

Bears Win District Opener Over Roscoe, 28-0, for Win No. 6

BAIRD — The Baird High School marched on the football field once again Friday night in Roscoe Plowboy Stadium to perform the Victory March in salute to the Baird Bears on their sixth win of the season, and winner of their first district game in 7-A.

The Bears rolled over the Roscoe Plowboys 28-0. Once again the two-some of Cecil Faircloth and David Strickland paid off, with the strong back-up power of the remaining Bear lineup. The two-some scorer twice each, with Faircloth leading out from 6 yards out for the Bears first score in the first quarter. The touchdown came after an 80 yard drive and a big gainer on a 40-yard pass from Gary Goble to Efrim Rodriguez.

Strickland scored in the 2nd quarter on a 41-yard pass from Goble, and again in the 3rd quarter running 66 yards for the TD. With only a few minutes remaining in the game, Faircloth went over from the one, after Goble hit Strickland with a 35-yard pass.

The Plowboys were inside the Bears 20 on three occasions, but failed each time against the mighty strength of the Bear defense.

The Bears had 212 yards rushing to Roscoe's 144, and completed 5 out of 15 pass attempts.

Jay Mike Reeves completed all conversion for the Bears, bringing his record to 23 out of 25 attempts.

Clyde Bulldogs Hit By Hail Of Mavericks at Eastland Friday

CLYDE — The Clyde Bulldogs were out-classed 50-0 at Eastland last Friday night by the top-ranked AA Mavericks. The Bulldogs held within 9 points through the first quarter, but the Mavericks opened a barrage of passes in the 2nd quarter as blue-chip quarterback Craig Lund hit on 58, 41 and 27 yard touchdown strikes to receivers Bob Mace and Rendy Rexroat.

The Mavericks amassed 18 first downs and 400 yards on offense while holding Clyde to four first downs and 70 yards rushing. Tailback Howard King was the leading rusher for the Mavericks with 184 yards.

Outstanding defenders for the Bulldogs were Timmy Payne, Johnny York, Gary Barr and Robbie Tucker. Leading rushers for Clyde were Barr and Craig Loper. Missing in the game and possibly the rest of the season for Clyde was Endgate Hawk, due to illness. Endgate was a team captain, and 2nd team All-District defensive halfback last season.

Clyde Shipping Point for Rabbits

CLYDE — Thousands of pounds of rabbit meat, all still "on the hoof" is leaving Amarillo on a regular basis through an organization formed in 1969 to act primarily as a marketing association for the bunny business.

So, from that first meeting in the fall of 1969, the group now ships valuable rabbits from pick up points in Lubbock, Happy and Amarillo for the Kansas markets.

An average of 326 rabbits are weighed and shipped from Clyde to Lubbock each two weeks.

These rabbits are brought to Clyde by rabbit raisers from the Rule-Haskell area north, Weatherford-Ranger area east, Comanche-Brownwood area on the south, and Abilene-Colorado City area west.

Commercial rabbit production in this area is 10 times greater now than at the beginning of the co-op.

There are 72 Commercial Rabbit Raisers in this area who are co-op members.

The Commercial Rabbit Co-operative was formed Nov. 1, 1969 during a meeting attended by J. W. Jackson, Clinton Peat, Ed Garnett and Aubrey Simpson, all of Amarillo, and Walker and Nancy Parker of Happy.

The primary purpose in forming the cooperative was to form marketing association for the rabbit industry," Peat said. "The Commercial Rabbit Raisers are striving to get the rabbits out of the hobby class and put them into an industrial classification."

Callahan County Museum Receives Antique Collection of Pioneers

BAIRD — An antique collection enclosed in a handsome oak display cabinet, has been presented to the Callahan Co. Library and Museum by Haynie Sides of Abilene, in memory of his grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. W. H. Gilliland, early pioneers of Callahan County.

The late Mr. and Mrs. Gilliland, owned a ranch in the south part of the county, which later was known as the Alex McWhorter Ranch. The Gilliland family made the ranch their home for many years before moving to Abilene. Four children were born to Mr. and Mrs. Gilliland, one daughter being the late Mrs. Clara Gilliland Sides, mother of Mr. Sides.

Among the well preserved collection is Volume 2 of the

cumseh Banner, a pioneer newspaper published by W. E. Gilliland, cousin of Mr. Gilliland. The paper became the Callahan County Clarendon in 1879, later the Baird Weekly Star in 1887.

Mrs. Gilliland was an aunt of Mrs. Beas Driskill, Mrs. Inez Boydston and Mrs. Ruby Anderson, all residents of Baird. Mrs. Driskill remembered numerous articles in the collection, one being the bone handled forks used by these early day pioneers.

The Callahan County Library and Museum would like to express its appreciation to Mr. Sides for presenting this collection, that will now take its place among so many valued memories in the museum.

He took complete ownership of the business in 1947 and operated it until his retirement.

Survivors are his wife; one daughter, Mrs. Burton Veteto of Hobbs, N. M.; two grandsons; a brother, Earl of California; and a sister, Mrs. R. C. Shelton of Stamford.

A son, Neal, preceded him in death in 1924.

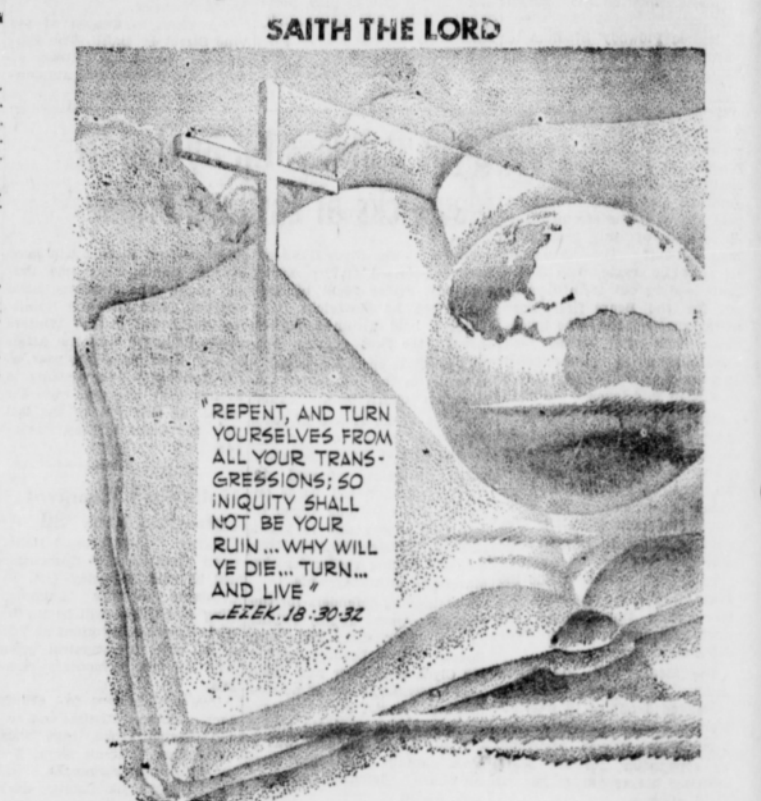

UNDERSTANDING THE SCRIPTURES

(continued from last week)

If God wants men to all understand the Bible alike, then why is there so much confusion about what the scriptures teach? What causes such a problem, and what is the solution to it?

If the Bible is what it claims to be (a lamp to our feet and a light to our path -- Psa. 119:105), then it surely supplies the solution to this perplexing problem. And, it does!

Proverbs 2:1-9. 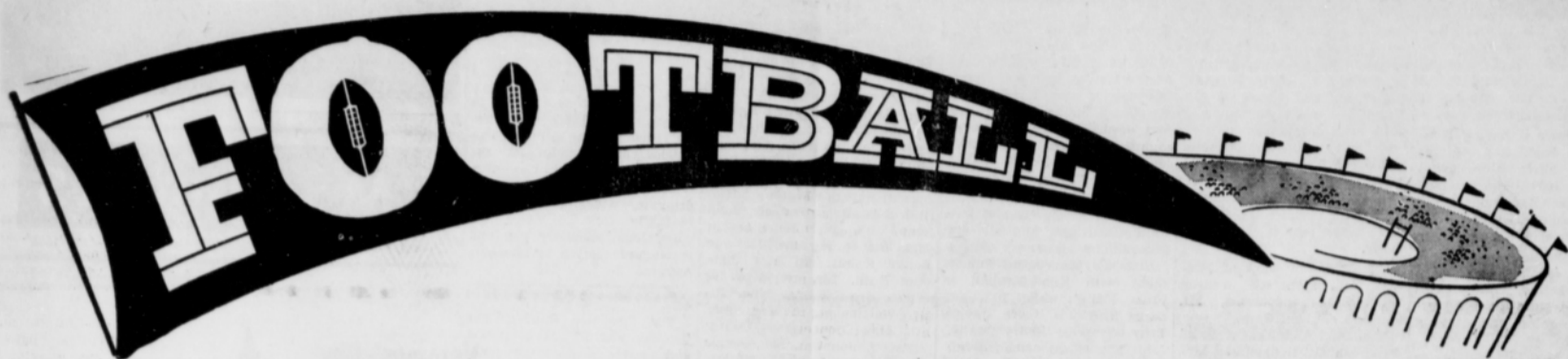

Hunters Urged to Exercise Caution Near Telephone Equipment

BAIRD — Hunting season is underway in many areas. West Texas Telephone Company has issued a plea to all hunters to exercise caution when shooting near telephone equipment.

Harvey Womack, Business Manager of the telephone company in Baird, said that damage to telephone lines, insulators, and other outside equipment by gunfire is not too frequent. "But just one incident of this kind can cause extreme inconvenience to our customers," Womack added, "and could produce disastrous results if there is an emergency in the area."

"Repair of equipment is often delayed in remote areas,"

said Womack, "because it is difficult to find the exact location of the damages."

He pointed out that the importance of telephone communications in the rural areas is greatly magnified during the hunting season. He cited several situations which would require the quick summoning of aid; such as, gunshot wounds, or other injuries to hunters, vehicle accidents due to increased traffic, and campfires spreading out of control.

"We hope that all hunters will be extremely cautious near telephone equipment, both for their own safety and for the well being of the residents near hunting areas."
