

Iowa Park Police Department's radio dispatcher was swamped with calls concerning grassfires during the first few hours of darkness Monday, July 4th.

Six calls were received during a two-hour period, from 9:40 to 11:59, and volunteers from Iowa Park, Wichita West and Kamay departments were dispatched.

In all, the radio dispatcher posted 15 fire calls beginning Saturday night through Tuesday, according to Additionally, there were numerous complaints phoned into the department concerning fireworks being set off inside the city, in violation of city ordinance.

Police are investigating a report of a burglary that apparently took place Friday in a unit at Woodbriar Apartments.

Lou Ann Andrews filed a complaint that several pieces of jewelry, mostly gold necklaces and a ring,

were taken.

Lake annexation set after council action

Two ordinances will be considered at Monday evening's meeting of the city council that will lead to the annexation of Lake Iowa Park into the city limits.

One ordinance calls for accepting a petition to annex a 28-acre tract of land along the west side of the road leading to the lake, owned by Gene Wigley and leased by the city.

The other ordinance would set a public hearing to consider the petition for annexation of the tract. Both ordinances are prescribed by the city's general laws charter.

Council members will consider 7 p.m. in council chambers.


Proposed school budget calls for 7-cent increase

A tentative budget of \$5.8-million calling for a seven-cent tax increase was proposed to the Iowa Park school board during a called meeting Thursday evening by Supt. Glen Mitchell.

The superintendent explained the eight percent increase would be necessary to meet mostly state-mandated programs and finish the 1988-89 year

with the \$1-million carryover needed to start the 1989-90 year.

He added, however, that he felt some \$94,000 could still be cut before the board meets in August to adopt the budget.

"The budget reflects an estimated balance of \$906,203 on Aug. 31, 1989," he told the board.

He said the seven-cent increase, which would generate \$175,000, was necessary for six primary reasons:

1. Decrease in state revenue by over \$100,000;

Employing additional teachers
to meet the 22-1 ratio in grades 3-4;
Increase in salaries that are

mostly mandated by law; 4. Increase in the cost of health

insurance for employees; 5. Additional classrooms at Brad-

ford; 6. Increase in workman's com-

pensation rates. The tax rate increase is the max-

imum allowed by law without facing a possible rollback election.

Mitchell also pointed out that

Dillard hired by trustees

School trustees last week hired Iowa Park High School graduate Ray Dillard to replace George Brandt as Vocational Agriculture and horticulture teacher.

Dillard, who has taught the past nine years at Electra, is a graduate of Tarleton State Univ.

Also hired was Vicki Scott, as deputy tax clerk.

Trustees also approved a proposal to cut class periods to 50 minutes beginning in the fall, but to retain the seven periods per day. the \$1.1-million carryover expected at the end of this fiscal year includes the classroom additon at Bradford being fully paid.

He told the trustees, "I don't want to do anything (cutting more of the budget) to hurt our district financially, or academically."

He emphasized the need of at least \$1-million to start the 1988-89 year in order to meet payroll and expenses until state and local tax money start being paid. Otherwise, he pointed out, the district would have to borrow the money.

If the tax rate is set at 83-cents, 79.5-cents would be used in local maintenance and 3.5-cents for bonded and debt service.

Local revenue, including "flowthrough" monies, are estimated next year at \$2,937,895, and state and federal revenue at \$2,813,809.

Each one-cent increase in the tax rate will cost the taxpayer an additional \$5 on a \$50,000-home. So, if the eight-percent increase is approved, the owner of that home would have an increase in taxes of \$35 next year, Mitchell explained.

The 1988-89 budget, broken down by expenditures, would be:

Instructional Services: payroll, purchased and contracted services, supplies, materials, other expenses, capital outlay for teachers and aides, \$3,130,764, or 53.19%;

Instructional Related Services: payroll, purchased/contracted services, supplies, materials, other expenses, capital outlay for librarians, principals, aides, \$478,928, or 8.14%;

Pupil Services: Payroll, purchased/contracted services, supplies, materials, other expenses, capital outlay for counselors, nurse, aides, transportation, co-curricular, food services, \$1,114,764, or 18.94%

Maintenance/Plant Service Payroll, purchased/contracted services, supplies, materials, other expenses, capital outlay for maintenance, custodial, utilities, etc., \$679,274, or 11.54%

General and Tax Administration: Payroll, purchased/contracted services, supplies, other expenses, capital outlay for administration, tax office, aides, \$360,634, or 6.13%;

Debt Service: Bond principal, interest, fees, \$93,700, or 1.59%;

Swimming Pool: \$27,437, or .47%.

During a discussion among members of the board concerning possible areas to cut the budget, chairman Jimmy Howell said in previous years of study on that point, it had been proven that the only significant cuts in expenses is in personnel.

"And we've already hired our people for next year," he reminded board members.


• Howell complimented Mitchell and Robert Palmer, assistant superintendent, for having the proposed budget in the hands of the trustees in June, rather than in August, as has been the case in the past.

He said trustees could study the budget thoroughly during July, when the board traditionally does not meet, and be better prepared for the budget hearing in August before adopting it.

Board members were each given a thick book of computer generated information concerning proposed expenditures per campus with which to do their studies.

Reception to honor couple on anniversary



Dance group competes in state competition



Nothing in this world is more inspiring than a soul up against crippling circumstances who carries it off with courage and faith and an undefeated spirit.

Newton Baker, Secretary of War in Pres. Wilson's cabinet, once told of visits he made to the worst casualties in the Federal hospitals after World War I. One of the very worst was a man with both legs and one arm gone, blinded in both eyes and whose face was terribly mutilated. He was wheeled around the grounds of the hospital by a nurse. No one really expected him to live. Yet in spite of all these problems, he was radiant and full of spirit.

Later, when Mr. Baker met someone from the hospital, he asked, "Did that young man live?" The answer was, "Did he live? I'll say he did! He married the nurse!"

Marveling at the capacity of women to love, Mr. Baker almost forgot the incident until a few years later, as a trustee of Johns Hopkins University, he received a letter from the president. They wished, said the president, to do an unusual thing-to hold a mid-semester convocation to bestow the degree of Doctor of Philosophy upon a young man, though severely handicapped, had one of the most brilliant pieces of work ever done at the university. His name was the same as the crippled veteran. Mr. Baker was quite incredulous that it could be the same man, but the phrase "severely handicapped" caused him to check on the man's identity. Sure enough, it was the man from the veteran's hospital. Both legs gone, one arm gone, both eyes gone, but still, not part of the world's problem but part of the answer!

Winston Churchill said it well when asked the key to victory: "NEVER-NEVER-NEVER-NEVER GIVE UP!"
