Gleghorn Funeral Rites Held Tuesday

Funeral services were conducted at the Church of Christ here Tuesday afternoon for E. A. Gleghorn, pioneer resident of the O'Donnell territory who passed away Monday night in a Lubbock sanitarium. Elder R. P. Drennon paid the last tributes of respect and those to the deceased as scores of grieving friends gathered with the family. A heart attack was immediate cause of Mr. Gleghorn's death.

He is survived by his widow; two sons, Finis and Ernest Gleghorn, both of this place; two daughters, Mrs. Vernon Lane and Mrs. Gesse Lane, also of O'Donnell; two brothers, A. V. Gleghorn of Mason and V. V. Gleghorn of Artesia, N. M.; and two sisters, Mrs. F. P. Patterson and Mrs. A. L. Sewall, both of Pflugerville.

A resident of this territory for a number of years, Mr. Gleghorn was numbered among the most influential and respected citizens in his community. He had always taken an active interest in community affairs, especially the school, and served as a member of the board of education for his district for several years.

His death is a sharp loss not only to his family but also to this entire section. The Index joins with other friends in extending sympathy to the bereaved.

Mexican Killed Saturday In Fight

One Mexican was instantly killed, another seriously injured and others less seriously hurt here Saturday night as a result of a free-for-all fracas at the Mexican dance hall at the edge of town.

Reports concerning the cause of the trouble conducted but apparently the source was a family argument in which one Mexican objected to another dancing with his wife. One word led to another until the matter was settled with fists and knives, a stab in the heart instantly killing one. Another was treated at the clinic, and others are nursing minor injuries.

The Mexican who inflicted the fatal wound fled the scene before local officers reached the place, and radio messages giving descriptions were broadcast early Monday.

COUNTY AGENTS PLAN TWO-DAY MEETING SOON

A two-day meeting for all county agents and AAA administrators in district 2 of the state extension service is being planned for the middle of this month, to discuss the 1940 cotton program. The meeting will be held in Lubbock, but the place has not been definitely decided, said J. Lynn Mauk, district field agent.

COTTON LOADING CHARGES ARE NOW ELIMINATED

Loading charges for cotton on all railroads in Texas, for both intra and inter-state shipments are now a thing of the past, say local railroad men.

The 5 cents per bale charge on inter-state shipments was removed October 16, and the Railroad Commission of Texas has now ordered the charge removed from intra-state shipments.

Mr. Knapp will also draw plans for an addition which the court expects to build soon.

COTTON CENSUS REPORT SHOWS GINNING INCREASE

E. W. Holloway special agent for the Bureau of the Census, reported Tuesday that Lynn County's ginnings prior to October 18 totaled 38,662 bales as compared with only 21,758 at the same date last year.

During the two weeks since October 18, however, harvest has been favorable for cotton harvest, and local gin men are of the opinion that probably ten thousand bales have been ginned in that period.

Emma Jo Hinkle Is 1939 Football Queen

Emma Jo Hinkle, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. W. A. Hinkle and Junior Class candidate, was elected 1939 Football Queen by an overwhelming majority. Results of the election were announced Wednesday morning at assembly, and the count showed that Emma Jo received 817 of the 1070 votes.

Other class candidates were Cassie Mae Newton, freshman; Wanda Lynn Crouch, sophomore; and Ann Brewer, senior.

Inasmuch as each vote brought in the sum of one penny for the pep squad treasury, the election netted a total of \$107 for the organization. Of this sum approximately \$70 will be spent on construction of two additional sections of the grandstands at Johnson Field. The remainder will be used to defray expenses of the annual Football banquet.

Emma Jo received announcement of her election, one of the highest honors in the power of the school to bestow, with becoming modesty. The three other candidates congratulated her most heartily.

Friday Normal Date For Killing Frost

Friday of this week is the normal date for the first killing frost on the Plains this year, according to figures based on a 27-year record as kept by the date experiment station at Lubbock. Last year the date was October 23.

Earliest date as recorded by the station is on October 19, frost having come on that date in both 1916 and 1917. Latest date is November 22, occurring twice also, in 1931 and 1934.

So far this fall the frost line of 32 degrees has not been reached, though several counties have reported a temperature below 35 degrees. During the 27 years, the first frost has come ten times in October and 17 times in November.

Three Railroad Commissioners Are Charged

Former Employee Charges Diversion Of Special Fund, Perjury And Conspiracy

AUSTIN, Oct. 30.—Six criminal charges against Railroad Commissioners Lon A. Smith, Jerry Sadler and Ernest O. Thompson were filed in justice court here today by Luther W. Davis, former employe of the commission.

Warrants for the arrest of the three commissioners were issued.

Davis' charges were: Diversion of part of a special fund set aside by law for a specific use, paying public money to a person knowing he is not entitled to receive it, perjury, and conspiracy to commit each of these three alleged offenses.

The complaints were based on an allegation that the commission's September payroll listed one employee as an assistant intrastate rate expert whereas in fact he was employed in the oil and gas division. None of the commissioners was in Austin. Smith and Sadler had gone to Washington, presumably to discuss rail matters with federal officials. Thompson was at Amarillo, his home city.

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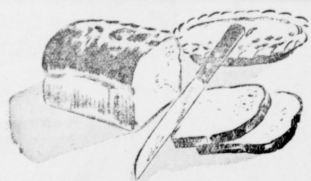

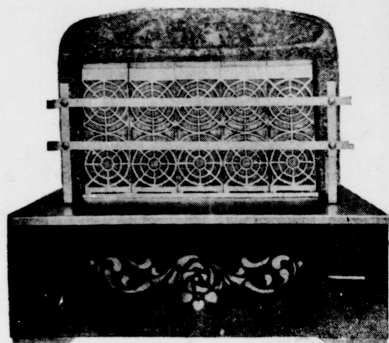
