around locally for the last couple of years. But it hasn't materially improved in that time. There are no more officers now than there were.

There are no regularly scheduled night officers on patrol. And there still is no sheriff's radio operated around the clock so that nighttime contact could be maintained with officers on duty at night-from the citizen who might need one to an armed officer in a patrol car.

All of these things Post needs badly today, and will need even worse by election time.

The community has growing responsibilities in the law enforcement field, just as it has growing responsibilities in the fields of sanitation (which it has taken steps to solve), education (which it has taken steps to solve), public utilities (in the planning stage), zoning field (also in the planning stage), fire protection (which it has taken steps to solve), etc.

As the community grows, so grow the responsibilities of the community.

But the law enforcement problem has become caught in the net of divided responsibilities. Both the city and the county share the responsibility and in the last two years there has been no meeting of minds at the city-county level to solve the problem

This is indeed unfortunate.

Choice of a sheriff will not of itself solve the

The county's 1960 political races are just be- law enforcement problem. It is only a part of the problem. It won't bring about any city action, or the meeting of minds between city council and

county commissioners' court. But the citizen who has a vote must remember too that the law enforcement problem also can be solved in part by the election of county commissioners and by the choice in the spring of city councilmen.

They can ask of all the candidates where they stand on the law enforcement problem, what they propose to do if they are elected to the office which they seek.

The interest of the voting public in the months ahead can make its weight felt, if that public is interested and wants an improved law enforcement program here.

There are those who say that the people don't want any stepped-up law enforcement. In the last spring election at least a bare majority voted for an expanded police force, even at stiff tax price. That is a good indication of what Post folks thought then-at least those who voted.

But that was only a straw vote. It didn't mean anything. The council has announced no plans to expand its police department in the eight months which have followed that public expression.

The Dispatch has become rather unpopular in several public quarters here over its expressed belief in the need for law enforcement.

In the end the choice is up to the voters. They can ask for and get a stepped-up law enforcement program if they demand it and make it an issue in the 1960 elections. On the other hand if you don't want law enforcement, the voter can make his weight felt on that side too. Or if the voter doesn't much care-or doesn't care enough-he can simply let things "rock along."

That's up to you in 1960 .- JC
