The choice you make now will not be binding for the rest of your life. You have the right to change at any time.

Q -- I am a Korea veteran with service-connected disability. I want to get a GI insurance policy available to disabled Korea veterans. I Know that a one-year deadline is involved. Is that one year from the date of my discharge, or one year from the date VA rated my disability?

A-Your deadline is one year from the date VA determined your disability to be service-connected.

Q—I'm intending to go to college this fall, under the Korean GI Bill.

Will it be possible for me to get any Will it be possible for me to get any part of my GI allowance pay in ad

vance, before I start classes?

A — No. Under the law, allowances are paid some time after the end of each month of training com-pleted, and not before. After the end of the month, you and your school will have to sign a certificate stating you were in class all month VA is allowed up to 20 days, after receipt of certificate to send your check. In starting out be sure to take along enough money to tile you over the first 2 months.

Old-age, survivors, and disability insurance benefits are being paid in the South Plains at the rate of \$6 520,860 a years, according to John G. Hutton, manages of the Lubbock

social security district office.
"This is an increase of about 45 percent over last year,"

"Our studies have shown that many of these aged people, widows, and orphans have little or no other resources." he pointed out. something like 9 percent, social benefits, received as an earned

are the only cash income. Hutton also stressed that while the benefits are intended primarily as basis for individual economic security, the payment of social se-curity benefits at the rate of \$146, 000 a year in Lynn County helps business generally because most of the money is spent immediately on food, clothing, other necessities.

"This is especially important in a time of economic recession," he said. 'Social security benefits are being paid nationally at a rate of more than 8 billion dollars annually."

Payments to a retired worker average about \$65 per month, Hut-ton said. The average for a widow with two young children is \$145 The maximum payment for a retired couple is \$162.80 a month, and the maximum for a family is \$200.

"There were several reasons for the increase in benefits over last year." Hutton said. One was the payment of benefits to people who were brought under the law for the first time in recent years—self-employ ed farmers, for example. Othe example. Other reasons for the increase were the reduction in the retirement age to for women and the starting of disability insurance benefits to disabled people 58 or over.

Hutton agreed that one factor in the increase may be the business recession. "I'm sure some older people who would have preferred to keep on working have been forced to retire because of the general business conditions." Hutton said. 'Also some mothers may be getting themselves as well as their children because they have lost jobs as a result of the recession."

"Many of these people would have been forced to turn to public assistance as soon as they exhausted t h e i r unemployment insurance rights," Hutton said. "The result would have been a further increase in public welfare costs,, costs which are paid out of a general taxation
