In the "Religion Today" column of the Nashville Tennessean on In the "Religion Today" column of the Nashville Tennessean of July 25, 1953, George W. Cornell gave the results of a religious poll conducted by the Catholic Digest, as follows: "Today's average American believes in God, considers religion 'veryimportant' attends church at least twice a month, and thinks he'll go to heaven when ht dies . . . Ninety nine percent believe there is a God; one percent are atheists . . . Seventy two percent believe there is a heaven where the good are ettrnally rewarded. . . Pifty eight percent think there is a hell where the bad are everlastingly punished . . . Only twelve percent—see any possibility whatever of their going to hell.

It is interesting to note that eighty-eight percent of the people polled see no possibility of their being eternally lost. At first these are rather encouraging statistics, for they are evidence that a large portion of the people desire to go to heaven, as well as an evidence that they expect to go there. However, when one remembers the statement of the Lord, it is rather discouraging, for Jesus said. "For narrow is the gate and straitened the way, that leadeth unto life, and few are they that find it." (Matt. 7:14) In the words of the old Negro spiritual, "Everybody talking bout heaven ain't going there." It is quite obvious that man too generously appraises his own life and that he is often tracially worse in the expectation. his own life and that he is often tragically wrong in his expectation of spending eternity in heaven. One is reminded of the apostle Paul's statement, "Let him that thinketh he standeth take heed lest he fall."—(I Cor. 10:12) Since it is so easy to be wrong, each of us urgently needs to be concerned about whether his own religious beliefs are right or wrong. - B. 



State Agricultural Conservation and Stabilization offices in Arizona Colorado, Kansas, Nebraska, Nevada, New Mexico, Oklahoma, Texas and Utah have been designated as contact points for teams of livestock buyers from Mexico. The first teams from Mexico will start buying in Texas. The program was made possible thru an Export-Import bank loan to Mexico for buying U. S. Cattle.

During 1956 more than 900 Texas communities have done something about existing conditions by organizing to solve some of their probems. 187 cimmunities were enrolled in the Seighborhood Progress program and that group interest and action achieved amazing results in communities which were on the verge of dying out.

Pecan growers are advised not to become unduly alarmed about the present markket outlook for pecans. Prices later are expected to follow the trend of past years and if this happens, prices should pick up. Growers should harvest their pecans as early as possible.
