GIVES SAFETY RULES IN FLYING KITES -0

Safety rules for boys and girls who fly kites were outlined today by Jimmy Lemons, manager fol Texas Electric Service Company, in anticipation of the opening of the 1956 kite flying season.

As explained by Mr. Lemons, the five safety rules in order of their importance are: First, fly your kite out in the open where it won't get caught in wires or trees, Second. use only string made of cotton, silk linen, nylon or rayon. Third, use only wood in your kite frames. Fourth, fly kites only in good weather. You lon't want to get them rain soaked. And fifth, if your kite should get caught in electric wires, call Texas Electric Service Company. They will send someone to get it down for you.

"Local youngsters who fly kites have been very careful in the past about where and when they flew their kites." Lemons stated. "We had a perfect record last year with not one boy or girl being injured and only a few kites demolished."
