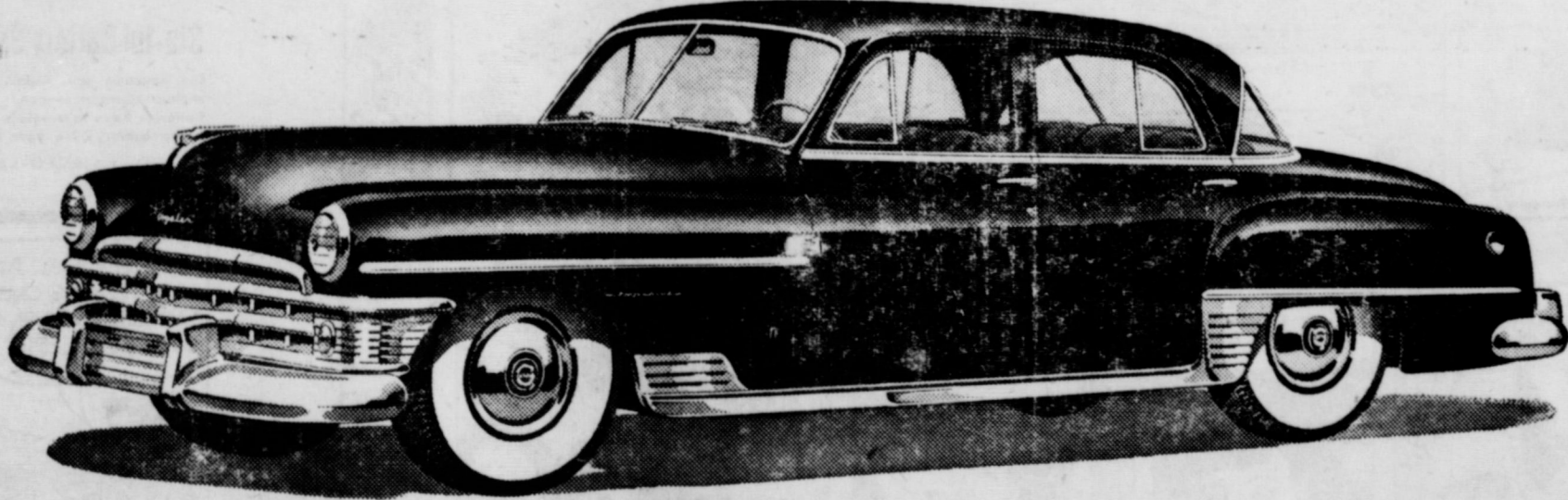

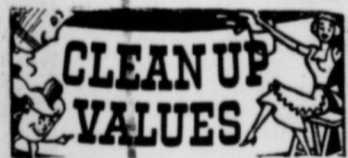

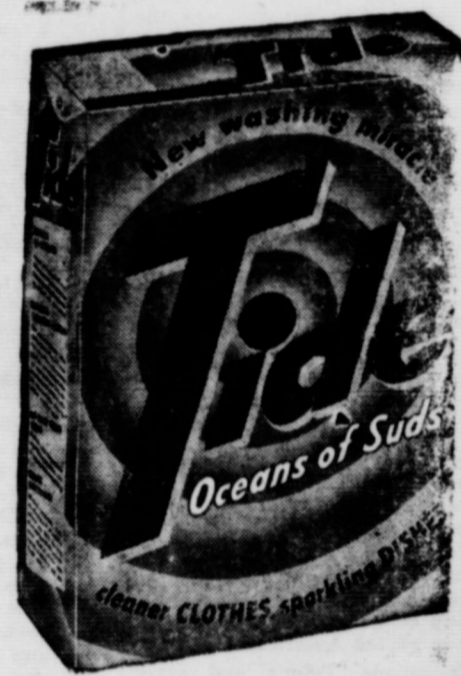

Better Pigs



More than 3,000 Midwest farmers recently viewed pigs raised by Sam and Frank Honegger who have developed a system of vitamin feeding to produce bigger and better swine. The use of antibiotics and minute quantities of vitamin substances, including vitamin B-12, in the daily rations has given growers a new outlook through a lower livestock mortality rate. The pig above fed by the new method gained nearly a pound a day faster than on previous diets at better than five cents less cost per pound of meat.

Trucks Now Hauling Majority of Stock

Chicago Yard Conducts Truck Safety Program

The livestock truck is Number One around the Chicago stock yards these days.

Frank Flynn, general superintendent, says trucks now haul around 70 per cent of livestock received at the world's largest livestock market. Twenty years ago it was only 3 per cent.

The livestock trucker will play the major part in a new phase of the Chicago safety program begun at

the yards last year to reduce livestock losses through bruising.

The yards will keep seven-month records on every livestock trucker bringing livestock to the yards. They will check arriving loads for dead, cripples or obvious bruising.

At the end of the program, drivers with the best records will be rewarded at a truckers' jamboree which contest officials will hold April 6 in the international amphitheatre, home of the International Livestock Exposition.

Livestock farmers will benefit most from the campaign since they share a large part of the cost of this annual loss.



Produce Clean Eggs For Larger Profits

Buyers Will Pay Top Prices for Clean Eggs

Produce clean eggs. Thousands of dollars are lost by poultry raisers every year due to dirty eggs and the resulting deterioration takes place before they are marketed. The prevention of dirty eggs will not only increase the flockowner's income but will build a better market for eggs.

Dirty eggs offer a poor appearance, they cannot be stored successfully and it takes time and



Eggs should be gathered at least three times a day in wire baskets and stored in clean, cool, moist place.

money to clean them. Consequently, buyers are willing to pay more for clean eggs which means more profit to the flockowner.

The production of clean eggs and handling them to maintain quality is not difficult. Deep, dry litter, good ventilation and nests well littered with shaving, excelsior, straw, or other nesting material, will keep the birds from getting dirt and stains on the eggs from their feet. Always keep hens in the house on wet, muddy days.

Immediately after gathering, eggs should be stored in the cleanest, coolest and most moist place on the farm. A cellar with a temperature of 45 to 60 degrees is very good.

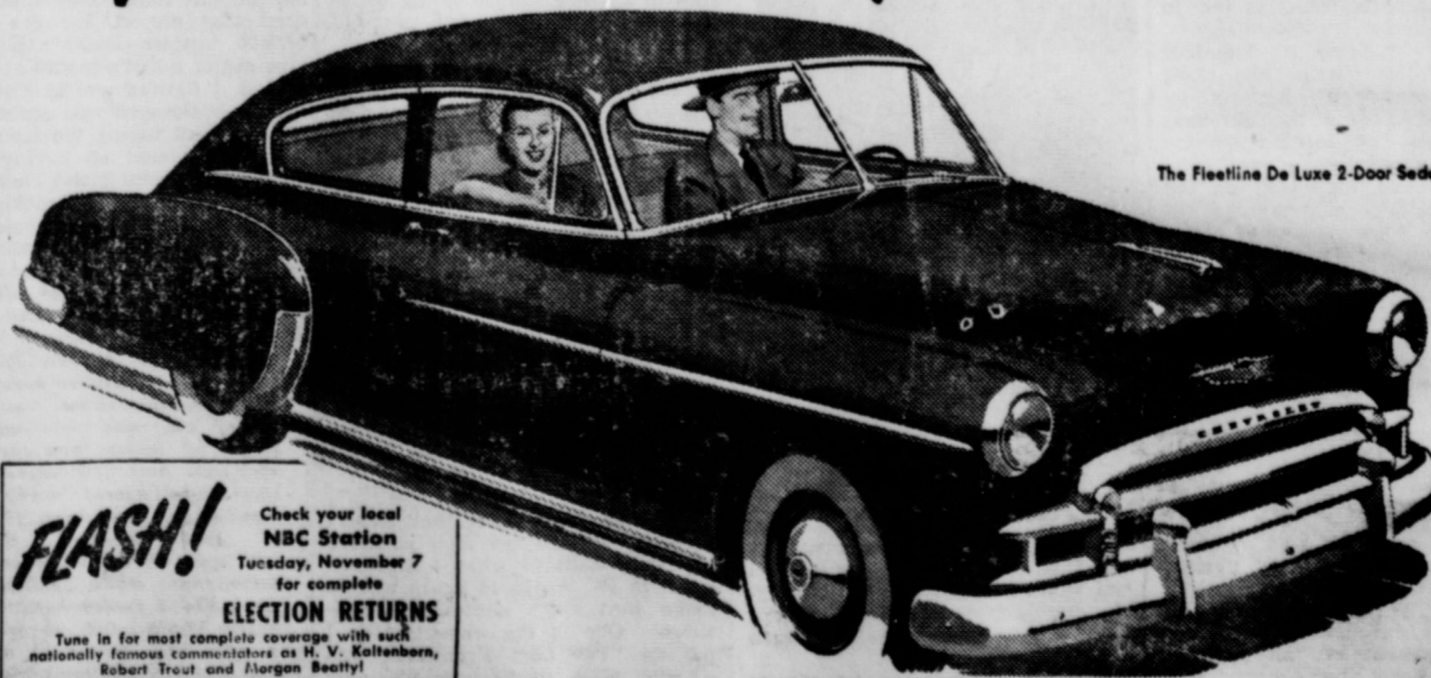

He is an economic expert, a former director of the bureau of foreign and domestic commerce in the department of commerce and a former partner of Dunn & Bradstreet.

Edward W. Barrett as assistant secretary in charge of public affairs acts as sort of general manager and directs the office of international information and educational exchange. He was born in Birmingham, Alabama, is a former newspaper reporter and radio man and was editorial director of Newsweek.

Jack K. McFall was a navy commander during World War II. He is assistant secretary and has charge of congressional relations. He spent fifteen years as clerk of the house appropriations committee. Born in Tacoma, Washington, he lived in Colorado and Indiana and is a graduate of Georgetown and National universities.

George W. Perkins, assistant secretary in charge of the bureau of European affairs, is a native of New York, an army colonel, a graduate of Princeton, and was executive secretary to former postmaster Gen. Will H. Hays. He is a trustee of Princeton University and wears the Legion of Merit badge.

John Hickerson of Texas is an assistant secretary in charge of the bureau of United Nations affairs. His is a foreign service officer of 25 years experience, a graduate of the University of Texas and a lecturer since 1928 on diplomacy and consular practice at the Georgetown University school of foreign service.

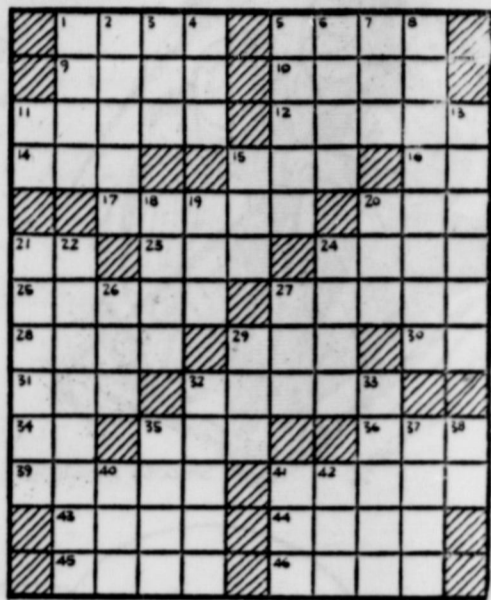

Ratio of Elders Doubles in Century

The ratio of elders to those at the main working years of life has doubled in the United States during the past century, and has increased by nearly two thirds since 1900.

One hundred years ago there were only about six persons at age 65 or older for each 100 of the population at 20 to 64. By 1900 the ratio had climbed to eight, and since then it has risen even more rapidly and is now 13.

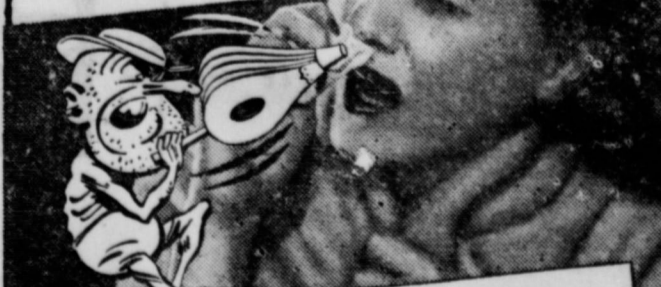
Although the segment of the population at 65 or over has been increasing, the relative importance of the dependent population as a whole has declined, due to a rapid drop in the ratio of children to the population at the main productive ages. The number of children under 18 per 100 persons at ages 20-64 has been cut in half, from 107 in 1850 to about 54 in 1950.

In very recent years, however, due to the war and postwar spurt in the birth rate, this trend has been reversed and the child population has increased at a more rapid rate than people at ages 20-64. This will continue for at least a decade, even if allowance is made for a steady decline in the birth rate from its present level, and at the same time the population at the older ages will continue its long-term upward climb.

As a result, we are entering a period when the country will have to provide for the expanding social and economic needs of both its large child and aged populations, each growing at a faster rate than the population at the main working ages.

THE TRUTH of the business is that life, when a man takes it seriously, is a fight. It is a war between your best and your worst self. Your two other-selves are there every moment, like ghosts, or rather like a bright angel and a dark one.

It is always possible to become a better man than you are; also, alas, it is possible to become far worse than you are. No man stays the same through life. He is continually pressing upward, or plunging downward, or varying between the two. There has been only one person, Christians believe, who actually fulfilled all the good that was possible for him. The possibilities for evil in his life remained only possibilities—he never let them come to pass.

The possibilities for good, on the other hand, became real. His dark angel remained only a ghost; his good angel was simply his real self. At no point in his life was he forced to say to himself, "I wish I had . . . I wish I had not." And yet, even for him life was a struggle. We do not believe he sinned. We do believe he was tempted; and if the temptation was real, then he could have sinned. No man can be really tempted to do what he cannot do. Yes, the Master had his fight. But the point is: he won.

The Way to Win

CHRISTIANS are not exempt in this war of good against evil. We are not "carried to the skies on flowery beds of ease" any more than Jesus was. We do not drift into the Promised Land. We have to fight our way uphill.

Yet Christians are expected to win. That is, God stands beside each Christian in his fight, and God's power is for the Christian's use. As Saint Paul says, with each temptation God provides a "way of escape." Our prayer, "Lead us not into temptation" can always be answered. Sometimes it can be answered by ourselves. That is, we cannot leave the fight to God.

But we can win as Jesus won: sometimes by standing and doing battle where we are, sometimes simply by leaving temptation behind. For often the best thing to be done is to retreat. Get as far as you can from whatever tempts your worse self. Don't stand debating between right and wrong when you know which is which. Turn your back on the wrong . . . run, don't walk, to the nearest exit!

Is Alcoholism a Disease?

ONE OF the common temptations of millions at all times is alcoholism. It is popular to speak of this as a "disease," and yet it is the only disease of which victims have actually cured themselves.

Dr. Brady, whose medical column is well known, reminds us that nobody ever got over migraine headaches, or heart disease, simply by deciding to be well. But men and women have got over alcoholism, essentially by deciding to be well, and sticking to that decision.

Alcoholics Anonymous, that well-known group of former victims, who have been very successful in helping slaves of this habit to become their best selves, use much the same methods we find in the New Testament: (1) staying out of temptation's way, (2) overcoming evil with good; and (3) laying hold of the "Power, not ourselves, that makes for righteousness."

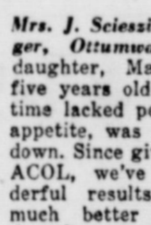

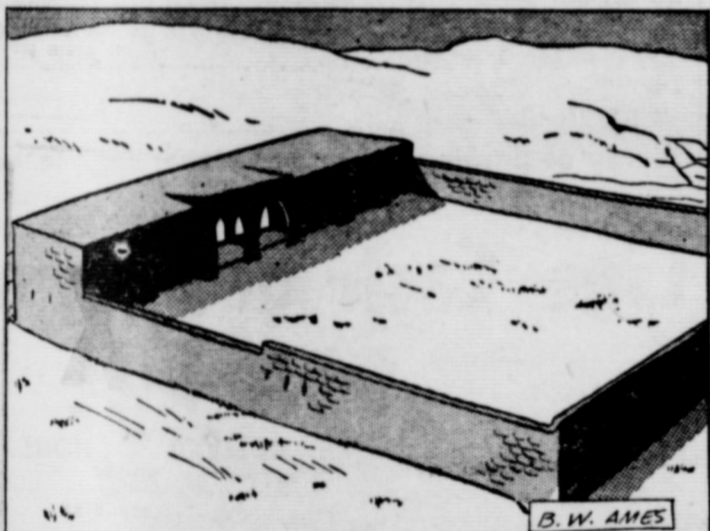

KEEPING HEALTHY

Preparation for Migraine Available

WRITE from time to time about migraine (one-sided headache) which is so often accompanied by nausea and vomiting. It is most often found in those who work hard mentally and physically, are over-conscious and often over-ambitious.

Some years ago, Dr. Mary O'Sullivan reported a large number of cases in which ergotamine tartrate (gynergen) was unusually successful. Previous treatment had been a few days rest in a quiet, darkened room. The breathing in of pure oxygen, suggested by Dr. Walter Alvarez, Mayo Clinic, helped many cases. However, while the usual treatment today is ergotamine tartrate, as some patients have some side reactions therefrom, a preparation in which caffeine is added to ergotamine tartrate is now available.

In Journal of the Missouri State Medical Association, Dr. Robert E. Ryan, St. Louis, reports his results with a preparation known as cafer-

gone containing 1 mg. of ergotamine tartrate and 100 mg. caffeine. It is manufactured in sugar-coated tablet form. It is now used to prevent or shorten the length of the migraine attack or headache caused by too much histamine in the system. However, to obtain the best results, it must be used at the very onset of the attack. Two tablets were found to be the best average dose.

Of 201 cases, 65 per cent obtained excellent results; 14 per cent good results; 11 per cent experienced toxic (poisonous) symptoms which consisted of nausea and abdominal cramps.

It is an excellent preparation to use in absorbing or shortening length of attacks of migraine and cephalalgia (headache) due to histamine for which so many new drugs (antihistamines) are now being manufactured by various drug manufacturers. However, Dr. Ryan does not claim that cafergone is a sure cure for these types of headaches.

HEALTH NOTES
