Another expansion set for Cryovac plant here

The sixth major expansion since Cryovac locating here was announced this week by Sam Laird, manager.

The \$6-million, 36,000-square foot addition will be located on the east end of the facility, bringing its total square footage to 435,000.

Purpose of the expansion will be to add manufacturing and warehouse space, of which about one third will be for production of more bagging.

Cryovac, a division of W.R. Grace Co., Inc., is a leading supplier

of packaging products for a wide range of consumer and industrial firms.

The local plant manufactures flexible plastic bags and films designed to be shrunk around a product forming a protective "second skin."

The Texas beef industry is a major market for the bags.

As a result of the expansion, about 25 new jobs will be added, bringing total employment to over 625 permanent employees.

Cryovac began operations in Iowa Park in 1975, with an original plant size of 159,600 square feet and 155 employees.

Electra Construction Co. was awarded the building expansion contract. Work is to begin immediately and completion by January, 1988.

Manufacturing equipment installation will follow, with start-up expected early 1989, Laird said.

The project was approved July 2 by the W.R. Grace board of directors, during a meeting in New York.

City aims to correct old sewage problem

The city will seek bids to enlarge the main pipeline into the wastewater treatment plant which the council hopes will eliminate backup problems caused in periods of heavy rain downpours.

Aldermen approved advertising for bids during Monday's meeting.

Despite efforts to seal out water from storms from infiltrating sewer pipes, backups in the line were evident in the area of Washington and West Highway.

When that occurred this spring, a further study of maps indicated an area which likely was causing the backups was at a manhole west of an area between Ruby and Lafayette, where 12-inch and eight-inch lines

were channelled into a single 12-inch line.

The proposed project would be to add an additional 12-inch line from the manhole to the treatment plant.

Estimated cost, according to Kerry Maroney, city engineer, would be \$10,000. This would be for materials only, and city employees do the installation.

In other business, appointments of members to two committees and a board were approved, as was a resolution concerning ambulance subsidy.

Mayor Tim Hunter's appointment of Joni Whitis, Robert Palmer, Bob Hamilton and Loretta Sheffield to serve as a committee for both the Constitutional Bi-Centennial and the city's Centennial were approved.

Appointed to the electrical board, and terms of office, were Milburn Bates, Eldon Dowell, Vern 1989; Hardin Hill, June 1, 1988, and code enforcement officer Larry Ashford, no expiration date.

The city of Wichita Falls has taken over dispatching duties for Life-line Ambulance, which receives a subsidy from Wichita Falls, the county, Burkburnett and Iowa Park.

A contract adjusting downward the subsidy was approved.

However, administrator James Barrington said Wichita Falls may want in the future, some additional money for taking over the dispatching duties.


Other topics discussed by the council were:

* approved expenditure of less than \$5,000 to replace a major line at the water treatment plant;

* voted to complete the area across Wall from city hall into a parking lot, after giving consideration to turning the area into a park;

* considered but made no decision on purchasing additional playground equipment for city hall park;

* and decided to meet most Mondays when regular meetings are not scheduled, until the 1987-88 budget is completed.

Expensive trash

Council calls for bids to dig \$100,000 hole in the ground

Iowa Park's city council Monday night approved advertising for bids to construct a sanitary landfill dumping pit in which the community's trash will be buried over the next year, hoping it will meet the dictates of the state.

And the anticipated price tag on the pit is \$100,000.

As part of the ongoing topic, which has consumed numerous hours of council meetings since the city has been warned if it did not comply with state regulations on its pits it would face \$900-per-day fines, the subject of incineration was again brought out.

Council members have been considering a major capital investment in an incineration plant as an alternative to constructing the expensive holes in the ground.

The pit to be dug, as explained by engineer Kerry Maroney, would be 200 feet wide, 325 feet long and 19 feet deep.

Then the walls and floor of the pit must be lined with materials taken from the pit, put down in six-inch layers which are watered and packed, to a thickness of three feet, and then covered with another foot of loose dirt.

Maroney expressed frustration with the specifications provided by the state for several reasons.

He first said the soil where the proposed pits are located have been cored, the samples approved, and the locations approved by the state.

But since that approval, the state has since told the city "vertical" walls would not be acceptable, and the flooring must be lined.

In order to produce a pit required, the city must either contract out the work, or purchase equipment and hire operators to do the work.

Plans and related information will now be sent to the state, which

has given the city a date of Aug. 1 to show its intentions of complying with regulations, and have the work underway by Oct. 1, Mayor Tim Hunter said.

If the council should decide to go the incinerator route in the future, it will still be required to have an approved pit in which to dump the ashes, Maroney said. But a pit as described would last five years, instead of one.

Construction of the pit will require approximately 30 days.

Because of the additional cost of operating the city's trash collection and disposal, an adjustment of rates can be expected.

Administrator James Barrington, responding to a question from the council, said there are approximately 2,500 customers in the city, and a monthly increase of \$4, on the average, would be needed, he estimated.

The administrator was asked to poll surrounding communities to see what their trash rates were. The information will be used to determine how future rates will be assessed.

Some of the key city people have visited the cities of Carthage and Center, to tour their incinerator facilities. But council members who have not seen them expressed a desire to make a study before advancing plans for the future.

Barrington was asked to invite representatives of a firm that worked with the two cities to build burning plants, to meet with the council and explain both the process, the operation and costs.

The size of incinerator the city will buy, should the council decide that is the route to take, depends on different factors: whether to burn only trash produced by residents of the city; burn city trash and also that produced by Cryovac; or both, plus offering the service to the county

and/or neighboring communities.

To be included in the calculations would be whether steam produced by the process would be purchased by Cryovac, or used only to generate electricity required by the city's wastewater treatment plant.

During discussions about the operations at Center and Carthage, officials said they were told the cost of operating an incinerator can be offset considerably by the sale of steam for energy use.

A proposal has been discussed with officials of Cryovac, about both the taking of the plant's refuse and the sale of steam. No response has yet been received.

Should the industry not choose to purchase steam, the discussion is that the incinerator would be located near the wastewater treatment plant, to cut down on distance electricity generated from the steam would have to be carried.

Use of city-produced electricity would cut down considerably the cost of energy required to operate the wastewater treatment plant, it has been explained.

The cost of an incinerator which would handle up to 75 tons of trash daily is estimated at \$2,224,000.

Savings from operating the sanitary landfill would basically offset the cost of operating the incinerator, Barrington said. Sale of the steam should produce enough revenue to cover the debt service for constructing the plant.

As far as continuing to operate a sanitary landfill, instead of investing a large capital outlay to construct an incinerator, the city's mayor, engineer and administrator all said they could not feel secure additional changes in regulations and requirements which would be even more expensive would not be coming.

During an investigation, officers determined he was not intoxicated, but did find less than two ounces of marijuana in the vehicle.

He was arrested, his vehicle confiscated, and his juvenile daughter taken to the children's home in Wichita Falls.

Ondishko was released at 10:52 a.m. to a county deputy, according to the police blotter.

Thirteen counterfeit one-dollar bills were found in Catlin Car Wash change machine Saturday morning and reported by Ronnie Taylor.

Three individuals were arrested during the week on warrants from law agencies outside Iowa Park.

Yovonne M. Hiddenkamp, 34, was taken into custody at 2:32 a.m. Friday at Magnolia and First when it was determined Department of Public Safety (DPS) warrants were outstanding against her for speeding and failure to display drivers license.

She was released after posting a \$65 bond.

Saturday at 9:16 a.m., Andrew Dean Baldwin, 24, was stopped on the access road at Karen, and two outstanding warrants from the Brown-

wood DPS office were found to be against him.

He was released an hour later after posting a \$161 bond.

Police Tuesday afternoon arrested Velma Shipman Oakley, 61, at 1003 Park Plaza on a Wichita County Sheriff's Office warrant, for revocation of probation on DWI charges. She was released to a county deputy.

City's sales tax picture improves

While the sales tax rebate for June to Iowa Park is still below this time last year, the picture is somewhat improved from last month.

Iowa Park received a check for \$11,681.64, which brought the year's total to \$87,858.84.

According to the state comptroller's office, the city has received 3.17 percent less than last year, when \$90,732.05 was the total.

The comptroller's office reported last month Iowa Park was a minus 3.68 percent compared to 1986.

Wichita Falls is a minus 8.52 percent; Burkburnett plus 0.57 percent, and Electra minus 25.72.

Rebate payments are running a minus 6.5 percent over the state.

Every community in Archer County is below the same period reported last year: Archer City -29.88; Holliday -38.16; Megargel -24.92; Lakeside City -26.24; Windthorst -6.27 and Scotland -10.84.

Predators cost ranchers money

Randy Smith of the Wildlife Division of the U.S. Department of Agriculture gave a program for the Evening Lions on wildlife damage control in Texas Tuesday.

Smith said that the cattle industry in Texas suffered millions of dollars in loss each year because of the predators. He showed pictures of these that are found in different sections of the state to include the bobcats, grey and red foxes, wild dogs, mountain lions and coyotes.

For the larger predators he suggested methods of control as steel, buried and hidden traps, guard dogs and donkeys running loose in the flock of cattle, sheep and goats, toxic collars placed on some of the animals, and spotting and shooting the predators from airplanes.

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FAMILY HEALTH NOTES

Water helps to keep those summer bodies from melting

After a grueling tennis game, you notice chill bumps on your arm even though the temperature is 97 degrees. You feel dizzy, your lips are dry and cracking, and your skin is red hot. You start to walk off the tennis court and stumble, trying to remember what day it is.

Beware. These symptoms may be warning signs of heat illness that can result in a life-threatening emergency if not treated immediately. Year after year during summer months the tragic stories of heat victims repeat themselves. More tragically, most of these emergencies could have been avoided.

The problem with heat illness starts and stops with water. During your tennis game, your body perspires and cools the skin by evaporation. But too much perspiration dried up body fluids in the same way that a prune dries up in the sun. When this happens, perspiration stops and body temperature raises dangerously high. The combination of excessive water loss and high body temperature can result in catastrophic heat stroke, a rare but often fatal disease.

Drinking plenty of water while exercising, whether it's cutting the grass or playing tennis, is a good start in preventing heat illness. Since body sweat is mostly water, the best replacement fluid is water. Fruit dinks, sodas, and glucose mixtures have high sugar concentrations, which tend to absorb water in your body. The end result is that a person who guzzles down several soft drinks after a tennis game will feel more thirsty after drinking them! So wet your whistle with water, not soft drinks.

Picking the right time of day for your exercise is another useful hint. Early mornings and late evenings are the coolest times of the day to avoid overheating. Another practical consideration is clothing, which should be loose fitting and porous.

If you are interested in losing weight, sweating is not the way to do it. Rubber suits and nylon stockings are a definite no-no in the summertime when you are exercising, particularly in older adults who may have heart problems.

Regardless of how hard you try to prevent it, heat illness can occur. Recognizing the early warning signs may save your tennis partner's life as well as your own. "Goosebumps" on dry hot skin, nausea, and vomiting may be the first indications. Emergency treatment is to lie the patient down and put ice or cool towels around the head and neck while you transport him to the hospital. Occasionally, some victims of heat stroke "talk out of their head" or feel "high" -- a reaction not to be confused with normal behavior.

Heat illness is a potential problem for people of all ages but particularly young children and senior citizens. Careful attention to temperature, time of day, clothing, and water can make your summer activities safe and more enjoyable.

Overdoing sun exposure may delete beta-carotene

Sun worshippers not only speed up the aging of their skin, they also may be reducing the amount of beta-carotene in their blood and upsetting their nutritional well-being.

A study conducted by Dr. Daphne A. Roe of Cornell University showed that sunlight can break down beta-carotene in white and Oriental people who are exposed to average summer sunshine.

The depletion of beta-carotene, in turn, can make these people more susceptible to several types of cancer, Dr. Roe said.

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

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
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

CINNAMON ROLLS

- 1/2 cup shortening
- 1 cup sugar
- 1 1/2 tps. salt
- 2 cups water

Bring the above ingredients to a boil; Let cool until just warm. Add 1 package of yeast
2 beaten eggs
Mix in 6 cups flour.
Do this at 3 p.m.
Punch down at 6 p.m.
Roll out at 9 p.m.



Cook of the Week

Cover rolled dough with sugar and cinnamon mixture (to your liking). Roll and cut. Place in greased pan. Cover with wax paper and let stand overnight. Ready to go in the morning. Bake at 350 degrees 25 minutes. Ice with powdered sugar and milk.

BLUEBERRY MUFFINS

- 1/2 cup oil
- 1 stick oleo
- 1 3/4 cup sugar
- 2 eggs
- 1 T. vanilla
- 3 cups flour
- 1 cup buttermilk
- 1 tsp. soda
- 1 tsp. baking powder
- 1/2 can blueberries

Drain berries and use 1/2 of juice in recipe. Mix oleo and oil, add sugar and eggs, then vanilla.

Alternate flour, soda and baking powder with buttermilk and juice.

Gently stir in blueberries. Bake in greased and floured muffin pan at 400 degrees 18-20 minutes.

This can sit in the refrigerator for two weeks.

CHICKEN SPAGHETTI

- Boil a large fryer, salt and pepper to taste
- 2 stalks celery
- 1 onion
- 1 carrot
- 1 large green pepper

- 1 can tomatoes
- 1 can mushrooms
- 1 pound ready cut spaghetti
- 1 pound American cheese

Saute vegetables and add tomatoes. Reserve 1 cup or more of the chicken broth and cook spaghetti in remaining with added water. Mix all together. Reserve 1/2 of the cheese, for topping. Pour broth over mix and top with cheese. Bake 30 minutes at 350 degrees uncovered.

CHOCOLATE CAKE

- 2 sticks of butter
- 1 cup water
- 2 cups flour
- 4 Tbs. cocoa
- 2 cups sugar

Mix well, then add:
1/2 cup buttermilk

- 1 tsp. soda
- 2 beaten eggs
- 1 tsp. vanilla

Batter will be thin.
Bake in a 13X9 pan until middle springs back about 30 minutes in a 350 degree oven.

ICING

- 1 stick butter
 - 6 Tbs. milk
 - 1 cup marshmallows
- Heat until melted, then add 4 Tbs. cocoa, 1 box powdered sugar and 1 tsp. vanilla. Spread over cooled cake.

CHEESE CAKE

- CRUST:
- 1 1/4 cups graham cracker crumbs
- 3 T. melted oleo
- 2 T. sugar

Mix and press in bottom of spring form pan. Bake at 350 degrees 10 minutes. Cool.

FILLING:

- 2 large and 1 small packages cream cheese
- 1 cup sugar
- 3 eggs
- 1 tsp. vanilla

Beat cream cheese with mixer until fluffy. Gradually add sugar while beating. Continue to beat and add eggs one at a time. Add vanilla (can use 1/4 tsp. vanilla and about 2 tsp. grated lemon rind). Pour on cooled crust and bake 1 hour at 300 degrees. Cook, then chill at least 3 hours before cutting.

Will Contact Lenses Improve Your Tennis Game?

Photographs of tennis players taken at high speed show that a player's line of sight reaches extreme positions many times during a game. For example, the extreme upward direction of gaze during the overhead "smash." Eyeglasses are limiting because of the size of the frame, thickness of the lenses and reflected light off the lenses. Plus the eyes have to move away from the optical centers of the lenses. With contacts the eyes are virtually looking through the centers of the lenses because the contact moves with the eye. A recent study conducted by Vic Braden Tennis College showed that contact lenses enhanced the playing performance of tennis players of all ages. It was also found that the larger size soft contact lenses are more stable than the smaller, looser fitting contacts.

For players who have to wear bifocals, it was found that fitting one eye for distance and the other for near ("Mono-vision") worked out very well. So, if you need to wear glasses and your tennis game ain't all its cracked up to be, you may wish to consider contact lenses. Will contacts improve a golfer's game? Well, that's another story!

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



Worth Quoting

A lot of Americans have been upset over the action by Congress to give themselves a pay boost by means of a law which allows a presidential commission to set the pay scale. The only way to stop the pay raise was by voting against it, and the majority of Congress took the raise.

Our own Rep. Beau Boulter voted against it and has declined the \$2,500 raise which puts Congressional salaries at \$75,000 a year.

There is at present a movement for a constitutional amendment which would put an end to this kind of pay raise. It is the 11th Amendment which was never ratified by all the states. This amendment would forbid Congressmen from voting themselves to a pay raise until after they had faced the voters in election.

There have been 13 states who have ratified this amendment and a move is now on to get 25 more to do so. There were six states which ratified the amendment in 1789 and it remained that way until recent years. The latest states to ratify it were Colorado in 1984, Maine in 1983 and Wyoming in 1978, South Dakota, New Hampshire and Arizona in 1985.

A young man in Austin, Greg Watson, was doing research on the Equal Rights Amendment when he came across this 11th Amendment which did not contain a deadline for ratification as the other amendments did.

This means that although it was first passed in 1789 it is still very much alive and can become law if 38 states ratify it.

Supporters of this project have set 1989 as the target for 38 states to ratify this 11th Amendment and do something about back door pay raises for Congress.

Texas has been strangely silent on this project, perhaps because Speaker Jim Wright is very much in favor of Congressional pay raises.

But it is a project worth an effort. Maybe we Texans will get a chance to do our bit to stem this kind of federal spending.
