Price Reductions Clip Inflation: Rent Control Law Gives Authority To State Governors, Legislatures

PRICE DROP:

Hits Inflation

American consumers were asking themselves: What does it mean? Why were prices being slashed, the dollar stretching a little further? Was it simply that inflation was being clipped, or was it tree, as some have said, that the country is in the midst of a mild

THOSE QUESTIONS were wellfounded. For, in the latest economic development, prices of automobiles, accessories, radios, refrigerators and ranges had been re-

Continued reductions in such basic commodities as lead, zinc, copper and steel indicated there might be further cuts in manufactured goods in the wind.

One automobile manufacturer announced cuts ranging from \$198 to \$333 in the price of his cars. The mid-season catalogue of the nation's biggest mail-order house announced "many price reductions in all lines." Even ice cream was down-off three cents a quart in

Radios showed the biggest drop. One nationally-known manufacturer announced price cuts of 20 to 50 per cent on nine home model sets. Auto batteries were lower in cost. A refrigerator manufacturer knocked off \$20 from some of its models. Steel was down and scrap metal was at the lowest price in almost two years.

WHATEVER ELSE entered into buyer resistance was one of the main items in the price reductions.

The consumer had become more conscious of prices. There had been more hand-to-mouth buying. There was a tendency to "wait and see" whether prices would come down a

Businessmen and industrialists agreed that the "bloom is off the boom" - that a healthy readjustment is underway.

SPEED PILOT:

A New Record?

Joe De Bona, by his own admission was a "scared boy."

And he had every reason to be. He had taken off from Burbank, Calif., in actor Jimmy Stewart's nine-year old plane-a souped-up F-51-at 9:20:50 one morning, and exactly five hours later he was zooming into the airstrip at New York's La Guardia Field.

THE PLANE had a cracked cockpit canopy, dangerously low oil pressure, no oxygen, and gasoline for only seven more minutes of flying when De Bona whistled into the airport at 600 miles per hour.

"I'll never try a record flight again." he said. "This was too nerve wracking."

Fred H. Wilkerson, official timer of the National Aeronautical association, said the NAA would have to decide whether De Bona set a new cross-country record. He said the plane carried no barograph, a locked instrument which shows elapsed time, and that the gasoline tanks were not sealed.

THE OFFICIAL coast-to-coast record for a single reciprocating plane such as De Bona flew is six hours, seven minutes and five seconds, set by Paul Mantz on February 28, 1947, in a flight averaging 401.076 miles per hour.

DEFENSE CHIEF:

Has Big Job

Louis Johnson of West Virginia had taken on one of the biggest jobs in the world, and had added to the magnitude of the task when he declared the armed services of the United States would be "united as one '

WELL, JOHNSON, in taking over as secretary of defense, was the man whose job it would be to unify the armed services, but his predecessor, James V. Forrestal, retiring to private life as a banker, hadn't been able to do it.

The fact was that jealousy between the services made it practically impossible to implement a congressional act unifying the army. navy and air corps. However, it was said Johnson would come closer to it than anyone else probably could. It was reported he was ready to adopt a "tough" policy to brass hats in all the services and that if unification were possible, he'd bring it about.

FORRESTAL:

Medal From Harry

James V. Forrestal, retiring secretary of defense, received a surprise when he called at the White House to say goodbye to President Harry S. Truman, Mr. Truman pinned the Distinguished Service Medal on Forrestal's coat.

The citation read that Forrestal had "materially advanced the security of the nation." Forrestal said it was "beyond me" how he merited it.

New Senator



One of the nation's foremost educators, Dr. Frank P. Graham, has been appointed U. S. senator from North Carolina to succeed the late Sen. J. Mel-ville Broughton. Dr. Graham was president of the University of North Carolina.

RENT BILL:

Buck Was Passed

The rent control question was red hot. Congress knew it. The people knew it. But something had to be done before controls expired March Congress had to do something. It did. It passed the buck.

A rent control bill was drafted the picture, it was conceded that by the 81st congress, but it laid in the laps of state governors and legislatures the real power and responsibility for rent controls.

EVERYTHING congress wrote into the present bill can be nullified by a governor or a legislature, if

The bill continues rent controls for 15 months, or to June 30, 1950. It sets up a "home rule" process for decontrol of states, cities, or other local areas. Legislatures could remove controls throughout a state, or in parts of a state. A city government, or ruling body of other communities, could pass a resolution calling for de-control and, if the state governor approved it, then the federal government would be forced to abolish controls in that community.

The bill requires the housing expediter to fix rents so as to insure landlords a "fair net operating in-come . . . as far as practicable." However, it restores old OPA powers for the rent expediter to control evictions. This, some congressmen said, would prevent any mass evictions by landlords. UNDER THE MEASURE, the

housing expediter is authorized to sue a landlord for three times the amount of any charge made against a tenant above the legal rent ceiling. Under old law, the tenant had that power, but seldom used it.

The new act does not authorize further 15 per cent "voluntary" increases in rents, and recontrols any dwellings decontrolled under such voluntary leases, at the rent figure contained in such leases.

Veteran's priority for first chance to rent or buy a new property are continued in the bill.

STOCK MARKET:

Curbs Are Relaxed





The senate GOP canipaign committee is going its own way, detouring around the Republican national committee on both matters of policy and operation. The senate committee has hired Victor Johnson, one-time strategist for former governor and presidential candidate Harold Stassen, as a public relations director. The house GOP campaign committee, headed by the wily ex-speaker Joe Martin of Massachusetts, is planning its own policy and operation and while giving lip service to Chairman Hugh Scott of the GOP national mmittee, is preparing to set up its own publicity staff and conduct its own operations. The senate committee, according to information is starting off with \$50,000 in the kitty, but the house committee is not so well off and will start from scratch to raise its own money to better its press relations and get its public relations story over to the

The progressive Republican leadhoping that ultimately they will come up with a unified program upon which they can go to the people, but that time has not yet come. And this same source of thinking indicates that despite the Democratic split, the administration Democrats, with liberal Republican help, will push through most of the Truman "Fair Deal" program.

This reporter finds that the mail many congressmen, even including some southern congressmen is unusually heavy. Some offices are swamped with mail, the big bulk of it from individuals and that almost 90 per cent of this mail is definitely favoring the program advanced by the President in his election campaign. The President and the president's cabinet are becoming more and more outspoken in demanding congressional Democrats to go along with the program.

There is every indication that the President was not kidding when some weeks ago he indicated he might "get on a train" and make another trip to take his program to the people if his measures were not forthcoming from congress. He may make some radio talks, but he has found he is not as effective on the radio as he is face-to-face with the audiences out in the home towns of the country, talking to them in their own language.

Range of Religion

Lesson for April 10, 1949

ONCE THERE WAS a farmer who owned a large farm. Its wide acreage was divided into pastures and fields and a garden and

orchards and hog-lots and chickenyards and so on. But whenever any one would ask the farmer-about some particular part of the farm, he would "That's not businessthat's only the orfarm:"

chard, it isn't the Dr. Foreman farm;" or "-That's

not the farm, that's a flock of sheep," or a rye field or whatever it might be. Of course such a farmer never lived, or if he did, he should have his head examined.

What Does Religion Cover?

YET THAT FARMER is not a bit more idiotic than a Christian who, when asked about this or that activity or aspect of life, answers, 'That's not religion. I have no interest in it." Religion isn't a little fenced-off pasture for lambs, a tiny garden plot behind thick hedges.

Religion covers the whole farm, every bit of life from end to end. Jesus knew this very well. He never once refused to discuss anything on the ground that it was not religious.

He cast light on everything that touched him. He called his followers the "light of the world." Not flashlights, shining in one narrow beam! Not flashlights, but lamps, set on a lampstand and "giving light to all who are in the house.

The Light Of God

A GOOD cross-section of Jesus' methods and ideas can be seen in Mark 10, into which one chapter Mark packs his whole account of a number of weeks which Jesus spent in the region called Perea. Observe the variety of situations which confronted Jesus. First there was a question about divorce. When they brought that question up to Jesus. he did not dodge it. He did not call it a personal matter in which he, as a teacher of religion, had no interest. He did not say it was strictmay read what he did say in Mark 10. You will not that first of all he brings God into his answer.

Religion And Little Children

THIS CHAPTER includes the famous story of the little children who were brought to Jesus-evidently quite small children, for Jesus lifted them into his arms. We do not here Jesus saying, "Children are too small for me to take any interest in them. Wait till they are older. What good can religion do these tiny tots?" On the contrary, Jesus not only blessed them, but held them up as models for older people.

Is your church following Jesus here? Is your church interested in the little children as much as it is in the "paying" members?

Or are the little ones shoved off into some damp corner of the church basement? In your state or province, do the Christian people take an interest in the children? Do children in your section get as good attention as pure-bred cattle

As Wide As Life

THEN THERE WAS a question about eternal life. Of course Jesus answered that one, it was obviously a religious question. (Except that he gave it what some people even today would consider a not very religious answer!) Jesus went on to talk about money and the effect it has on a man's prospect of eternal life. Jesus would be the very last person to imagine that a man's bank account has nothing to do with religion. Some people to this day don't like to hear a preacher mention money in his sermons. Well, such people might have been offended by Jesus, for he often preached about money and prop-

Then there was the question of ambition, the audacious request that James and John made of him. He had some strong remarks to make about that.

And finally at Jeriche, not long before Palm Sunday, there was the blind beggar Bartimaeus. Jesus did not say to him, "Health is no affair of mine. I cure souls, not bodies."

FIRST AID to the AILING HOUSE by Roger C. Whitman

Question: My new plastic tablecloth has made the ends of the breakfast table sticky. How can this be removed from a varnished birch finish and not ruin the fin-

Answer: Try wiping the sticky places very lightly with benzine, being careful not to press hard on the finish. Be careful of fire, and close the door leading to the kitchen, If the table is in the kitchen, do not work there. If the benzine dulls the finish, apply a thin coat of paste wax, let it dry and then polish with a soft cloth.

Question: Can anything be done to stop the radio interference caused by our oil furnace? Some say to ground the furnace. Our furnace is on the main floor as we have no basement.

Answer: Radio interference from oil burners, motors and other electrical equipment can be eliminated, but this calls for the service of an expert electrician or radio serviceman. The manufacturer of your oil burner might be able to take care of the nuisance.

Horses Are Dangerous



Never approach a horse without speaking to him.

As a rule, farmers do not consider horses as especially dangerous animals, yet they account for more accidents of a serious nature than any other farm animal.

According to the National Safety Council, approximately three times as many accidents occur with horses as with any other farm animal. Farmers should always be cautious around these animals, the NSC continued. One phase of this precaution is a through check in the spring of all equipment to be used on or by horses, particularly harness.

Only strong harness should be used and these should be inspected regularly and kept in good repair. Dry leather has low tensile strength and it should be cleaned with mild soap and warm water and treated with oil. Attention to equipment such as neck-yokes, tongues, single-trees, double-trees and eveners is also very necessary.

The NSC suggests that many serious farm accidents can be prevented by following these simple rules:

Never approach a horse without speaking to him. When cleaning a stall, make no sudden movement. Enter the stall on the left side of the horse. When driving or leading horses, never wrap the lines around body.



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

DDT Increases Yield Of Clover Seed

William Meinholz of Dane county, Wisconsin, increased his yield of Ladino seed by one-third when he dusted it with 40 pounds of 5 per cent DDT per acre. Meinholz reports dusting gave better results than spraying (one pound DDT in 100 gallons of water per acre), while Henry Perry, Jefferson county, reported an increased seed yield of 76 per cent in red clover with the use of the spray.



Keep electric mixers, toasters automatic juicers, etc., in a handy ready-to-use place. Don't hid them on the bottom shelf.

Rinse tea towels after each dish washing "detail": then they won't pile up and present such a large item on wash day.

A perforated cap on a cork which will fit into any soft dring bottle makes an ideal devise for sprinkling clothes.

A very thin starch (one table spoon to each quart of water) will bring back that "new, pretty look" to your favorite rayon blouse.

New Test to Keep Farmers on Toes

A new test for detecting weevil infestation in grain has been developed by J. C. Frankenfeld, USDA entomologist at Manhatten, Kansas, who discovered that small red dots appeared where weevils had laid eggs in the kernels if grain samples were soaked in a dye containing acid fushsin; the dots do not appear on grain which is free from infestation.

Using this new method, all grain brought for milling purposes can be tested for weevil infestation on the-spot, and docked in price accordingly - likewise, the wise farmer will make sure his grain









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

Easter Plans

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ONE OF THE TRADITIONAL nighlights of Easter will probably the coloring of Easter eggs. Though some adults think that coloring eggs is strictly child's play and should be left to youngsters, a large percentage of grownups doesn't agree. 

THERE IS REALLY something funny about it. Consider a First Church congregation singing: 'Jesus, I my cross have taken, All to leave and follow thee:

Destitute, despised, forsaken, Thou from hence my All shalt be." Oh, come, come, ladies and gentlemen! Your cross? Where is it? 'All to leave"-?

You are going right back to your homes for an extra-good Sunday dinner. "Detitute"-? (Some congregations, believe it or not, actually sing 'naked, poor, stead of "destitute.") Not a one of

you ever has been Dr. Foreman on relief; you prob-

ably have more money in the bank than most of the people who didn't come to church.

Some People Cannot be Christians

IT MAY BE FUNNY to compare what the congregation is singing about themselves with what they really are. But it is sad, too, because that hymn illustrates how foggy-minded some Christians are about their own "cross."

They can sing blithely about it, and even complain (in song) about their own condition as something for the Salvation Army to look into, when they don't mean a word of it.

The fact is, Jesus did demand just the thing the hymn describes. He said, in so many words, "Whosoever doth not bear his cross and come after me cannot be my dis-

What Did Jesus Mean?

THERE ARE TWO ways of misunderstanding Jesus here. One wrong line is taken by those who think Jesus did not mean a word he said. The other wrong line is taken by a very few people, a very few indeed, who take Jesus absolutely literally. They believe that no one can be a true, 100 per cent Christian, unless and until he gives up all his property, all his family, and lives alone and wild, a hermit in the wilderness. The facts show that both these interpretations are false. The world has never been really made better, either by selfish, comfort-loving, worldly Christians, or by the wild and woolly hermits who are clean "out of this world."

"Love Thyself Last"

THE WISEST, the most devoted christians, have known better what Jesus meant. Jesus' own parable of the "rich fool" gives us the hint. He tells of a man who had everything he wanted . . . but when he came to die, discovered he had nothing. In that little story Jesus shows us a man who put himself before all other persons; who put himself before God; and who put things before character. He lived for his body, he lived for his comforts, he lived for himself.

The neighbors, maybe, called him smart because he was rich; but God called him a fool, and what God calls a man, that he

Taking the cross means living as Jesus lived, not as that fool lived.

Christians and Liquor Don't Mix

CONSIDER JUST ONE illustration of what Jesus means. Should a Christian drink alcoholic liquors? If you are not a Christian, you can try to answer this from non-Christian reasons; but that is not the question. Shall a Christian drink? Just think about this in the light of what Jesus said. The disciple of Christ will deny himself; does the drinker deny himself? The disciple of Christ will put Christ first always; but what does the drinker put first? Jesus called a man a fool who lived for his bodily pleasure. lived for himself; what would he call the man who thinks he can "take it or leave it" but who is actually tied to his bottles?

It is true, a selfish man may perhaps (for selfish reasons, such as saving money) deny himself liquor, tobacco, or even tea and coffee, and still be no Christian.

But a man who really denies himself, who loves himself last, will find that other self-denials follow as a matter of course. A man who lets his appetite dictate to him, especially his appetite for alcohol, is a man who is letting real self starve. 1 tablespoon butter Cream to moisten 1/2 teaspoon salt 1/4 teaspoon nutmeg Crushed cornflakes 1 egg

Boil potatoes in boiling water until tender. Peel, rice and mash them. Season with butter, salt, nutmeg and cream enough to make them moist. Roll into small balls. Dip in egg which has been slightly beaten with water. Coat with corn-

flakes. Bake in a greased pan in moderate (350°) oven until browned, 20 minutes, fry in hot, fat. (Fat deep be hot

enough to brown a cube of bread in one minute.)

*Carrot-Asparagus Salad Cut scraped, cleaned carrots in water. Chill thoroughly. Drain and dry between towels. Arrange in a circle on crisp lettuce leaves. Place chilled, cooked or canned asparagus tips in the center and serve with well chilled, seasoned French dressing.

4 eggs 3 cups sliced peaches 24 lady fingers

1 pint whipping cream Cream butter and sugar until light and fluffy Add eggs, one at a time, beating thoroughly after each addition. Line an oblong pan with lady fingers on sides and bottom. Fold in peaches with creamed butter-sugar and egg mixture. Place one-half of mixture in lady finger lined pan. Add a layer of lady fingers, then remaining mixture. Top with lady fingers. Place in refrigerator for 24 hours. Uumold and garnish with whipped cream. If using fresh peaches, sprinkle them with lemon juice and sugar.

Ever tried eggs au gratin? Devil hard-cooked eggs, then place in a casserole, cover with grated cheese and white sauce. Top with buttered crumbs and bake until golden.

Mix the yolks of hard-cooked eggs with finely chopped ham, then refill the whites. Serve on lettuce

leaves and pass mayonnaise. Hard-cooked eggs may be ground or chopped, then mixed with drained sweet pickle relish, mayonnaise, Thousand Island dressing, mixture into small cubs and chill.

Increased production of livestock will solve the bug-a-boo of surplus grain, aid soil conservation, and create efficiencies which will make possible the profitable sale of more meat and animal products at prices more people can afford to pay.

Moreover, the need for soil conservation is just another argument in favor of more emphasis on animal agriculture, according to H. E. Babcock, one of America's top agricultural leaders.

Grass crops hold and build up the soil, and animal manure adds valuable humus while acting as fertilizer: for example, the rich black soil of Iowa is the result of centuries of grass and grazing buffalo.
