AMENDMENTS TO BE SETTLED BY VOTE

We are this week publishing a concise summary of the content of four of the constitutional amendments which voters are to decide upon this fall.


They are numbered as follows, and their general purpose is worked as briefly and as plainly as possible:

H. J. R. No. 9 proposing an amendment to Section 26 of Article 3 of the Constitution, providing that no county shall be entitled to more than 7 representatives, regardless of its population until 1s shall have reached a population of 700,000.

ment to the constitution fixing the salary of Governor at \$12.000; Altorney General at \$10.000; Comptroller, Treas-urer and Commissioner of the General Land Office at \$6.000, and Secretary of State at \$6.000.

State at \$8,000. S. J. R. No. 26, proposing an amendment to the constitution, to provide for a board of Pardons and Paroles, composed of three members, whose terms of office shall be for a period of six years. One to be appointed by the Governor, one by the Chief Justice of the Supreme Court of the State of Texas, and one by the pressing Justice of the Court of Criminal Appeals, such appointments to be made with the advice and consent of two-thirds of the Senate present; and so as to previde that the governor of the state shall have the power on the recom-
