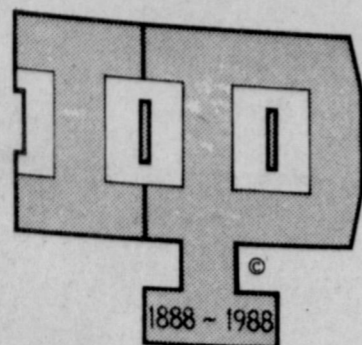

### Fields set ablaze by fireworks

Iowa Park Police Department's radio dispatcher was swamped with calls concerning grassfires during the first few hours of darkness Monday, July 4th.

Six calls were received during a two-hour period, from 9:40 to 11:59, and volunteers from Iowa Park, Wichita West and Kamay departments were dispatched.

In all, the radio dispatcher posted 15 fire calls beginning Saturday night through Tuesday, according to

the blotter.

Additionally, there were numerous complaints phoned into the department concerning fireworks being set off inside the city, in violation of city ordinance.

Police are investigating a report of a burglary that apparently took place Friday in a unit at Woodbriar Apartments.

Lou Ann Andrews filed a complaint that several pieces of jewelry, mostly gold necklaces and a ring,

were taken.

Police arrested Mario Dominguez, 19, on West Highway at 6:35 p.m. Saturday on a charge of failing to identify to police. He was released an hour later after posting a cash bond, according to the blotter.

Iowa Park police were notified that an automobile, stolen here about three weeks ago, had been recovered in the community of Lone Star. A woman from Burkburnett is being held on that and other felony charges.

## Lake annexation set after council action

Two ordinances will be considered at Monday evening's meeting of the city council that will lead to the annexation of Lake Iowa Park into the city limits.

One ordinance calls for accepting a petition to annex a 28-acre tract of land along the west side of the road leading to the lake, owned by Gene Wigley and leased by the city.

The other ordinance would set a public hearing to consider the petition for annexation of the tract. Both ordinances are prescribed by the city's general laws charter.

Council members will consider

authorizing the city administrator to enter into a contract for the lining of a new sanitary landfill cell.

Bids from contractors on the project are to be opened at 10 this morning at the city hall.

Administrator James Barrington will ask the council to approve a list of improvements needed at the Burnett Ball Field, next to the Recreational Activities Center.

Barrington will also ask the council to set a budget workshop for the 1988-89 fiscal year.

Monday's meeting is to begin at 7 p.m. in council chambers.

## June biggest month for building permits

Bolstered by a massive repair project on school building roofs, the city's building permits were the highest in May of any other month this year.

Iowa Park schools received permits to repair roofs damaged in the March 1 hailstorm, for \$165,000.

That raised the June permit total to \$462,619, as compared with May's \$271,891; April's \$454,036, and March's \$417,798.

Permits now total \$1,875,961 for the first half of 1988.

No permits were issued during June for new construction, and only two for mobile home move-in.

## Proposed school budget calls for 7-cent increase

A tentative budget of \$5.8-million calling for a seven-cent tax increase was proposed to the Iowa Park school board during a called meeting Thursday evening by Supt. Glen Mitchell.

The superintendent explained the eight percent increase would be necessary to meet mostly state-mandated programs and finish the 1988-89 year

with the \$1-million carryover needed to start the 1989-90 year.

He added, however, that he felt some \$94,000 could still be cut before the board meets in August to adopt the budget.

"The budget reflects an estimated balance of \$906,203 on Aug. 31, 1989," he told the board.

He said the seven-cent increase, which would generate \$175,000, was necessary for six primary reasons:

1. Decrease in state revenue by over \$100,000;
2. Employing additional teachers to meet the 22-1 ratio in grades 3-4;
3. Increase in salaries that are mostly mandated by law;
4. Increase in the cost of health insurance for employees;
5. Additional classrooms at Bradford;
6. Increase in workman's compensation rates.

The tax rate increase is the maximum allowed by law without facing a possible rollback election.

Mitchell also pointed out that

the \$1.1-million carryover expected at the end of this fiscal year includes the classroom addition at Bradford being fully paid.

He told the trustees, "I don't want to do anything (cutting more of the budget) to hurt our district financially, or academically."

He emphasized the need of at least \$1-million to start the 1988-89 year in order to meet payroll and expenses until state and local tax money start being paid. Otherwise, he pointed out, the district would have to borrow the money.

If the tax rate is set at 83-cents, 79.5-cents would be used in local maintenance and 3.5-cents for bonded and debt service.

Local revenue, including "flow-through" monies, are estimated next year at \$2,937,895, and state and federal revenue at \$2,813,809.

Each one-cent increase in the tax rate will cost the taxpayer an additional \$5 on a \$50,000-home. So, if the eight-percent increase is approved, the owner of that home would have an increase in taxes of \$35 next year, Mitchell explained.

The 1988-89 budget, broken down by expenditures, would be:

**Instructional Services:** payroll, purchased and contracted services, supplies, materials, other expenses, capital outlay for teachers and aides, \$3,130,764, or 53.19%;

**Instructional Related Services:** payroll, purchased/contracted services, supplies, materials, other expenses, capital outlay for librarians, principals, aides, \$478,928, or 8.14%;

**Pupil Services:** Payroll, purchased/contracted services, supplies, materials, other expenses, capital outlay for counselors, nurse, aides, transportation, co-curricular, food servi-

ces, \$1,114,764, or 18.94%

**Maintenance/Plant Service:** Payroll, purchased/contracted services, supplies, materials, other expenses, capital outlay for maintenance, custodial, utilities, etc., \$679,274, or 11.54%

**General and Tax Administration:** Payroll, purchased/contracted services, supplies, other expenses, capital outlay for administration, tax office, aides, \$360,634, or 6.13%;

**Debt Service:** Bond principal, interest, fees, \$93,700, or 1.59%;

**Swimming Pool:** \$27,437, or .47%.

During a discussion among members of the board concerning possible areas to cut the budget, chairman Jimmy Howell said in previous years of study on that point, it had been proven that the only significant cuts in expenses is in personnel.

"And we've already hired our people for next year," he reminded board members.

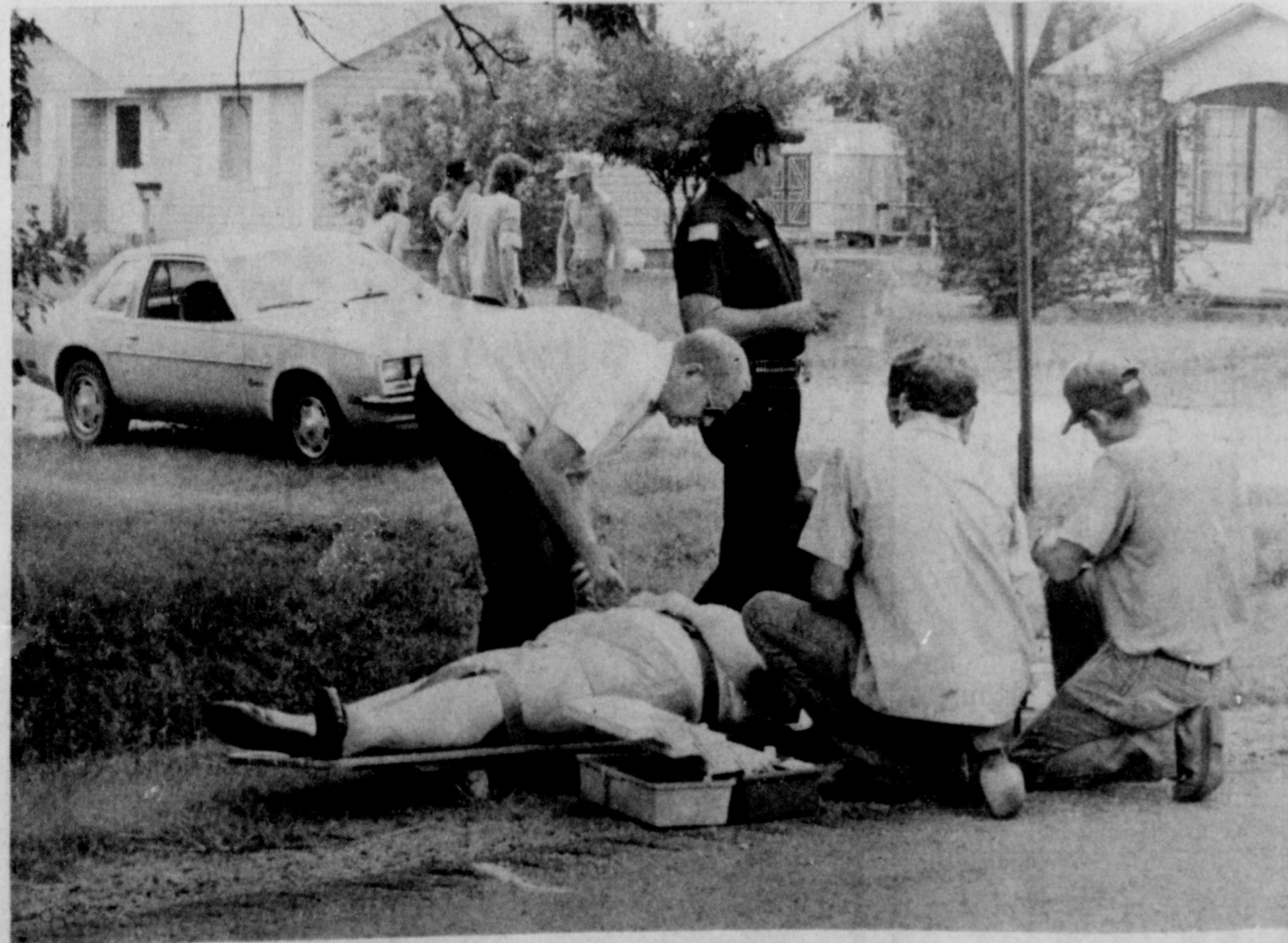
Howell complimented Mitchell and Robert Palmer, assistant superintendent, for having the proposed budget in the hands of the trustees in June, rather than in August, as has been the case in the past.

He said trustees could study the budget thoroughly during July, when the board traditionally does not meet, and be better prepared for the budget hearing in August before adopting it.

Board members were each given a thick book of computer generated information concerning proposed expenditures per campus with which to do their studies.

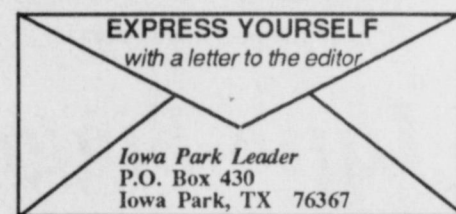

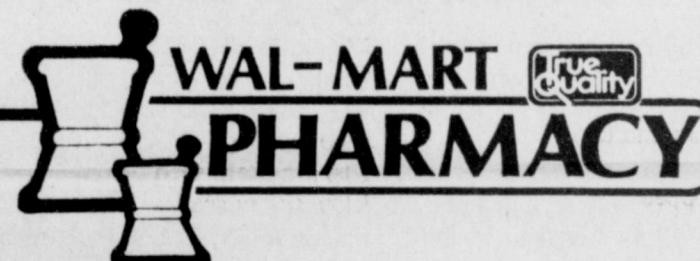

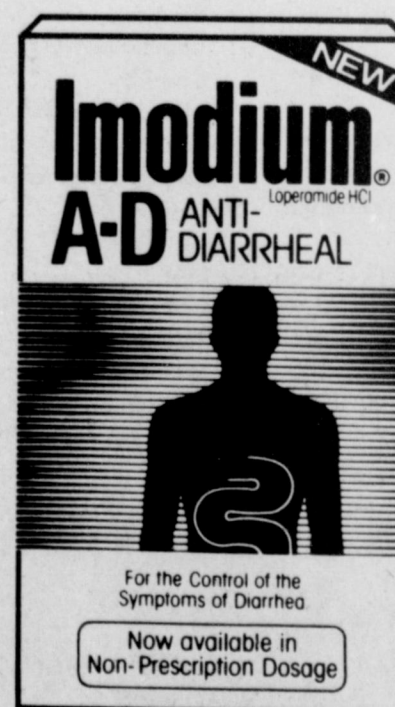

# Cook of the Week

With arts and crafts being so popular now, having the talent to hand-make any number of things, coupled with a career in decorating, must make work and play seem the same. Such is the case with this week's Cook of the Week, Betty (Mrs. Lewis) Hillard.

Betty is self-employed through Home Interiors the past five years, a career she says she loves. Along with that, she lists one of her hobbies as flower arranging, a skill she taught herself, and one that comes in handy with her work.

She said she also enjoys most arts and crafts, currently t-shirt decorating and ceramics, sewing, crocheting, fishing and camping. She is currently working on a quilt.

Betty and her husband, Lewis, have been married 30 years and lived in Iowa Park 25 years. They have four children, Michelle Kerr, Keith, David and Terry; and two granddaughters.

Lewis is self-employed at Hillard Trucking, based in Iowa Park.

Mrs. Hillard gave four salad recipes, and one authentic British dessert recipe, Lemon Curd, all of which readers should appreciate in the North Texas summer heat.

### SHRIMP SALAD

1-10 oz. pkg. shell macaroni  
Cook and rinse macaroni in cold water. Let drain and cool.  
Add:  
1 tomato, chopped  
1 onion (to taste)  
Sweet pickle, Cucumber  
1-4 1/2 oz. can shrimp  
Salt and pepper  
Toss with mayonnaise and 1 Tbsp. Salad Supreme Seasoning. Let stand one hour and serve.

### GREEN AND WHITE SALAD

1 cup mayonnaise  
1/2 cup sour cream  
1 Tbsp. sugar  
1 Tbsp. vinegar  
1 raw cauliflower  
3 bunches raw broccoli  
3 bunches green onions  
Cayenne pepper (sprinkle)  
Dash tabasco sauce  
Dash Worcestershire sauce  
Salt and pepper

Cut all vegetables fine. Mix dressing together with vegetables. This salad can be made ahead of time.

### CORN SALAD

1 can shoe peg corn  
1/4 cup diced carrot  
3 hard-boiled eggs  
1/2 cup each (chopped):  
Celery  
Green pepper  
Onion  
Sweet pickle  
Salt and pepper (to taste)  
1 heaping Tbsp. Miracle Whip  
Mix all together. Is best when it stands eight to 12 hours. Stays crisp as long as it lasts.

### MARINATED SLAW

1 lg. head cabbage  
1 cup green pepper  
1 cup celery  
1 onion  
1 cup vinegar  
1 cup cooking oil  
1 1/2 cup sugar  
1 tsp. pepper  
1 tsp. mustard seed  
1 tsp. celery seed  
Chop cabbage, pepper, onion and celery fine in a bowl. In separate bowl, combine other ingredients. Mix and pour over cabbage. Allow to stand five to six hours before serving.

### LEMON CURD

2 cups sugar  
4 eggs  
1 stick butter (4 oz.)  
3 lemons  
Grate the rinds of lemons finely and squeeze the juice and save. Melt butter in top of double boiler; then add sugar, lemon juice and rind. Add the well-beaten eggs and stir constantly until thickened. Cool and pour into a jar. Store in refrigerator. This can be put into cooked tart shells for Lemon Curd Tarts.

The group competed against dance teams from 22 other states.



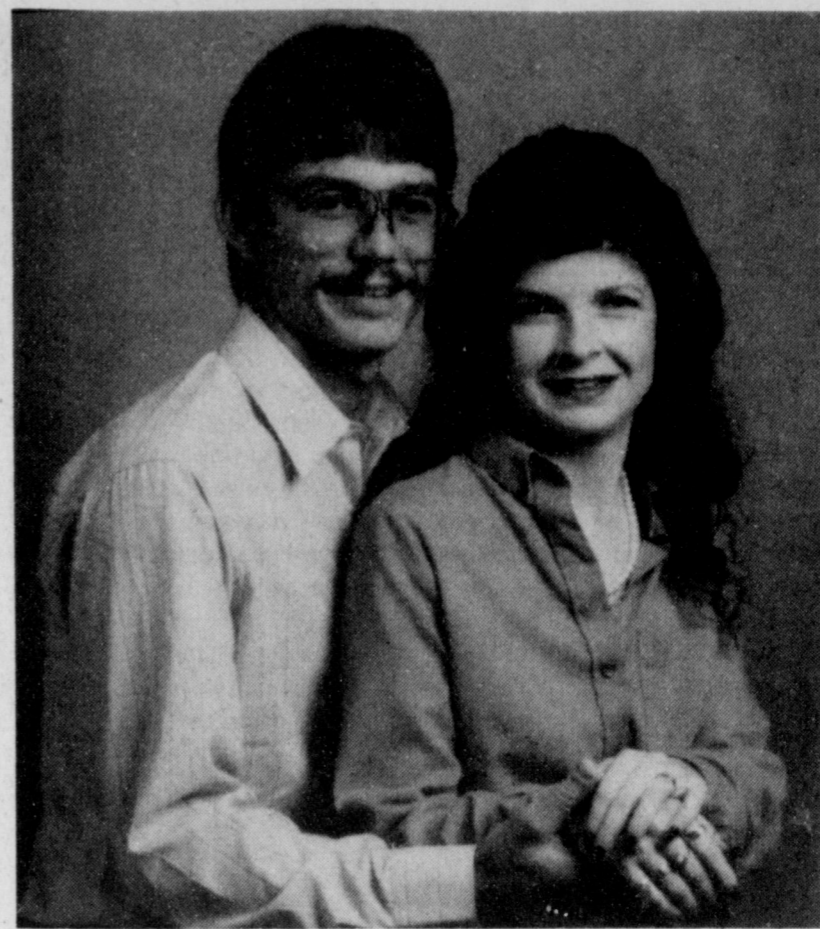

## Magazine ranks Vernon favorite, Hawks second

Vernon is favored to take the Dist. 5-AAA title this year, according to the newest edition of *Texas Football Magazine*.

Iowa Park is rated second, followed in order by Decatur, Graham, Bridgeport and Bowie.

The Lions are certainly not new competitors for the Hawks, but they have been dropped back from Class AAAA during the recent realignment by the University Interscholastic League, as was Graham.

Both have been in and out of districts with the Hawks over the years. But the magazine is impressed by the fact Vernon has been in the playoffs the past two years in AAAA, and finished with a 7-4 record last season.

About Iowa Park, the magazine article states:

"The high-flying Hawks at Iowa Park don't expect to be grounded this year since 18 lettermen are back from a 10-2 team. The talent lode includes LB Gary Tatum (5-9, 180, 4.6), who was in on 120 tackles as a junior, and TE Tony Taylor (6-0, 225, 4.8). Also back are QB Jimmy Duggins (6-3, 170) and center Scot Davis. Guard Jay Loggins is tough, too. Familiar faces also will be found in defensive mainstays such as LB Mike Lubinski

(6-0, 195), NGs Lee Cokendolpher and Chuck Brown and DT Brad Lewis (6-0, 265). DE Rual Swanson is solid, as are skill-position folks Marc Cruz, Jimmy Nicholson, Dan Fannin and Sean Rowe."

Defending champion Cuero is the *Texas Football* top pick again this year, followed by Daingerfield, Vernon, LaGrange, Springtown, Newton, Sweeny, Navasota, Wills Point and Southlake Carroll.

McGregor, the team that knocked the Hawks out of the playoffs at the area level, 20-17, and went on to lose 14-6 to Cuero, is ranked second

among Class AA teams this fall.

Also ranked in the top 10 AA clubs in the state are Quanah, in eighth, and Electra, tenth.

The magazine has Holliday ranked third in Dist. 9-AA, behind Electra and Henrietta, but ahead of Olney, Archer City and Seymour.

Hawk runningback Jim Cummings, who was a first-team all state performer last year, missed by only 12 yards being in the top 20 ball carriers in the state in 1987.

Cummings finished the year with 1,700 yards rushing. The 20th place gainer among all classifications was Wayne Williams of West Columbia, who finished with 1,712 yards, in 14 games.

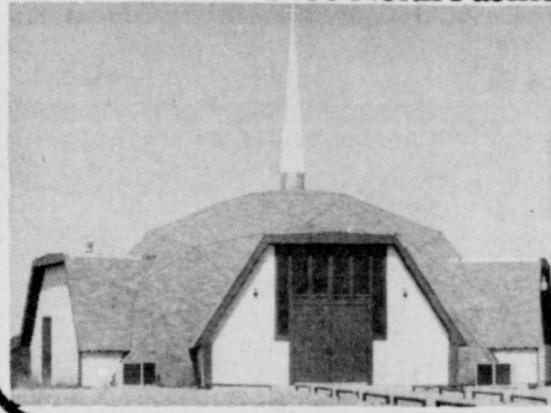

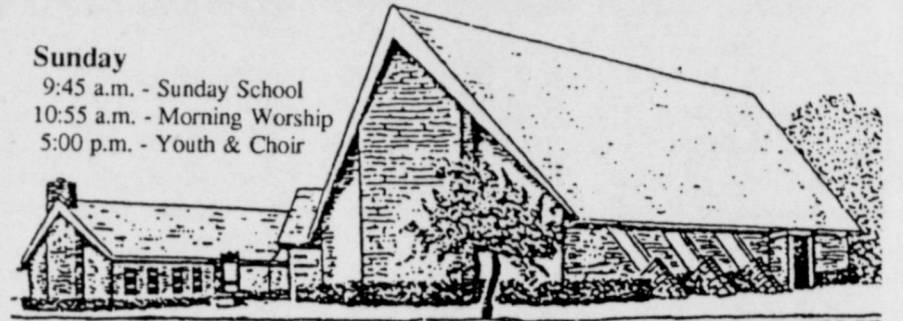

Nothing in this world is more inspiring than a soul up against crippling circumstances who carries it off with courage and faith and an undefeatable spirit.

Newton Baker, Secretary of War in Pres. Wilson's cabinet, once told of visits he made to the worst casualties in the Federal hospitals after World War I. One of the very worst was a man with both legs and one arm gone, blinded in both eyes and whose face was terribly mutilated. He was wheeled around the grounds of the hospital by a nurse. No one really expected him to live. Yet in spite of all these problems, he was radiant and full of spirit.

Later, when Mr. Baker met someone from the hospital, he asked, "Did that young man live?" The answer was, "Did he live? I'll say he did! He married the nurse!"

Marveling at the capacity of women to love, Mr. Baker almost forgot the incident until a few years later, as a trustee of Johns Hopkins University, he received a letter from the president. They wished, said the president, to do an unusual thing-to hold a mid-semester convocation to bestow the degree of Doctor of Philosophy upon a young man, though severely handicapped, had one of the most brilliant pieces of work ever done at the university. His name was the same as the crippled veteran. Mr. Baker was quite incredulous that it could be the same man, but the phrase "severely handicapped" caused him to check on the man's identity. Sure enough, it was the man from the veteran's hospital. Both legs gone, one arm gone, both eyes gone, but still, not part of the world's problem but part of the answer!

Winston Churchill said it well when asked the key to victory: "NEVER-NEVER-NEVER-NEVER GIVE UP!"

# Iowa Parkans delegates to international meeting

Fourteen members were present.

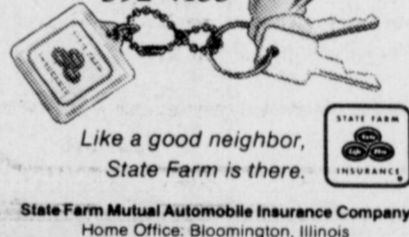

**United Way to award \$18,000 in Grants**

The United Way of Greater Wichita Falls, of which Iowa Park is a member, will be awarding \$18,000 in Venture Grants for one-time funding to encourage agencies and organizations to respond with new and/or innovative projects aimed at the following problems:

- a. teenage pregnancies and/or related family life education;
- b. latch-key children or day care for children;
- c. medical and physical care for the needy elderly population, or adult day care;
- d. illiteracy and under-education or job training/job development; or
- e. dealing with possible negative motivation in society and in the classroom for the minority population or dealing with the high risk issues facing black males.

Eligibility is limited to any non-profit organization which has established or is currently in the process of establishing tax exempt status under Section 501 (c) (3) of the Internal Revenue Code and provides health and human care services in the Wichita Falls area.

This includes United Way affiliated agencies and non-affiliated agencies. Collaborative efforts between organizations are encouraged, according to Sandra Marvel, chairman of the Venture Grant committee.
