8500 TURKEYS TO BE FED

Glenn Clark of the O'Donnell Farm and Ranch store here, said Monday that at least 8500 turkeys would be on feed here this season. E. S. Kingston of Mesquite will have 5,000 and Fred Williams will have 1,000 and Otis Roberts 2500. Birds will be delivered early in June at age of 2 months and put range and will be sold in November or December. Last year turkey producers in Texas made a net profit of \$1.65 per bird. Mr. Clark said he probably could push thru poultry orders even yet but the absolute deadline was very near.

GIVES SAFETY RULES IN FLYING KITES

Safety rules for boys and girls who fly kites were outlined today by Jimmy Lemons, manager for Texas Electric Service Company, in anticipation of the opening of the 1956 kite flying season.

As explained by Mr. Lemons, the five safety rules in order of their importance are: First, fly your kite out in the open where it won't get caught in wires or trees. Second, use only string made of cotton, silk, linen, nylon or rayon. Third, use only wood in your kite frames. Fourth, fly kites only in good weather. You don't want to get them rain soaked. And fifth, if your kite should get caught in electric wires, call Texas Electric Service Company. They will send someone to get it down for you.

"Local youngsters who fly kites have been very careful in the past about where and when they flew their kites," Lemons stated. "We had a perfect record last year with not one boy or girl being injured and only a few kites demolished."

Williams In District Attorney's Race

Mitchell Williams of Tahoka, serving an appointive term as District Attorney of the 106th Judicial District, announces that he is a candidate for an elective term.

Williams was appointed to the office last June following the resignation of Vernon Townes of Brownfield.

The candidate was born and reared in Hope, Ark., is 34 years of age, is married and is the father of a son, age seven. He served four years in the army during World War II, went through the European campaign, and advanced from a "buck" private to captain.

He says in his formal statement: "Since assuming the duties of this office, I have endeavored to conduct the office to the best of my ability in a fair and impartial manner, mindful of all times of the trust imposed in an office of this nature."

"I am now asking the people of this District (Dawson, Gaines, Terry, Yoakum, Garza and Lynn Counties) to give me my first elective term in this office. If I am elected I pledge to administer the duties of the office with diligence and in a manner befitting the public trust imposed in this position."

"I want to express to the people of this district my appreciation for their splendid cooperation, and I earnestly solicit your vote in the coming primaries."

NOTICE OF WATER CONTRACT ELECTION

THE STATE OF TEXAS
CITY OF O'DONNELL
COUNTY OF LYNN
TO ALL QUALIFIED ELECTORS
OF THE CITY OF O'DONNELL,
TEXAS WHO OWN TAXABLE
PROPERTY IN SAID CITY, AND
WHO HAVE DULY RENDERED
THE SAME FOR TAXATION:

TAKE NOTICE that an election will be held in the City of O'Donnell, Texas, on the 13th day of March, 1956, in obedience to a resolution and order duly entered by the City Council on the 9th day of February, 1956, which is as follows:

"RESOLUTION AND ORDER calling an election on the 13th day of March, 1956, in the City of O'Donnell, for the purpose of submitting to the qualified electors of the City who own taxable property therein and who have duly rendered the same for taxation, the question of whether the City Council, on behalf of the City, shall be authorized to enter into a water supply contract with the Canadian River Municipal Water Authority; and enacting other provisions relating to the subject and purpose of this resolution."

WHEREAS, the City of O'Donnell is in need of a water supply which may be obtained by contract with the Canadian River Municipal Water Authority; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Directors of the Canadian River Municipal Water Authority notice to call a water supply contract election in accordance with the provisions of Article 8280 - 154 R. C. S. of Texas 1925, as amended, such election to be held under the provisions of Article 1109 e. R. C. S. of Texas and other applicable laws; and

WHEREAS, the City Council deems it advisable and to the best interest of the City and its inhabitants to call and conduct an election as hereinafter provided for on the proposition hereinafter stated therefore

BE IT RESOLVED AND ORDERED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF O'DONNELL, TEXAS:

SECTION 1: That an election be held within and throughout the limits of the City of O'Donnell, Texas, on the 13th day of March, 1956, at which time there shall be submitted to the qualified electors of the City who own taxable property therein, and who have duly rendered the same for taxation, the following proposition:

"SHALL the City Council of the City of O'Donnell, Texas, be authorized to contract with the Canadian River Municipal Water Authority for a water supply for said city as authorized by Article 1109e R. C. S. of Texas, 1925, and other applicable laws?"

SECTIONS 2: That said election shall be held under the provisions of and in accordance with the laws of this State, applicable thereto, particularly the provisions of Article 1109e, R. C. S. of Texas, 1925, and only qualified electors of said City who own taxable property therein and who have duly rendered the same for taxation shall be permitted to vote.

SECTION 3: That said election shall be held at the City Hall (City Tax Office) in the City of O'Donnell, Texas, and the entire City shall constitute one election precinct, with the election officers therefor as follows:

Mrs. J. M. Noble, Presiding Judge

Mrs. E. C. Harris, Clerk

Mrs. Clyde Winans, Clerk

SECTION 4: That the ballots for said election shall be prepared in sufficient number and in conformity with Chapter 6, V. A. T. S. Election Code, adopted by the 52nd Legislature in 1951, as amended, and that printed on such ballots shall appear the following:

"FOR THE WATER CONTRACT"
"AGAINST THE WATER CONTRACT"

AS TO THE FOREGOING, each voter may mark out with black ink or pencil one of such expressions, thus leaving the other as indicating his vote on the proposition; or, in the alternative, each voter may vote on the proposition by placing an "X" in the square appearing on the ballot beside the expression of his choice.

SECTION 5: In the event the results of the aforesaid election are favorable to the proposition for the water contract, the City Council shall pass an ordinance prescribing the form and substance of the contract and directing its execution. A form of said proposed con-

tract is on file in the office of the City Secretary and is there available for public inspection. The contract thus to be authorized will be substantially in such form.

SECTION 6: A substantial copy of this resolution and order signed by the Mayor and attested by the City Secretary shall be given as proper notice of said election. Notice of said election shall be given by posting and publication of a copy of this resolution and order, at the top of which shall appear the words "NOTICE OF WATER CONTRACT ELECTION". Said notice shall be posted at the City Hall and at two other public places in the City, not less than fourteen (14) full days prior to the date on which said election is to be held, and be published on the same day in each of two successive weeks in the O'Donnell Index - Press which is a newspaper of general circulation, published in the City of O'Donnell, Texas, the first of said publications to be made not less than fourteen (14) full days prior to the date set for said election. The City Secretary shall cause said notice to be prepared, posted and published as aforesaid, and make due returns thereof to the City Council.

SECTION 7: Immediately after said election, the officers shall make due returns of the results thereof to the City Secretary for canvassing by the City Council.

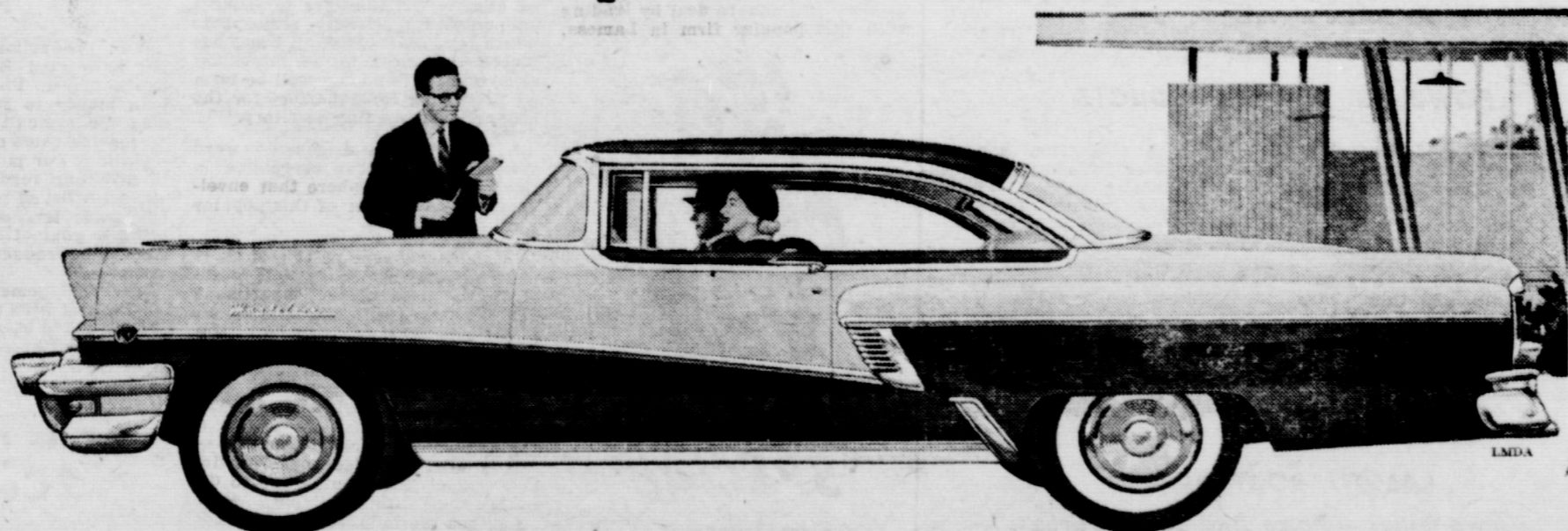

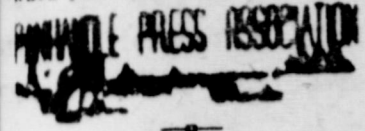

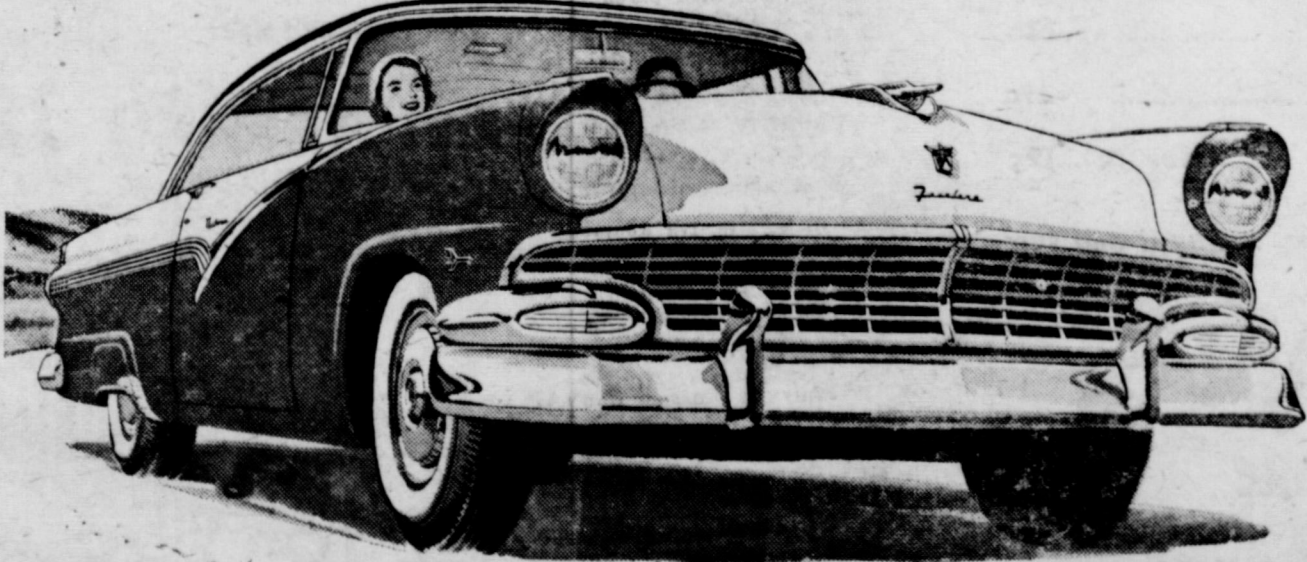
