Lecture on Cotton Co-operative Marketing



Cotton cooperative marketing will be told the farmers of Lynn county at 8 o'clock at the High School auditorium Friday night, July 24, according to M. Mitchell, district supervisor of the Texas Farm Bureau Cotton Association.

C. O. Moser of Dallas, secretary of this association, who has done more for the advancement of cotton marketing in the South than any one man, will be the principal speaker. Mr. Moser will discuss the organization, operation and success of the association, and will tell the farmers of this section the next step in cooperative marketing. Steps have been taken towards bringing out a full attendance of the membership as well as a large representation of non member cotton growers, bankers, merchants, business men and others who are directly interested in the welfare of the farmer.

Mr. Moser is considered authority on cotton cooperative marketing and was one of the organizers of the association. Since that time he has been actively connected with the movement in an official capacity, and is likewise secretary of the American Cotton Growers Exchange. This exchange marketed one million bales last year.

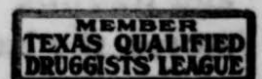

Notice of Election

"ELECTION ORDER"

WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of O'Donnell, Texas, deems it advisable to issue bonds of the said City for the purpose hereinafter mentioned:

THEREFORE BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF O'DONNELL, TEXAS:

That an election be held on the 5th day of August, 1925, at which election the following proposition shall be submitted:

Shall the City Council of the City of O'Donnell, Texas, be authorized to issue bonds of the city of O'Donnell, Texas, in the sum of \$25,000.00, payable \$3,000 in 11 years, \$3,000 in sixteen years, \$3,000 in 21 years, \$4,000 in 26 years, \$4,000 in 31 years, \$4,000 in 36 years, \$4,000 in 40 years from the date thereof, bearing interest at the rate of Six (6 per cent) per cent per annum, payable semi-annually, and to levy a tax sufficient to pay the interest on said bonds and create a sinking fund sufficient to redeem them at maturity, for the purpose of constructing street improvements in the City of O'Donnell, Texas, as authorized by the Constitution and General Laws of the State of Texas with reference to Cities and Towns.

The said election shall be held at The City Hall in the City of O'Donnell, and the following named persons are hereby appointed managers of said election, to-wit:—

A. B. Fortner, Presiding officer.
W. R. Sanderson
C. M. Cox, Judges.
Sam Pfrimmer,
T. C. Brown, Clerks.

The said election shall be held under the provisions of the Constitution and General laws of the State of Texas, now in force with reference to such elections and bond issues governing cities and towns, and only qualified voters, who are property taxpayers of said city, shall be allowed to vote.

All voters who favor the proposition to issue bonds shall have written or printed upon their ballots the words: "For the Issuance of Street Improvement Bonds and the Levy of Tax Therefor."

And those opposed shall have written or printed on their ballots the words: "Against the Issuance of Street Improvement Bonds and Levy of Tax Therefor."

The manner of holding said election shall be governed by the laws of the State regulating general elections.

A copy of this order, signed by the Mayor of the City of O'Donnell, attested by the City Secretary of the said City, shall serve as a proper notice of said election.

The Mayor is authorized and directed to cause said notice of the election to be posted up at the City Hall, and at one public place in each of the voting places in the City of O'Donnell for at least thirty full days prior to the date of said election.

The Mayor is further authorized and directed to have said notice of election published in some newspaper of general circulation published in said City, to-wit, The O'Donnell Index, which notice shall be published once each week until the date of said election, the date of the first publication being not less than thirty full days prior to the date of the election.

Notice of Election "ELECTION ORDER"

WHEREAS: the city Council of the City of O'Donnell, Texas, deems it advisable to issue bonds of the said City for the purpose hereinafter mentioned:

THEREFORE BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF O'DONNELL, TEXAS:

That an election be held on the 5th day of August, 1925, at which election the following proposition shall be submitted:

"Shall the City Council of the City of O'Donnell, Texas, be authorized to issue bonds of the City of O'Donnell, Texas, in the sum of \$65,000.00, payable \$7,000 in 11 years, \$5,000 in 16 years, \$7,000 in 21 years; \$8,000 in 26 years, \$12,000 in 31 years; \$17,000 in 36 years; \$9,000 in 40 years from the date thereof, bearing interest at the rate of Six (6 per cent) per cent per annum, payable semi-annually, and to levy a tax sufficient to redeem them at maturity, for the purpose of constructing a Waterworks System in the City of O'Donnell, Texas, as authorized by the Constitution and general Laws of the State of Texas, with reference to cities and towns.

The said election shall be held at The City Hall in the City of O'Donnell and the following named persons are hereby appointed managers of said election, to-wit:—

- A. B. Fortner, Presiding Officer.
- W. R. Sanderson,
- C. M. Cox, Judges.
- Sam Pfrimmer,
- T. C. Brown, Clerks.

The said election shall be held under the provisions of the Constitution and General Laws of the State of Texas, now in force with reference to such elections and bond issues governing cities and towns, and only qualified voters, who are property taxpayers of said city, shall be allowed to vote.

All voters who favor the proposition to issue bonds shall have written or printed upon their ballots the words: "For the Issuance of Waterworks Bonds and Levy of Tax Therefor."

And those opposed shall have written or printed on their ballots the words: "Against the Issuance of Waterworks Bonds and Levy of Tax Therefor."

The manner of holding said election shall be governed by the laws of the State regulating general elections.

A copy of this order, signed by the Mayor of the City of O'Donnell, attested by the City Secretary of the said City, shall serve as a proper notice of said election.

The Mayor is authorized and directed to cause said notice of the election to be posted up at the City Hall, and at one public place in each of the voting places in the City of O'Donnell, for at least thirty full days prior to the date of said election.

The Mayor is further authorized and directed to have said notice of election published in some newspaper of general circulation published in said city, to-wit, The O'Donnell Index, which notice shall be published once each week until the date of said election, the date of the first publication being not less than thirty full days prior to the date of the election.
