Thousands expected here Saturday

Lorena vs. West Texas in Class AA semi-final playoff football game

Hawk Stadium will be the site Saturday evening for the Class AA semi-final playoff game between West Texas and Lorena.

The two teams will put their perfect 14-0 records on the line at 6 p.m. to decide which will advance to the state championship game the following week.

A crowd of approximately 6,000 is expected to fill the stadium, as both communities have chartered buses and large advanced ticket sales already underway.

For those unfamiliar with the name of West Texas High School, it is located in the Panhandle community of Stinnett. It was re-named after the school consolidated with Phillips and Plemons.

Stinnett is 12 miles north of Borger.

Lorena is well-known to all AA fans, having won the state title in 1987. Lorena is the first town south of Waco on US 35.

Both schools won their respective district championships, and last

week played their district runner-up again to advance to the semi-final.

The editors of Texas Football Magazine had both schools picked in that pre-season publication.

About West Texas, the magazine stated about Dist. 1-AA, "West Texas appears to have supplanted Panhandle as overlord of this district, but there is room enough for both in the 1989 playoff field..."

West Texas defeated Panhandle 12-7 in regular season, and last week did it again, 14-7.

In its article about Dist. 16-AA, the magazine said, "Lorena vs. McGregor has developed over the past two seasons into one of the great rivalries in Class AA. Lorena rates the pre-season nod this year because of a well-stocked defense and RB John Henry..."

Lorena edged McGregor 23-17 in the first meeting of those two teams, and last week advanced to Saturday's big game by a 17-13 margin.

Lorena, with John Crawford at the helm for his seventh season, will be the "home" team. He guided the Leopards to the Area game in 1986, won state in 1987, and last year advanced to the region once again before losing to Celina.

The Leopards count heavily on their star back John Henry, a senior runningback who in three years has rushed for almost 5,600 yards.

Henry, who can carry his 185-pound body over a 40-yard distance in 4.5 seconds, has just under 2,400 yards this year.

Besides being the team's punter and kickoff returner, Henry is also the team's leading defensive player, with 112 solo tackles and 68 assists.

Quarterback of the split back veer offense is Alfred Black, who has gained 692 yards this season. The

other leading carrier is Chad Thompson, who has 612 yards this season despite missing three games because of a sprained ankle.

The Leopard offense features two tight ends and a flanker most of the time. Defensively, they usually line up with four down linemen and four linebackers.

Lorena opened the season with a 14-0 shutout of Rosebud-Lott, followed with wins over Whitney, 38-6, Troy, 56-0, Liberty Hill, 49-20, and Groesbeck, 21-14.

In district play, the Leopards beat China Spring, 47-6, McGregor, Moody, 47-14, Moody, 47-14, Mart, 20-0, and finished the regular season blasting Clifton, 61-21.

Before replaying McGregor, the Leopards knocked off Goldthwaite, 42-20, Italy, 35-6, and Pilot Point, 27-8.

The West Texas Comanches are coached by James "Hoot" Gibson, and use various offensive sets out of the "T" formation.

With a roster of nine seniors, 17 juniors and 10 sophomores, the Comanches are not a large team. The largest player in the backfield is quarterback Greg Jones, who weighs 180 pounds.

The rest of the backs are 155 or smaller.

Eventhough junior runningback Lynn Sargent is only 135 pounds, he has carried 248 times this season and gained 1,649 yards. He's also scored 23 touchdowns.

Jones is called upon to throw about 15 times a game. This season he has completed 124 of 221 attempts for 2,057 yards and 25 touchdowns.

The Comanche defense usually lines up in a split six formation, and it has been effective, allowing only three teams to score as many as two touchdowns, while shutting out four opponents.

West Texas victories this season include 13-7 Fritch, 23-0 White Deer, 38-13 Dalhart, 24-9 Tulia, 45-0 Wellington, 12-7 Panhandle, 68-0 Highland Park, 63-7 Boys Ranch, 48-6 Spearman and 43-14 Stratford.

On the playoff road, the Comanches defeated Quanah 35-14, Farwell 21-6, Albany 12-0, and the replay with Panhandle, 14-7.

The winner of the West Texas Lorena game will meet the Groveton-Schulenburg winner next week in the championship game. Groveton and Schulenburg are to play Friday at College Station's Kyle Field.

The ticket windows at Hawk Stadium are to open at 4 p.m. Ticket prices are \$5 per person.

School to sell bonds

Members of the Iowa Park School Board were anxiously awaiting the return yesterday afternoon of a delegation that had been in New York City.

Their interest was to find out what rating the district received, and

its possible effect on interest charged when \$2.75-million in bonds are sold next week.

Trustees are to meet Wednesday to receive bids on the bonds which were approved in November by voters in the district. The money will

be used to add classrooms and other improvements on all four campuses.

Making the trip were trustees Don Decker, Sheri Kennedy and Keith Fisher, as well as Glen Mitchell, superintendent of schools.

Fisher took the place of tax collector Alan Shewmake, who was unable to make the trip because of his mother's serious operation Monday in Wichita Falls.

Following the receiving of the bids Wednesday, board members are to hold their regular monthly business meeting. An agenda for that meeting, however, has not been completed.

Investors rely on a bond rating to determine what their interest bid will be.

The delegation met Tuesday morning with Moody's Investors Service. Accompanying the group was Ken Smith of Southwestern Securities of Dallas, who is advising the local board during the bond issue.

Sales taxes still down for year

Iowa Park's sales tax rebate check received this week was almost exactly the same for the same month in 1988, \$12,642.

The check was only .65-percent lower than the one received in December of last year, according to the state comptroller's office.

But it hasn't been that way all year, because the city's rebate checks

for the year are 8.52-percent less than this same time in 1988.

For the year, Iowa Park has received \$162,115.06, down from the \$177,215.05 reported in December of 1988.

Electra continues to lead all Wichita County communities in lower receipts, standing at a minus 13.02-percent. Burkburnett is a plus 1.88 and Wichita Falls plus 8.02.

Holiday's sales are considerably up over the previous year, standing at a plus 8.87-percent.

This month's check reflects taxes collected in October by businesses that file monthly tax returns.

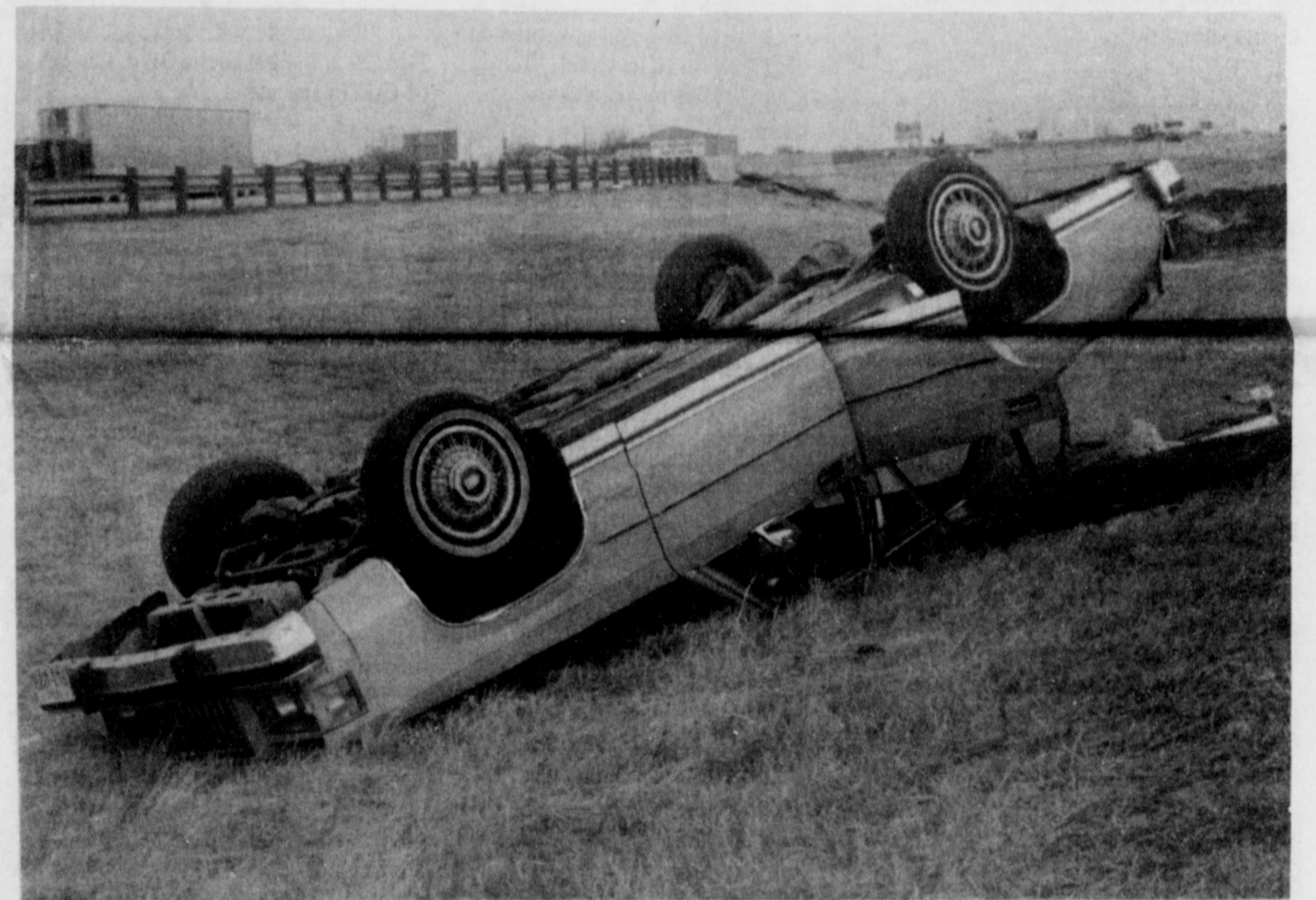

City denies exemption

Iowa Park City Council Monday night voted to not grant the "freeport" tax exemption this year.

Voters this year approved a constitutional amendment that provides for an exemption from personal property taxes on manufactured goods that are to be shipped out of state within a 175-day period.

The exemption is a local option, and all taxing entities are able to grant or not grant it. The denial can be changed at any time in the future by the entities.

However, once the exemption is granted, it cannot ever be reinstated.

Only one alderman, Johnny Coker, voted against the denial motion. The others voted for it.

Eventhough there is still some correctional work to be done on the city's water tower that was relocated on Emerald Street, aldermen voted to accept the project and make final payment to the general contractor.

Two small holes in welds were discovered when the tank was filled. A local welder has been contracted to make the repairs, and water pressure in the tank was relieved so the work could be accomplished, the council was told.

The council looked at three proposed floor plans for a new Recrea-

tional Activities Center, and the general consensus was to work with the larger of the three proposals.

At a work session last week, the council discussed constructing a new RAC facility, rather than investing a considerable amount of money in the old structure presently being used.

But when the 80x100 plan's cost was estimated to be more than \$100,000, aldermen ask that alternatives be made available for study.

The other two plans were for 72x100 and 80x80.

Alderman Bud Burch suggested the city adopt the larger size, but not finish the interior. Local organizations could be solicited to donate the funds to finish separate rooms, and the sponsoring organization's name be put on a wall plaque in the room, Burch said.

Mayor Tim Hunter explained to the audience at the meeting that the council was considering building a new RAC, because if a replacement is not erected, the city will have to condemn its own building for failure to meet city codes.

An earlier estimate was made at a council meeting that something like \$25,000 would be needed just to bring the present RAC into compliance with codes.

Aldermen approved a proposal to advertise for bids to purchase a new or used pneumatic compacter that would be used when making repairs to asphalt surfaces.

Also approved was the purchase of pump controllers for the ground water storage station, at a cost of \$4,420.

Gloria Ripperger, representing the Red Cross, asked the council for its help and encouragement to get volunteers in Iowa Park to give blood when the Bloodmobile comes to the community.

"We just can't continue to bring it here for fewer than 20 units," she explained.

Suggestions were made that the day of the week and site be changed as solutions. Also, certain employees of the city could be encouraged to give donations, if they could be released late in the day.

When Mrs. Ripperger explained that Iowa Park had not met its goal since January 1980, Mayor Hunter pointed out there were other donation points here than the one she mentioned. They were at Cryovac and the high school.

The Bloodmobile's next visit to Iowa Park will be Jan. 8.

As I See It...

I've got an answer for the question often asked, "What does the Chamber of Commerce ever do?"

Be out on the streets, especially in the western part of town, late Saturday afternoon.

There's going to be several thousands of unfamiliar faces and hundreds of unfamiliar vehicles in Iowa Park that day.

Some are predicting a crowd of 6,000 or larger will be in Iowa Park for the football game between Lorena and West Texas (Stinnett), which, of course, will be in Hawk Stadium.

And why should the estimate be questioned? After all, it is the Class AA quarterfinal playoff contest. Last week, a crowd of as many as 20,000 was figured to pile into Baylor Univ. stadium for Lorena's game with McGregor. I have no idea how many converged in Borger for the West Texas and Panhandle game.

Again, the estimation seems reasonable, based on those figures. Lorena and McGregor are only 12 miles apart, and Stinnett and Panhandle are 39.

So there should be a considerable spillover from those crowds, plus all the hundreds of fans from AA schools in our area like Electra, Olney, Holliday, Seymour and Henrietta.

But, about what the Chamber of Commerce does for the community: this is a voluntary effort by Chamber members. And what work members aren't doing, they've coordinated the help of others.

You'll see Chamber people sell-

ing tickets, taking tickets, and selling the programs.

The reason that's important, is the cost of the game to the participating schools is less with volunteer work. Hence, they wanted to come here.

Let it be known, however, that the Iowa Park High coaching staff, especially Len Williams and Dean Kirkpatrick, will have spent hours on the game before it's over.

And, bless the hearts of all the Iowa Park Volunteer Fire Department for all their help in parking the cars at the stadium.

So what, you ask? What does it mean for all these people to come to Iowa Park?

Well, there'll be a lot of meals and gasoline purchased, not only by the teams but by their fans.

Some may have forgotten their blankets, or a warm cap, or other items that would make their viewing the game more comfortable.

One of the major efforts of any Chamber is to get people into the community. And that's happening.

Another goal of Chambers is to get publicity for its community.

Virtually every major newspaper in the state (even *Brand X* in Wichita Falls) has been carrying a listing of playoff sites. And Iowa Park is right there among College Station, Houston, Bedford, Snyder, and even Waco

Midway.

A couple of notes to bring the game closer to home than just the fact it's being played here:

* Lorena had to knock off McGregor twice to reach the quarter-final level. It was McGregor that eliminated Iowa Park in the playoffs in 1987.

* Recently consolidating with Stinnett in its present district was Phillips. It was Phillips that knocked the Hawks out of the state playoffs in 1967.

And, if that's not enough to get you interested in coming out with all the out-of-towners to watch the game, just remember, some outstanding football will be played Saturday in Hawk Stadium.

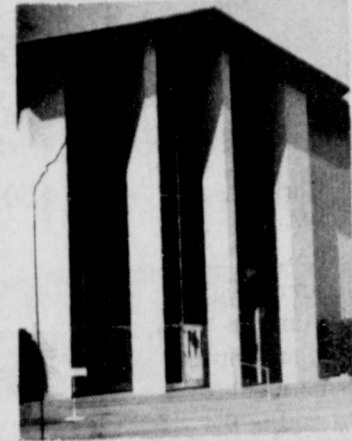

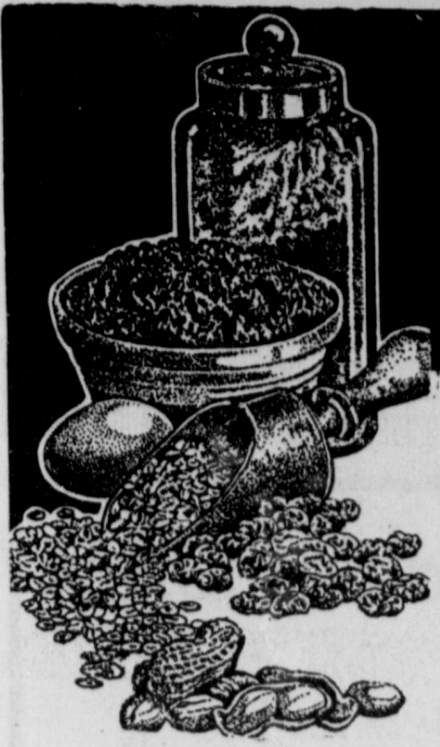

Each year they add to the display, which is just one of the ways the family has of sharing the spirit of the holiday season.

SUGAR NUTS

1 cup sugar
1/2 cup milk
1 tsp. cinnamon
Boil to soft ball stage (234°).
Add:
1 tsp. vanilla
2 cups pecans

CHOCOLATE-FILLED BON BONS

3/4 cup margarine
1/2 cup sugar
1/4 cup brown sugar
1 egg
2 tsp. vanilla
1/2 tsp. almond extract
1 3/4 cups flour
1/2 tsp. baking powder

1/2 tsp. salt
1/2 cup finely chopped pecans
3 1/2 to 4 dozen milk chocolate kisses

Preheat oven to 350°. Mix margarine and sugars until fluffy. Add egg and extracts, beat well. Add flour, baking powder, salt and nuts, mix until blended. Form dough into very large balls - it has to cover the chocolate kiss. Press dough around kiss so it is completely enclosed. Bake 12 minutes on ungreased cookie sheet. Do not overbake. When finished, frost or decorate as desired.

HOT APPLE CIDER PUNCH

1 gallon apple cider
2 tsp. whole cloves
2 tsp. whole allspice
2-3" cinnamon sticks
2/3 cup water
Heat cider and spices. Cover and simmer 20 minutes.

90 MINUTES SOFT PRETZELS

3 1/2 cups flour
2 Tbsp. sugar
1 tsp. salt
1 pkg. dry yeast
1 cup water
1 Tbsp. margarine
1 egg yolk, beaten
1 Tbsp. water
Coarse salt
Mix 1 cup flour, sugar, salt and undissolved yeast.
Heat 1 cup water and margarine to 120° - 130°F. Gradually add to dry

ingredients and beat 2 minutes at medium speed of mixer. Add 1/2 cup flour. Beat at high speed 2 minutes. Stir in enough flour to make a soft dough. Knead 5 minutes. Set in greased bowl. Let rise 40 minutes.

Divide dough into 12 pieces. Roll each into a 20-inch rope. Shape into pretzels. Place on greased baking sheets. Cover, let rest 5 minutes.

Mix egg yolk and 1 Tbsp. water, brush on pretzels. Sprinkle with salt. Bake 15 minutes at 375° For holiday pretzels, shape ropes as desired (bells, trees, wreaths, etc.)

MILLION DOLLAR FUDGE

3-4 1/2 oz. plain Hershey Bars
1-12 oz. pkg. chocolate chips
1 pint marshmallow creme
1 Tbsp. butter
1 lb. pecans
1 tsp. vanilla
4 1/2 cups sugar
1 can evaporated milk

Mix first six items in a 6 to 8 quart container. Mix sugar and milk and bring to a boil. After it boils, cook for 6 minutes.

Pour milk-sugar mixture over ingredients in large bowl. Blend until smooth and creamy. Add pecans then drop by balls, or pour onto wax paper and cut when cool.

MEXICAN WEDDING CAKES

2 cups (1 lb.) margarine
1 cup powdered sugar
1 1/2 cup chopped nuts
2 tsp. vanilla
4 cups flour

Mix margarine and sugar until well blended. Add sugar and flour a cup at a time. Add pecans. Chill dough about one hour. Roll into balls and place on lightly greased cookie sheet. Flatten with a damp fork. Bake at 325° 12 to 14 minutes. Let cool until just warm, then roll in powdered sugar.

HEALTH TIPS

Predicting Heart Attacks: Doctors have found two new tests that help to screen for the risk of heart attack. People with high blood pressure and high levels of creatinine (a chemical normally used to measure kidney function) are at an increased risk. High levels of this chemical indicate kidney, blood vessel, and heart damage. Also, the ratio of high-density lipoprotein (HDL) cholesterol to total cholesterol is more accurate for predicting heart disease risk than just total cholesterol levels. A ratio of more than 4.5 indicates a risk because there is not enough of the "good" (HDL) cholesterol to counteract the "bad".

Water Fluoridation: The Communist Menace? The fears that fluoridating water will promote AIDS, cancer, and sickle cell anemia appear to have no foundation, and the prevalence of cavities has dropped by up to 60% among people drinking fluoridated water from birth to adolescence. Both the American Dental Association and the Surgeon General's Report on Nutrition and Health state that the levels of fluoride recommended for drinking water are safe.

Persistent Sleeplessness: Is Milk A Culprit? A study over a 2-year period of children less than 5 years old who had continual waking and crying during sleep hours revealed that 58% had inappropriate sleep habits. However, no explanation for the sleeplessness was found for 12%. These children were entered into a trial in which cow's milk was excluded from their diets. Sleep became normal in 15 of the 17 children after 5 weeks on the restricted diet. When they were allowed the milk, the sleeplessness returned. The investigators warned, however, that only children with the most persistent sleeplessness that does not respond to other treatment should be considered for milk intolerance tests.

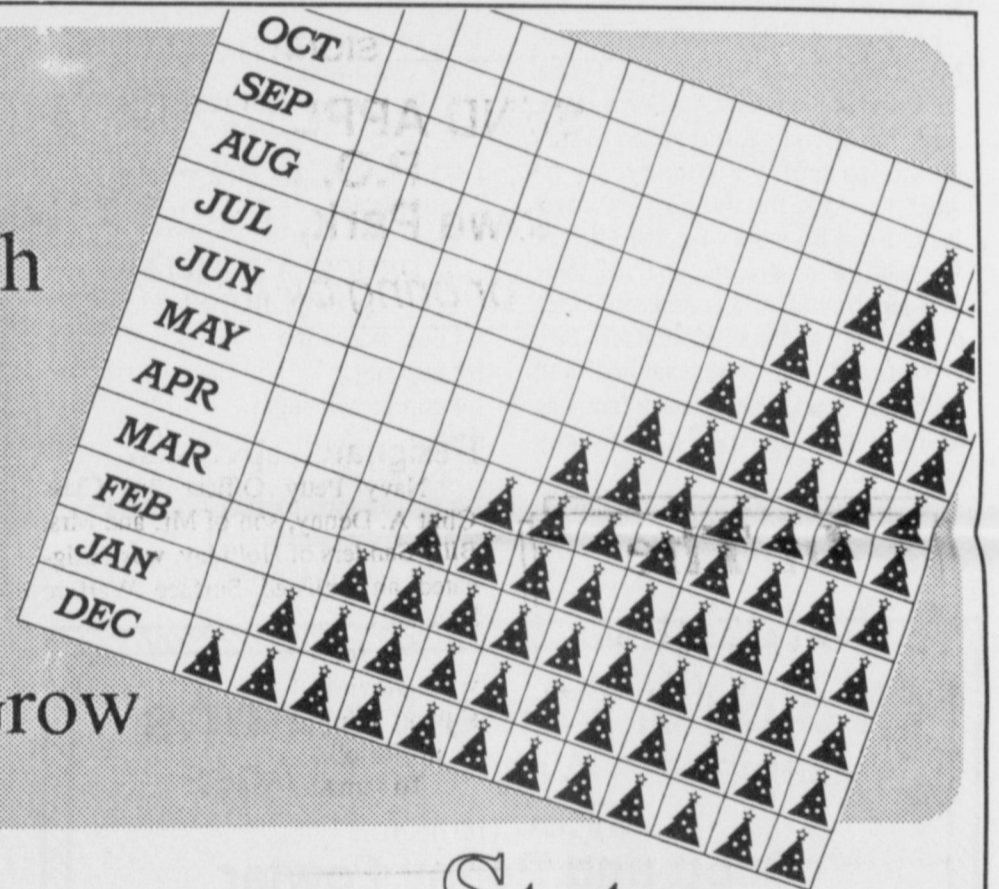

Hospice is Noon Lions topic

Hospice of Wichita Falls was explained to the Iowa Park Lions Club at a meeting Tuesday by Jan Banta.

Patients receiving hospice service have been diagnosed as having a life-threatening illness and willing to accept palliative rather than curative therapy, she explained.

The service is available, regardless of the patient's finances, she said.

"The most common problem we have," she said, "is that many of our patients and their families tell us they have waited too long to contact us."

Hospice patients must reside within a 15-mile radius of Wichita Falls, but as the program grows, so will the area of coverage.

While Hospice relies heavily on

volunteer work, all nurses connected with the program are paid professionals, Mrs. Banta explained.

One of the major fund-raising projects of Hospice is the annual Christmas tree lighting program that is held in Wichita Falls.

Because patients are also from the surrounding communities, she said she would be interested in starting a lighting project in the smaller towns of the area.

Lions members agreed to consider the project in Iowa Park in 1990.

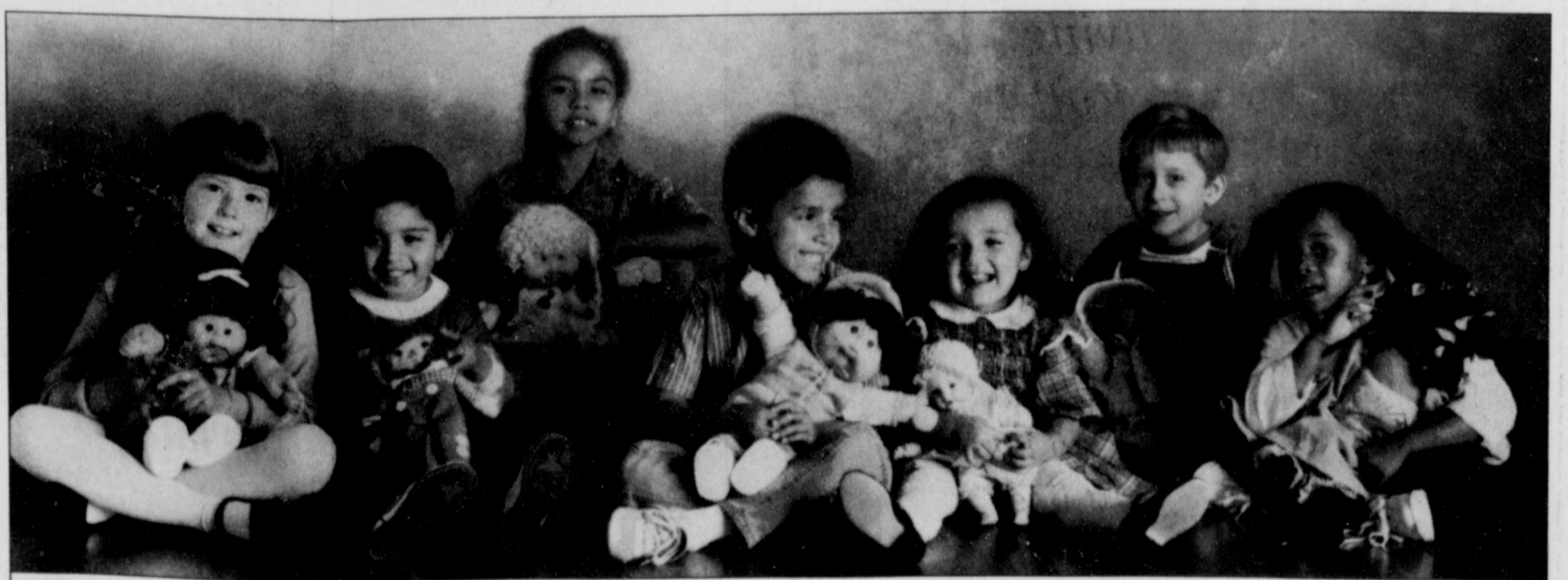

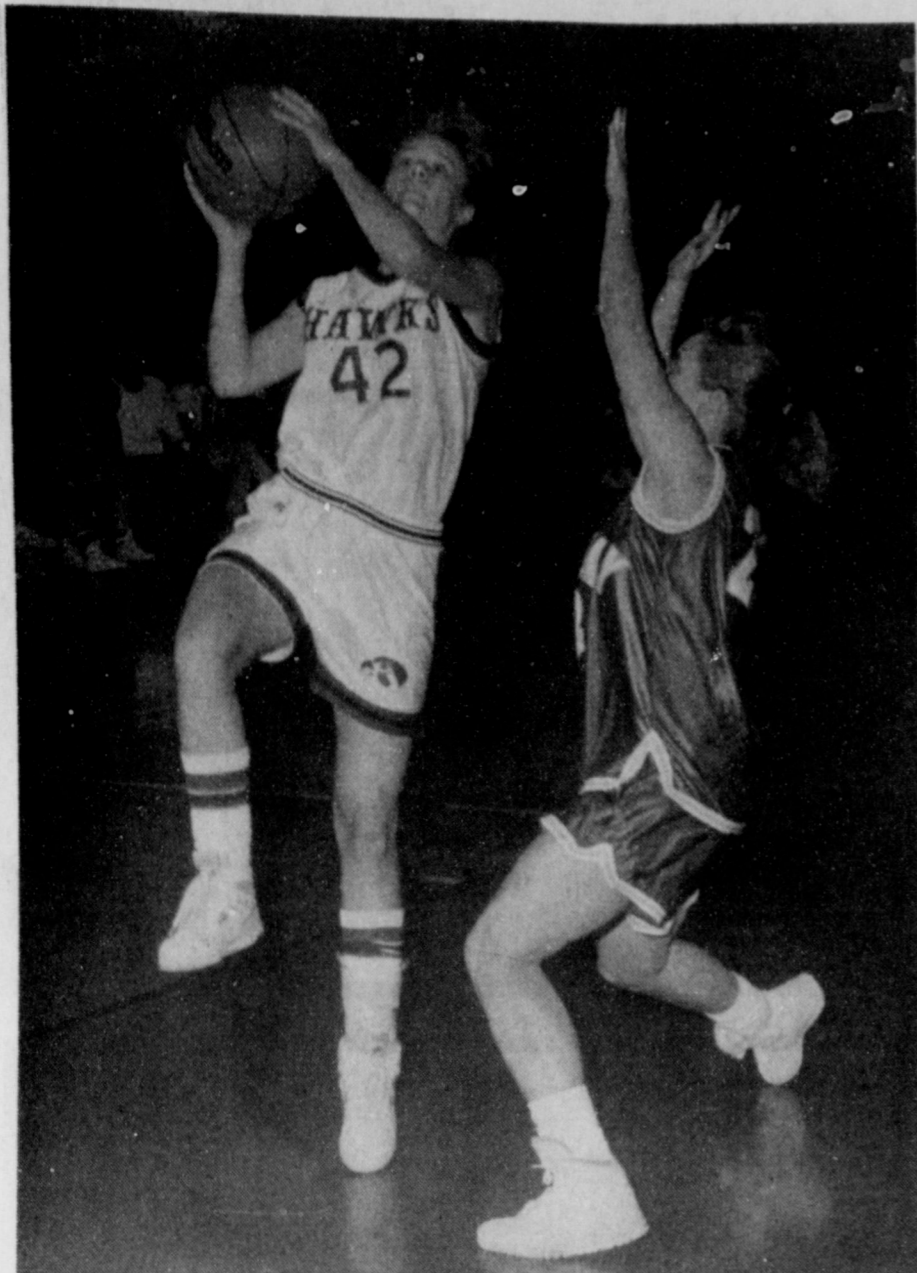

Iowa Park Junior High girls' basketball teams split their outings during the past week, sweeping Bowie but losing both contests to Graham.

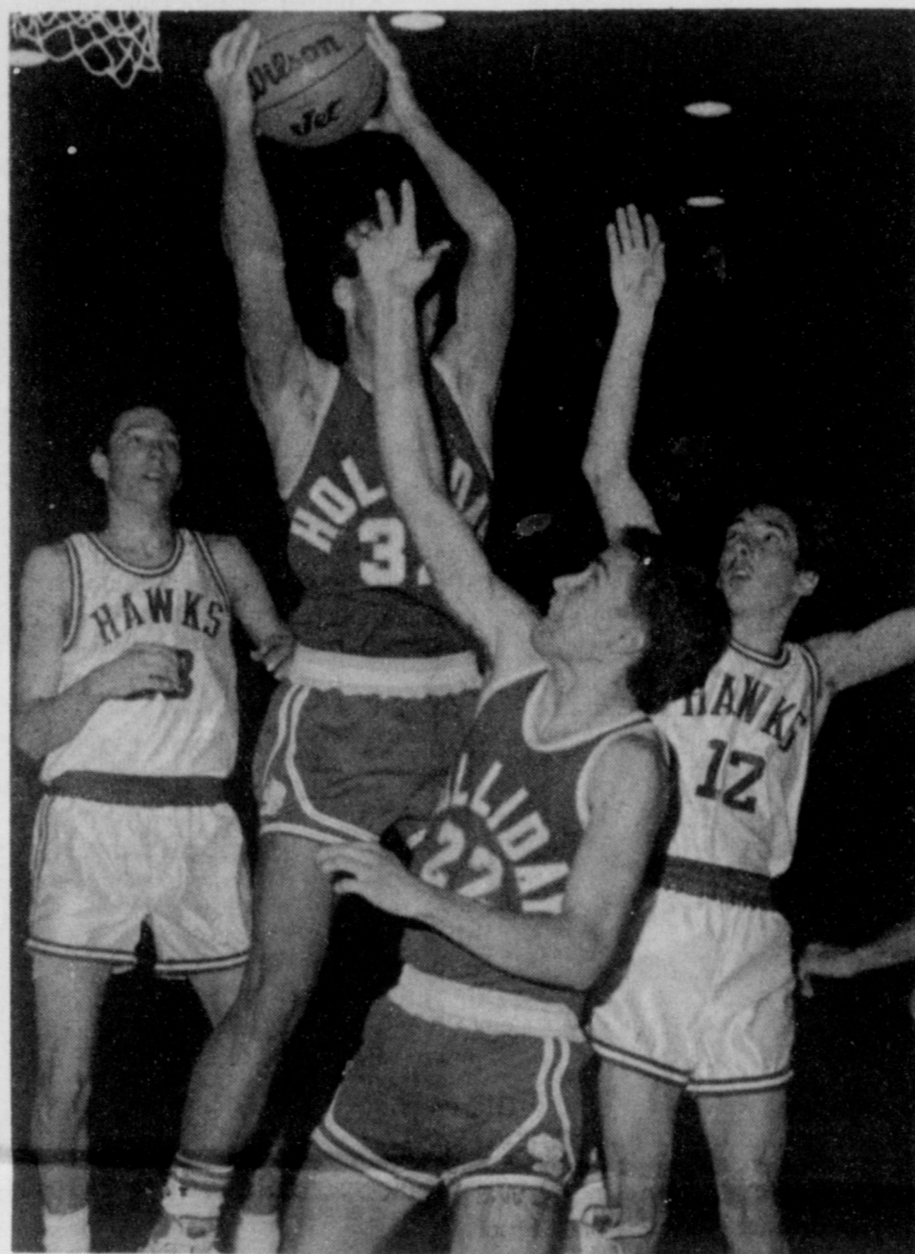

Mandy Threet and Gina Inman both scored in double figures, 13 and 12 points respectively. Jennifer Ricks had eight.

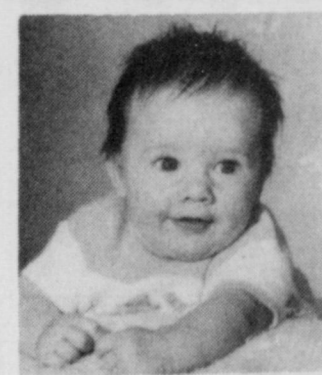

I have always considered this office as an office that belongs to the citizens of Wichita County and that I only hold the office in the public trust and at the voters' pleasure.

"I am a 42-year-old native of Wichita Falls and am a graduate of Hirschi High School. I earned by Associates degree from Vernon Regional Junior College. I am a veteran who served with the U.S. Navy from 1968 to 1972 during the Viet Nam war. I am a member of the University Kiwanis Club of Wichita Falls. I have been actively involved in Childrens Church ministries in my church for the last seven years.

"In 1988 there were 2,811 civil cases and 1,121 felony cases filed in this office for a total of 3,932 new cases.

"We issue approximately 6,000 sets of service papers each year. These are papers to be served by the constable or the sheriff to notify people that they have been sued or that their presence is required in court.

"As laws change and the operation of the office becomes more complex, it is very important that we continue to utilize the computer to its maximum effectiveness. I will continue to be committed to the goal of efficiency and accuracy in the operation of this office," Trapp said.

The following rates are hereby established and shall be collected by the Town: The minimum monthly bill for water service shall be \$15.00 for which amount each customer shall be allowed 3,000 gallons of water, such amount of water to be used during the current month. For larger consumption the rate shall be:

Over 3,000 gallons - \$1.70 per 1,000 gallons.
SECTION 2. **ALL ORDINANCES** and parts of ordinances and resolutions and parts thereof in conflict herewith are hereby expressly repealed to the extent of the conflict herewith.

SECTION 3. **THE TOWN SECRETARY** shall cause a copy of this ordinance to be published in the Iowa Park Leader, newspaper.
