City takes no action on offer to buy RAC

While the city council took no action on a proposal to sell the Recreational Activities Center during Monday's meeting, members heard from both sides of the disputed issue.

A portion of the meeting was set for public input on the proposal and while there were several speaking against the sale, only two, members of the Optimist Club which wants to purchase the facility, attended.

Mayor pro tem Johnny Coker, chairing the meeting in the absence of Mayor Tim Hunter, said the issue was proposed by Optimist President Mike Sellers.

"We want to make sure whatever is done is for the betterment of the community," Coker said, adding, "I don't think this council has given too much serious consideration until it receives (public) input."

A major point of discussion was whether the RAC would continue to receive United Way funding if the Optimists purchased the facility.

When RAC board president Mrs. Vern Mikkelsen quoted a United Way official as saying the Optimist would have to apply for UW funding if the club took over the facility, one of the Optimists responded the club had no intention of displacing the RAC

board, which is UW approved.

Walter Beaman and Howard Smith, Optimists, said they only wanted to improve the facilities, which included the building and ball field, expand the programs for youth, and receive nothing in return.

They said the organization was expecting to spend \$25,000 or more on facilities, and wanted to buy the building to insure a long-term opportunity to serve there, much like a long-term lease for a renter.

Others in the audience suggested the Optimists do their civic improvements, but allow the ownership to remain as it is.

It was generally agreed among all who spoke on the issue that the ball field's lease fee for out-of-town use, \$25 per day plus lights, was far too low.

Following the public hearing, junior high teacher Carolyn Richter was asked to recognize four of her students who were attending as part of their government studies.

The council voted to not place a stop sign on Rita at the Mary Drive intersection, after it was pointed out several residents of the neighborhood had expressed opposition to the

issue, and studies by the police department failed to show good cause.

Aldermen voted approval of the lowest of four bids to paint and repair a ground storage water tank.

Accepted was a bid of \$17,200 by SSPC, Inc. Highest of the bids was \$27,940.

Approval was also given to advertise for bids to rebuild certain streets with concrete, and to build a quarter-mile oval track on the west side of Lake Gordon.

Also accepted was a negotiated contract for grounds maintenance by Beco Lawn Care, Jim Cooper and Weldon Bean, for a three-year period.

Aldermen said the price accepted was \$1,113 per "cycle" and felt it was a considerable savings to the city over doing the work with employees or as previously contracted.

The group also okayed laying of a 30 foot by 90 foot concrete slab on which a two buildings will be erected at the public works center on FM 368. The cost was set at \$4,295.

When the subject of considering an offer from Charley Helms to lease grass for grazing at Lake Buffalo the balance of the year, for \$500, Denny McCarthy said he would be willing to pay more.

McCarthy said he did not respond to the city's first advertisement which set a minimum per acre charge and apparently overlooked the second advertisement which called for bids.

Helms said he didn't know there was going to be any bidding in the meeting, in apparent objection to the offer.

The council accepted Helms' proposal, and instructed Administrator James Barrington to negotiate with McCarthy on the possibility of leasing the Lake Iowa Park grass for grazing.

'Summer in Park' is success

The first event for "Summer In The Park," a performance by the Iowa Park High School Jazz Band and Show Choir Thursday night at the new pavillion behind city hall, has been termed a success.

James Barrington, city manager, said, "It went great! We're pleased with the turnout and we're looking forward to the next one."

Barrington said he counted some 150 people at the concert.

Tom Lutz, program director for the series, echoed Barrington's comments, saying, "(That was) what Iowa Park was looking for in family entertainment."

Over 300 soft drinks, furnished by Coca Cola, were given away.

Mrs. Lutz said the only complaint she received was that the program started too early for those who work outside of Iowa Park. Barrington added that another conflict existed with ball games being played on Thursday nights.

The "Summer In The Park" idea didn't materialize without some hard work.

Other than public works director

Mike Price's, Barrington's and Mrs. Lutz's initial work on the project, numerous individuals and organizations donated their time and money to the cause.

Barrington stressed that no tax dollars were spent on the pavillion. Don Daugherty and John Glover donated their services in designing the site, while TU Electric and the Rotary Club donated utility poles and \$1,000, respectively, according to Barrington.

In addition to this, city crews built the pavillion. Barrington said the first event of the series proved helpful in showing what might need to be added to the park in the future. Among these he listed the possible construction of moveable benches, permanent wiring for the pavillion, restroom (which could also be used for the annual Whoop-T-Do), picnic tables, upgrading the playground and the planting of more trees for shading purposes.

"If it goes well this summer, we might have two a month next summer," Barrington said.

Monday holiday for many

Though Monday will not be a holiday for Iowa Park school students, employees of city hall, post office and bank will be at home for Memorial Day observance.

Supt. Glen Mitchell said Monday was not set by the school board as a holiday, because it falls in the last week of the school year and tests will be underway.

Postmaster Ken Turman said the post office will be closed and no

home delivery will be made. However, mail will be put up in lobby boxes, though a little later than usual.

Essential city services, such as the police department, water and sewer works, will not be disrupted.

Most businesses plan to remain open, and will be denoted by signs in their windows.

The Leader will be open part of the day, but will not observe regular hours.

The service, to begin at 6 p.m., will be held in the high school auditorium.

Church; invocation by Charles Hensley, pastor of the Assembly of God, and benediction will be given by Harold Brooks.

Special music will be provided by the school choir, while the professional and recessional will be played by Donna Gibson.

Graduation exercise will be held the following Friday evening in Hawk Stadium.

On the list of commodities are butter, cheese, honey, flour and dry milk.

Trustees deny teacher's appeal

School trustees Tuesday night voted unanimously to deny an appeal of a junior high teacher who was not placed on this year's career ladder.

The board voted to uphold the career ladder committee's recommendations, following an executive session that lasted an hour and 28 minutes.

The appeal hearing was requested by Eddie Jones, sixth grade teacher who has been on the faculty 22 years.

Following the vote, Don Dorsett, a representative of the Texas State Teachers Association, said the board's decision would be appealed, and stated an additional complaint would be added to the appeal as a result of the meeting.

Appeals are advanced from the local level directly to the commissioner of education.

Dorsett said he believed Jones' rights were violated when Robert Palmer, assistant superintendent, was invited into the closed session not in the company of junior high principal Jimmy Alsup.

Board president Jimmy Howell responded to the complaint by saying it should have been pointed out at the time, not after the fact.

Howell commented to Jones, "Even though you taught a course you do not regularly teach, we should expect the same excellence as in a regular class."

He was apparently referring to a period during which the teacher was observed. Observations are required under House Bill 72, and standards for checking are specified by the state.

Teachers placed on the career ladder receive an additional year's salary

of \$1,500. Should the commissioner uphold the appeal, the district will have to pay Jones the amount he did not receive.

The career ladder committee's recommendation for placement of teachers on the career ladder is based on those with the highest scores for the 1986-87 school year. No other criteria was considered, according to Supt. Glen Mitchell.

In other business, trustees approved the purchase of three temporary classroom buildings and accepted the lowest of three bids to re-roof the original gymnasium at the high school.

The classrooms will be 24 feet by 32 feet delivered and set complete with carpet, recessed lighting, 3/4-inch flooring, sheet rock and paneling and four windows, and will cost \$14,013 apiece.

Trustees considered options of purchasing the units and two types of leases.

They will be used to relieve crowded conditions anticipated next year at the elementary campuses.

Lowest of three bids to re-roof the gymnasium was submitted by Armored Roofing Co. of Wichita Falls.

The bid of \$15,413 included a new type of covering called Dryflex, and a 12-year, 100-percent warranty.

The new covering will displace gravel used to protect the present roof which weighs some 400 pounds per square, according to architect Don Daugherty.

High school principal Richard Davis explained a federal vocational application he is filing which would change the CVAE General Construc-

tion Trades course to CVAE Farm and Ranch Management.

He emphasized the course is not actually agriculture, nor would it displace any of the vocational agriculture courses being offered.

It is being proposed because the state is eliminating CVAE for eighth graders, and the present program is offered to about 15 students in each

of the eighth and ninth grades who need the types of instructions offered.

With the state's action on the course, local funding needed will be \$9,826 to match \$18,656 from the federal government, he explained.

The board approved Davis' proposal, and also a request to submit for bids from all banks in the county wishing to be the school's official depository.

Man cuffed to tree, beaten at local lake

A 26-year-old man was reported handcuffed to a tree and abandoned after being beaten Thursday morning at Lake Buffalo.

According to the police blotter, two men took Robert Wesley Hammonds, not an Iowa Park resident, to the police station at 9:15 a.m. after they picked him up.

Hammonds was allegedly bound to a tree with plastic handcuffs which he was later able to break. He refused treatment by EMTs.

He declined to file charges, saying he knew his assailants and was later released to his mother.

A high speed chase that lasted about 10 minutes ended near the high school about 6:46 p.m. Saturday and resulted in the arrest of Donald Eugene Vickers, 21.

He was charged with evading arrest and driving while license was suspended.

County and Department of Public Safety officers were asked to assist in the pursuit, but it ended be-

fore they arrived.

He was released at 10:34 p.m. to a deputy for transport to county jail.

Two men were arrested during the week on warrants from outside the city.

Thomas Craig Canon, 22, was taken into custody on Lafayette at 10:47 p.m. Saturday on outstanding warrants from the DPS in Wichita Falls.

The warrants were for "ride not secured by seatbelt" and "failure to appear." He was released at 11:45 to a DPS officer.

Ronnie Dean Stokes, 26, was arrested at a home on James Monday afternoon on a Wilbarger County grand jury indictment. The case involved burglary of a motor vehicle.

He was released to a Wilbarger deputy.

Jimmy Lindsey told police Sunday that someone had broken out a window of his pickup overnight while parked at 712 S. Park, and his checkbook was missing.

The Hawks won their baseball title Friday by shutting out Bridgeport 5-0, to finish the three-team conference undefeated.

The second bi-district game will be played at 6 p.m. Wednesday in Abilene, at the field of Hardin-Simmons University.

Should a third game be necessary it will follow the second game.

Wednesday is the deadline for determining teams advancing to the area level.

Admission to each game will be \$2 for adults and \$1 for students.

Clyde and Merkel played Monday for the 5-AAA title, and Clyde lost 9-6. Merkel now plays Bowie, the 6-AAA runner-up.

Probable starter for the Hawks Monday will be senior Robert Adams, according to Coach Daryl Frazier, who said his likely starter Tuesday will be junior Billy Kenyon.

Freshman hurler Jim Duggins earned his shutout Friday by limiting

the Bulls to only two hits while giving up no walks. One error was posted against the green and white.

Iowa Park scored three runs in the first inning and added the other pair in the fifth.

Mike Williams had the most consistent bat against the Bull pitchers, collecting two hits in three official trips to the plate. Craig Rickman, Jeff Huff and Adams each had hits.

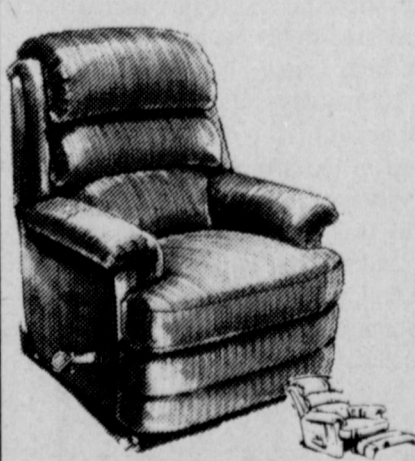

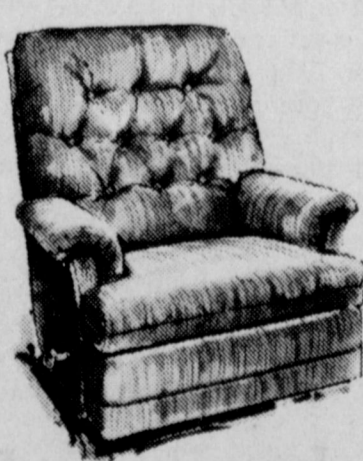

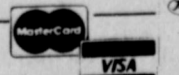

Cook of the Week

Kristi Lane, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Bill Lane, our young cook for this week, is one of the busiest young women in town.

A 1985 graduate of Iowa Park High School, she attended Midwestern State Univ. one year. She is presently employed at 3-M Cafe and also does babysitting. She is sponsor of the youth group at First Christian Church and works at the family farm with the cows and horses in her spare time.

Kristi ran the gymnasium at the First Christian Church in Wichita Falls for the kindergarten through sixth grade students one year. She has worked for Polar Bear Ashburn and Burger King in Wichita Falls and at Heritage Manor in Iowa Park. Her hobbies are swimming, reading, working with youth and babysitting.

She has one brother, Brandon, a high school freshman.

Kristi has three dessert recipes this week which call for sugar or sugar by-products. Sugar is indeed an important ingredient in most dessert recipes. Housewives and cooks today think nothing of going to the grocery store and purchasing a five- or 10-pound bag of sugar, but it hasn't always been that easy to get. In the 19th century, it was such a rare and prized commodity it was included in a list of rare and precious wedding gifts for a future queen of Hungary and Bohemia.

Hundreds of years before the birth of Christ, the people of India learned how to make sugar from sugar cane, but not until the time of the Crusades was sugar introduced by the Arabs into Europe. At first it was a great rarity and even used for medicine.

COOKIE ICE CREAM

2 cups whipping cream
1/2 of a 14 oz. can (2/3 cups) sweetened condensed milk
1/2 tsp. vanilla
12 chocolate sandwich cookies

In a large mixer bowl, combine cream, milk and vanilla. Chill 30 high until soft peaks form. Coarsely crumble the cookies and fold into

creamed mixture. Transfer to an 8X8X2-inch pan. Cover and freeze 4 hours. Makes 1 quart.

THREE LAYER MEXICAN DIP

1 (10 1/2 oz.) can bean dip
1 container guacamole dip (found in dairy case)
3 heaping tps. sour cream
3 heaping tps. mayonnaise
1/2 pkg. dry taco seasoning

Use a 5X8-inch dish or any shallow dish of the approximate size. Spread bean dip in bottom of dish. Spread guacamole dip over bean dip. Mix sour cream, mayonnaise and taco seasoning and spread on top of guacamole. May be garnished with chopped ripe onions or chili powder.

DOUBLE DECKER FUDGE

2 cups (12-ounce package) Reese's Peanut Butter Chips, divided
1/4 cup butter, melted
1/2 cup Hershey's cocoa
1 tsp. vanilla
4 1/2 cups sugar
1 jar (7 ounces) marshmallow cream
1/2 cup butter
1 1/2 cups (12-ounce can) evaporated milk

Line a 13X9X2-inch pan with foil. Place 1 cup peanut butter chips medium bowl, blend 1/4 cup melted butter, cocoa and vanilla until

smooth. Add 1 cup peanut butter chips.

In heavy 4-quart saucepan, combine sugar, marshmallow creme, evaporated milk and 1/4 cup butter. Cook, stirring constantly over medium heat until mixture comes to a rolling boil, boil and stir 5 minutes. Remove from heat, immediately add half of hot mixture in bowl with peanut butter chips only. Pour remainder into cocoa mixture, stir to blend.

Beat peanut butter mixture until chips are completely melted, spread evenly in prepared pan. Beat cocoa mixture until chips are melted and mixture thickens. Spread evenly over top of peanut butter layer. Cool, remove from pan. Remove foil. Cut into squares. Store in airtight container in a cool, dry place. Yield: about 4 pounds.

7-UP SALAD

1 pkg. red or green Jello
1 1/2 cups applesauce
1-16 oz. bottle 7-UP
1 orange, use juice and grated rind
1/2 cup nuts (optional)
Heat applesauce to boiling. Dissolve Jello in hot applesauce. Cool, add 7-Up, orange and nuts. Let set and chill in refrigerator.

CHOCOLATE CHIP CAKE

2 cups all-purpose flour
1 cup brown sugar
1/2 cup granulated sugar
3 tsp. baking powder
1 tsp. salt
1/2 tsp. baking soda
1/2 cup shortening
1 1/4 cup milk
3 eggs
1/2 cup semi-sweet chocolate chips, finely chopped, or 1/2 cup miniature semi-sweet chocolate chips
1 1/2 tsp. vanilla

Heat oven to 350 degrees. Grease and flour 13X9X2-inch pan or 2 round layer pans, 8 or 9X1 1/2-inch.

Beat all ingredients in large mixer bowl on low speed 30 seconds, then on high 3 minutes, stirring to 45 minutes. Then cool and frost with desired frosting.

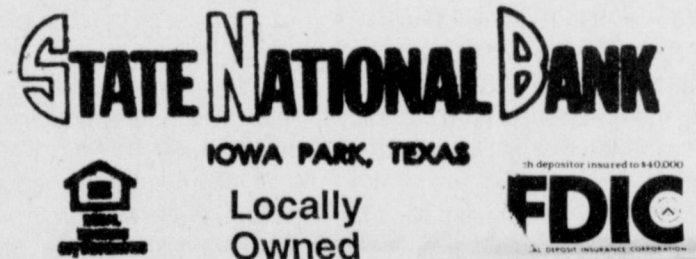

The council voted against a proposal to permit public swimming in Lake Gordon, both because a public swimming pool is already in operation and potential increase in the city's liability insurance.
Aldermen complimented Pubic Works Director Mike Price for his work and efforts in solving the city's landfill facility problems with the state.
Price had written a report for the council, which stated:
"The last two weeks I've had the opportunity to discuss landfills and incinerators with Texas A&M solid waste technicians, representatives from the Texas Department of Health, and personnel with Cryovac. I am still convinced that those municipalities that can swing the capital investment, have a good, constant source of refuse, and have a potential purchaser for the resource recovery should consider incineration as the dominant method to reduce landfill cost.

"Texas A&M teaches that cities with a population less than 10,000 can't afford to go the incineration route, yet if we use their figures to compute the daily refuse per capita as set forth in the TDH regulations, our city and Cryovac produces enough daily refuse as a city of 17,000 people.
"I've talked with Mike Edmiston, regional engineer for the TDH's Amarillo area, and John Butler, our district inspector, and both conveyed their enthusiasm of our consideration to an alternative method of refuse disposal. They both stated that TDH is pushing regional facilities for incineration as well as regional landfills to reduce the financial burden on small individual cities.
"Also for your information, John Butler made an inspection of our landfill Wednesday, May 13, and found everything satisfactory. He commented that it was the best he had seen lately.

"This week I talked to Ron Sears, Engineering Technician in charge of solid waste for Cryovac, about the possibility of our city operating an incinerator to dispose of ours and their refuse and selling the steam to them. He told me that he had been exploring the use of an incinerator at their plant, but due to the problems the plant in South Carolina was having with their Ecolaire unit, had shelved the idea. We discussed the City owning an incinerator, charging them a user fee, and then selling them the steam or that they purchase an incinerator and allow us to dispose of our refuse at it to generate more steam and greater savings for themselves.
"With Cryovac's refuse it is possible that we would need a 60 ton per day unit to operate five days a week at 24 hours. If we could operate (and we would have the refuse volume needed) 24 hours at seven days a week, we could use a 50 ton unit and still have room for some growth. I feel like we would be looking at a turn-key job cost of between \$2.3- and \$2.7-million. I know this is a large expense but the more refuse we take in - the more steam we put out. The big question is how much steam Cryovac would buy in a day's time. Each ton of refuse can produce from 5,000 to 7,000 pounds of steam.
"I plan to talk with Roy Knowles of Regional Landfill Equipment in Abilene next week to get a price on the construction of a lined pit that would last us nine to 12 months. This will be beneficial whether we contract out our landfill or go to incineration since both require lined pits.

FmHA committee nominations sought
Nominations of eligible farmers to the FmHA county committee are being sought.
Generally, any resident of Wichita and Clay counties whose principal income is from farming and who is not an FmHA borrower, is eligible to be a nominee.
Nominations can be made at the office at 309 Federal Building in Wichita Falls.

"Ron Lirette of Texas Equipment Co., dealer for the Consumat Incinerator, should be able to give us a ballpark price of the size unit we would need, operating cost, and expected revenue sales by our workshop meeting," Price said.

Alderman Bud Mercer expressed he felt it was paramount that the public knows what the city is facing, with its landfill problems, and know what incineration is all about, if the city calls for a bond issue to finance the project.

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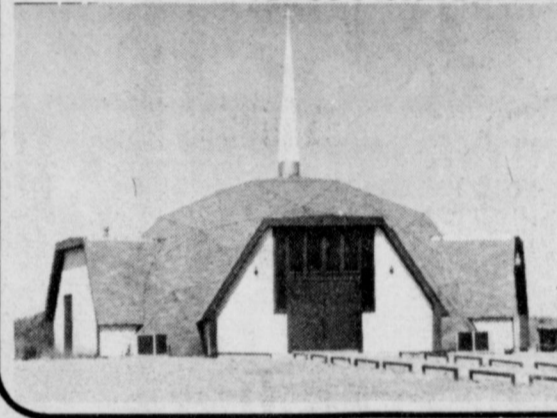

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FAMILY HEALTH NOTES

BEE, WASP AND HORNET STINGS


Many people are highly allergic to the sting of insects, especially bees, wasps, hornets and yellow jackets. The sting of these insects produces a variety of reactions. A normal reaction is relatively brief and consists of intense pain and redness at the site, followed by itching. Ice over the site usually provides effective relief.

The insect's stinger should always be located and removed. The bee's stinging apparatus contains a poison sac and always remains in the victim's skin. The stinger should always be scraped or flicked off with the blade of a knife or fingernail.

In people who are allergic to insect stings, the local reaction at the sting site includes a surrounding whitish zone with an area of redness around it -- the characteristic flare of allergy. An antihistamine may help relieve the symptoms. Those who are severely allergic may develop a rash or hives on the involved area. A generalized allergic reaction may show up as itching often beginning on the palms and soles, then spreading to involve the whole body. Sometimes a delayed, serum-sickness type of reaction occurs. These symptoms develop ten to fourteen days after a sting, and include fever, a washed-out feeling, headache, hives, swelling of the lymph nodes and pain in the joints over the entire body.

A very few people are hypersensitive to such stings after they have been stung one or more times. These people can, within ten to fifteen minutes of a sting, become weak, pale, faint and have low blood pressure -- and even die. They need to be treated immediately with an injection of adrenaline by a physician.

If you or your child experience severe reaction to insect bites, consult your family doctor for methods of reaction prevention. In addition, the allergic person should wear an identification tag indicating that he or she is highly sensitive to insect stings and should always carry an insect sting treatment.

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
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

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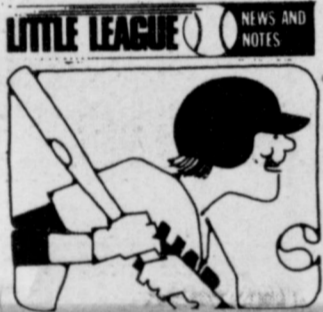
