City, school taxes subject of meetings

Both Iowa Park taxing entities, the city and school, will be acting on taxes at their meetings next week.

The city, which is to meet at 7 p.m. Monday in council chambers, is to set its budget and tax rate.

Tuesday, the school board is to hold its public hearing on the budget, but will not set the tax rate until a later date.

School trustees are to meet after touring the junior high building. which is to begin at 7 p.m.

City aldermen will be asked to authorize the city administrator to enter into a contract for group medical insurance, and also advertise for bids for sewer line smoke testing.

The council will consider a policy of enforcing a provision in the Standard Building Code to license building contractors.

The Volunteer Fire Department has submitted a request to replace the emergency vehicle, and action could be taken on that Monday.

A report is on the agenda concerning a proposal by the Texas Highway Department to rebuild South Wall, and another report on Enhanced 911 telephone service is expected.

An executive session is slated on the meeting agenda. One part is on pending or contemplated litigation or settlement offers," and the other on "purchase of real property."

The agenda provides for action on either or both the topics once the meeting is reopened to the public.

Teachers return to work tomorrow

The 1986-87 school year is just about to begin, and the large number of cars and people at Iowa Park High School campus tomorrow is a clear indication.

The entire faculty will report there Friday morning to begin inservice training.

The faculty will meet in the auditorium for a general session, beginning at 8:30.

Following a coffee and doughnut period, Supt. Glen Mitchell will welcome the staff and introduce all new members, as well as make special announcements.

Rule and curriculum changes for the year will be noted by Robert Palmer, assistant superintendent, and he will introduce the morning's guest speaker, Cindy Bradford, of KFDX television.

The teachers are to report to their respective campuses from 10:45 to noon, and meet at the high school cafeteria for lunch.

Faculty members will return to their campuses the entire afternoon for meetings with their principals.

Inservice continues through all of next week. Teachers will be at the high school auditorium Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday, and at their campuses Thursday and Friday.

Monday morning, the program will center on special education. That afternoon and all day Tuesday, the

subject will be Methods for Effective Teaching and Supervision.

Wednesday, teachers will meet at the high school and that afternoon at their home campuses, but the subject the entire day will be Texas Teacher Appraisal System.

STUDENT SCHEDULES

Iowa Park High School students are to pick up their class schedules, locker assignments, home room assignments, parking permits and fill out required paperwork either Aug. 28 or 29, according to Principal Richard Davis.

Seniors are to report between 8:30 and 11:30 a.m. next Thursday,

and juniors between 1 and 3:30 p.m. Sophomores will report the same hours as the seniors, but on Friday, and freshmen Friday afternoon.

Any student who has moved into the district this year and not yet registered, should do so immediately, school officials say.

A student who will be in grades nine through 12 should report to the high school; grades six through eight at the junior high school; grades three through five at Breadford Elementary, and kindergarten through second grade at Kidwell Elementary.

All students will commence the 1986-87 school year at 8:10 a.m. on

More students register for bussing; changes made

Registration of students who will ride buses to school this year will continue in the school administration building until the beginning of school, according to Robert Palmer, assistant superintendent.

As of Monday afternoon, 752 students had registered. That is an increase over last year, and has caused the addition of two routes, Palmer

Mini-bus 1 will pick up all students living at Lake Diversion and the fish hatchery. These students previously rode bus 10.

All junior high students loading at Edgehill/Park Plaza, Lanelle/Foley and Kidwell Elementary will ride special bus 7, instead of buses 18 and 1, to which they were previously assigned, Palmer said.

A new bus stop has been added at 7:45 a.m., for students living in the vicinity of Emma Street. These students will board bus 4 in the middle of Emma, Palmer reported.

1100 block of Cornelia to be closed temporarily

The 1100 block of West Cornelia will be closed temporarily next week to permit construction of a 10foot concrete valley gutter, according to Mike Price, public works director

The project is to correct a drain-

age and pavement problem. Crews will close the street at 9 a.m. Tuesday, and reopen it the fol-

lowing Friday, Price said. Residents south of 1116 and 1117 will still be able to reach their property from Corrine, but those north of the addresses will have to travel on the Access Road.

More work will be done the following week to correct potholes, which have been a constant problem because of poor drainage.

Price said the Johnson Road project could possibly be completed by the first of September, with pouring of concrete of the curb about the only work remaining.

Sealcoating of 64 blocks of pavement is to begin this morning and be completed Friday, Price said.

Residents of the blocks to be sealcoated are asked to not park on the streets either day, and not drive on the surfaces until the barriers are removed.

Price said a lot of workers' time is lost on this type of project when they have to locate the owners of vehicles parked on the streets, and ask that they be moved.

Lafayette; 100 through 400 blocks of South Colorado, from Daisy south to

Cash, from Bond east to Bell; 100 through 1500 blocks of North

Victoria, from East Highway north to Access Road; 100 North Texowa, from East

Highway north to Cash; 400 through 1000 blocks of East Pasadena, from Texowa east to Bell.


Whoop-T-Do reservations open

Cook of the Week

Friends of Cheryl (Mrs. Roger) York who have eaten her cooking know what a delicious experience it is, and those who have not eaten it are in for an enriching surprise when they do. Her recipes for this week sound like culinary delights.

The Sweet and Sour Sausage can surely wake up one's taste buds because of the combination of certain ingredients, one of which is apricot preserves.

The apricot grows wild in the mountains around Peking where it originated and is known to have been cultivated as early as 2200 B.C. Throughout its long history it has been slow to spread.

It was grown in the hanging gardens of Babylon. The Romans knew the apricot and some scholars argue that apricots were planted in Italy about the time of Nero. They were called "eggs of the sun" by the

The apricot seems to have been familiar to the French in the 15th century, but did not arrive in England until 1562. It has been stated that the apricot reached America in the 16th century, but it is more probable that it was introduced in the 18th century by the Mission Fathers of California. That state today produces the best fruit for eating and the third best canning.

CRUNCHY PECAN PIE

3 egg whites

1 cup granulated sugar 1 square Nabisco graham crackers finely rolled, about 1 cup crumbs 1 cup finely chopped pecans

1/4 t. baking powder 1 cup heavy cream, whipped

Beat egg whites until soft peaks form, gradually add sugar beating until stiff peaks form. Combine next three ingredients and fold into egg whites. Spead in a greased 9-inch pan. Bake at 350 degrees 30 minutes. Cool thoroughly. Spread with whipped cream. Chill 6 hours or overnight.



2 cups cubed cooked chicken 2 cups sliced celery 1 cup pecans, almonds or walnuts

1/2 t. mustard 1 cup mayonnaise

2 t lemon juice Potato chips

Mix the chicken, celery and choice of nuts together. In separate bowl, mix salt, mustard, mayonnaise and lemon juice, then add to chicken mix. Put into 2-qt. casserole dish and top with potato chips and cheese. Cook at 425 degrees 12-15 minutes. Serves 6-8.

PINEAPPLE CREAM CHEESE BALL

2-8 oz. pkgs. cream cheese 1-8 oz. crushed pineapple, very well

1/4 cup chopped bell pepper

2 T. chopped onion 1/2 t. salt

2 cups chopped pecans (1 cup chopped finer for inside)

Soften cheese, then add all ingredients except 1 cup chopped pecans. Roll in ball and freeze seven hours. Roll in pecans and chill.

SWEET AND SOUR SAUSAGE

Cut in pieces and saute 1 lb. smoked sausage 5 minutes.

Combine: 1 Tb. cornstarch

1/2 t. ground ginger

1 Tb. vinegar 1 Tb. soy sauce

1/2 cup apricot preserves

Stir into sausage mixture and heat to thicken. Add 2 cups drained pineapple chunks. Heat. Serve over rice. Makes 4-6 servings.

Crush cookies and soften oleo. Mix together and press all but 1 cup oreo mixture in pan. Spead 1/2 gallon soft vanilla ice cream on top. freeze until firm. On top, spread 1 cup hot fudge sauce. Make a layer of salted peanuts; on top of that spread 8 oz. Cool Whip, then 1 cup crumb mixture on top. Cover and freeze.

Note: when ready to serve take out of freezer a few minutes early so it has a chance to soften up a bit.



Mrs. James leads review



V.C. Moore has announced plans to drill the No. 1 Vogel, a 1,999-ft. developmental well in the Wichita Regular Field. The operator has 20 acres leased, with drillsite in the RRVL S/D Survey, Blk. 74.

The venture will be drilled three miles north-northwest of Burkburnett

Drillsite is 150 feet from the south line and 150 feet from the east line of the lease.

The No. 10 Parker Heirs "F" has been finaled by L.J. Miller and B.J. Parker.

It is a developmental well in the Wichita Regular Field, five miles south of Iowa Park. DRillsite is in a 320-acre lease in the Palo Pinto CSL Survey.

Daily potential of nine barrels of oil, plus 20 barrels of water was posted with the Railroad Commission. The well went to a 1,315-ft. bottom, and will produce from a set of perforations in the Cisco Sand Formation, 1,230 to 1,233 feet into the wellbore.


Worth Quoting

Seems like I get on this soap box pretty often and each time I get phone calls or stopped on the street with the same "there ain't nothing to buy here and if it was here it would be too high."

Sad thing, those same folks are the first to lay blame on our city for not fixing the pot holes, taxes are too high, not enough recreation facilities, and the real kicker "why doesn't SOMEBODY do something."

The "Something" that everybody

can do is give the local merchant "first shot." We have never argued that dollars should be spent at home recklessly or without shopping around. However, a simple point, how is a merchant to know if he or she is competitive if the buyers automatically bypass them for the larger city?

This simply creates a false image of "there's no business here" and inventories decrease and incentives for expansion of existing or new business falls to zip.

INCOME ELIGIBILITY GUIDELINES 1986-87

Dear Parent or Guardian:

The Iowa Park Consolidated Independent School District serves nutritious meals every school day. Students may buy lunch for 75¢, 85¢, and \$1.00 and breakfast for 50¢. Children from families whose income is at or below the level shown on the attached scale are eligible for either free meals or reduced-price meals priced at 40¢ for lunch and 30¢ for breakfast.

HOW AND WHERE TO APPLY: A separate application must be filled out for each child you want to receive free or reduced-price meals. The completed application must be returned to that child's principal. One application form is attached, but you may obtain additional forms from any principal if you have more than one child for whom you want to apply.

COMPLETE APPLICATION: For an application to be complete, you must provide: the total household income listed by the amount received by each household member receiving income and the type of income it is (such as wages, child support, etc.) OR your food stamp case number if your household is on food stamps, the names of all household members, social security numbers of all household members 21 years or older or state that a household member does not have one, and the signature of an adult household member. Please answer all questions on the form. An application which does not contain complete information on household members and income cannot be processed by the school.

VERIFICATION: The information on the application may be checked by the school or other officials at any time during the school year.

REPORTING CHANGES: If your child is approved for meal benefits, you must tell the school when your household income increases by more than \$50 per month (\$600 per year) or when your household size decreases.

REAPPLICATION: You may apply for benefits at any time during the school year. If you are not eligible now, but have a decrease in household income, become unemployed, or have an increase in family size, fill out an application at that time.

FOSTER CHILDREN: If you have foster children living with you, they may be eligible for these benefits. If you wish to apply for these benefits for them, please contact the school and they will help you complete the application.

NONDISCRIMINATION: Children who receive free or reduced-

price meal benefits are treated the same as children who pay for meals. In the opeation of child feeding programs, no child will be discriminated against because of race, sex, color, national origin, age or handicap. If you believe you have been discriminated against, write immediately to the Secretary of Agriculture, Washington, D.C. 20250.

FAIR HEARING: If you do not agree with the school's decision on your application or the result of verification, you may wish to discuss it with the school. You also have the right to a fair hearing. This can be done by calling or writing Glen H. Mitchell, Superintendent, Iowa Park Consolidated Independent School District, P.O. Box 898, Iowa Park, Texas, 76367.

CONFIDENTIALITY: The information you provide will be treated confidentially and will be used only for eligibility determinations and verification of data.

HELP WITH APPLICATION: If you have any questions or need help in filling out the application form, please contact your child's principal. You will be notified when the application is approved or denied.




