Mr. Hardberger is currently serving on the council but he said he did not desire re-election. Mr. Forbes has also indicated that he did not desire election. Records Needed For S. S.

Persons applying for social security benefits can speed the payment of their claims by bringing the necessary records with them according to John G. Hutton, manager of the Lubbock social security office.

Wage earners and the survivors of deceased wage earners should furnish a copy of the Form W-2 "Statement of Wages Paid" for the preceding year. In addition they should supply the information regarding earnings for the current year.

Self-employed persons or their survivors should be prepared to furnish a copy of Schedule C (or Schedule F for farmers) and other supplementary schedules with their income tax reports for the preceding year. They should also furnish the cancelled check or other evidence that the tax has been paid. The estimated earnings from self-employment for the current year should also be furnished.

No person should delay contacting his social security office, because he lacks any of these records, Hutton states. Delays in filing claims may mean a loss in benefits. However, if all the records available are taken to the social security office when an applicant seeks to file a claim it will assure the earliest possible payment of benefits.

1958 Crop Prospects Are Fine

Crop prospects over this area never looked brighter than at present. Coupled with the good fall rains of last year and the wet, cold winter, the growing season looks very promising.

January saw 1.18 inches of moisture according to Benny Moore and February had 2-10ths. To date March has netted 7-10ths and a cold drizzle is falling at noon on Tuesday.

Farmers say they have never seen the soil with a better texture, condition and wet down as far as three feet.

Much of the land has been prepared for spring planting. The current winter has been colder than any winter since 1949-50. We have had 9 major and minor snows. Business is currently slow and there seems a lack of ready cash.

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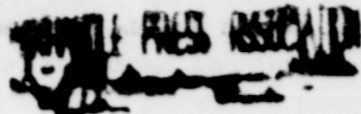

BETTER HEALTH MARKS THIS MODERN AGE

Progress in medicine and public health are difficult to measure. As each succeeding generation grows it falls into its own pattern of development, forgetting all too easily that only a few years earlier many of the conveniences of modern living — particularly of good health — simply did not exist. How many of us recall the scourges that swept over whole communities in the form of smallpox, malaria, typhoid and other diseases of which we are only vaguely aware today?

In fact, the only information most of us have of these diseases is gained from reading of epidemics in foreign lands, of tasting the protective chlorine in our water, and of the small scar left by a long past vaccination.

Even today we modernists are witnessing the decline and fall of still another ominous disease foe — paralytic polio. Since the advent of Salk vaccine, the drop in incidence has been so dramatic that the odds are good that tomorrow's children will be as safe from paralytic polio as our children are from smallpox.

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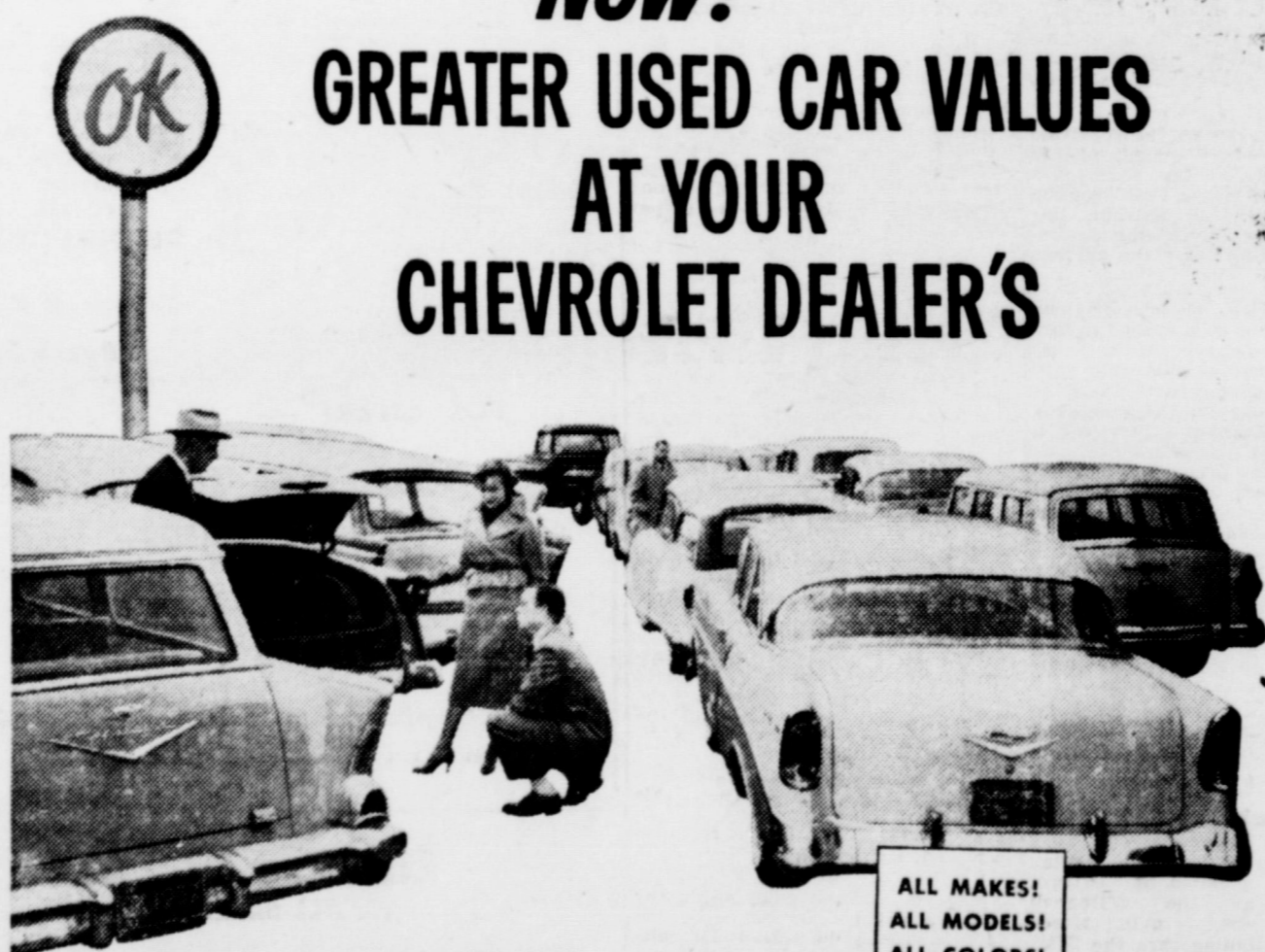

Plan To Clear Slums

The State Department of Health has been engaged for many years in the promotion of housing hygiene because of the direct relationship between insanitary housing conditions and the spread of communicable diseases.

The Urban Renewal and Slum Clearance Act of 1949 (amended in 1954) provided a means for systematically attacking the problem. The 55th Texas Legislature provided the needed State legislation.

The State Department of Health was made the official planning agency by act of the Texas Legislature for city planning programs undertaken by cities with populations of less than 25,000 according to the 1950 census.

Since August, 1957 (the effective date) 18 Texas cities have applied for planning assistance under the urban planning assistance program. They are Texas City, Rosenberg, La Marque, Brownwood, Irving, McAllen, Victoria, Edinburg, Mesquite, Kleberg, Mission, Deer Park, Grand Prairie, Denton, Haltom City, Greenville, Richmond and Donna.

The total cost of the planning applied for is \$594,456.50, over \$242,900 of which will be Federal matching funds. The remainder of the planning funds will be raised by the cities.

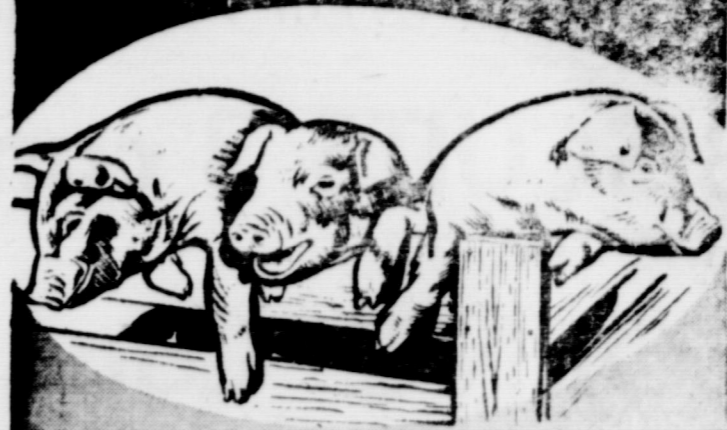

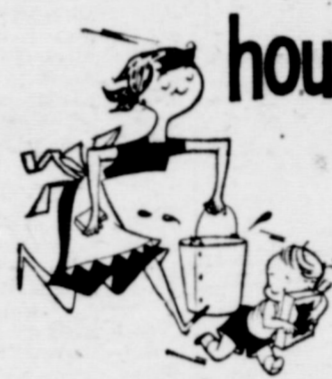

V. A. Quiz

Q — I understand VA benefit checks now can be forwarded by the Post Office. Is this automatic or do veterans still have to give some sort of notice if they move?

A — Veterans still must give notice. They must file a regular change of address form with their local Post Office. And they still should notify VA, so the agency may keep its records current.

Q — I had a World War II GI term insurance policy which lapsed in 1944. Is it too late to reinstate or renew it?

A. Yes. Application for reinstatement of GI term insurance must have been made within the policy's term period. Since your term insurance expired, it is too late to reinstate it.

Q — I am eligible for both VA compensation and pension. I chose compensation because the payments would be higher. If conditions should change so it would be more advantageous to receive pension payments, will VA make the switch automatically?

A — No. VA may not make such changes automatically. You must request the change.

Q — I am eligible for War Orphans schooling but as a Korea vet can I previously took training under the Korean GI Bill. May I still receive the full amount of 36 months of War Orphans education?

A — No. Your entitlement will have to be reduced by the amount of training you received under the Korean GI Bill.
