GOOD YEAR FOR CANNING

This is the year to can, according to all reports coming from the berry, fruit and vegetable sections of the country.

There is a big crop of high quality of practically all fruits and vegetables. There are going to be hundreds of carloads of luscious pears, peaches, plums, cherries, beans, tomatoes and corn to can, and best of

Grace Viall Gray, all they are going to be offered at reasonable prices in bushel lots for canning, says one authority.

Cherries are being shipped from Idaho, where there is a bumper crop, 240 carloads, compared with 200 last year. Cherries are also plentiful in Michigan and Oregon.

The plums that are coming from California are of good size and excellent quality.

Alberta peaches that women want for canning are going to be plentiful and cheap.

So 1929 seems to be a "lucky"

year for all good homemakers who believe that it is "smart to be thrifty" and who therefore like to put away jars of preserved food at reasonable prices for future winter use.

The United States Department of Agriculture advocates the use of the pressure cooker for canning all non-acid vegetables such as corn, peas, and beans as well as meats, fish and poultry. The high pressure made possible in the pressure cooker kills all spores, thus making canning safe.

OFFER \$5,825 IN PRIZES IN NATIONAL CANNING CONTEST

To ward off a threatened surplus of farm products in many sections and to impress more housewives with the economy and healthfulness of home-canned foods, a National Canning Contest is now under way to find the best jar of canned fruit, vegetables and meat in the country. Two hundred and twenty-two cash prizes totalling \$5,825 have been hung up by the Sears-Robuck Agricultural Foundation, including a grand sweepstakes prize of \$1,250 for the best jar of canned food entered in the contest. THE PAJAMA FAD

This season's pajama fad among men, which was given such an impetus through street appearances in nocturnal garb by Editor Saunders of North Carolina, may be something more than a passing novelty.

We doubt that the actual wearing of night clothes in daytime is likely to become general, even in torrid weather, but the idea of more sensible clothing for men is one which seems bound to become more widespread. Already we have seen a revolt against the stiff-bosomed shirt, the starched collar and the barrel cuff, even though the comfortable suspenders of old have been largely superseded by the often distressing belt.

Certainly there might be devised a species of male garb, which would at once fulfill the requirement of neatness combined with comfort. Whether it shall take the form of modified

and glorified pajamas, or something entirely different remains to be seen.

But when it arrives it should be welcomed by the long-suffering masculine tribe—if the members thereof have nerve enough to wear it.

Teh chinch bug is only one-sixth of an inch long, but it is one of the worst pests of grain and grass crops in the country. Control of this pest, says the U. S. Department of Agriculture, must depend chiefly on three things: Burning the bugs in their winter quarters; growing crops on which they don't feed; and killing them by the use of barriers, sprays, or dusts. Spraying and dusting, to be effective against the chinch bug, are expensive and are recommended only in cases of emergency. The chinch bug will not feed on legumes or any truck crops except sweet corn.

THE "CAN" IN CANNING

The pressure cooker puts the "can" in canning. While canning was a big improvement over the earlier methods of food preservation by salting and drying, it was not until the pressure cooker was adapted to household use that the bugbear of the canning season was destroyed.

It is no longer necessary to make canning an all-day job. With a built-in water-bath canner monopolizing the whole stove top, and the escaping steam making the already hot kitchen still hotter. The pressure cooker has changed all this. Because cooking at temperatures higher than boiling is made possible, the time for cooking is shortened. Instead of boiling the cans of meat, for instance, for three to four hours, they may be sterilized in the pressure cooker for thirty minutes at ten pounds pressure, if partially cooked before, and sixty minutes if uncooked. A proportionate time saving holds true in canning of vegetables.

The pressure cooker is particularly adapted to the homemaker who has a garden where the vegetables are ripening in co-operation with C. L. Beason, county agent. HELPING TO BUILD TEXAS

Urging Texans to take their summer vacations in Texas, the Dallas Journal says he would "return to his home base a better informed and more contented citizen than he has been. From queens and live bees alone Texas apiarists get around \$50,000 a year, the queens alone bringing \$10,000 to \$15,000. the 1928 crop was estimated at \$1,085,454 from a total investment of \$1,247,430 by the 4,600 beekeepers of the state, with 250,000 colonies of bees.

Texas poultry shipments to major markets in 1928 totaled 27,000,000 pounds, putting the state in fifth place in poultry shipments.

Clarendon is seriously considering adoption of a city plan, and a survey from a topographic and traffic viewpoint is to be made soon. Texas cities are falling in line in the effort to plan seriously for future conditions.

During the calendar year 1929, twenty-two million cows produced 120 billion pounds of milk valued at more than three billion dollars, and approximately all of it was consumed in this country.

"Cook pork well" is the advice offered by the U. S. Department of Agriculture in Leaflet 34-L, Trichinosis, A Disease Caused by eating raw

pork. This leaflet can be obtained free by writing to the Department of Agriculture, Washington, D. C.

There is no "best" formula for a mash for laying hens, but it should contain about 30 per cent of a high-protein feed, such as meal scraps or fish meal, and about 40 per cent yellow corn meal. In addition, the ration should contain bran and middlings and perhaps other products for variety.

With the opening recently of three new offices in the West for market news on grain, hay, and feed, this service, which is conducted by the Bureau of Agricultural Economics of the U. S. Department of Agriculture, is put on a nation-wide basis. The new offices are in San Francisco and Los Angeles, Calif., and Portland, Oregon.

When feeds are bought under an "open formula"—that is, when the name and quality of each ingredient is openly declared—the purchaser knows the contents of the mixture and can figure out its digestible nutrients, and can compare its cost with that of home-mixed feed. Most cooperative buying associations follow this policy in purchasing feeds.

Since the fruit and vegetable standardization work of the Bureau of Agricultural Economics, U. S. Department of Agriculture, was started in 1916, interest in this service has increased so steadily that grades are now established for 44 commodities. The latest development in this service is the standardization of commodities for canning.

KNOW TEXAS

Fort Sam Houston, San Antonio, is one of the largest military posts maintained by the United States. It has 12,000 officers and men in its area and, at the average annual cost of \$1,100 for each soldier's upkeep, the total receipts from that source are more than \$13,000,000 a year, exclusive of civilian employees and additional capital investments. The Federal military plant at San Antonio, including flying fields and target ranges, is of an estimated value of

\$26,831,326.

The grave of David G. Burnet, first president of the Texas Republic is in Lakeview Cemetery, Galveston. He was born April 4, 1779, and died December 4, 1870.

Assessed values in Texas for 1929 are \$3,144,446,188 and actual values (estimated) are \$12,500,000,000. Assessed values in 1861 were \$266,784,482.

Approximate value of Texas production in different lines is: Farm crops \$800,000,000. Livestock \$200,000,000. Minerals \$400,000,000. Forests and other natural resources \$60,000,000.

For ten years Texas has led all the states in total crop values with an average annual production of \$806,000,000.

Power Transmission Lines
Bring Many Advantages
to a Community

CHIEF among the advantages of electric power transmission lines is *flexible service capacity*. Many conditions, such as heat or cold, cloudy and stormy weather, cause variations in the demand for electric service in any city. Today the greatest demand may be at six A. M.; tomorrow it may come at ten A. M.; and the next day at eight P. M. When a city has transmission line service these variations are instantly met, with ease. But when a city depends upon an isolated power plant it is probable that a heavy load at an unusual hour will result in poor service for part or all of its customers.

Greater dependability is another big advantage of transmission line service. It is usual for a city to have two and sometimes five or six sources of power when served by transmission lines. So that if one source of power is cut out for any reason, another is instantly switched into use. In case of an isolated power plant an accident in the plant itself is likely to throw all or a part of the city out of service for a time.

Ability to Increase Power Capacity is a mighty important advantage to any city that has ambition to become truly great. Transmission lines permit instant and almost unlimited increases in the amount of electric power which can be served a city. An isolated plant must undergo drastic structural changes at great cost in order to increase its capacity very much. And the process is slow. NEW OATS AND WHEAT VARIETIES YIELD WELL

Jacksboro—Nortex oats and Denton wheat obtained from the Experiment station at Denton have given the top in yields here for farm demonstration. C. A. Munch, county agent, reports. J. E. Frances of Perrin community made 53 bushels of Nortex oats per acre drilled in old cotton stalk land while ordinary oats sowed on well prepared land yielded only 35 bushels to the acre. Where Nortex oats were drilled on well prepared land the yields were correspondingly higher, other demonstrations show.

Denton wheat made 29 1/2 bushels per acre for Fred Gildwell of Longhollow community while the ordinary Turkey Red variety he had been using yielded only half that amount. Mediterranean wheat, of which Denton is an improved strain, is a soft winter wheat adapted to North Texas conditions.

COWS LOOK ALIKE BUT PRODUCE DIFFERENTLY

Madisonville—Two cows in the herd of J. N. Rancey, local dairyman, look equally alike. Yet dairy demonstration records show that one is a fur-gallon cow making a monthly profit above feed cost of \$41.50, while the other is a gallon-and-a-half cow netting only \$15 per month above feed cost. The first one, bought a year ago for \$175, is registered. Both cows are getting a balanced ration with grain fed at the rate of one pound to four pounds of milk while grazing on a rich Bermuda grass pasture.

STOCK BEETS GOOD COW FEED

Sinton—Stock beets have nearly if not quite the value of ensilage as a bulky succulent feed to keep cows in condition in the hot summer months and to maintain their milk flow. A. E. Nelson of Taft thinks. He has been feeding them to his herd of 30 cows and intends planting them both in spring and in fall as a regular practice. He says they yield about 40 tons per acre and will keep over summer in the ground. Similar results have been reported to the county agent by other demonstrators in San Patricio county.

WESTERN UNION CLOCK SERVICE INSTALLED AT LAMESA

LAMESA—Western Union Clock Service is to be installed here soon according to G. S. Johnson, manager of the Western Union Office here. The clocks and wiring have already been received and as soon as a man can arrive to make the installation the work will begin according to Johnson. At this time some 20 clocks will be installed according to contracts already signed with the business men here. This service will give Lamesa an up to date time service that has long been sought here.

HENS CATCH COLD IN WARM WEATHER

Corpus Christi—Hens may catch cold, even in warm weather, if kept in poorly ventilated houses. F. W. Hoepfner, county agent here, reports that Pete Shannon's flock of 250 White Leghorns quit laying recently due to colds. Lack of ventilation on one side of the poultry house was found to be the cause. After this was corrected and the flock dosed with Epsom salts and the drinking water

I have on this day, August 16th, 1929, made a test of practically 3,000 pounds on the Public Scales owned by Mell Pearce, and I find them absolutely correct. This scale has a sensibility reciprocal of less than two pounds, (i. e. the amount of weight that breaks beam from top of trig loop to bottom of same.) Scales in general will take from five to ten pounds even when found correct by test. I do not hesitate in affixing the State Seal on these scales and put the State Weights and Measures behind them.

Losses of sweet potatoes from stem rot, black rot, and other destructive diseases can be considerably lessened by practicing a crop rotation in which the potatoes are grown on the same land only once in three or four

years. In planning a sweet-potato rotation, the importance of plowing under a soil-improving crop every two or three years should be kept in mind. The practice of planting a cover crop following sweet potatoes is a good one. Where sweet potatoes are dug for early markets, crimson clover is a good cover crop to sow; or where it is too late to plant this legume, or in localities where crimson clover does not do well, a mixture of rye and vetch can be planted.

The Angora goat not only provides mohair for the upholstery of the parlor furniture and other things, but in parts of the East, the Middle West, the Ozarks, and the Pacific Coast States it is utilized to clear brush from farm and pasture lands. On some range areas where brush is the main forage, stocking with Angora goats has brought better returns than were obtained with other live-stock.

WHY PICK ON PRINTERS?

In several states, notably Mississippi and Florida, recent attempts have been made to establish state printing plants, possibly with a view to furnishing soft jobs for certain political favorites.

Commenting on this agitation in Florida, the Fort Pierce News-Tribune said:

"The argument, no doubt, is that the state will save money by doing it own printing. But will it? The experience of other government operated institutions doesn't warrant any such view. But even if the state of Florida should be able to perform the miracle of running an efficient and economical printing plant why should it go into the business of manufacturing printing any more than that of any other supplies required?"

For some unaccountable reason it seems that printers are about the only business men who are forced to suffer from government competition, both state and national. This in spite of the fact that the very politicians who would perpetuate and extend this injustice owe their own prestige and power largely to the owners of small newspapers who depend on job printing for a considerable part of their revenue.

Why do not these politicians advocate the establishment of all kinds of state and national manufacturing plants, thus going Socialistic all the way? Why pick on the printers?

Citizens of the Southwestern part of the state will seek to get the state to buy 20,000 acres in the Davis Mountains for use as a State Park. If the state can secure park sites on a reasonable basis—not a few of the designated state parks have been given.
