Early Freeze Hits Crops

The first killing freeze and frost of the fall season was recorded Saturday night and Sunday morning with a low of 29 degrees — about ten days earlier than the average date of Nov. 4th.

Cotton and grain vegetation is killed and pulling and machine harvesting is currently in full swing.

Farmers generally agree that the early freeze will cut the expected record crop to a moderate or great extent especially the late cotton planted in June after the hail storm. However the early freeze is not expected to be too great an economic loss provided the weather remains dry and warm for the next three weeks and a hard freeze does not hit the sappy bolls.

Local gins reported 9,567 bales being ginned with the cotton crop being estimated as 40 percent completed. Gins yards were full of cotton Tuesday having a backlog of cotton to be processed.

Summer Clayton, local grain man, reported the grain harvest as slow due to past weeks of wet weather.

Week end business was very good with the grocery firms getting the lion's share of money spent.

Ear Trouble Still Problem

Severe infections of the ear are not as common as they were before the appearance of sulfa drugs and antibiotics. But while the severity and frequency of these infections have been reduced, earaches still occur.

Most ear pain comes during childhood, the reason being that small children have shorter passages for infections to reach the ear. When they get colds, they do not blow the nose or clear the throat as adults do. This results in an accumulation of mucus which may congest narrow passages and start an ear infection.

Infections of this type begin when bacteria reach the middle ear. The

infections of this type begin when bacteria reach the middle ear. The pain—intermittent at first, then constant—is a sign that this has happened. In this condition, pain may be followed by drainage. The start of drainage may mean the end of pain because the pressure has been relieved. Pain subsides only when pressure and infections have been brought under control.

As bacteria multiply and produce their poisons, the body's natural defenses rise to fight the infection. Blood vessels expand to carry more blood to the ear. Serum passes from blood vessels into the middle ear to try to neutralize the invading bacteria. White blood cells, normally present in the body, increase in numbers to destroy bacteria.

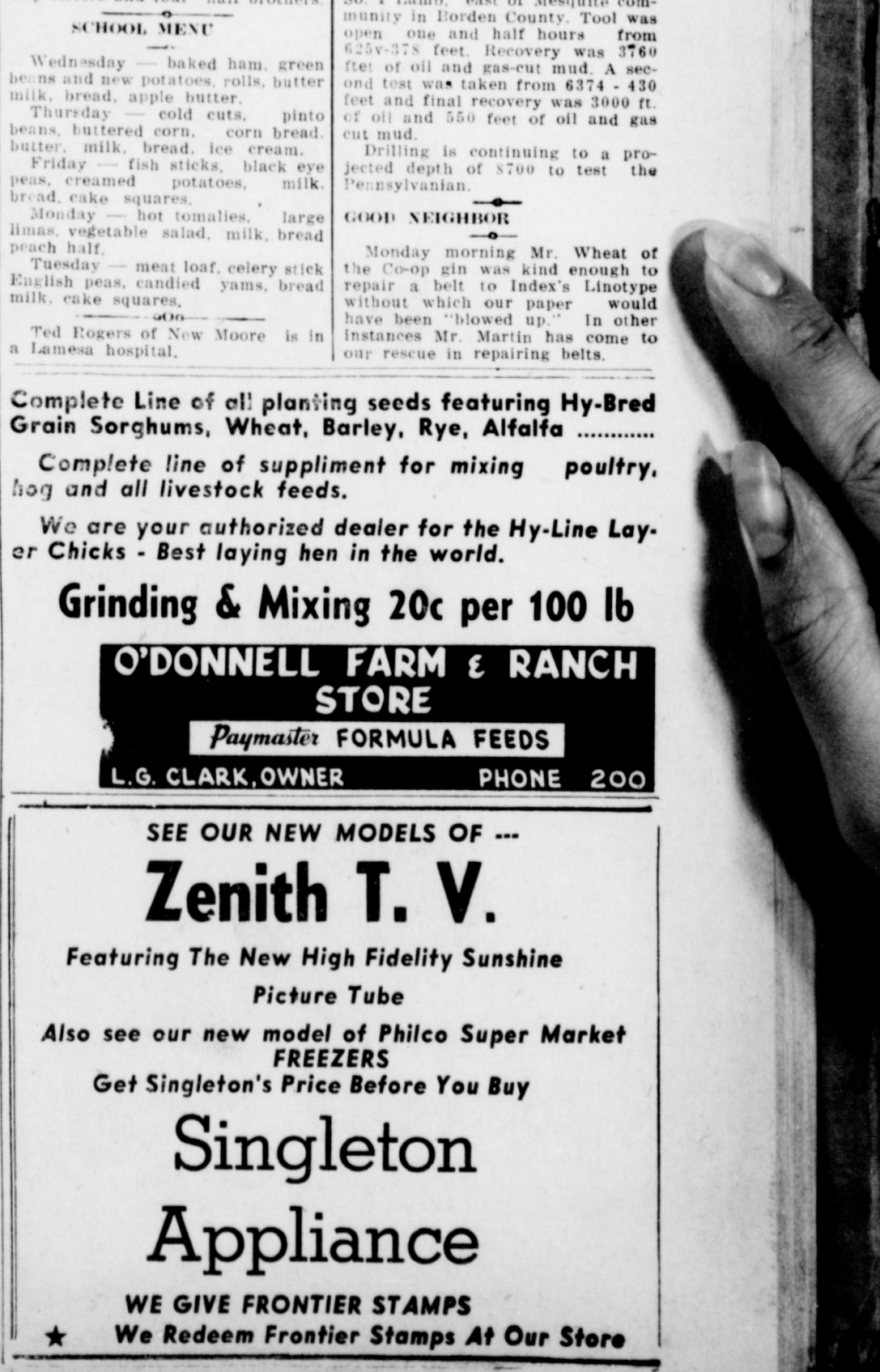

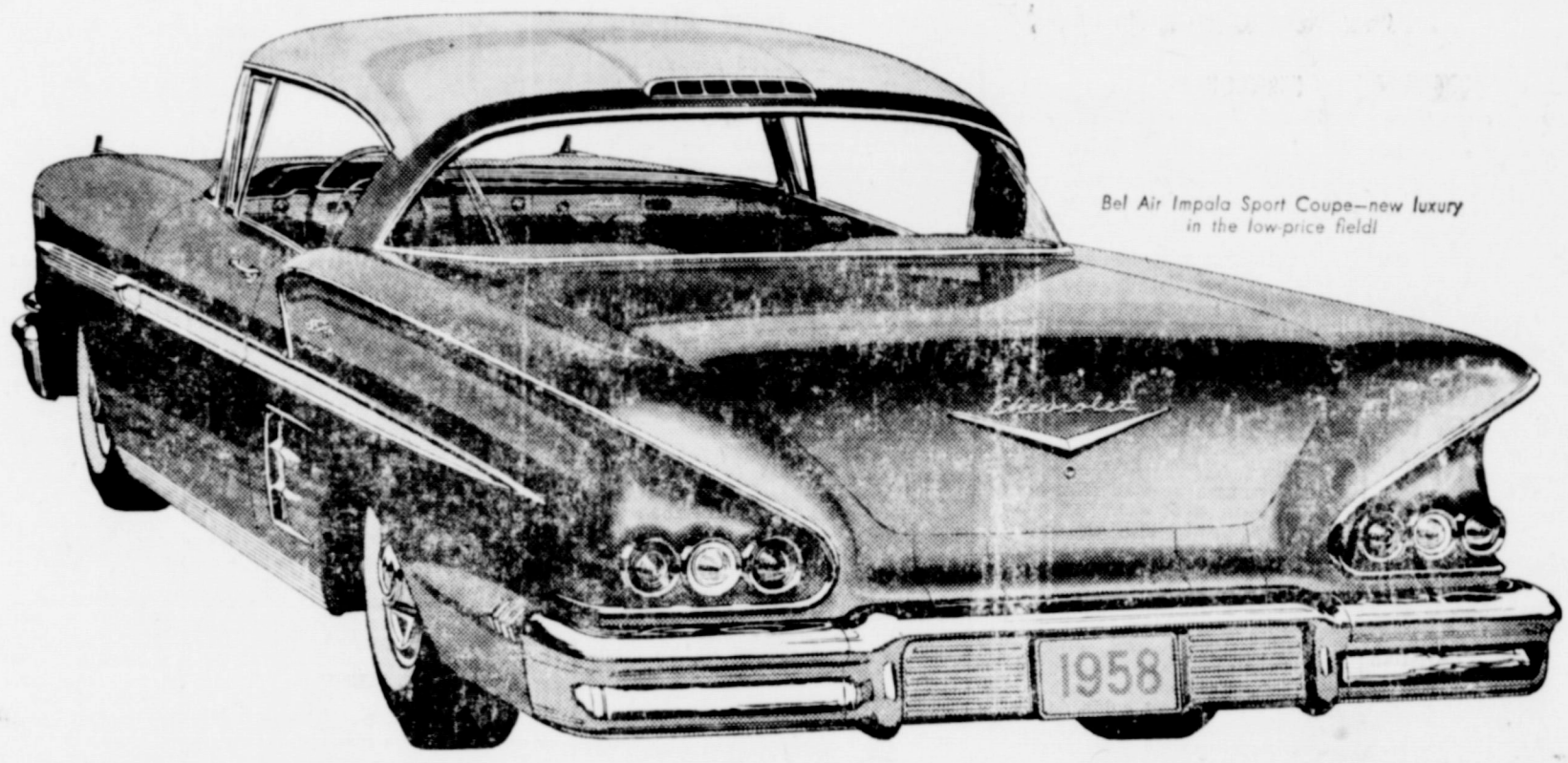

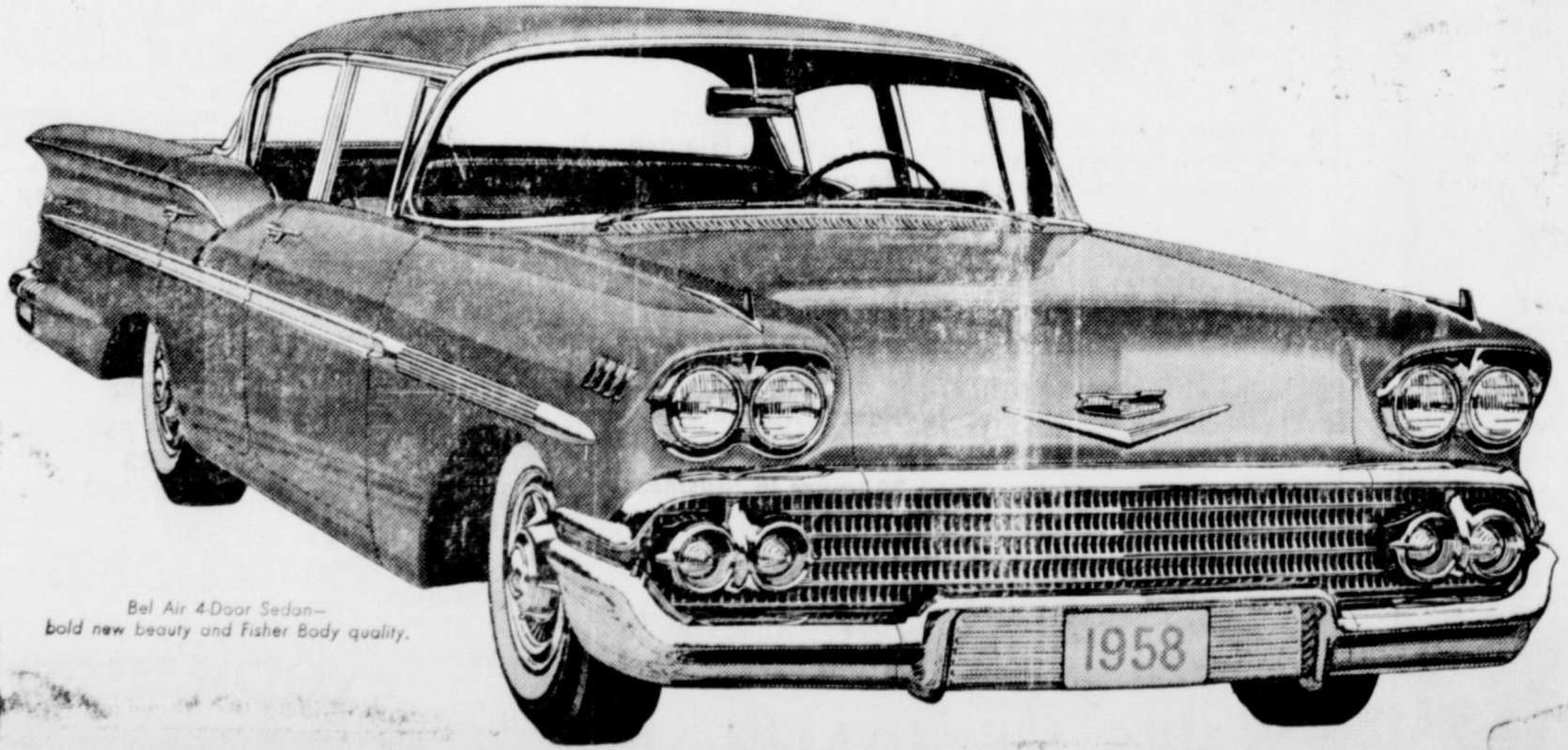

 ies will include no games of chance.

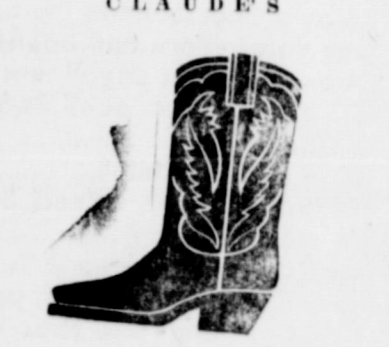
