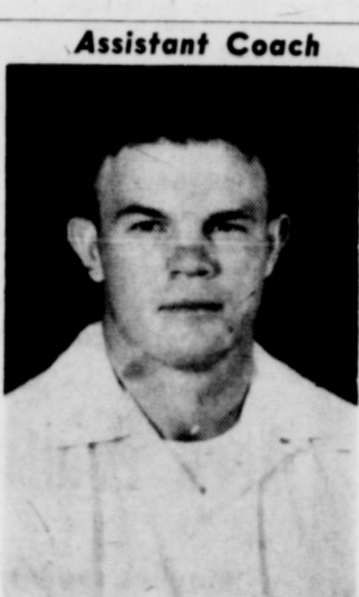

Work To Start On 4-Lane Highway 87 In Dawson

Contract was let last week for the construction of the link in highway 87 between O'Donnell and Lamesa for more than \$400,000 to a Lubbock firm.

When completed this four lane divided super-highway will be one of the most modern in the state. The new road will end for the time at the Lynn Co. line. The next "leg" of the road from O'Donnell to Tahoka probably will not be advertised for bid before next year. Much machinery is currently being moved in and work is expected to start soon.

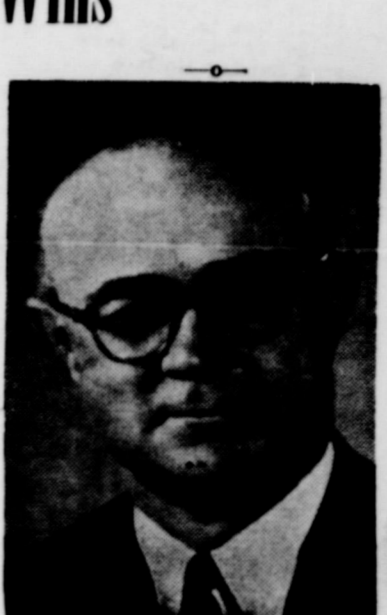

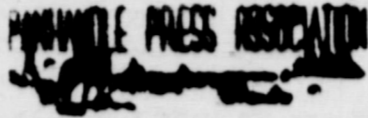
