

TV Antenna is Part of Your Set

With television one of the most popular types of entertainment the TV set has become the object of a great deal of interest. Unfortunately, little or no attention is being paid to the antenna.

In the family's mind, this is just something that goes on the roof after the all-important receiver proudly rests on the living room floor. Such a family is shortsighted in regarding the antenna slightly and is taking a risk of

inferior reception. They would do well to learn what engineers have known for years: that an average set with an excellent antenna will give better reception than an excellent set with a poor antenna. The authority for this statement is Harold Harris, Vice President in charge of Engineering and Research for the Channel Master Corporation, world's largest manufacturer of TV antennas.

Very few people realize that any television set, regardless of cost, is only as good as the antenna. No TV installation can possibly be better than the antenna because the antenna is the 'eye and ear" of the TV set.

Good antenna installations can minimize and even eliminate the two most annoying disturbances to show up on the TV screen: "snow" and "ghosts." "Snow" shows up when the TV set receives a very weak signal from the telecasting station. A more powerful antenna reduces the amount of "snow" by bringing

in a stronger signal. "Ghosts" are double or triple images on the TV screen, and they occur when the transmitted signals have been reflected off another building, hill, watertower, etc. Here again, the set-





ABOUT BARBECUE

The word "barbecue" is of comparatively recent origin. It comes from the Spanish BARBACOA from BERBTKOT, the name applied by the Carib Indians to the wooden framework or grill on which they broiled, smoked or dried meat and fish. Around 1700 it was introduced into the southern United States to signify an elevated platform used either for cooking or sleeping. Sometime later barbecue came such a contraption. Soon after, any social gathering at which barbecued meat was the chief food came to be called barbecue. The largest bar becue known was given not in Texas, but by the governor of Oklahoma in 1923 when 100,000 people were served on one time.
