Two major projects await council okay

The city council will consider authorizing advertising for two major projects, and also make appointments to three volunteer groups, when it meets at 7 p.m. Monday in council chambers.

The projects include construction of a "liner" for the landfill and for materials to upgrade the sewer main into the wastewater plant.

Under direction of the state, the city must have its new landfill pits lined with a two-foot-thick clay wall which, according to the state, will keep anything in the pit from contaminating underground water.

Estimates for a pit which would be required to handle the city's trash one year run as high as \$100,000, if built to state specifications. The cost figure does not include normal operating expenses.

Besides appointments of members to the city's electrical board, appointments to two committees are also on the meeting agenda.

One group will be the Iowa Park Centennial Committee, as the council expects to declare 1988 as the

city's 100th anniversary.

The other group of appointments will be to the Constitutional Bicentennial Committee.

A resolution will be proposed for the city to enter into an amendment to the ambulance subsidy contract with the county, Wichita Falls and Burkburnett, with Lifeline Ambulance.

Under the city administrator's report on the agenda are the following topics:

- * consider landfill options, rates and alternatives.
- * consider use of property west of city hall.

Pre-dawn storm drops only .06 precipitation

Iowa Park received only .06 of an inch of precipitation from a brief, pre-dawn shower Thursday morning, according to Virgil Woodfin.

Fireworks, grassfires keep dispatchers busy

The dispatchers at Iowa Park Police Department were kept busy answering the telephones and alerting appropriate organizations during the July 4th weekend.

During the past week, from Wednesday to Wednesday, dispatchers received seven complaints about fireworks being set off in the city, and 11 calls about grassfires outside the city limits.

One resident who thought he heard fireworks being set off near his home Saturday night, and didn't call in a complaint, learned Sunday morn-

ing that it had actually been a gun.

Alan House told police he had believed he heard fireworks during the night, but when he went outside the next day to mow his lawn, he found his neighbor's vehicle windshield had been shattered, apparently by gunfire.

The vehicle was parked at 412 W. Washington, and the owner was out of town, according to the blotter.

Two men were arrested within an hour of each other early Saturday, both on warrants from offices other than Iowa Park.

Police took Timothy Joe David-

son, 27, into custody at 200 W. Highway at 12:55 a.m. when it was learned he had outstanding warrants listed by the Department of Public Safety for failing to report change of address on drivers license, and failure to appear.

Davidson was released after posting \$144 bond.

At 1:56 a.m., police arrested Anthony Jon Noble, 22, at 904 S. Park, according to the blotter.

Noble was wanted in Albany, Ga. on seven charges of check forgery. He was released at 7:54 a.m. to a county deputy.

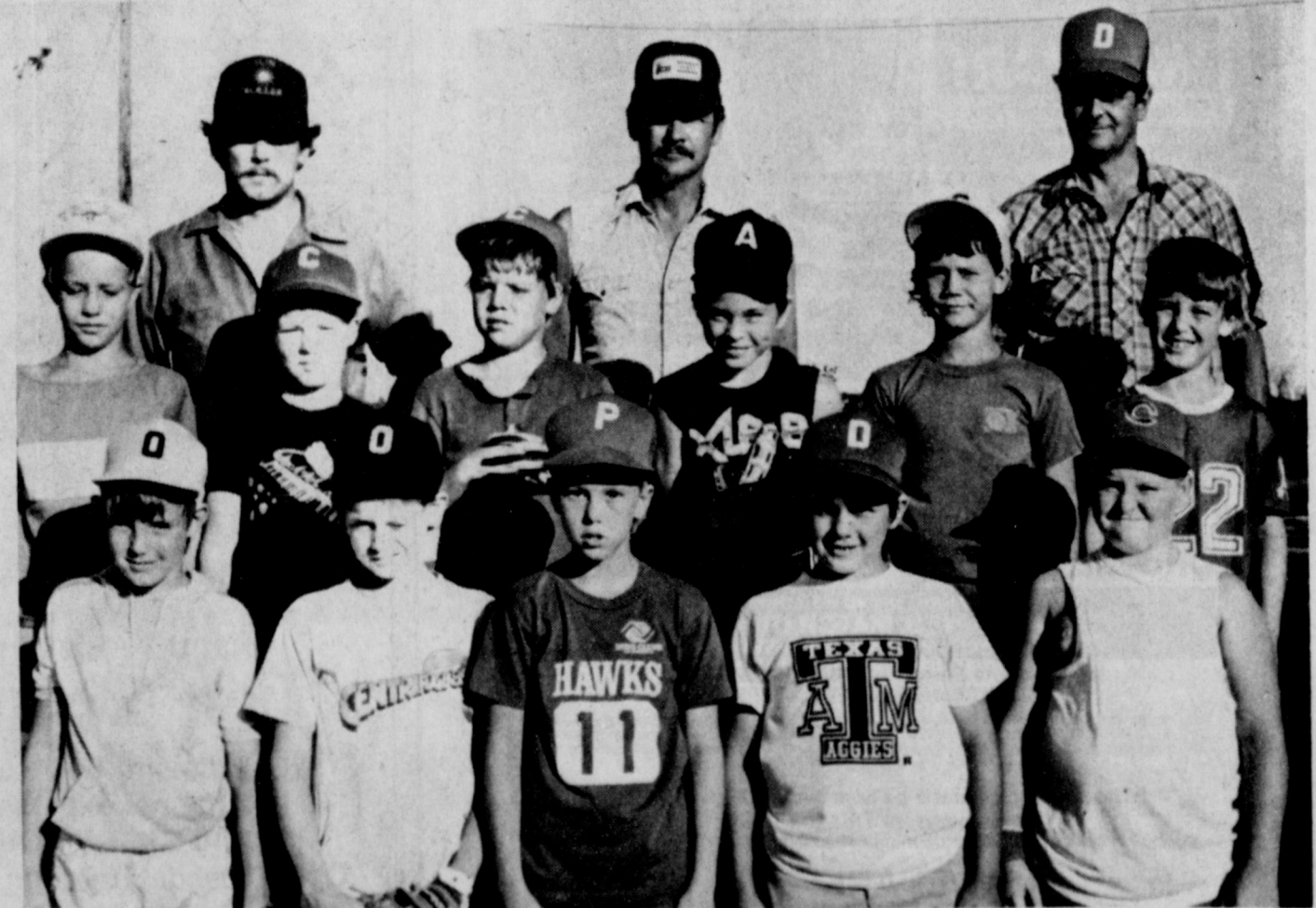

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Cook of the Week

One of Mrs. Leonard C. Riddle's recipes this week is Lime Jello 7-Up Salad, which is a reminder how popular salads are in planning family meals during any season, and especially during the hot summer days.

What is a salad? The old English name for it was sallet, the name stemming from sal, meaning salt. But today, salad is used to encompass an enormous number of cooked and uncooked vegetables, fruits, meats, shellfish, fowl, and, of course, hard-cooked eggs, all suitably dressed.

The French describe a salad with only one ingredient, lettuce for example, as a salad simple, and a salad with a number of ingredients as a "composed salad" or "salade composee." The popular salad lunches and dinners in America today definitely feature composed salads.

LIME JELLO 7-UP SALAD

1 large box lime jello dissolved in 1/2 cup boiling water
Add 1 1/2 cups 7-Up and chill until set.

Mix in:
2 cups applesauce
1 pkg. miniature marshmallows

Place in favorite mold and chill until set. Serve in individual molds or on lettuce leaves.

BROCCOLI AND CHEESE CASSEROLE

1 large bag frozen broccoli pieces
1 cup water
1 cup minute rice (uncooked)
1 large jar Cheez-Whiz
1 can cream of mushroom soup
Thaw broccoli, place in water and bring to a boil. Add rest of ingredients, just mix well. Heat in casserole dish or crockpot until hot and rice is done. 30 minutes at 350 degrees.

COUNTRY-STYLE BEANS (from Ohio)

Saute:
1/2 pound hamburger or sausage and 1 medium onion until brown, drain as needed.
Mix with:
1/4 cup brown sugar
1/2 cup catsup
1 T. Worcestershire sauce
1 T. prepared mustard
2-lb. cans baked beans
Place in casserole and bake 45 minutes at 350 degrees.

OUR FAVORITE CORN BREAD

1 pkg. Jiffy Corn Muffin Mix, prepare according to directions, then add: 1 egg and 1/4 cup granulated sugar to make the corn bread lighter. Note: the Riddles like it hot served with milk over it.

MOM'S BROILED HOT DOGS (Pigs in Blanket)

1 pkg. hot dogs, preferably jumbo
Cut slit in center of hot dogs, not clear through. Fill with favorite cheese. Wrap tightly with strip of raw bacon. Wrap and broil until bacon is cooked to desired doneness. Serve with picnic menu.

Local students are recognized

Several post-school recognitions have been received by Iowa Park High students. 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FAMILY HEALTH NOTES

Breast Cancer

Breast cancer is one of the most common malignancies in women. Its incidence seems to be increasing. During the 1960's it was estimated that breast cancer would strike about 1 in 13 women at one point during life; now the figure has been revised to 1 in 11 women. Cancer of the breast is the second leading cause of death in women from cancer, having recently been surpassed by lung cancer because of increased smoking among women.

The incidence is increasing most strongly among younger women under 55, and in black women, although better reporting may be influencing these figures. Some of the reason for this increase may be due to the fact that more women live into the cancer prone years. There are several breast cancer risk factors which should be discussed.

1. Sex. Women predominate in the ratio of 99:1 (yes, men can get breast cancer, but it is very rare).
 2. Age. Eighty-five percent of breast cancer occurs after age 40.
 3. Family history. The risk increases three times with
 4. Previous breast cancer: risk increases five-fold when one breast has already been affected.
 5. Previous benign breast lesion: risk increases with fibrocystic disease and other noncancerous benign lesions which require biopsy.
 6. Late first pregnancy increases risk four times when the first pregnancy is after age 34. Never having children increases the risk three times.
- Other risk factors include a high-fat diet, cancers involving other body systems, the triad of obesity, diabetes and hypertension (when seen together) and exposure to heavy amounts of radiation.

The chief complaint of most patients with significant breast disease is a lump or mass and is usually the only manifestation in 85 to 90 percent of cases due to malignancy. In the great majority of cases, the tumor is detected by self-examination. Recently an increasing percentage of tumors have been uncovered by family physicians on the basis of history, physical examination, and the selective use of mammography (breast x-rays). The x-rays are advocated as a routine measure in patients at high risk of breast cancer. A constellation of risk factors, major and minor genetic hormonal and immunologic are more likely than any single factor to determine development of cancer.

The single most important factor in control of breast cancer, of course, is early detection. The smallest detectable malignant tumors have usually been present on the average about 9 years, based on growth rates and the time required to grow from one cell to a palpable size. The shortest time required for malignant tumor to become apparent is about two years. The family physician plays a key role in breast cancer screening. He should perform periodic breast examinations at intervals appropriate for the patient's age and risk factors. Patients must also be enlisted in the screening effort. By learning self-breast examination in detail, the monitoring process is extended into the intervals between office examinations. The result will be fewer masses brought to the attention of the physician after dangerous delay. Each patient should report the presence or absence of these findings on a regular basis to the physician. Not infrequently, women report minimal lesions that are confirmed only after several office examinations.

The above-mentioned screening, when accompanied by a positive finding, sets in motion a process of investigation which may or may not suggest the need for biopsy. Suspicious areas should usually be confirmed with x-ray or mammography. This process is painless, not invasive and may often detect areas that are too small to be diagnosed conclusively by physical examination. Contrary to popular opinion, the amount of radiation received by routine mammograms is insignificant and does not contribute to the future development of breast cancer in women who undergo routine screening.

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As I See It...

If you've kept up with the news this week, you probably figure that you'll not have to pay a sales tax on your insurance premiums.

The public's reaction likely has the attention of the legislators.

But did you know that, as of Oct. 1, you won't have to pay sales tax on your newspapers?

Yep, newspapers and magazines were excluded from sales tax during the regular legislative session, and it was later signed into law by the governor.

I received a letter Monday from Bob Bullock, state comptroller, explaining the exemption and a suggestion on phasing out the tax.

"The effective date of the repeal is October 1, a date set in the legislation. Subscriptions charged and collected on a monthly -- or shorter ---- basis will continue to be taxable through September.

"But for semi-annual or yearly subscriptions which will reach beyond the October 1 date, I recommend that you drop the tax immediately. It is simply not efficient for you or my office to handle proration of the tax on subscriptions you handle between now and October 1. Just consider this subscription money as nontaxable sales," he said.

Well, we'll do as he suggests. So, using the effective date we received the letter, those subscriptions we received Monday and later, which included the sales tax, we are giving an extra month of expiration. Those who paid the tax prior to Monday will just have their money sent right on to Austin and the state cauffers.

We, and all businesses selling the paper, will continue collecting the tax on single copy purchases,

through September.

Actually, it's kinda embarrassing to my industry to have our papers not taxed, with the state in the financial situation it is. I was for the repeal a couple of years ago, but I'm not sure about it right now.

Frankly, I'm of the opinion that there should be a one-cent sales tax put on every dollar expended in the state. I just don't like having a tax on this and not one on that.

Good argument can be given on why health care, food and other basic essentials shouldn't be subject to tax. But picking and choosing in fact gives powerful lobbies a leg up to have their bosses excluded.

How much money does the state need? Well, it all depends on which body of the legislature you listen to. That is the big argument in Austin right now, and it varies between the house, the senate, and what the governor figures.

The senate figures the state needs a lot more than the other two, according to the news reports. Those guys not only want to spend as much as when the state was rolling in money from the oil industry...they actually want to increase expenditures!

As I understand it, the senate is proposing that Texans, including all the unemployed oilfield workers who are trying to make ends meet by doing yard work and other tasks, to kick in enough extra dough to pay college professors a 30-percent salary increase.

Families, when money is short, cut back on the quality of cuts of meat they have on the table.

Criminals increase their thefts and robberies, when they need more money.

The legislature, it appears, just adds more tax.

I couldn't keep from laughing at a comment quoted in the Dallas Morning News from Sen. Bob Glasgow of Stephenville, who said "We have a little reluctance to put a \$6 billion tax on the backs of consumers only," when he referred to the house's proposal to tax insurance premiums.

And at the same time he figures a 15-cent-per-gallon of gasoline tax is not a big tax on consumers. And that's not the only state tax levied on consumers, eventually, as far as oil is concerned.

I may have lost the right to give my opinions on how the state should work out its financial problems, since my newspaper will no longer be taxed on sales.

But it appears to me that if the legislature would look back on all the programs that have been initiated during the past 15 years, as possible areas of cuts, a desired budget could be found.

After all, most of these programs were launched because the state could afford them. When we couldn't afford them, I don't think the people were suffering too badly, or were being treated inhumanely.

Advice for Easing VDT User's Symptoms

In 1970 there were fewer than 5,000 VDTs in use. By 1985 the figure climbed to 10-million and by 1990 it is expected that 40-million people will use terminals.

VDT users often suffer from ulcers, back and neck problems, as well as visual difficulties. Such tactics as periodic breaks, lowering light levels and using copy holders for data entry will help alleviate these problems.

The two major causes of VDT-induced visual problems are glare from the screen and long-term visual work. The two most common symptoms are headaches and eyestrain.

Headaches often result from increased amount of time people work at close range on the VDT and because glasses prescriptions may not be correct. Eyestrain may result from increased focusing at close range and from the VDT glare. A special pair of glasses that incorporate a tint as well as a correction for the near working distance would go a longway in reducing eyestrain symptoms.

It would be a wise investment to consider an extra pair of specs for something you do for hours at a time every workday. Your eye care professional can tell you what kind of VDT eyewear you need to make life easier behind the computer screen.

June 4 was the last day of school here in Midland. As everyone knows, the last day of school is a joyous occasion. Well, here in one of our elementary schools this changed. The students were eating lunch, like any other day, hot dogs, nothing really special, when one of the second grade boys began to choke. One of the teachers grabbed him and began doing the Heimlich Maneuver but she got no results. By this time the nurse had arrived and began the same process, still with no results. No more than four minutes had passed since this episode began and the E.M.T.s arrived, still there was no response. The boy was immediately transported to Midland Memorial Hospital where an emergency traceotomy was performed. I wish this story had a happy ending, but that is not the case. This young man is still in a Ft. Worth hospital in I.C.U. His condition is still unsure. The piece of wiener found was only one and one-half

inches long. It was later explained by medical personnel that the Heimlich Maneuver is completely useless in a case like this because of the texture of a wiener. While a piece of hard candy will pop right out of the throat, something spongy, like a wiener gives.

I tell you all this to help explain the horror I felt when I picked up the Iowa Park Leader from June 11 and saw five young children having a wiener eating contest. If something this tragic could happen when a child is merely eating lunch imagine what could happen in a contest of this sort. Mr. Hamilton, please speak to the people in charge of this event and see if perhaps some other type of food could be used in the food eating contest. I truly am concerned that this never happen to another child.



Ag teacher hired; new computers okayed

HOLLIDAY - The Holliday school board during regular meeting Monday night hired an assistant

vocational agriculture teacher and approved the purchase of computers and a phone system.

Trustees hired John Simmons of Mineral Wells to replace Jay Womack as assistant agriculture instructor. This will be Simmons' first teaching job since graduating Tarleton State Univ.

Womack is leaving his position at Holliday after accepting a job in Nocona as head agriculture instructor.

Board members approved the purchase of 20 Apple II computers for the high school computer rooms at a cost of approximately \$20,600. The computers presently being used in the high school will be moved to the middle school for elementary and middle school use.

Purchase of a new phone system for the school was approved. The school will purchase the system from General Telephone, the same company that holds the lease on the phone system the school presently uses.

In other business, trustees approved the repair of the damaged north parking lot of the school, and

the construction of a circle bus drive between the middle school and high school building. Superintendent Dan Owen cited safety as the main reason for the construction.

Goals for the overall student body and each individual campus were approved.

Owen said the major overall goal was to establish better public relations with parents and the community.

Some individual campus goals were:

- *teaching the awareness of drug abuse and sex education;
- *improvement of TEAMS test scores;

- *the prevention of drop-outs;
- *teaching senior high students citizenship;

- *keeping students in extra curricular activities through the tutorial program;
- *and increasing and improving writing skills.

Trustees accepted changes in the policy for selection of the valedic-

torian and salutatorian. Before the changes, students were required to be on the honors program to be eligible for selection.

Now any student may be eligible but certain subjects still must be taken.

The board heard a request from the building committee to look into the cost of a possible addition of six to seven classrooms and an administrative room. The classrooms will be needed in the next few years to keep up with the student/teacher ratio, mandated by House Bill 72, according to Owen.

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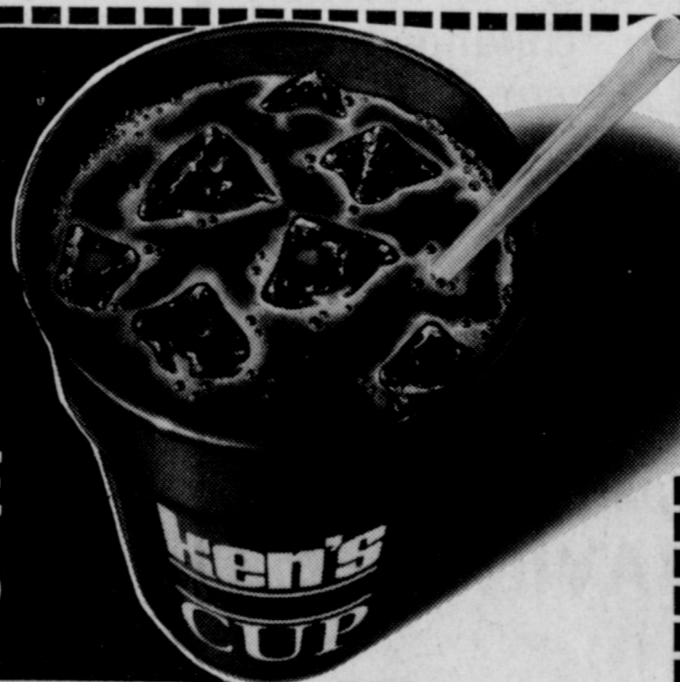

AREA OIL & GAS NEWS

Operating out of Irving, Tri-Core Oil and Gas Inc. has driven stake for a pair of 2,000-ft. developmental wells in Wichita County's Tricore Field, about three miles north-northeast of the Clara community. The wells will be known as the No. 51 and No. 52 Dickinson. Locations are in a 79-acre lease in the Specht Colony Subdivision Block 19. The No. 51 is 3,550 feet from the south line and 625 feet from the east line of the block. The No. 52 is 3,350 feet from the south line and 150 feet from the east line of the block.

It bottomed at 2,050 feet and will produce from Cisco Sand perforations, 671 to 1,879 feet into the wellbore. The well is located 2,055 feet from the north line and 1,725 feet from the east line of the survey.

Midland-based Atapco Inc. has filed for permit to drill three 1,950-ft. developmental wells in the Wichita Regular Field, about three miles southeast of Clara. The wells will be designated as the Nos. 8, 9 and 10 Reilly "A." The operations will be in a 2,100-acre lease block in the L.C. Dennison Survey A-55. The No. 8 is 2,600 feet from the northerly north line and 150 feet from the west line of the survey. The No. 9 is 2,600 feet from the northerly north line and 450 feet from the west line of the survey. The No. 10 is 2,050 feet from the northerly north line and 550 feet from the west line of the survey.

Pumping 18 barrels of 41-gravity crude with about 50 barrels of waste water daily, the No. 2 J.M. Dickinson has been completed by Tri-Core Oil and Gas in the Tricore Field, three miles north-northeast of Clara. The well bottomed at 1,920 feet and will produce from a set of perforations in the Gunsight Sand, 1,534 to 1,538 feet into the wellbore. Drillsite is 4,250 feet from the south line and 840 feet from the east line of the lease.

Wildcat drilling action is planned in Hardeman County by Texaco Producing Inc., about two miles north of Quanah. The operation will be in a 256-acre lease in the W&NW Survey Section 146 Block H. The well will be drilled to a projected depth of 6,000 feet. It is situated 1,320 feet from the south line and 1,320 feet from the west line of the section. It is designated as the No. 2 W.G. Walther.

Mobile Producing has posted first production data for the No. 62 R.R. Hamilton in the Wichita Regular Field, 1.5 miles north of Electra. On an open choke, the well pumped 15 barrels of 39-gravity oil plus 176 barrels of salt water per day.
