

Wreck victim succumbs

Iowa Park police were notified at 1:25 p.m. yesterday that Jerry Wallace Campbell, 41, had died as a result of injuries sustained in a onevehicle accident Mar. 21 near the high school.

Chief Alan Sheffield said he would now be working with the district attorney's office to update charges against the driver of the vehicle, 46-year-old Reggie Leroy Lacy.

Lacy, who also was injured and treated at Wichita General Hospital, already had a charge filed against him for driving while license was suspended.

Sheffield said the revised charge would "likely be more serious."

The accident was discovered when Sgt. Mike Stark, on routine patrol at 10:03 p.m., found the VW van which had crashed into a dead-end barrier, sitting with its motor running and the two occupants unconscious.

Both occupants had sustained head injuries, apparently from hitting the windshield.

Emergency personnel said Campbell's head and shoulders were wedged between the steering column and Lacy's knees.

Students receiving sex education in classrooms

By KARI COLLINS Where do students receive sex

education? A number of sources, according

to Carey Roberts, Home and Family Living teacher at Iowa Park High School.

Miss Roberts said the four places adolescents receive information about sex are, in order, friends and television, the schools, from family members and the church.

She also said that society's views as to what is acceptable has changed over the years. Television shows have become more explicit and usually don't display values, responsible sex or the consequences of irresponsible sex.

Miss Roberts said, "(Sex education) needs to start at home, but it usually doesn't." Therefore, the school district offers sex education beginning in junior high.

The United States has one of the highest teenage pregnancy rates in the world, reporting over one-million teenage pregnancies each year.

Carol Sinclair of Wilson Family Planning Clinic in Wichita Falls

offered some national statistics which were applied to Wichita County.

In 1980, there were 4,890 teenage girls (13-19 years old) in Wichita County. Of these, they projected that 10 percent (489) would get pregnant. Of the pregnancies, 10 percent would miscarry, 30 percent would abort the pregnancy and 60 percent would carry the babies to term

Of the 60 percent who carry the babies to term, 90 percent would keep their babies (resulting in 2/3 to marry with 3/4 of these resulting in divorce) and 10 percent opting to adopt their babies out.

1981 data indicates that Texas has the third highest pregnancy rate per 1,000 girls ages 15 - 19, and the second highest number of pregnancies and the highest number of births to girls 14 and younger.

She said in 1986 there were 301 births to women under the age of 20 in Wichita Falls.

Mrs. Sinclair said that of the 3,346 women who now utilize the clinic, approximately 31 percent (1,051) are under the age of 20.

With statistics such as these, and venereal diseases also on the rise, proper sex education is a must.

Sex education programs in the schools are designed to do exactly what they say - help students to make educated decisions about sex. The school district offers basic

types of relationships and different kinds of love.

Hiding it (facts about sex) is not going to help."

sex education beginning in the eighth grade.

A mandatory eighth grade health class, taught by Terry Davis, has a two-week section on "sex education."

Discussed in this section are heredity, physical changes during adolescence, reproductive organs, personal relationship and peer and social pressures. Ninth grade health, a half-year course taught by Dean Kirkpatrick, discusses and shows filmstrips regarding venereal diseases including Acquired Immune Deficiency Syndrome (AIDS), and discusses

course, which includes in its curriculum an extensive two-week mandatory class, but an elective, for

eleventh and twelfth grade students. Miss Roberts said she tries to present both sides of the discussion and stays away from "preaching." She said, "Good sex education is the whole package...no preaching ... they immediately shut you out."

During the course, students are educated on every aspect of sexuality, from personal relationships

teenage pregnancy

There are class discussions on relationships with siblings, parents and friends. They also discuss values and decisions about sex, drugs and alcohol.

There is also a full study of the male and female anatomy; how sex affects relationships, education and future plans; venereal diseases including AIDS; birth control including methods, effectiveness, how they work, price and responsibility; sexual and birth control myths; and teenage pregnancies and options,

Numerous filmstrips are shown, including one entitled "OK To Say No,"

Although Miss Roberts encourages open discussion among her students she said that what questions the students feel uncomfortable asking in the classroom may be put in a "question box," and she will answer it the next day in class,

With a little over half of all adolescents sexually active, Richard Davis, Iowa Park High School principal, said that he believes sex education should begin early in

junior high when children are going through puberty and continue through high school.

Davis also said, "It (sex education) should be taught from a professional level." He agreed that it took a special kind of educator to relate to the students on this matter,

Both Davis and Miss Roberts agree that proper and accurate sex education is a deterrent to sexual promisculty and teenage pregnancy, and not a motivator. "Hiding it (facts about sex) is not going to help." Davis said.

Davis said that he didn't think the Iowa Park schools had a problem with teenage pregnancies but that continued sex education is necessary to prevent a problem. He also stressed that the study of AIDS should be a part of the curriculum beginning in at least the ninth grade.

Roberts said a lot of students go into her course thinking they know all there is to know about sex. But oftentimes, she said she can tell when she's just told a student something he or she didn't really know







Finnell said legislators must focus their attention on crucial issues during the last half of the session.





At the luncheon, Mrs. Joe Singer will welcome guests, and members of the youth awards committee will assume responsibilities of presenting the awards and other duties.





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

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FAMILY HEALTH NOTES THE DISEASE OF ALCOHOLISM

For years alcoholism has been classified as a disease and although most people understand this, they do not believe, or understand, all of its implications. In the same way that a diabetic's life tends to fall into place as long as he is taking insulin, the alcoholic's life falls into place as long as alcohol and other psychoactive drugs are eliminated from his daily living.

Miraculous changes take place as the chronic alcoholic becomes first detoxified and then begins to learn of the becomes first detoxified and then begins to learn of the "disease" aspect of his illness; it is amazing to see the changes taking place. Some 10-15% of the adult and adolescent population of this country are alcoholics and, for them, there are biochemical and biological differences in their system that do not allow them to take alcohol or drugs. In patient after patient in an alcohol treatment unit, one is able to watch the course of the disease and determine, fairly accurately, the precise time when the biochemical changes occurred that prevent this person from drinking like a normal person. The alcoholic is unable to tolerate any psychoactive drugs

The alcoholic is unable to tolerate any psychoactive drugs such as tranquilizers, sedatives, and depressants such as alcohol. Many compassionate physicians will prescribe tranquilizers to the alcoholic in order to ease the discomfort from alcohol withdrawal. Unknowingly, they are contributing to the problem because this just perpetuates the alcohol-drug dependence-alcohol cycle.

Alcoholics Anonymous is a group that understands the addictive qualities of the disease and helps educate those people with drinking problems. Before a disease can be treated it must be understood, and self-help groups such as AA are probably the largest factor in maintaining sobriety in larger numbers of alcoholics than any medical or psychiatric institution.

For Chronic Cluster Headache Although medicinal treatment of headache

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usually is effective, some patients with chronic cluster headache (chronic migrainous neuralgia) are unresponsive to medical management.

In a study conducted at Mayo Clinic by Dr. B.M. Onofrio, 26 patients with this condition underwent a surgical procedure designed to block the pain pathways of the trigeminal nerve.

The procedure proved effective in relief of pain (excellent in 54%, fair to good in 15% and poor in 31%).
