Officer's appeal for job being studied by council

The city council delayed making any decision on an appeal for reinstatement to the police force by Johnny Robertson, following a lengthy, courtroom-like hearing Monday night before a packed audience.

The officer was terminated from the department by City Administrator James Barrington some two weeks ago, after he refused to sign a suspension penalty for not attending a required seminar held here.

With the council sitting much like a court jury, attorneys questioned the key figures in the situation. Robertson was represented by Bob Estrada of Wichita Falls, and the city by its designated attorney, Jay Cantrell.

The list of complaints against Robertson, as explained by Cantrell, were poor work record, potential atmosphere of desecration and "behavior we believe tends to bring discredit to the city."

Robertson explained that he was confused by two different postings of schools on one sheet on the bulletin board in the police department, another about the seminar, and a third that he was not to attend a school.

He said a note posted told him to work his regular schedule, which he said he did.

Chief Alan Sheffield, responding to a question by Cantrell, said the failure to attend the seminar was not the main issue, and Cantrell then noted the three other complaints.

Sheffield charged that Robertson was sloppy about filling out report forms, that the officer had for a period of time not worn clean uniforms, and that he had worked as a security officer in violation with his restrictions.

Robertson countered, through Estrada, by presenting a number of certificates of completion from several training classes, including one of

filling out reports.

He also had a letter complimenting him on his work and appearance.

Sheffield said he had given his approval for Robertson to work part time with Ray Cannedy Security and Investigations, but stated permission to work while carrying a gun would not be approved until he received his private investigator's license.

Robertson had stated he had taken his state private investigator's test, and was awaiting delivery of the license.

When asked if he had carried his gun while doing the part time work, he said he could not remember.

Estrada made a point during his presentation that a law official is on duty at all times.

Sheffield said he had discussed Robertson's need for improvement in filling out report forms, when the two had held an evaluation conference meeting in June.

Estrada encouraged the council members to look at a "representative" sample of reports on record filled out by Robertson, and emphasized they should not be selected by critics.

Following the presentations, Mayor Tim Hunter told the council they had three options: declare want of confidence and uphold the administrator's action; reinstate the officer to his position; or table for review.

Alderman Diane Robnett moved to table for study, Alderman Virgil Woodfin seconded, and the vote was

unanimous.

The next regularly-scheduled meeting of the council is Sept. 14.

Another public hearing was held with Francis George, representing the Friends of the Library, who asked the council if members had plans to landscape the library grounds and do more maintaining.

Hunter said he had asked a nursery firm in Wichita Falls to make a proposal, emphasizing selections of plants that do not require special and frequent attention, in order to hold down cost of operation.

He added that more money had been included in the new budget than last year.

Mrs. George also asked about the lights in the fountain being out, and that a sidewalk be built on the east side of the building.

Ordinances were approved complying with federal requirements for flood insurance and changing part of the employee holiday pay plan.

Approval was also given to appoint Robnett to a joint drug task force of city and school people.

Two resolutions were read by the mayor. One establishes Sept. 18 as Air Force Day in Iowa Park, as the U.S. Air Force celebrates its 40th year as a separate service. The other designates Sept. 16 as "A Celebration of Citizenship Day" in the community, in observance of the signing of the national constitution.

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Valley View school going on sale block

Iowa Park school trustees voted during a called meeting Tuesday night to offer the Valley View School for sale.

Additional information on the building and its costs will be brought out when the board holds its regular monthly meeting at 7:30 p.m. Tuesday in the administration building.

A report on the deed to the land and on insurance coverage and costs are to be made Tuesday.

Trustees, in their meeting this week, heard a report from chairman Jimmy Howell, himself a resident of Valley View, who had toured the facility and posed a discussion of whether it should be used instead of adding onto buildings here to house the current growth of enrollment.

He pointed out that there were areas of maintenance, both preventative and corrective, needed if the district intends to retain ownership.

A leaking roof has caused some damage, but has been fixed, he reported. And he did not feel mowing the grounds but twice in a year was adequate, suggesting fencing and grazing the growth might be a solution.

A tentative study of cost to reopen, staff and operate the campus would be in the area of \$250,000 per year, trustees were told.

Trustee Martha Dudley said the same money, spread out over a few years, would take care of additional classroom construction and staffing here in town.

She also recalled that there were a number of complaints from parents of students who were bussed to the Valley View campus a few years ago when middle school classes were held there.

When a proposal that the building be listed for sale was offered, the vote was unanimous.

Trustee John Sibley said, considering the cost of insurance coverage and maintenance, the district would be better off, if the facility does not sell, to lease it at a very low sum to someone who would agree to keep it maintained.

Supt. Glen Mitchell told the board the district will need three more classrooms next year to meet the mandated 22-1 student-teacher ratio.

He said three more rooms will be needed for the third grade and one for the fourth, but one less for the fifth grade.

"If we were to build three more rooms, we should be in good shape," he said.

In other business Tuesday, trustees approved the transfer of a City View student who's name was left off a previously-approved list.

Next week's meeting agenda calls for a study of various options to meet classroom needs, transportation and cafeteria reports, tax report and reports from the four campus principals.

Cost of living goes up

The cost of living in Iowa Park and its school district went up slightly this week, when the new year's tax rates were set.

Both entities increased their rates one cent above last year's.

The city council approved a new rate of .80557 per \$100 value, and also increased water and sewer rates, as well as dumping fees for the landfill.

The city's budget was also approved at \$2,468,000.

Iowa Park school district taxpayers will have a rate this year of 76-cents to fund a budget of \$5,759,841.

The vote of the trustees was unanimous. In fact, there was no one at Tuesday's called meeting except board members, school personnel and the press.

Former mayor Johnny Crawford attended Monday's meeting, when the tax rate and budget were voted on, and after asking questions concerning the budget, its format and several expenditures, asked to be on record as opposing the budget and service rate increases.

With the exception of the voting on the sewer rate increase, aldermen were unanimous in their voting. Virgil Woodfin voted in opposition to the new sewer rate, without comment.

The city's budget calls for expenditures of \$1,444,000 from the general fund, \$862,000 water and sewer, \$94,000 to pay general obligation bonds and \$68,000 for payment on revenue bonds.

The city's budget estimates the year-end carryover will be \$600,000, which is also estimated to be the carryover from this year.

"I feel like you (city) have enough money to not have to raise taxes by one cent and also raise rates for sewer, water and already raising trash rates," Crawford told the

council.

After pointing out the council has been working and studying the proposed budget since April, Mayor Tim Hunter told Crawford, "I pay the same taxes and services. I have to be concerned about the little old lady and the effect they have on her. I've talked with a great many people, and what I have heard is basically most of them want (what we are doing)."

The new water rates include:

Generally - \$5.76 (was \$4.80) first 2,000 gallons, minimum; \$2.30 (was \$1.92) per 1,000, all over 2,000.

Outside city - \$24.48 first 2,000 gallons, minimum; \$5.54 per 1,000, all over 2,000.

The fee for dumping at the landfill was kept basically the same for in-city residents, but was doubled for non-city residents and businesses.

Enrollment figures up

Iowa Park schools continue to show increases in enrollment, according to first-day figures reported to the administration, and relayed to the board of trustees Tuesday night.

There were 28 more students who reported for class Tuesday than the first day of the 1986-87 year.

The major gains were in the two elementary schools, where Kidwell reported 472 students (up 16), and Bradford 412 (up 12).

The junior high was down two from last year's 399, and the high school was up two, 545, making the district's total 1,826.

First-day enrollment last year was 1,798.

But administrators believe there are still more yet to enroll, knowing some parents keep their children out of class until after the Labor Day holiday, despite state law.

Iowa Park enrollment hit its lowest in a number of years at the start of the 1984-85 year, when only 1,753 students enrolled. That figure increased to 1,775 the following year.

The district's first-day enrollment reached its highest point since the start of the 1980-81 year, when 1,916 students reported for classes.

Kidwell enrollment included 10 students in special education and early childhood, 147 kindergarten, 140 first grade and 175 second grade.

Bradford's enrollment included 136 third grade, 126 fourth grade and 150 fifth grade.

At the junior high, there were 121 in the sixth grade, 137 seventh grade and 139 eighth grade.

High school classes included 134 freshmen, 130 sophomores, 145 juniors and 136 seniors.

Season's park finale tonight

The final event in the "Summer In The Park" series, which will include plenty of music, will begin at 6 p.m. tonight at the park behind city hall, and is expected to be an evening of fun.

The evening will begin with music by the Friendly Door Rhythm Band, to be followed by the Red River Blue Grass Band.

During this time, members of the Friendly Door will be selling old-fashioned homemade ice cream and baked goods.

Three contestants thus far have entered the fiddlers contest.

Hawks open season here against Burk Friday

The two-a-days are over, as are the scrimmages, and tomorrow night at 8 the 1987 football seasons opens in Hawk Stadium with one of the area's oldest rivalries.

A capacity crowd is expected to be on hand when Iowa Park's Hawks host the Bulldogs of Burk Burnett.

And if the rivalry, which has been going on since the two schools

began fielding athletic teams, and the season-opening weren't enough, there are two other factors that are expected to have the players and the fans built to an unusual height.

Mean Green fans, with memories of last year's opener loss (14-6) to the Bulldogs, in a season that saw their favorites advance all the way to the state quarter-finals, are anxious to see what an almost completely new

team of starters has to offer.

And Burk Burnett fans, especially those who have been on former head coach Pat Smiley's back several years, want to see what new mentor Jerry Watson has developed.

Returning only two offensive starters and three defensive regulars from last year, hardly any of this year's Hawk team saw action against the Bulldogs last year.

But while they lack experience as starters, and probably have less speed than last year, the Hawks have unusual size and quickness, as well as depth in most positions.

Actually, most of Iowa Park's team this year saw considerable action last year, even though the players weren't starters. Several who were on the junior varsity gained valuable experience in the playoff games, after having been called up to the varsity.

Turnovers last year proved to be Iowa Park's major downfall, when the Hawks coughed up three fumbles and an interception in a game where the breaks played a big part in the outcome.

The new Burk mentor was hired from a similar post at Ranger Junior College, and has promised to put the ball in the air, in order to give his lightweight players an edge on their opponents.

Eventhough he's only a junior, 'Dog quarterback Rob Johnson is back for a second season at the helm.

His passing record last year was not all that impressive, however, completing only 16 of 56 attempts for 348 yards. Against the Hawks, he connected on only one of nine attempts, a 34-yarder, and had one interception.

Last year's Bulldog win broke a string of two victories by the Hawks.

A great number of people, who might not have ever taken the opportunity, got a look at our community Saturday.

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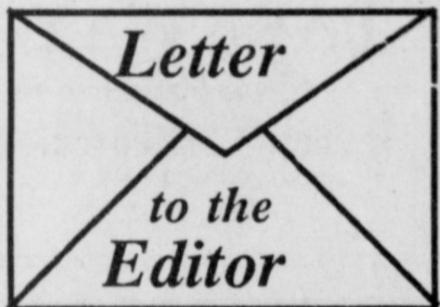
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Says he's innocent

Nation-wide broadcast bumped by Cowboy game

While television viewers across the nation will be watching a feature about an Iowa Park church and its leaders Sunday morning, local viewers will have to settle for football.

Normally, "CBS Sunday Morning" is on the schedule for 9:30 a.m.,

but it's been bumped locally for "NFL Football, Oilers at Cowboys."

A crew from Sunday Morning with Charles Kuralt spent most of last Saturday and Sunday in Iowa Park and Electra, filming the story of Rev. Mr. Patrick Burke, pastor of Christ the King Catholic Church, as

well as the Catholic church at Electra.

But it was not known until after the crew had left that the feature

would not be shown locally, according to Burke.

Because of the Pope's upcoming visit to the United States, CBS felt the unusual story of the local pastor would be of interest to viewers.

Burke is one of only seven deacons in the Catholic Church in the United States directing a congregation, instead of an ordained priest. He has been here four years, and is believed to be the only non-priest pastoring a Catholic Church in Texas.

Sixty percent of the 8,000 deacons in the world are in the United States, Burke said.

Deacons were reinstated, after being non-existent since the year 1100, in 1967 by Pope Paul VI.

Producer of the television program, Estelle Popkin, and a crew of two men interviewed Mr. and Mrs. Steve Catlin, and then Burke, Saturday. Sunday, they went with Burke to Electra where they interviewed Marye Bentley for the program.

While such filmings are made by crews not knowing when their product would be shown, this particular production was being made with the

knowledge of it being programmed next Sunday.

Burke said some residents with satellite receivers might possibly be able to pick up the program Sunday, but it would not be aired locally because of the football program.

He said he was going to request a copy of the film from CBS, so he and others here wanting to see it could see how the interviews came out.

The star of the program, Kuralt, did not come here to make the filmed interview himself.

Burke, his wife and their two children, are looking forward to next week. He said they will be in New Orleans, where the Pope will be Sept. 11-12, and they have tickets for most of his appearances.

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How do you return unwanted purchases?

REFUNDS, EXCHANGES

Every time a sale is made there is an agreement between a buyer and a seller.

Refunds and exchanges of merchandise are actually changes in the agreement that has been effected between buyer and seller.

A store is not obligated to accept items for refund, exchange or credit except in cases where the item is defective or was misrepresented.

Returning the product is generally a privilege rather than a right. An exception to this rule is the three-day "cooling-off-period" allowed for purchasers of merchandise from door-to-door sales representatives.

Return policies vary from store to store with some stores having "no return" or "final sale" policies. The customer should be sure to inquire about a store's return policy before making a purchase. The Better Business Bureau suggests that stores post their return policies for customers to see.

Many stores have voluntarily set up policies to encourage you to shop with them, not because a store is so compelled by any law. Three types of return policies are:

Exchange - the item may be returned and another item of the same kind may be taken in its place.

Return for Credit - on return of the purchased item, the customer is given a credit slip. Then, the customer may apply that amount to the purchase of any other items in the store.

Refund - under this policy, the customer's money is returned. This is the store's way of assuring its customers that they will gain satisfaction when shopping there. These policies usually require that the goods be returned within a specified time period and be in new condition. Most will require a receipt.

Some products purchased in stores have written warranties which state what a customer should do if anything is wrong with a product. You should read the warranty on a product before returning it to the store to find out if you are required to mail the product to the manufacturer, or to take it to a particular place other than the store where you bought it.

For some items, and sometimes even for all merchandise in some stores, the policy may be that all sales are final. Retailers have every right to do this, but the policy should be clear and "final-sale" items should be clearly identified or advertised. Expect this policy for seasonal merchandise, floor models and for intimate apparel or swimwear which should be worn or used by only one person.

Some shoppers shop casually and return merchandise purchased on impulse, causing an unnecessary amount of sales time and paperwork, both of which are expensive for the store. Naturally, these extra costs are passed on to the customer, increasing the cost of all merchandise in the store to all customers. It also causes some retailers to adopt less liberal return policies that they might otherwise use.

If you find that you tend to return merchandise regularly, it is probably a good idea to ask yourself whether or not you are taking advantage of a store's liberal return policy. Exercise good judgement whenever you buy. In the long run it will undoubtedly save you time, aggravation and embarrassment -- as well as money.

Call the Better Business Bureau of North Central Texas for pamphlets for both merchants and customers on "Refunds and Exchanges" and for information on "Refund Policy Posters" for stores.

Wheat growers are reminded that Sept. 30 is the last day to apply for crop insurance on fall seeded grain crops of wheat, oats and barley in Texas, according to Bruce Hotel, district director of the USDA's Federal Crop Insurance Corporation.

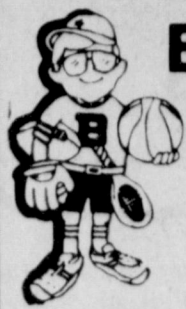

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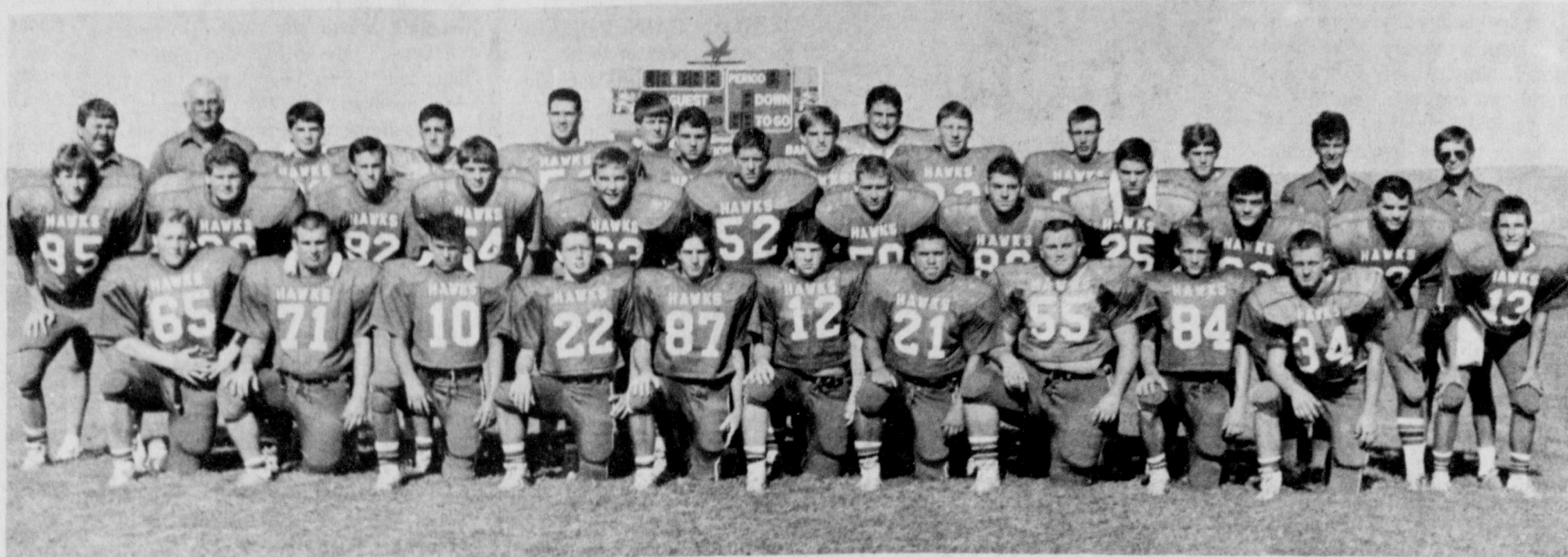

Hawks dominating in final scrimmage

On paper, the Hawks weren't dominating in the second and final preseason scrimmage held Friday at Olney.

The first teams were, on paper, very even. Eached scored twice and the yardage totals were about even.

But the Hawks were, in fact, dominating...except for three break-downs defensively.

The Mean Green amassed 242 total yards offensively, gaining 17 first downs.

Olney had a total of 224 yards on offense, but only eight first downs.

The major difference was that the Cubs broke for long yardage on three plays. Those three plays picked up 146 of their 224 yards gained.

In the first series, Iowa Park rushed for 91 yards and added 16 more passing. Then, in their second series, they worked on their aerial game,

gaining 102 yards passing and only 33 rushing.

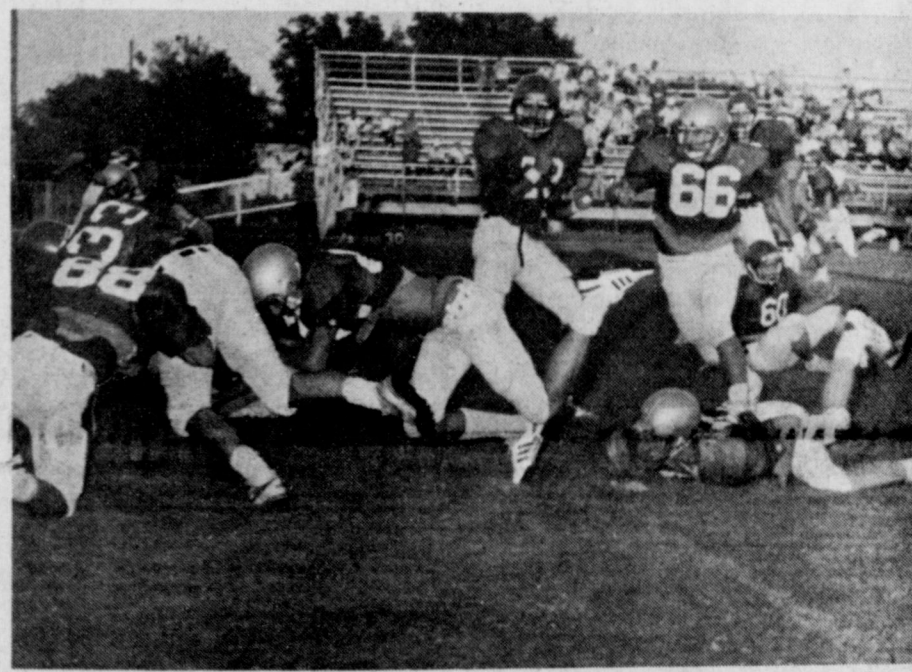
Olney's 111 yards rushing in the first series was primarily on two big plays: 31 and 50 yards.

Of the 80 yards gained passing in the second series, 65 came on one play, when the secondary broke down in coverage and allowed a receiver to catch and run without a Hawk being nearer than 10 yards. Olney added 19 more yards rushing that series.

Like their previous scrimmage with Holliday, Iowa Park's depth in reserves proved superior.

The second unit outgained their hosts 167-21 rushing, 32-29 passing, 7-4 in first downs and 2-1 scoring.

Commenting to his players after the scrimmage, Head Coach David Baugh said, "We didn't do real good, but didn't do real bad. We did not play with enough intensity."

Two new producers have been brought on line in Wichita County's Tricore Field, with Tri Core Oil & Gas of Irving as the operator.

The Nos. 52 and 53 Dickinson are located three miles north-northeast and 1.5 miles northeast of Clara, respectively. Drillsites are in a 79-acre lease in the Specht Colony Land S/D Survey, Blk. 19.

The No. 52 well pumped 36 barrels of oil per day, while the No. 53 well pumped 28 barrels of oil per day. Total drilling depths were 1,684 and 1,688 feet, respectively. Production will be from perforations in the Gunsight Formation, ranging from 1,533 to 1,575 feet into the wellbore.
