-000-A Clean Community

Every Texas family needs the assurance that it is living in a clean and healthy communitty. according to Dr. Henry A. Holle, Commissioner of Health. The family needs the assurance that when disease threatens, there will be a local health agency ready to combat it on a community wide basis. Texas now has 47 full time city and county health units covering 57 counties. These 57 counties have 62 percent of the State" a population State's population.

An adequately staffed and fi-nanced local health department provides six basic services to the citizens of the town or county. It keeps public health statistics, controls communicable diseases, promotes maternal and child health forces environmental sanitation operates a public health labora-tory and works to educate the community for better health. Each local health department will of necessity differ from others and the most effective public health program must be "tailor made' to fit the particular health needs and problems of its own community

Alan Abel has built his career around drums. His presentation of The history of the Drum and Its Effect on Civilization Today" the product of years of study, re-search and practical experience. search

The drum is perhaps the oldest musical instrument known to man. An actual drum with curved drumsticks belonging to the Egyptians was found during the excavations at Thebes in 1823. Every race of people. white, yellow, red, black, used the drum in their wars and religious and social rites since the earliest dawn of history. The use of drum in war and peace is inextricably woven into the lives of people of all ages and climes. is probably the most universal of all musical instruments. Abel emphasizes the fascinating story of drums, accenting their niche in he musical world of today...but es it with deftness, drollery and hilarious double-talk. He will be the High School Auditorium Nov. 4th at 8:45 a.m.

At present 197 counties in Texas do not have full time health pro-tection. Dr. Holle has as one of his goals complete health protection in every county of the state. Some counties now have a large enough population to provide this service but for counties having sparse population, two or more could pool their resources and have the advantage of up to date public health methods.

Dr. Holle points out that giving full time health service to the entire state will require a substantial increase in the expenditure of funds for public health purposes. In his opinion this is the best investment any community can make. Although great strides have been made in maternal and infant health and in disease prevention, Texans cannot be content with less than complete eradiiation of preventable, A state in which local deaths. health services are available everywhere is an important step toward this goal.

The stomach, the experts say, is largely controlled by the involun-tary nervous system. You get keyed up, your stomach over-secretes, and you feel the pain. Actually, the Department points

out, there are many directly trace-able causes of indigestion. Lack of sleep or exercise, improper diet, and similar artificial conditions can bring it on. You've heard the old saw about

one man's meat being another man's poison. It's litterally true Even healthful and nutritious foods may rub you wrong. They contain organic acids which upset the balance of your particular tomache.

Your favorite fruit may contain malic-acid, oxalic-acid, or citric acid. One or more of these may give you trouble, causing ungentle-manly or unlady-like belching. Or the degree if ripeness of a fruit or vegtabl may cause fermentation in the stomache, bringing on

unpleasant results. Condiments or strongly flavored foods are other causes of indigestion. They offten cause the stomach to secrete too much hydrochloric acid In normal pople the stomach neutralizes what it over-secretes, but people with ulcers suffer painful indigestion."

Greasy foods are particularly troublesome to people with malfunctioning gall bladders or liver diseases. Tannic-acid can be found in

three of the most commonly used ot drinks. And here's the last straw: Even water, if you drink lots of it, may start your stomach churning and pouring out its digestive juices.


