Cotton acreage in the nation has dropped 37 percent since 1951 but production only 8 percent. The drop in Texas for the same period has been 42 percent in acres but only 1 percent in production.

About 500,000 farmers in the nation had signed 10 million acres of cropland under the Soil Bank by July 27th. They can earn nearly \$225 million if all requirements are met. In Texas 60,000 agreements have been signed. These involve nearly 2 million acres.

A drop of 8 percent in the nation's spring pig crop and an indicated re-duction of 7 percent in the number of sows to farrow this fall promise some relief for swine prices, says John G. McHaney, extension econom-
