## City slates meeting; school's is postponed

The city council will hold its regularly-scheduled meeting Monday, but the school board meeting has been postponed from Tuesday to Thursday.

Supt. Glen Mitchell explained the regular monthly meeting of the board of trustees was postponed because the accountants who audited the 1985-86 books would not be available Tuesday night.

Instead, board members will meet at 7:30 p.m. next Thursday, in the administration building.

City aldermen are to meet in executive session Monday, to look over applications for police chief, according to Administrator James Barrington.

Action is expected on a lease agreement with the Iowa Park Trap Club on land to be used at Lake Iowa Park. The subject was postponed at the last meeting because one member was absent and two abstained because of conflicting interest.

Representatives of the Iowa Park Volunteer Fire Department are to appeal to the council for another vehicle to be used in rescue work.

The council will consider a proposal that the city purchase used vehicles from the Department of Public Safety.

A request to lease part of the land owned by the city at Fourth Street and West Highway has been

submitted by Shirley Cravens, and city fathers are expected to consider authorizing that appeal.

Property in the same tract, which fronts onto the old highway, has already been leased to Deryl James for a used car sales lot.

Repairs on Buffalo Lake Dam, recommended by the state Water Quality Control Board, will be considered.

Also on Monday's agenda is the appointment of a representative from Iowa Park to the Sheppard Community Council, replacing Jerry Gholson.

## Hawks take on Lampasas in quarterfinals

Two football teams that could very well be suffering from a Rodney Dangerfield syndrome will meet each other Saturday afternoon in Weatherford, to decide which will advance into the state semi-final game.

Neither Iowa Park nor Lampasas was ever ranked by the Associated Press among the state's top 10 Class AAA teams during the 1986 season.

Like the famous comedian, neither got any respect from the wire service.

But the Hawks and Badgers are now among the final eight clubs in the AAA classification with an opportunity to earn the 1986 crown.

Lampasas enters the contest with a 10-2 record, having played only a nine-game regular season schedule, after knocking off Crane 10-8 in the final minute of play Saturday, via a field goal.

The Hawks, now 10-2-1, earned the playoff berth by knocking off Kermit, 36-14, Friday at Snyder.

Lampasas could be short-handed when the ball is kicked off at 2 p.m. Badger quarterback, Richard Roach, was injured late in last week's game and reportedly will not play.

Roach, a 156-pound senior who has 1,500 total offensive yards this

year, despite missing two games because of a disciplinary suspension, received a knee injury Saturday.

But, according to those who watched the game, he was virtually carried back onto the field from the sideline to hold the ball for the winning field goal kick.

Taking the quarterback position for the game will be Jason Bednar, a 172-pound junior who is a starting linebacker on defense.

Roach's favorite target this year has been blue-chipper Curtis Thrift, a 6-4, 225-pound tight end who caught 25 passes last year and added 42 more this season for 902 yards and nine touchdowns.

Thrift also plays defensive end.

Leading rusher this season is fullback Peper Procter, a 200-pound senior converted from his 1985 position as a guard.

Procter, who also plays linebacker, has gained 932 yards in his 12 appearances this season.

Other heavyweights on the offensive line with Thrift are 225-pound tackle Davis Keele and center Bobby Standridge, 190.

Tackle Van Berry, 200, is a defensive specialist on a five-man front along with a 168-pound noseguard and a couple of others who weigh 170 and 180, but use their quickness to hold their opponents in check.

Like the Hawks, the Badgers are back in the playoffs for the second consecutive year.

Making their first playoff appearance in 30 years, the Badgers beat Crane 30-14 last year in bi-district, and then lost 24-7 to Vernon.

Lampasas defeated Gatesville 20-6 to kick off the 1986 season, and then edged Fredericksburg 21-15 before losing 30-9 and 25-21 to Cameron.

Returning to the winning side of the ledger by beating Llano 41-0, Early 35-0, Comanche 50-6, Burnet

The Badgers shut out Connally 32-0 in bi-district and then humiliated Dist. 6-AAA champ Breckenridge 41-14 for area.

Head Hawk David Baugh said preparation for the game was difficult because the Badgers operate out of so many different offensive formations.

Their basic formation is the Wing T, but they also like the "B" pro and "B" tight formations, using a player in motion almost all the time.

Option and draw plays are favorites of the Badgers, who like to let the quarterback keep the ball.

Iowa Park will be playing without the services of alternating linebacker Chad Fielding, who suffered a shoulder separation Friday night.

Otherwise, all the Hawks are expected to be fit and ready for the game.

Mean Green fullback Danny Forman is threatening to set a new rushing record for Iowa Park, thanks to his 177-yard performance against Kermit.

Forman now has 1,338 yards this season.

Baugh complimented the play of Dennis Phillips, who was pressed into service as offensive center after the loss of Clint Loggins via grades.

## Cable changes announced

Numerous changes in the local cabletelevision service were announced this week, ranging from additional channels to new management.

Equipment is being installed to add five channels, bringing the total to 22.

New channels will include a 24-hour national weather program, American Movie Classics, The Discovery Channel, WSA Cable Network and the Cable Value Network.

All current channel numbers will be changed, with the exception of the three national networks.

Installation of equipment, which includes a second satellite dish, is expected to be completed by Dec. 18, according to Weldon Lair, new system manager replacing Raymond Greenwood, who is being transferred to Mineral Wells.

Lair pointed out that the basic rate for cable service will be increased to \$15 monthly, but there will no longer be an additional charge for more than one set in the home.

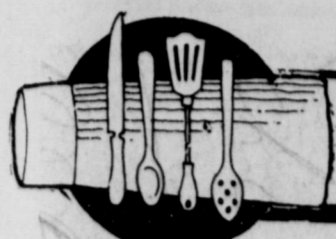

## Cook of the Week

At this time of the year after Thanksgiving, people are naturally turning their thoughts to Christmas, and cooks are going through their cookbooks to pull out their favorite dessert recipes. Most of the festive ones call for pecans, and Tammie (Mrs. Mark) Patterson shares two dessert recipes this week that call for pecans.

The pecan seems to be most appreciated in Texas. In fact, one expert said "Texans will buy anything with pecans in it," and isn't it also true that Texans will eat anything with pecans in it?

One reference states the pecan is a nut originally 100 percent American; and another reference says that the territory now Texas may be where the pecan started in the United States despite its scientific name, the Illinois hickory. It was probably named Illinois because that is where it was presumably discovered by the French missionaries pushing southward from the St. Lawrence valley.

Pecan is an American Indian word. Pre-Columbian Indians used pecans extensively. They pressed oil from them and seasoned cooked fruit with pecans. They ground them into meal to thicken stew, mixed them with vegetables and roasted them to carry on hunting trips.

Thomas Jefferson introduced the nut to the Atlantic Coast when he moved some trees from the Mississippi Valley to Monticello. He gave a few to George Washington who planted them, and it is reputed that three of the trees are still there.

Tammie, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Jerry Robertson, was graduated from Iowa Park High School. She is busy now as a homemaker, wife and mother. She is a member of First Baptist Church and her hobbies are arts and crafts and decorating cakes.

She and Mark, who is self-employed as a welder, have a four year old daughter, Cheyenne, and a 15 month old son, Dakota.

### ORANGE ROCK PECANS

1 1/2 cup sugar  
3 T orange juice  
Pinch of salt  
1/4 cup water  
Cook the above ingredients till ball forms.  
Add:  
1/4 tsp. vanilla  
4 cups pecans  
Stir mix liquid all over pecans for a couple minutes or until coated well. Pour out on waxed paper, and when cool break apart.

### PIZZA SNACKS

1/2 lb. Italian sausage  
1 tsp. dried oregano, crushed  
1 clove garlic, minced  
1-8 oz. pkg. refrigerated biscuits  
1 can tomato paste  
4 ozs. sharp cheese (grated about 1 cup)  
1/4 cup Parmesan cheese  
Brown sausage and drain; add oregano and garlic. On greased baking sheet, flatten biscuits into 4-inch circles with floured custard cup, leave rim. Fill with tomato paste and sausage. Sprinkle cheeses over sausage. Cook at 425 degrees approximately 10 minutes.

### POTATO CASSEROLE

1 - 2 lb. pkg. hashbrowns, thawed  
1/2 cup chopped onion  
10 oz. Velveeta cheese, grated  
1/2 tsp. pepper  
1/2 cup melted butter  
1 tsp. salt  
1 can cream of chicken soup  
1 pint sour cream  
Mix all ingredients together and put in a greased 3-quart casserole dish. Top with 2 cups crushed corn flakes mixed with 1/4 cup melted butter. Bake 1 hour at 350 degrees.

### SOCK-IT-TO-ME CAKE

1 pkg. white cake mix  
4 eggs  
1/2 cup sugar  
2 tsps. cinnamon  
3/4 cup Mazola oil  
3 T brown sugar  
1 small carton sour cream  
1 cup pecans  
Mix with spoon only - do not use electric mixer. Bake in greased bundt pan 1 hour at 350 degrees.

### CROCKPOT MEXICAN CASSEROLE

1 1/2 lb. ground beef  
1 can chili with beans

1/4 cup Picante sauce  
1/4 cup water  
1 cup rice  
Salt and pepper to taste

Brown ground beef, add the other above ingredients and simmer about 5 minutes.

Placed crushed Doritos in bottom of crockpot, add one half meat mixture and 1 can Cheddar cheese soup. Repeat, topping it off with Doritos. Cook on high about 45 minutes, or if you want to cook it longer, place crockpot on low temperature.

# As I See It....

Let's talk football!  
How about the Hawks' game being scheduled on Saturday afternoon?  
Not since Iowa Park lost to Denver City in 1964, at Snyder, has a Hawk club played a daytime game.  
Then-coach Tommy Watkins swore off daylight games as a bad item from that bi-district game, and never scheduled another.  
But Coach David Baugh tells me his players are excited about playing on a Saturday afternoon, relating it to big-time college football.  
They like the idea. So, by golly, since it's their game, that's the way it

ought to be.  
Absolutely no one is taking the Badgers of Lampasas lightly. Not when that club put it on Breckenridge 41-14, and Breckenridge earned the Dist. 6-AAA championship by virtue of a 20-6 win over Iowa Park.  
But one can't help but look to the east, where Daingerfield and Jefferson will be playing this week at Marshall.  
I'm not too sure Daingerfield will get past Jefferson, by the way.  
But City Administrator James Barrington, who comes from that part of the country, made an interest-

ing observation, should the Hawks win and meet Daingerfield.  
Daingerfield won state back in 1968. En route, by the way, they handed the Hawks their only loss of the season, 14-0, in the semi-finals.  
But, as Barrington pointed out, the following year, Iowa Park took the big crown.  
Barrington then noted Daingerfield won state in 1985. So, he reasons, this is the year of the Hawks!  
A radio announcer from Lampasas called me yesterday morning to talk about the game, and during the discussion, asked if I expected a good crowd to be at the game from Iowa Park.  
I said I did, and asked how many he expected from Lampasas. He said 1,500 to 2,000.  
"Is that all?" I asked.  
"We'll have that many former residents from Iowa Park there who live in the Dallas-Fort Worth area, I told him.  
Iowa Parkans like their winning football teams. I saw that back in the winning seasons of 1969 and '70.  
Driving back Friday night from Snyder, it occurred to me as we were in the rolling hills area, that it was like the old days. As far as I could see, red tail lights of Hawk fans going home.  
And we had a world of fans at Snyder who don't live here anymore. It was great to see them again, as was the case the week before when we were at Weatherford.  
Let's go Hawks! And let's go Fans!

## Worth Quoting

Folks, if perchance the President, or any of his people, ever call you and ask that you serve on one of those nonpaying Boards, Commissions, Committees, or whatever, my advice would be to say "no, thanks," politely, of course. That would be particularly true if the appointment requires the "advice and consent" of the Senate.

First, you would have to disclose all your assets and liabilities. This includes tax returns for years past. And all financial transactions for the past five years, I think it is. Then the FBI will conduct a full field investigation of your truthfulness concerning those disclosures, plus extensive checks on your character, morality, ethics, whatever. Then all that information goes to the Senate, where they do their own investigations. Ultimately they will schedule hearings before the appropriate committee, where some Senator might discover something that the FBI did not. Perhaps you passed up a hitch hiker years ago. That, to a properly compassionate Senator, could indicate you lack compassion, and are unfit to serve.

Our problems this time around were of another kind. The President had sent our name down to the Senate, asking that we be confirmed for another five years as a Board member of the Corporation for Public Broadcasting. One would think that if you are already serving on the Board, or Commission, or whatever, you would not have to go through that whole procedure again. No so, gentle reader. It's back to ground zero, just as if they had never heard of you before. At any rate it all went well until time for the Senate hearings.

Then Senator Long, of Louisiana, appeared to tell Senator Goldwater, who chaired the hearing, that no action could be taken on the nomination, if it went to the floor of the full Senate. The problem was not with the nominee. Indeed, the good Senator said he knew of no reason why we would not be qualified to serve. The problem was that the

White House had not yet sent down the name of a Democratic nominee to fill the Democratic vacancy on the Board. Until that was done our own nomination would be opposed. Actually the White House had sent down one Democratic name, a State Senator from Louisiana. But he got tired of messing with the clearance procedures and withdrew his name. Then the President designated another name, but that individual had not yet cleared the FBI check. The grapevine says the name has finally been cleared and gone to the Senate. What happens next is anybody's guess.

So, as we say, don't be too hasty in accepting one of those plums, should it come your way. One would think the Senate would be tickled pink to find someone silly enough to devote time to jobs like that, given the pay and all. But it doesn't always work that way.



He was born Dec. 27, 1909, in Speigeville and had lived in Wichita Falls 60 years. He was a retired used car salesman.

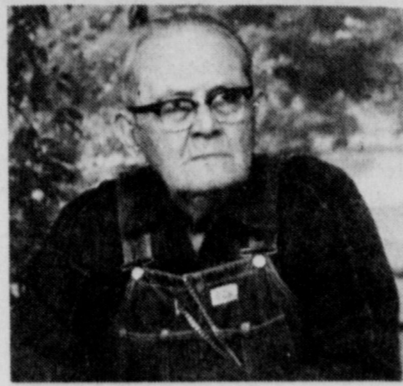

# Iowa Park School Scene

Iowa Park High School has received the results for the Texas Assessment of Minimum Skills (Exit Level).

Passage of this test is necessary for completion of work toward a high school diploma in the state of Texas. A student continuously failing either portion of this test, during the allotted test times will be denied a Texas High School diploma.

The test is first taken in October at the eleventh grade year of school. If the student fails all or either part, then the testing is re-done in May of the eleventh grade year. The student has two other opportunities while still in high school in October and May of the senior year.

The test measures minimum skills in Mathematics and Language Arts. The local high school results for the October testing are as follows:

Mathematics: 137 students tested; 134, or 98%, mastering, 3 not mastering.

Language Arts: 138 students tested; 131, or 95%, mastering, 7 not mastering.

Letters containing the result will be mailed to each student during this school week. A profile sheet will be enclosed indicating the overall results for the student.

When it comes to dealing with the state's budget problem, Texans feel strongest about state spending -- cut it -- and a state income tax -- forget it.

Those are the findings of a survey conducted by the Institute for Communications Research (ICR) at Texas Tech University. Survey participants were given six options for dealing with the state's fiscal problems and more than 75 percent favored cutting state spending and opposed instituting a state income tax.

Other fiscal options put to the 387 Texas residents in a mail and telephone survey during September and October included cutting college and university spending, increasing sales taxes, instituting a state lottery and initiating legal parimutuel betting.

Participants were given the fiscal options and asked how strongly they agreed or disagreed with them "in order to reduce the state's budget problem."

Of the respondents, 75.3 percent favored cutting state spending. Of those, 50 percent agreed with the option and 25.3 percent strongly agreed. Only 14 percent did not favor state spending cuts while 10.7 percent of those surveyed were unsure.

Though persons making above \$20,000 a year were more than twice as likely as persons earning less to favor a cut in state government spending, persons in all income categories approved a spending reduction.

Males and females favored spending cuts in comparable percentages. And, comparison of responses by education level, age and length of residency in Texas shows across the board support for spending reductions.

Initiating a state income tax was frowned on by 75.3 percent of the respondents with 38.2 percent

strongly disagreeing and 37.1 percent disagreeing it was a viable option. Only 12.8 percent favored a state income tax while 11.9 percent remained unsure.

Responses to increasing the sales tax broke down by age with 26.7 percent of those 45 and under opposing it, compared to only 18.7 percent approving. By contrast, 27.2 percent of those 46 and over favored increasing the sales tax, compared to 18.4 percent opposing.

Though participants in the survey favored cutting state spending, they generally felt those cuts should not come at the expense of the state's colleges and universities. Only 17.5 percent of the respondents favored college and university cuts. By contrast, 69 percent were against cuts in higher education. Unsure responses came from 13.5 percent of the participants on the option.

The greater the income, the more likely respondents opposed cutting college spending. Female respondents were more likely to oppose college spending reductions than male survey participants.

On issues related to gambling, about two-thirds of the participants approved of revenues generated by those methods. Some 66.6 percent favored a state lottery and a slightly smaller number, 62.7 percent, liked parimutuel betting to generate funds. Only 21.9 percent of those questioned opposed a lottery and 28.2 percent opposed horse race betting as a way to reduce the state's budget problem.

Men favored the gambling issues more than women. Instituting a lottery drew favorable responses from 70.9 percent of the men and 63.2 percent of the women. Horse betting was favored by 68.2 percent of the men and 58.2 percent of the women.

Survey results were announced by ICR Director H.J. Hsia. The survey had a margin of error of plus or minus 5 percent.
