O'Donnell Schools Advancing Rapidly

The O'Donnell public school is keeping pace with the advancement of the town and surrounding country. At the close of school last year there had been 438 pupils enrolled, this year the average attendance has been around 500 and the enrollment at the close of the school is above 600. The school has been classified by the State Department of Education as a standard four-year Class A school and full affiliation in all high school subjects has been applied for. This will likely be granted by the beginning of another term.

A library costing over \$750 has been added during the past year and a laboratory for the instruction of two classes in science has been added which cost \$750. No teacher in the school is being paid less than a month.

The \$25,000 addition to the former building which was completed at the beginning of the present term, has already proven inadequate to serve the increased attendance and plans are under way for the construction of another building. The auditorium in the present building is too small, has no study hall and no more rooms to provide for the future growth of the school, every room being occupied, one class is now being taught in the auditorium.

Superintendent Rickard is deserving of praise for the able manner in which he has managed the school during the past year, and if the patrons and citizens will stand behind him in providing adequate school facilities, O'Donnell will come into the limelight as one of the best school towns on the Southplains. He was unanimously reelected as superintendent for the next year.

More Skyjuice Puts New Life in Crops

Just as a crust had begun to form over the plowed land and the tender plants were poking their heads through the soil great gobs of good old skyjuice fell Saturday afternoon giving the finishing touches to make the farming interests of the country 100 per cent. Perhaps 50 per cent of the crops had been planted, and with the splendid season in the ground, the farmers have been taking advantage of the fine weather this week to complete the planting of the greatest acreage ever planted on the Southplains.

Old-timers state that the present prospects are above normal and much greater than last year when more than 14000 bales of cotton were ginned in O'Donnell, some even predicting that more cotton will be gathered this fall than last if it does not rain another drop. But we are sure to have more rain and more rain means that the world will sit up and take notice that this is the best farming country in the world.

The rain of Saturday was general over all the country embraced in O'Donnell trade territory, the heaviest precipitation seeming to center here where around two inches fell. The fall was reported to be around half an inch at Tredway on the east, but one and a half inches fell in the Newmoore country to the west. The rain was also heavy to the south and north.

Two Boys Shot While Riding in Auto

A regrettable near tragedy occurred Friday night about 10 o'clock near the stock pens when a car driven by Ennis Curtis was fired upon, two shots entering the car one of which struck Homer Cargal in the shoulder, plowed its way through and struck his hand making an ugly wound and clipped the end off a finger. The same bullet ripped a furrow through the cheek of Eugene McKinley and passed on out through the windshield of the car. The other shot entered the car from the side and only missed Curtis by a margin so narrow that he felt the impact as it buried itself in the seat cushion. Roy Gaultney was the other occupant of the car. Sheriff Boone Dillard, of Lamesa, Sheriff J. M. Simpson of Tahoka, and Special Policeman W. V. Tolbert of O'Donnell, were arrested and placed under bond charged with the shooting, the bonds of Dillard and Simpson were placed at \$2,000 each and Tolbert's \$1,000.

According to Ennis Curtis, the party were driving about town and when near the stockpens the car was stopped and the officers came to it and searched it for booze. After the search the boys drove away but later returned and upon approaching the officers a light was flashed at them, but thinking it was a salute they drove on a short distance and decided to return. When approaching the officers they were commanded to halt and before the car came to a stop, three shots were fired, two of which left their mark as above stated.

The boys were taken to physicians and their wounds dressed, and if no complications arise they will soon be well, but disfigured for life.

No statement has been made so far as the Index has been able to learn as to why the parties charged with the shooting fired the shots. Complaint had been made to the officers that booze was being sold to employes of the railroad company camped near the stockpens and they were there to stop this illicit traffic.

Patrons of the school will be gratified to learn that Dr. W. P. Horn, president of the Texas Technological College, will deliver the commencement address. This will be held Friday night, May 28. Dr. Horn is one of the foremost educators in Texas and his coming will be received with much interest. The exercises will probably be held in one of the churches as the auditorium is too small to accommodate the crowd that is sure to attend.

Engineer Making Survey of City to Submit Cost of Water Works and Drainage

Engineer Wills representing the Devlin Engineering Company of Amarillo, arrived Wednesday and has since been engaged in making a survey of the town to determine the cost of cutting drainage ditches to carry off the flood waters, and also to survey the town for the proposed water system and make blue prints with an estimated cost of the project and submit same to the city council.

As soon as Mr. Wills completes the work, an election will be ordered to vote bonds for both improvements. The recent heavy rains have proven the necessity of the town being drained, since some of the

streets have become almost impassable. The work under contemplation will include the grading and leveling of the streets as well as draining.

The town needs a water works system and no doubt both issues will carry when voted on.

Commissioners Court Orders Bond Election

Among the important measure acted upon by the court was the ordering of an election to vote a 15 cent maintenance road bonds for the upkeep of the rural roads and one to vote bonds to the amount of \$500,000 for the hard surfacing of the two designated highways through the county. The elections will be held on the same day, possibly the last day of June.

Petition For Road Bond Election Is Filed

A petition was filed with Commissioner's court Monday asking that an election be called to determine whether or not bonds in the sum of \$500,000 should be issued with which to build hard surfaced highways and improvement of the lateral roads of the county.

At time of going to press Wednesday the petition had not been acted upon but the election will no doubt be ordered before the court adjourns.

The State adopted the policy of granting dollar for dollar in highway building and in some instances it has been much more liberal than that. Those initiating this movement have good reason to believe that the state will be more liberal than that in this instance.

A engineer, in conversation with the News editor and others, gave it as his opinion that a good standard Macadam system of roads can be built through Lynn County at a cost of about \$21,000 per mile. Seventy-five per cent of the highway mileage in America is built of this material, he stated, crushed rock base with asphalt surface.—Lynn County News.
