By adopting improved manufacturing methods recommended by the specialist this factory was able to make cheese of such improved quality that no troible was experienced in marketing it at the the current market price which at the time was 22 cents a pound.

A rough survey of the farm woods might be worth while at this time of year. Take stock, and determine what you have now, and what you should have. By far the greater number of farm woodlots are in need of improvement. Are poorer trees with no local market in the majority and crowding out the better ones? Are some of the trees overmature—going back from rots and decay faster than they aer growing? Do some of the trees show evidence of statack by insects or disease? Are there open places that ought to be planted up? Is there idle land, now contributing nothing, that ought to be growing is slow bécause the trees are overcrowded? August is a good time to dip sheep for ticks. Two dippings are necessary, about 24 days apart; the first dipping may not destroy all the eggs land the maked eye. They are found in and these may later hatch a new brood. Various kinds of dips are satisfactory. Coal-tar-crosorote, cresol, and nicotin dips may be bought ready prepared. Sheep dips are most effective when used with soft water. If necessary to use hard water, the water may be "broken" by adding sal soda at the rate of from 1 to 1-2 pounds for each 100 gallon of water. The sheep tick—which is not a true tick but a bloodsucking parasite— is very prevalent and spreads rapidly, especially among close-herder arege flocks. It is best for a whole community to dip all sheep about the same time to prevent spread of ticks

A common mistake in the management of sweet clover is to pasture is 20.6 on the basis of the 1928 estimated total, the lowest of any of the Southern States, and lower than all but twelve of the States of the Union. The highest density is in Rhode Island with 57.5 to the square mile, and the lowest is in Nevadaw with 0.7 persons to each mile of area.

Densest population in Texas is in Dallas County with 26.0 persons to the mile and the most scattered is in Loving Coutny with 0.1 of a person, the population (1928 estimate) being 82 in an area of 735 square miles.
