Does it make sense? We believe that it does. Will you consider our plea?

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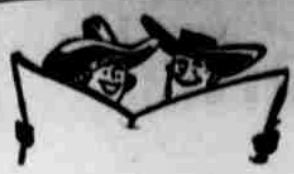

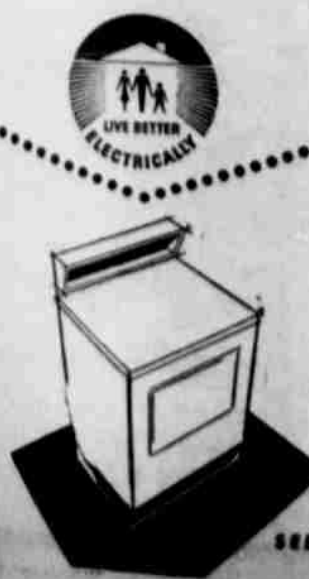
