Wichita Falls to raise rate for buying water

Among the numerous items on the city council's agenda for Monday night's meeting is a discussion of a rate increase being set by Wichita Falls.

The meeting is expected to be lengthy, because this is the only one to be held this month, after the Mar. 9 meeting was cancelled.

Wichita Falls has notified Iowa Park that it will increase the rate of water purchased by 26 percent, effective May 1, according to James Barrington, city administrator.

According to the agenda, the council will discuss the possibility of expanding the city's own water treatment facility, in order to hold down costs.

Barrington will also propose the city purchase a 30x50-foot metal building to be used at the public works complex. It would double as an office and storage facility, he said.

Also to be proposed is the purchase of a laminating machine for the city hall, and a request for authorization to travel to East Texas to examine solid waste disposal alternatives. This information will be considered as the city seeks to satisfy state mandates for the local landfill.

Two items are under the topic of "bid action."

One is to enter into a contract for ground maintenance for a three-year period. Bids were opened in February, but tabled because a full council was not present.

Also to be considered is a proposal to sell a brush chipper the city purchased three years ago, but has been found to be inadequate.

An ordinance will be considered to abandon a 25-foot strip of right of way on South Park, on the east side of Faith Baptist Church.

A similar width strip was abandoned several years ago, and Barrington

said the action, if passed, would align the property throughout the block.

Aldermen will consider a resolution to accept "phase three" of renovation of city hall, and authorize final payment. This is the exterior work that was completed recently.

Two public appearances are on the meeting agenda.

Don James has asked to discuss the city's solicitation ordinance, and Michael Sellers has asked that the city pave the parking lot at the Recreational Activities Center.

Also on the agenda is an appointment of a member to the electrical board, and an executive session to "exchange or value of real property."

The meeting is to begin at 7 p.m. in council chambers.

Teacher contracts get okay by school board

Contracts for 108 teachers were approved for next year by Iowa Park trustees, and amount to pay level two career ladder teachers was set, during a meeting Tuesday evening.

The meeting, which was the last for three trustees, Roy Boutwell, Rex Wells and Marilyn Hale, whose terms expire this month, featured an executive session that lasted more than two hours.

Of the teachers receiving contracts for next year, nine must complete required certification work before the start of the 1987-88 year, it was pointed out.

Accepting Supt. Glen Mitchell's recommendation, trustees approved payment of \$1,500 to level two Career Ladder teachers, the same as last year, to be included in their May checks.

Mitchell explained 43 teachers were placed on level two last year, and 41 of them remain in the district. The district has funds to place 55 teachers on the ladder this year, he said.

The extended executive session was not only to hear reports from the respective campus principals concerning their faculties, but also to work out other personnel details.

Those details included shifting of some teachers who hold one or two classes at the junior high and the rest at the high school, to concentrate all their work at the high school and open one full-time teaching position, for a science teacher, and add another history teacher at the junior high.

Also approved for next year was the addition of another second grade teacher at Kidwell, and setting of an \$8,000 limit which can be paid for contract services of support personnel in the band program.

Complying with board policy, trustees formally accepted a cash gift from an anonymous donor, and then approved its use to purchase a computer for the junior high library.

Robert Palmer, assistant superintendent, reported the district's change in bus routes and policies had resulted in additional funding from the state. The increase, he said, was enough to pay for a new mini bus the board had okayed to order.

Tax collector Allen Shewmake reported 93.15 percent of the school's current taxes had been collected. This is down from the 94.84 percent reported for the same period last year.

Though no action was taken, trustees were given a look at preliminary recommendations for facility improvements and additions to be given priorities for coming years.

These include proposals for all four campuses of the district.

Chamber hears report, approves 1987 budget

Iowa Park Chamber of Commerce directors Monday viewed a video film related to a boat race to be held here this summer, and approved the organization's budget for the year.

Burt Hoefs, a regional officer of a boating organization, provided the tape and told the directors the race, which is being sponsored by the Iowa Park Athletic Alumni Association, has already received national advertising in a magazine.

The meet, which will likely be

the only one of its kind this year between Oklahoma City and Houston, according to Hoefs, will be held June 7 at Lake Iowa Park.

The Chamber's 1987 budget, proposed by a committee composed of Allen Gilstrap and Dr. Erwin Soell, will be \$10,376. It reflects a decrease in anticipated spending from the previous year's budget, which was \$11,278 and exceeded by \$1,000 in actual expenditures.

Directors also approved a tentative date of April 19-25 for the city's annual Clean Up Week, and a committee of Robert Palmer, Keith Aulds, Frank Gossett and Bob Hamilton was named to coordinate the program with city officials.

A new member has joined the Chamber, Secretary Dee Blackwell said. It is Key Realty, 900 W. Highway, consisting of Cindy Witherspoon and Gene Weaver.

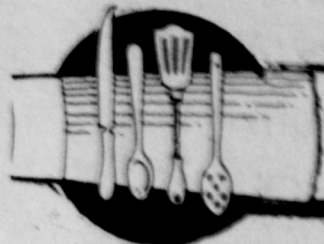

Cook of the Week

Mrs. James Billingsley's recipes for this week show that she, like many novice and seasoned cooks, appreciates spices and condiments to enhance the flavor of foods.

In their search for edible plants, pioneer people must have discovered many of those that supply us with the spices that we use today, and they learned to use the aromatic plants to make food more flavorful.

In time some of the spice plants became intentionally cultivated, and with the Romans the spices came into their own in the art of cooking. Through Marco Polo's accounts Europeans became aware of the wealth of the spices of the Far East, and it was partly an attempt to secure these spices that led to the great ocean voyages of discovery in the 15th and 16th centuries.

Mrs. Billingsley, the former Mildred Casteel, is a native of Horatio, Ark. where she was graduated from high school. She and her husband, who is an independent oil producer, moved to Iowa Park 22 years ago. They have two daughters, Pat Raby of Iowa Park and Janet Sullivan of Lubbock; and three sons, Jimmy, Randy and Andy of Iowa Park; and three grandsons.

STEAK SUPPER IN FOIL

1 1/2 lbs. chuck steak (1 inch thick)
1 can cream of mushroom soup
1 envelope dry onion soup mix
3 medium carrots, quartered
3 medium potatoes, pared and quartered
2 T. water
2 stalks celery cut in 2-inch pieces
Heat oven to 450 degrees. Place 24X18 piece of heavy duty aluminum foil in baking dish and place meat on the foil. Stir together

mushroom soup and onion soup mix and spread on meat. Top with vegetables and sprinkle with water. Fold foil over and seal securely. Cook 1 1/2 hours or until tender.

BURNT SUGAR CAKE

Melt 1 cup sugar in heavy skillet over low heat; add 1/2 cup boiling water. Take 1/4 cup of this and add water to make 1 cup liquid; set aside. Save the remaining syrup for icing.

2/3 cup Crisco
1 1/2 cups sugar
3 eggs
2 1/2 cups flour
3 tps. baking powder
1 tsp. salt

Cream shortening and sugar; add eggs and beat well. Add dry ingredients alternately with reserve liquid (1 cup). Bake in 9-inch round cake pans at 350 degrees 30 minutes.

ICING

Melt one stick oleo with 1/2 cup of the liquid from step one. If there is not 1/2 cup, add enough Pet milk or cream to equal 1/2 cup. Beat in 1 box of powdered sugar until consistency to spread.

FIERY POT TEXAS CHILI

2 lbs. chili meat
1/2 cup cooking oil
1 1/2 cups water
1-8 oz. can tomato sauce
2 small onions, chopped
1 medium green pepper, chopped fine
5-6 cloves garlic, minced
1 tsp. oregano
1 tsp. ground cumin
4 T. chili powder
1 tsp. salt
1/2 tsp. sugar
Cayenne pepper
4-5 jalapeno peppers

In a large skillet braise meat in 1/4 cup oil until brown. Transfer meat to large kettle or electric slow cooker leaving liquid in skillet. Add water and tomato sauce to meat, cook over low heat. Saute onion, green pepper and garlic in remaining 1/4 cup oil and liquid in skillet. Add remaining dry ingredients and chopped peppers with seeds removed. Simmer 30 minutes, then transfer to kettle. Simmer about 2 hours. Dip off grease that settles on top. Serves 8. Jalapeno peppers and cayenne are the zingers in this recipe. Add both with caution.

SUGAR COOKIES

1/2 cup butter or margarine
1/2 cup Crisco
1 cup sugar
1 egg

1 tsp. almond flavoring
5 T. cream or Pet milk
3 1/2 cups flour
1 tsp. soda
1 tsp. salt
Cream butter and shortening

with sugar, add egg, cream and flavoring. Add dry ingredients and stir until blended. Roll out on lightly-floured surface; sprinkle lightly with sugar. Cut with cookie cutter and bake at 350 degrees until lightly brown.

COLE SLAW

4 cups shredded or finely chopped cabbage (about 1/2 head)
2 cups diced tart apples
2 carrots, finely shredded
1/2 cup grated cheese
1/2 cup mayonnaise or salad dressing
1/2 tsp. seasoned salt
1/2 tsp. dry mustard
1 tsp. sugar
Dash pepper

Combine cabbage, apple, carrots and cheese in large salad bowl. Blend remaining ingredients, pour over cabbage and toss.

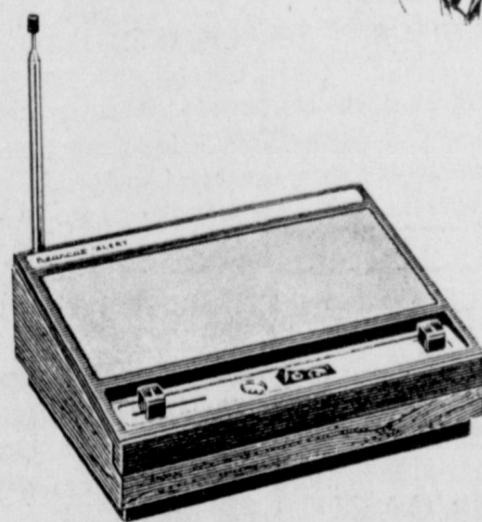

If you're interested in sports, and more specifically high school basketball, have you given any thought to how amazing this year was for state

champions? For instance, did you know that all five of the girls' state champion teams are no further apart than 70

miles? And had you noticed that both the boys' and girls' Class AA titles went to teams from the same school? And on top of all that, this year, I understand, is the first time in the history of high school basketball that all five classifications were won by teams from the same region!

I bring this up because a lot of people in this part of the country are not well acquainted with the geography of the South Plains area, where Plainview, Levelland, Slaton, Morton and Sudan are located.

Passive Smoking Increases Heart Disease Risks Threefold

Secondhand smoke, like secondhand love, is an unwanted thing.

There is a clear danger for nonsmokers exposed to secondhand smoke, according to Michael J. Martin, a clinical epidemiologist at the University of California, San Francisco.

Martin studied the health histories of 7,115 women and found that nonsmoking women whose husbands smoke are three times more likely to have heart attacks than nonsmoking wives of nonsmoking husbands.

Nonsmoking wives of former-smoker husbands had a heart attack incidence less than half of that of the women married to smokers.





Eric Whitman and Pete Armstrong each went two-for-three at the plate.

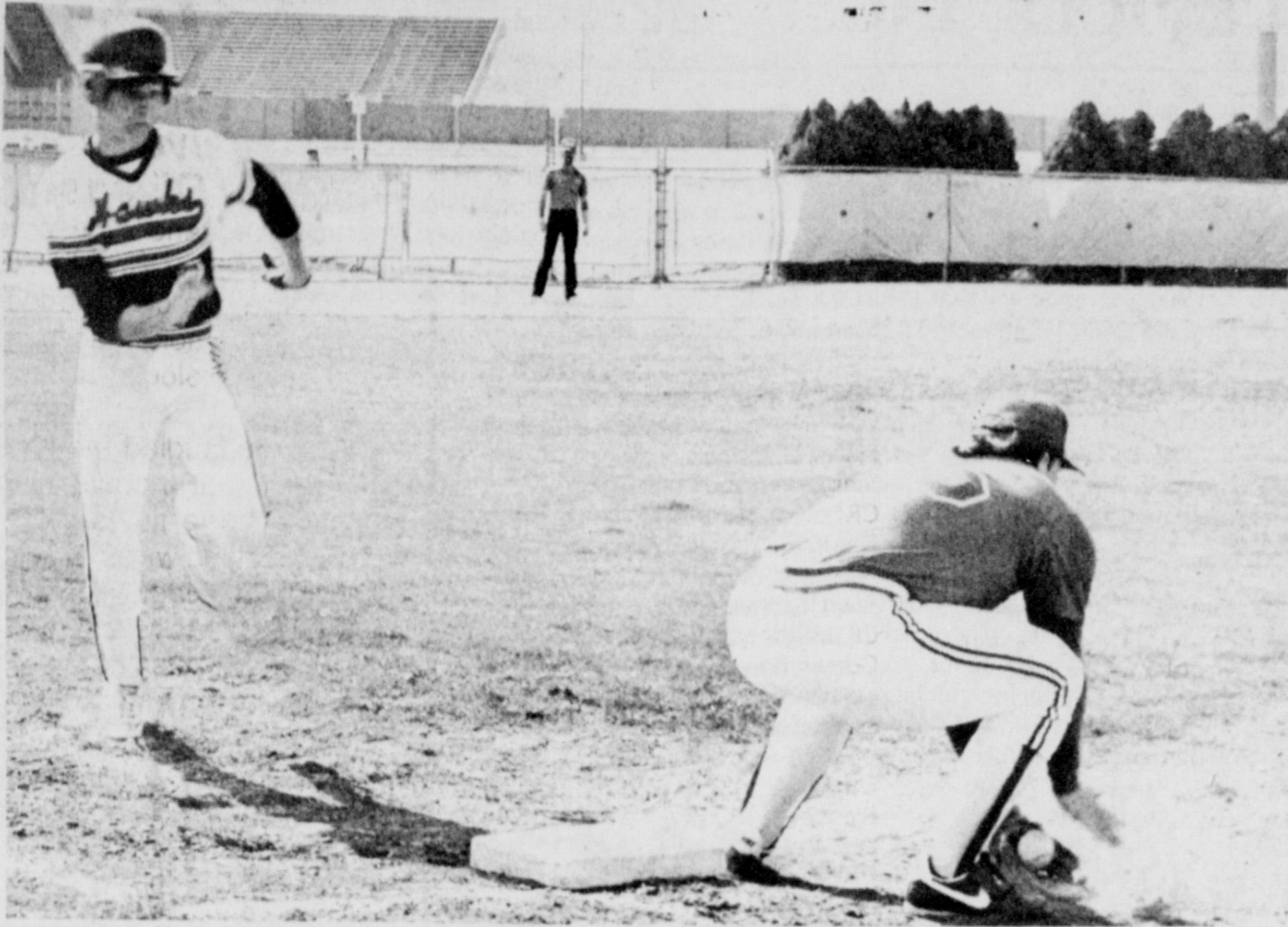
In the consolation final Saturday, Burkburnett jumped on Craig Rickman early, scoring two runs in the first inning, and scoring in all six frames to win 10-4.

Nursing home care is currently the fastest growing health care expenditure with an average bill of about \$22,000. Statistics show one out of every four senior citizens will enter a nursing home during his or her lifetime.

"Nursing Homes: What to Know Before You Go" is a seminar planned to address all aspects of selecting a nursing home including the emotional, financial and legal problems.

The seminar sponsored by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, will be held tonight and again the following Thursday. Each program will be from 7 to 9 p.m. in the 4-H Auditorium, 1626 Midwestern Parkway, Wichita Falls.

There is a tremendous emotional stress for children and parents when they are considering a nursing home. Knowing all the alternatives help both avoid heartache and anguish.

Thursday, Gerontology Specialist Judy Warren will address the emotional stress and trauma of making the move to a nursing home.

Willie McGrath, of Henson Long Term Health Insurance, Houston, will discuss new long-term health insurance policies which will cover nursing home care.

Medicare provides assistance only for skilled nursing homes; consequently, the patient often depletes life savings, transforming them into welfare recipients or dependents of their children.

Kale Martin, business manager

of Texhoma Christian Care Center, will discuss the types of homes available in this area as well as across the state.

The second part of the seminar will continue on Mar. 26 and guest speakers will include Shirley Bond, representative of Social Security Administration, and Karen Thompson, representative of Texas Department of Human Services, addressing the Medicare and Medicaid gaps.

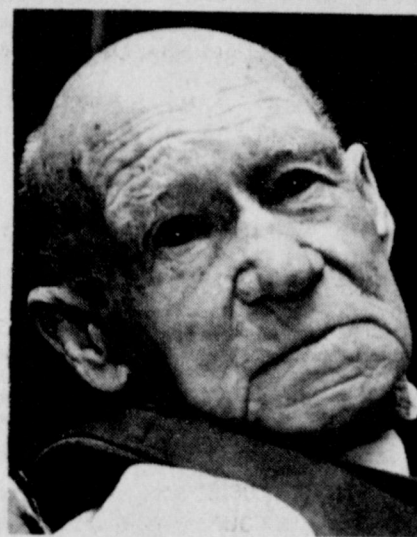
Bob Balch, attorney, will advise of the legal transactions needed such as power of attorney. Jim Oakley, ad-
