In contrast to the 6,000 apprentice-trained pharmacists who practiced a century ago, there are now 102,000, the great majority college-trained. And, instead of fewer than 5,000 drug stores, most of them physician-owned, today there are more than 53,0000, all w qualified

#### Coffee 'Sneak' Becomes 'Break' in Los Angeles

LOS ANGELES-The first municipal recognition of man's inalienable right to drink a cup of coffee during working hours on the bosses' time is working out fine for both the City of Los Angeles and its 15,000 employees, according to Samuel Leask, Jr., administrative officer.

Los Angeles became the first U.S. city to legalize coffee breaks for municipal workers when it passed an ordinance authorizing employees to take 15 minutes each morning and afternoon at no loss of pay or time to themselves. Previously, city workers had been permitted to take such breaks but the time was deducted from their lunch periods when-and if-employees reported it.

According to Leask, replacement of the coffee "sneak" with the regulated coffee break has been a decided "plus" operation for the

"The purpose of making the coffee breaks legal and regulated was to increase work output and thus promote efficiency and economy in the conduct of city business," he said. "After several months of observation, it certainly seems to be working out that way.

"Just like the coffee break in offices and factories, our city rest periods have ended time-wasting 'sneak outs' and other abuses which were costly to taxpayers."

An owlish youngster stared at the gent, but made no effort to assist him. "Was he trying to catch the train?" the station agent asked



#### Cancer Killer That Spares Life Sought

BERKELEY, Calif.-What would be the ideal chemical to kill cancer cells and at the same time leave normal tissues of the body unharmed?

A new approach to this difficult question will be undertaken by team of scientists in the University of California School of Medicine, San Francisco, with the aid of a \$10,000 grant from the Damon Runyon Fund.

At the present time the trial and error method usually guides the search for cancer-fighting chemicals. Chemicals are made in the laboratory, then tried on cancerous mice. If they have some effect on cancer, they are then tried on human patients.

There are at present two chief classes of cancer-fighting chemi-

In each case the chemicals that inhibit cancer growth so far tried have not been able to make a sharp enough distinction between cancer cells and normal cells.

The scientists will study the basic chemical reactions that take place between the chemicals and both cancer and normal tissue.

Their goal is to learn enough about the reactions to be able to write specifications for chemicals that would carry out the desired inhibiting reactions with cancer cells but not with normal cells.

1 cup fine graham cracker crumbs
1/4 cup melted butter
1 pkg. lemon gelatin
1 cup boiling water
9-oz. can crushed pineapple, not drained
1/2 cup Pet Evaporated Milk

Mix crumbs with butter and press in bottom as on sides of a 9-inch pie pan. Chill until need Dissolve gelatin in water. Stir in pineapple. Quantil mixture starts to thicken. Chill milk in tray until almost frozen around the edges. We ice-cold milk in cold quart bowl with rorat beat or electric beater at high speed, until stiff. It is to crumb crust. into gelatin mixture.
