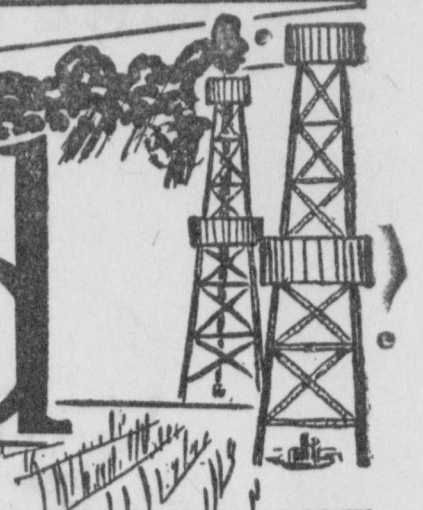

March 25 has been set as the wedding day.

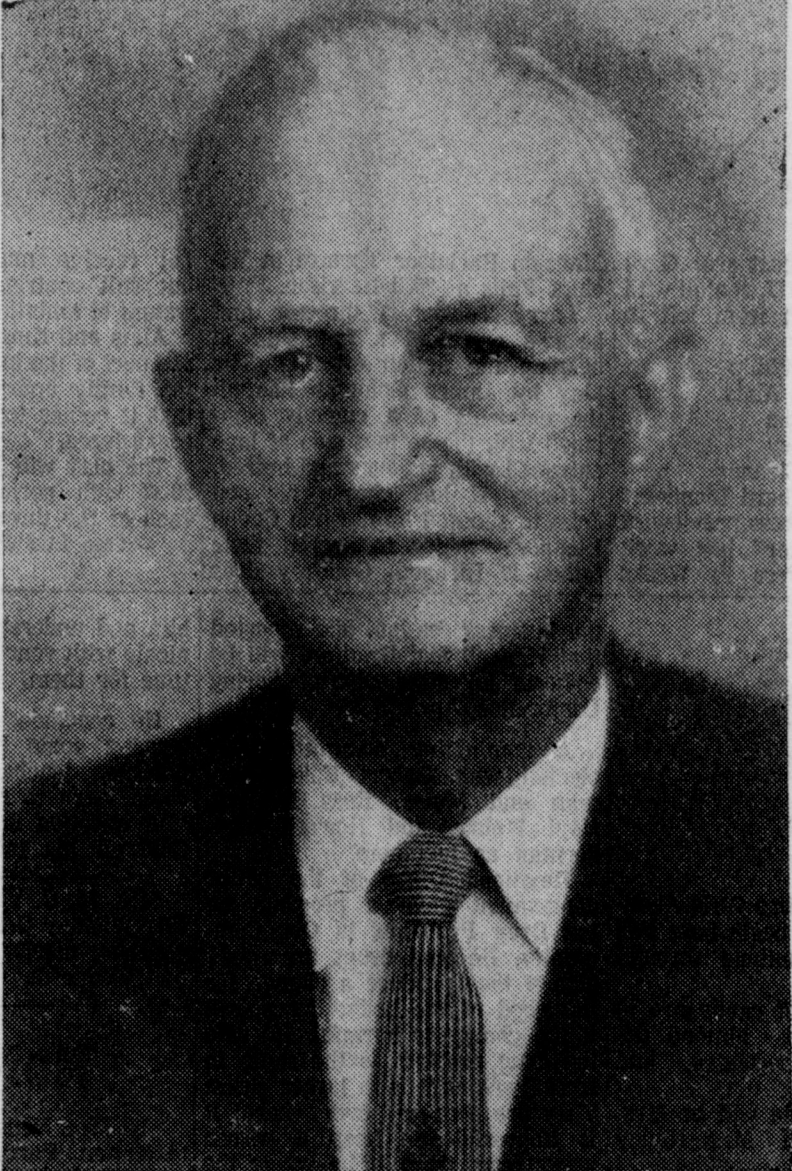
Bridal Shower

The wedding will take place after the prospective groom returns from Vietnam.

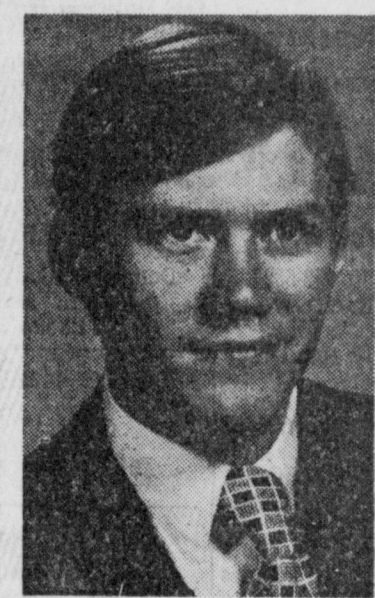

Raymond Dixon of the police department gave a program on the Drug Problems in Our Community. He said drugs are medicine if they produce a change for the good of the body, but poison if the change is harmful. He said the drug problem is the same in Iowa Park as it is in larger cities. They are here and everywhere; it is impossible to keep a person away from them if he wants the drugs.

Dixon said we should police our own homes. He recommended all left-over drugs be destroyed. Left-over drugs can produce a different chemical reaction with age, so never use a left-over drug before checking with your doctor.

Marijuana is the most often used drug in Iowa Park. He said if your child is old enough to leave your home alone, you will be unable to keep him away from drugs, as they are everywhere. He said some "kids" put drugs in soft drinks and give them to others who do not know the drink has been tampered with.

The police chief said the only way to keep your child off drugs is to know him, spend time with

him and understand him. Communicate with your children and have time for them.

He concluded the program by burning some marijuana so the parents, teachers and students could learn to recognize its odor. A question and answer session followed his talk.

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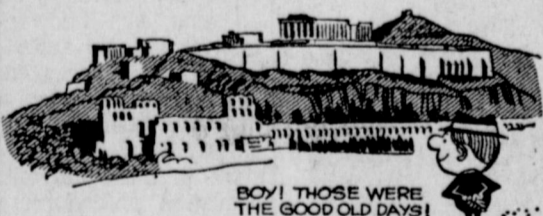
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AEO of BSP

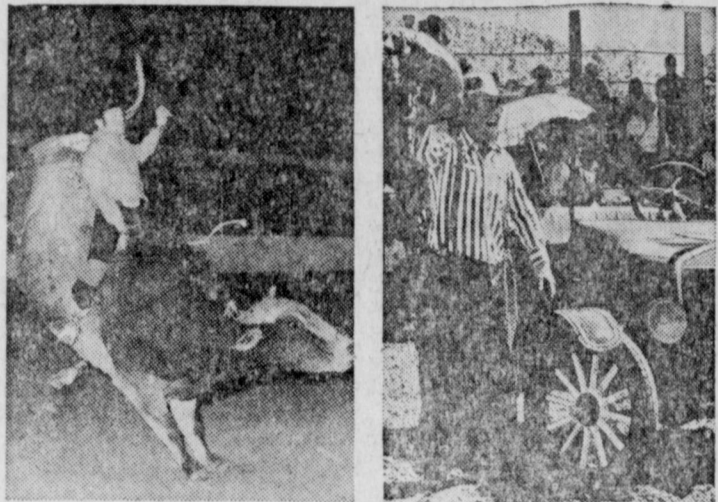

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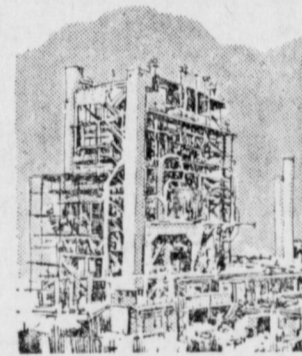
