"We want to make sure whatever is done is for the betterment of the community," Coker said, adding, "I don't think this council has given too much serious consideration until it receives (public) input."

A major point of discussion was whether the RAC would continue to receive United Way funding if the Optimists purchased the facility.

When RAC board president Mrs. Vern Mikkelson quoted a United Way official as saying the Optimist would have to apply for UW funding if the club took over the facility, one of the Optimists responded the club had no intention of displacing the RAC

Aldermen voted approval of the lowest of four bids to paint and repair a ground storage water tank.

Accepted was a bid of \$17,200 by SSPC, Inc. Highest of the bids

Approval was also given to advertise for bids to rebuild certain streets with concrete, and to build a quarter-mile oval track on the west side of Lake Gordon.

Also accepted was a negotiated contract for grounds maintenance by Beco Lawn Care, Jim Cooper and Weldon Bean, for a three-year period.

Aldermen said the price accepted was \$1,113 per "cycle" and felt it was a considerable savings to the city over doing the work with employees or as previously contracted.

The group also okayed laying of a 30 foot by 90 foot concrete slab on which a two buildings will be erected at the public works center on FM 368. The cost was set at \$4,295.

When the subject of considering an offer from Charley Helms to lease grass for grazing at Lake Buffalo the balance of the year, for \$500, Denny McCarthy said he would be willing to pay more.

McCarthy said he did not respond to the city's first advertisement which set a minimum per acre charge and apparently overlooked the second advertisement which called for bids.

Helms said he didn't know there was going to be any bidding in the meeting, in apparent objection to the

The council accepted Helms' proposal, and instructed Administrator James Barrington to negotiate with McCarthy on the possibility of leasing the Lake Iowa Park grass for

IOWA PARK, WICHITA COUNTY, TEXAS 76367

School trustees Tuesday night voted unanimously to deny an appeal of a junior high teacher who was not placed on this year's career ladder.

The board voted to uphold the career ladder committee's recommendations, following an executive session that lasted an hour and 28 min-

The appeal hearing was requested by Eddie Jones, sixth grade teacher who has been on the faculty 22

Following the vote, Don Dorsett, a representative of the Texas State Teachers Association, said the board's decision would be appealed, and stated an additional complaint would be added to the appeal as a re-

sult of the meeting. Appeals are advanced from the local level directly to the commissioner of education.

Dorsett said he believed Jones' rights were violated when Robert Palmer, assistant superintendent, was invited into the closed session not in the company of junior high principal Jimmy Alsup.

Board president Jimmy Howell responded to the complaint by saying it should have been pointed out at the time, not after the fact.

Howell commented to Jones, "Eventhough you taught a course you do not regularly teach, we should expect the same excellence as in a regular class."

He was apparently referring to a period during which the teacher was observed. Observations are required under House Bill 72, and standards for checking are specified by the

Teachers placed on the career ladder receive an additional year's salary of \$1,500. Should the commissioner uphold the appeal, the district will have to pay Jones the amount he did

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not receive. The career ladder committee's recommendation for placement of teachers on the career ladder is based on those with the highest scores for the 1986-87 school year. No other criteria was considered, according to Supt. Glen Mitchell.

In other business, trustees approved the purchase of three temporary classroom buildings and accepted the lowest of three bids to re-roof the original gymnasium at the high school.

The classrooms will be 24 feet by 32 feet delivered and set complete with carpet, recessed lighting, 3/4inch flooring, sheet rock and paneling and four windows, and will cost \$14,013 apiece.

They will be used to relieve crowded conditioins anticipated next year at the elementary campuses.

Lowest of three bids to re-roof the gymnasium was submitted by Armored Roofing Co. of Wichita

The bid of \$15,413 included a new type of covering called Dryflex, and a 12-year, 100-percent warranty.

The new covering will displace gravel used to protect the present roof which weighs some 400 pounds per square, according to architect Don Daugherity.

High school principal Richard Davis explained a federal vocational application he is filing which would change the CVAE General Construction Trades course to CVAE Farm and Ranch Management.

He emphasized the course is not actually agriculture, nor would it displace any of the vocational agriculture courses being offered.

It is being proposed because the state is eliminating CVAE for eighth graders, and the present program is offered to about 15 students in each of the eighth and ninth grades who need the types of instructions offered.

With the state's action on the course, local funding needed will be \$9,826 to match \$18,656 from the federal government, he explained.

The board approved Davis' proposal, and also a request to submit for bids from all banks in the county wishing to be the school's official

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


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
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Cook of the Week

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

The council voted against a proposal to permit public swimming in Lake Gordon, both because a public swimming pool is already in operation and potential increase in the city's liability insurance.

Aldermen complimented Pubic Works Director Mike Price for his work and efforts in solving the city's landfill facility problems with the

Price had written a report for the council, which stated:

"The last two weeks I've had the opportunity to discuss landfills and incinerators with Texas A&M solid waste technicians, representatives from the Texas Department of Health, and personnel with Cryovac. I am still convinced that those municipalities that can swing the capital investment, have a good, constant source of refuse, and have a potential purchaser for the resource recovery should consider incineration as the dominant method to reduce landfill

"Texas A&M teaches that cities with a population less than 10,000 can't afford to go the incineration route, yet if we use their figures to compute the daily refuse per capita as set forth in the TDH regulations, our city and Cryovac produces enough daily refuse as a city of 17,000

"I've talked with Mike Edmiston, regional engineer for the TDH's Amarillo area, and John Butler, our district inspector, and both conveyed their enthusiasm of our consideration to an alternative method of refuse disposal. They both stated that TDH is pushing regional facilities for incineration as well as regional landfills to reduce the financial burden on small individual cities.

"Also for your information, John Butler made an inspection of our landfill Wednesday, May 13, and found everything satisfactory. He commented that it was the best he had seen lately.

"This week I talked to Ron Sears, Engineering Technician in charge of solid waste for Cryovac, about the possibility of our city operating an incinerator to dispose of ours and their refuse and selling the steam to them. He told me that had been exploring the use of an incinerator at their plant, but due to the problems the plant in South Carolina was having with their Ecolaire unit, had shelved the idea. We discussed the City owning an incinerator, charging them a user fee, and then selling them the steam or that they purchase an incinerator and allow us to dispose of our refuse at it to generate more steam and greater savings for themselves.

'With Cryovac's refuse it is possible that we would need a 60 ton per day unit to operate five days a week at 24 hours. If we could operate (and we would have the refuse volume needed) 24 hours at seven days a week, we could use a 50 ton unit and still have room for some growth. I feel like we would be looking at a turn-key job cost of between \$2.3and \$2.7-million. I know this is a large expense but the more refuse we take in - the more steam we put out. The big question is how much steam Cryovac would buy in a day's time. Each ton of refuse can produce from 5,000 to 7,000 pounds of steam.

"I plan to talk with Roy Knowles of Regional Landfill Equipment in Abilene next week to get a price on the construction of a lined pit that would last us nine to 12 months. This will be beneficial whether we contract out our landfill or go to incineration since both require lined pits.

FAMILY HEALTH NOTES

BEE, WASP AND HORNET STINGS

Many people are highly allergic to the sting of insects, especially bees, wasps, hornets and yellow jackets. The sting of these insects produces a variety of reactions. A normal reaction is relatively brief and consists of intense pain and redness at the site, followed by itching. Ice over the site usually provides effective relief.

The insect's stinger should always be located and removed.

The bee's stinging apparatus contains a poison sac and nearly always remains in the victim's skin. The stinger should always be scraped or flicked off with the blade of a knife or fingernail.

In people who are allergic to insect stings, the local reaction at the sting site includes a surrounding whitish zone with an area of redness around it -- the characteristic flare of allergy. An antihistamine may help relieve the symptoms. Those who are severly allergic may develop a rash or hives on the involved area. A generalized allergic reaction may show up as itching often beginning on the palms and soles, then spreading to involve the whole body. Sometimes a delayed, serum-sickness type of reaction occurs. These symptoms devlep ten to fourteen days after a sting, and include fever, a washed-out feeling, headache, hives, swelling of the lymph nodes and pain in the joints over the entire body.

A very few people are hypersensitive to such stings after they have been stung one or more times. These people can, within ten to fifteen minutes of a sting, become weak, pale, faint and have low blood pressure -- and even die. They need to be treated immediately with an injection of adrenaline by a physician.

If you or your child experience severe reaction to insect bites, consult your family doctor for methods of reaction prevention. In addition, the allergic person should wear an identification tag indicating that he or she is highly sensitive to insect stings and should always carry an insect sting treatment.





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


