Iowa Park's city council decided to sponsor a "farmer's market" that date, on a trial basis, to determine if there is sufficient interest for an ongoing program.

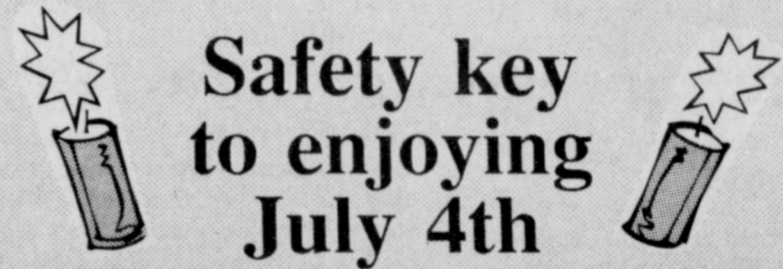
Administrator James Barrington said the city needs to determine how many will be selling, and how much space they will need, in order to plan for the event.

Plans are to have the sales area on East Cash, along the city hall park, and if more space is needed, the other sales area will be in the parking lot west of city hall.

Aldermen, in their discussion, said if those areas are not sufficient, a street will be closed off to traffic to handle the overflow.

"Farmer's market" will open at 7 a.m., and remain open until most of the area is cleared that afternoon.



Safety key to enjoying July 4th

While residents are having a good time this weekend, celebrating July 4th, local and area officials are encouraging caution to observe safety and also the law.

Iowa Park has an ordinance forbidding setting off fireworks in the city, and officials suggest those wishing to use fireworks to go to a lake. They noted, however, that Lake Gordon, in the northeast part of the community, is inside the city limits.

Residents who go to Lake Iowa Park are also encouraged to pick up residue from fireworks, such as wrappers and launching pads. Trash containers will be made available in the area where residue can be deposited.

Those wishing to see large firework displays can go to Wichita Falls Friday evening, or to Sheppard Air Force Base Saturday. The display at Sheppard will begin at 9:30 p.m. Missile Road gate will be opened to the general public at 8:30 p.m. and parking will be permitted along Missile Road.

Several local businesses have indicated they will close Saturday to observe the holiday. However, a list of closings is not available.

For those who plan to travel over the holiday weekend, the Texas Department of Public Safety is also encouraging safety and observing the speed limits.

"We expect a large number of people to lose their lives on Texas highways this 4th of July holiday. The main reasons for highway deaths are excessive speed, alcohol misuse and not wearing your seat belt," said Maj. V.J. Cawthon, regional DPS commander.

Venhaus named Midway school superintendent

Tom Venhaus of Iowa Park, who began his teaching career here 15 years ago, has been promoted to superintendent of Midway Independent School District.

Midway School is located south of Henrietta on Texas 148.

With the support of the school board, Venhaus has switched administrative posts with John Guice, who is assuming Venhaus' old job as principal.

The trade was suggested by Grice's desire to handle fewer administrative responsibilities and spend more time working with students.

Meanwhile, the change in jobs is a major step upward in career development for Venhaus, the new superintendent said.

"I'm looking forward to the new position," said Venhaus, who served as principal for the past two years. Prior to that he was counselor for Bellevue, Midway and Byers schools from 1978 to 1985.

Venhaus began his teaching career in 1972 as a history teacher at Iowa Park Junior High School, where he taught occupational orientation from 1973-78.

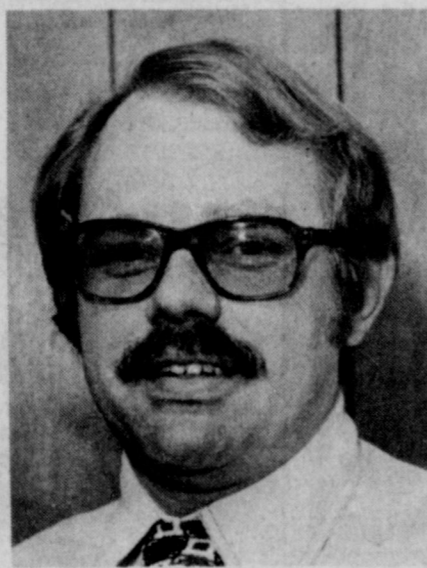
"Venhaus said he plans to continue the cooperative approach to school administration that he and Guice have developed over the past two years.

"It has been a cooperative effort on our parts. I've learned a lot from Mr. Guice," Venhaus said.

Venhaus said he has worked for eight superintendents and that he has learned something from all of them. "Otherwise, I won't think I would be able to handle the job."

In his new post as superintendent, Venhaus will devote all of his time to administration.

"Finances is always number one, having to deal with the budget and setting the tax rate with the coopera-



tion of the school board," he identified as his primary responsibility.

The budgetary problems are unusually difficult this year because the Texas Legislature is meeting in a late, special session to adopt a state budget which includes the formula for funding public schools. It is difficult to draft a budget without knowing how much money the school district will receive from the state, Venhaus said.

Venhaus forecasts Midway will have an enrollment of approximately 178 students next fall in kindergarten through 12th grades.

Midway finished last year with 176 students and historically its enrollment is on the rise.

Midway has a Class A designation, according to the University Interscholastic League. It is fourth in size among Clay County schools behind Henrietta, Petrolia and Bellevue. Only Byers has a smaller enrollment.

Venhaus supervises a professional staff of 17 teachers in addition to four teacher aides, one bookkeeper-tax collector, one bus driver-mechanic, one custodian and four bus drivers.

Asked if Midway has any difficul-

ty in attract teachers, Venhaus said, "We have more to offer than some school districts," pointing to salaries above state scale, additional fringe benefits, small class sizes and a new facility.

There have been four to five inquiries about the three teaching positions vacated at the end of the last school year, Venhaus said.

On the quality of education available at Midway Schools, he said, "We offer everything a student would need to go to college and then some." Midway offers its students courses to satisfy the regular transcript as well as advanced transcript.

Midway can't offer a wide range of training in the fine arts, he observed.

Nonetheless, students at Midway get a good education because of the good staff, good student body and support from the school board and community, Venhaus said.

Venhaus said he plans to continue commuting to work from his residence at Iowa Park where his wife, Carole, has taught Spanish and French 19 years. They have one daughter, Amanda, nine.

Venhaus is a 1964 graduate of Marquette High School, Alton, Ill. He served in the U.S. Air Force and received an honorable discharge as an E-5 staff sergeant in 1970.

He earned bachelor and master degrees in education from Midwestern State Univ.

Venhaus received his vocational teacher endorsement from East Texas State Univ. and his mid-management certification from Texas Woman's Univ., where he expects to complete requirements this fall for superintendent certification.

In the meantime, he is serving as Midway's superintendent under a temporary certificate issued by the state, good for five years.

Finnell urges adoption of constitution changes

State Rep. Charles Finnell this week characterized the upcoming Nov. 3 general election as "a major opportunity for Texas voters to strengthen the state's economic prospects."

Finnell said voter approval of several key constitutional amendments would help the state develop a unified long-term economic policy.

"Because of its vast supply of natural resources, Texas is the world's 13th largest economy," the Holliday businessman said, "but we will have to diversify and be innovative if we want to continue to remain competitive into the 21st century. These constitutional proposals set in

operation a mechanism for economic revitalization."

While consulting with constituents in the 80th House District in preparation for the 30-day special session that begins Monday, Finnell cited the importance of four amendments that he backed throughout the regular session.

These amendments authorize the legislature to assist in economic development, establish an economic stabilization fund, and support the development and production of Texas products and businesses. One benefit of the constitutional changes will be to merge several state agencies into one streamlined Texas Department of Commerce.

"In addition to coordinating Texas economic policy, this department will promote the creation and retention of jobs," Finnell said.

He said that all available members of his staff would be in Austin until Monday preparing for the second called special session. His number in the capitol is 512-463-0526.

"There's no reason why we shouldn't have a good auction. The cattle market looks good and we sure need a good auction for the Center," Parker said.

In a glass serving bowl, cook all ingredients except corn chips. Bake on 6 for 5 minutes or until cheese is melted. Stir once during cooking. Serve hot with corn chips.

- 1 unpeeled zucchini squash, quartered, then chopped
- 1 unpeeled yellow summer squash prepared the same as above
- 1 large onion, chopped in chunks
- 2 tomatoes, chopped
- 2 stalks celery

Add water and cook 20 minutes or until vegetables are tender, add salt and pepper to taste.

- 1 1/2 cup milk
- 2 Tbsp. cornstarch

- 1/2 cup chopped sweet pepper (optional)

Cook the milk, sugar and cornstarch until smooth. Add corn and pepper. Put in a baking dish. Mix together and put on top: 2 cups fine cracker crumbs and 1/2 cup butter.

Bake at 325 degrees 45 minutes to 1 hour till done or light brown.

FAMILY HEALTH NOTES

Complications of Sun Exposure can be avoided

Solar energy, the essential element for survival of every living plant and animal, can also cause a wide variety of medical problems when exposed to the human body in excessive amounts. From minor sunburn to life-threatening heat illness, most complications of sun exposure can be prevented with careful attention to early warning signs and symptoms.

Unfortunately, pain -- the most easily identified symptom of sun exposure -- may become evident only after injury to the skin has occurred. People who have experienced sunburn will recognize painful irritation after sunbathing, not during. Although most cases of sun exposure need minimal treatment for pain, severe burns may require intravenous fluids and hospitalization.

To prevent sunburn, the easiest measure is, of course, to protect the skin from ultraviolet light. But when exposure is unavoidable -- as in the case of farmers, fishermen, and other outdoor workers, for example -- sunscreen is an effective barrier to ultraviolet light.

There are several types of sunscreens, but the most effective ones include para-aminobenzoic acid (PABA), which prevents injury to the skin by ultraviolet light absorption. Sunscreens with higher concentrations of PABA afford a greater barrier to ultraviolet light. Regardless of the PABA concentration, sunscreens should be reapplied after swimming or excessive sweating, which wash off the protective element.

Individuals who are most susceptible to ultraviolet light exposure are those on each end of the age spectrum. Children and older adults should be protected from direct sun exposure to prevent the more severe reactions seen in these age groups. Most significantly, skin cancer has been shown to have an increased incidence in people with a history of excessive sun exposure.

While solar energy may produce injury to superficial skin tissue, it can also injure internal organs when body temperature exceeds normal levels. Under stressful condition, such as exercise in hot weather, increased body temperature can cause changes in fluid compartments of the body, which may lead to heat stroke. Heat stroke is usually precipitated by exercise in hot weather when the body loses control of temperature, which may reach as high as 108 F.

A more common complication of exercise in hot weather is dehydration, when body fluids are lost primarily through perspiration. Since body sweat consists of mostly water, the best replacement fluid during exercise is water. Fruit drinks, sodas, and glucose mixtures have high sugar concentrations, which tend to absorb body water. The end result is that a person who drinks several sodas after a tennis game will feel more thirsty after drinking them!

To prevent dehydration associated with physical exertion, picking the right time of day for exercise is a good start. Early mornings and late evenings are the coolest time of day to avoid overheating. Among all sports, swimming provides the best exercise during hot weather since water rapidly conducts heat from the body.

As another practical consideration, proper clothing during exercise should allow adequate ventilation and minimal heat absorption. The use of rubber suits and nylon stockings to promote weight loss is a dangerous error, especially during hot temperatures, and should be avoided to prevent potential cardiovascular crises.

Regardless of preventive measures, symptoms of heat illness may occur. Dizziness, nausea, and disorientation are important early warning signs that should require immediate discontinuation of exercise for any individual. Initial treatment for impending heat illness is the application of ice or cool towels to the head, neck and upper body, in addition to water replacement. Occasionally, victims of heat illness will exhibit a strange sense of euphoria or "high," which should not be confused with normal behavior.

While solar energy may be essential for the survival of all living things, complications of its excess are a significant medical problem during summer months. Careful attention to temperature, time of day, sun exposure, clothing and water availability may make your summer activities safer and more enjoyable.
