PROPER CARE IN FLYING KITES IS URGED

The Texas Electric Service Co. today appealed to parents to caution their children about flying kites near electric wires.

"The windy season brings kite flying time and this traditional sport is one that is lots of fun for children if it is done safely."

Other dangerous practices in connection with kite flying include using metallic cord or wire for the kite string, making the kite frame of metal, flying kites in the rain when even a cotton kite string can become a dangerous conductor of electricity and trying to retrieve a kite in case it gets caught in electric wires.

"Local youngsters who fly kites have been careful and cooperative in the past and we've had no serious mishaps in several years, but each year, over the nation, there are many cases of injuries to kite flyers," Mr. Lemons added.

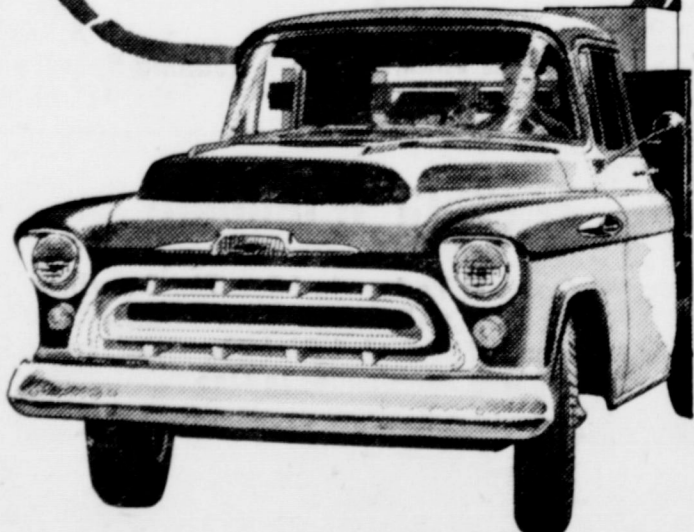

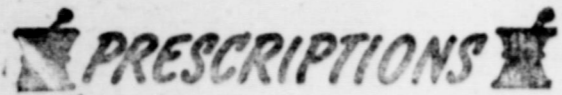

LUKEWARM CHRISTIANS

"I know thy works, that thou art neither cold nor hot; I would thou wert cold or hot. So because thou art lukewarm, and neither hot nor cold, I will spew thee out of my mouth." (Rev. 3:15, 16)
The apostle John's letters to the seven churches of Asia were written for the purpose of correcting certain beliefs, attitudes and practices that were prevalent in these particular congregations. The church at Ephesus had left its first love, and the churches at Pergamum and Thyatira had succumbed to the teaching of false prophets. The church at Sardis was spiritually dead, and the church at Laodicea was too cold to be hot and too hot to be cold. It was a "lukewarm" church.

These letters to the seven churches of Asia, like all of the letters of the New Testament, were written for a two fold purpose. First, to set forth principles that, if followed, would correct the deficiencies that existed in these particular congregations. Second, to provide all Christians of future generations with the same principles for correcting the same deficiencies as they arise in various congregations throughout the entire Christian dispensation. There were other churches in Asia besides these seven, but these seven were selected because their problems were characteristic of the problems that continually beset the churches of Christ in every age. Just as the Ephesian church had left its first love, so also have many churches of the past and present left their first love. Just as the churches of Pergamum and Thyatira had succumbed to the teaching of false prophets, so also have many churches of the past and present succumbed to the doctrines of false teachers. Thus the problems of the seven churches of Asia are problems that have existed and will continue to exist until the river of time comes to rest in the ocean of eternity.
