Iowa Parkan killed in copter crash

Lt. Col. William Charles Whittingstall of Iowa Park was killed early Saturday morning in an Army helicopter crash.

Whittingstall, 40, was among six soldiers from the First Cavalry Div. at Fort Hood who died in the accident which took place in the Mojave Desert of California. The troops had completed a three-

week training exercise at Fort Irwin National Training Center and were to return to Texas Sunday.

The soldiers were aboard a UH-60 Blackhawk when it went down at 4 a.m., 14 miles northeast of the main garrison.

No reason has yet been released as to what caused the crash. Whittingstall, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Whittingstall of

Iowa Park, was graduated from Iowa Park High School in 1966 and Midwestern State Univ., with a BS degree in economics, in 1971.

At MSU, he was a member of the Phi Sigma Kappa fraternity and was Cadet Corps commander of the ROTC unit there. He was commissioned an Army officer upon graduation.

Kamay resident dies after gunshot wound

Lt. Walter T. "Tommy" Collins of the Wichita Falls Police Dept. died Tuesday afternoon in Bethania Hospital, following surgery to repair damage after being shot.

Collins is a long-time resident of the Kamay community, and the father in law of Leader reporter Kari Collins.

His death came less than an hour following a three-hour-long surgery which was performed in the cardiac department of the hospital.

Collins had been shot in the upper right arm with a .30-.30 hunting rifle, allegedly fired by Dan Fowler, 37.

Because he had undergone heart surgery some nine years ago, as well as having lost considerable blood in the shooting, at least three specialists were in attendance during the procedure.

Collins was one of three police officers shot by Fowler in the area of the Ben Donnell Housing Project on East Wichita Street shortly after 11 a.m.

The other officers were William "Steve" Pruitt, shot in the right shoulder and admitted to Bethania, and Don Gossett, shot in the left leg but treated and released to go home.

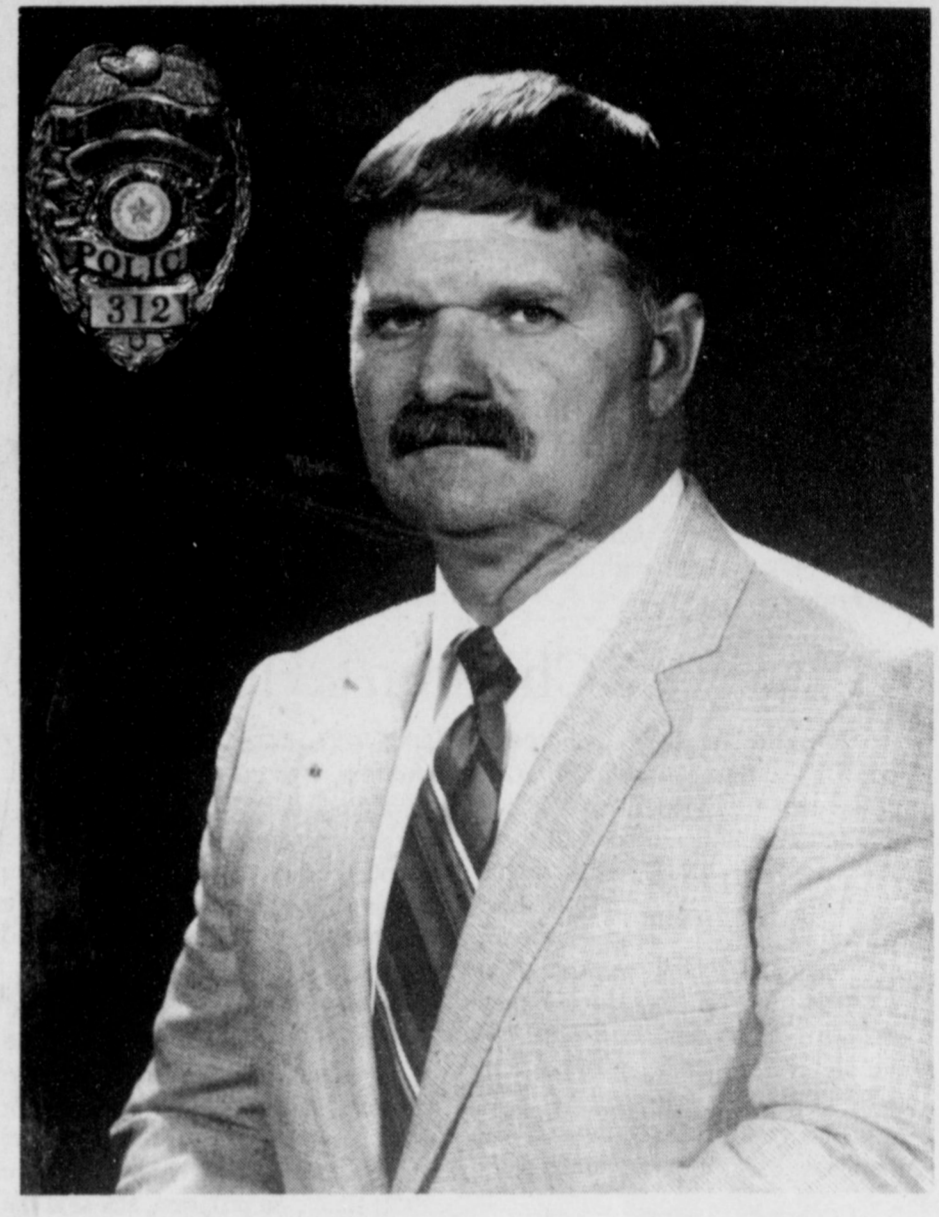
Fowler reportedly had become angered at noise two repairmen were making while working on one of the apartment units. He lives in a mobile home about 150 feet from it.

Fowler threatened the workers, who called for police. Pruitt was the first to arrive, alone in his vehicle, but was backed up by Collins and Gossett.

Fowler began shooting after being told to lay down his rifle, wounding all three officers. He was struck by one of the officers' returned fire, but it is not yet known who fired the shot.

Officers from every agency in Wichita Falls converged on the site when help was signaled for by one of the wounded policemen.

In addition, virtually every department, city and county, in the area volunteered additional help to assist in finding Fowler, who had run off in heavy woods that adjoined his home. Iowa Park had nine officers on

call, awaiting word from the command center which was set up at the scene of the shooting.

A fixed wing airplane and two helicopters aided in the search, as officers, some with dogs, combed not only the immediate area but the entire area in every direction.

Additionally, vehicles traveling away from that neighborhood were observed by officers, to make sure Fowler was not a passenger.

Fowler was sighted by officers in one of the helicopters, furnished by the Department of Public Safety, on a small island in the Wichita River, near the wastewater treatment plant. He did not have his rifle with

him which taken into custody. Wichita Falls Chief Curtis Harrelson was notified by his portable radio at the housing area, at 4:22 p.m., that Fowler was in custody.

Fowler was flown directly to the DPS office on I-44 and then transported to Bethania for treatment of his gunshot wound.

He arrived there about the same time a surgeon was meeting with Collins family.

Following surgery, Collins was taken to the Intensive Care Unit to recover and was later to be transferred to a room in the cardiac ward.

He became the fifth Wichita Falls officer to die in the line of duty since 1933.

Burglary solved, but no charges

Though police have solved the July 18 burglary of Golden Fried Chicken and have admissions by four young men, no charges will be filed against them, according to Chief Alan Sheffield.

The four, all recent graduates of Iowa Park High School, admitted to having conspired to enter the building through a window they had broken, and taking the firm's bank bags.

They also admitted to planning a "diversion" by breaking a window in

a residence, to occupy the attention of police.

The window was broken, but the residents failed to hear it.

That worked about as well as did the snatching of the five bank bags. They were all empty.

No charges will be filed by Mickey Boulware, manager, because the parents of the young men paid for his damage and also for the window of the home, Sheffield said.

City bails Chamber out of money hole

The city council responded to a request Monday night from the Iowa Park Chamber of Commerce, for financial help.

After aldermen unofficially said they supported the Chamber's call for help, Administrator James Barrington was instructed to prepare a check in the amount of \$1,200.

Kenneth Via, Chamber president, appeared before the council to explain the organization's financial plight.

He said the problem primarily was two-fold: businesses not paying their membership dues, and abnormal expenses incurred the previous year, when Iowa Park observed its 100th anniversary.

"We just need some help," Via stated.

At the end of June, the Chamber's bank balance was \$103.39. But that was bolstered when a fund of \$851 was discovered in the local savings and loan business which had been left over from the sale of games which related to the Sesquicentennial observance of Texas.

After telling the council dues outstanding through July were \$920, Via said "Some may come in, but a lot probably will not. We're in a business slump."

As a basis for his request for help from the city, Via said other chambers either receive funds from a local hotel-motel tax, or outright

funding from their municipalities.

"We have a small business community. Lots of service but small business. We have no way of forcing people to join," he elaborated.

After different council members suggested the Chamber become more active in raising funds through various projects, Via said those plans were already being made, as well as launching another membership drive.

"You need to take a serious look at programs and projects to raise revenue and you need some change in attitudes," Mayor Tim Hunter said.

There was no discussion of whether the city's contribution would be for one year or to be budgeted annually.

OTHER BUSINESS

Another organization, Highland Cemetery Association, has previously requested the council to consider funding the operation of that facility.

At the suggestion of Alderman Bud Mercer, council members agreed to offer collection of small monthly donations from citizens, attaching it to the monthly utility bill.

The suggestion has been highly successful in collecting funds to buy Christmas decorations. It is allowed by residents on a voluntary basis, and raises \$220-\$230 monthly, Barrington said.

When initiated, residents will be notified of their opportunity to allow

the 10-cent-per-month assessment.

The residents can call city hall and have the assessment discontinued or even increase the amount, which many have done for the Christmas decorations, Barrington explained.

The proposal was approved by a unanimous vote of aldermen.

Also approved was a request of the Iowa Park Trap Club to construct a permanent building at Lake Iowa Park.

The project was explained by Alderman Bud Mercer, who is a member of the organization and abstained from the voting.

He said the structure, which would serve as a club house, would be 30x60 feet, with wood framing and covered with metal.

Other business and actions taken by the council included:

* approved a proposal to advertise for bids to paint the relocated water tower;

* approved a resolution to accept a new contract with Lifeline Ambulance to serve the community, at a slightly-reduced subsidy rate;

* set Aug. 7 for a budget workshop session;

* voted to retain Greg Lynn on the 9-1-1 board of directors;

* approved funds for Barrington to attend a legislation update session at Denton.

Workload grows for police

"I keep thinking things will slow down some, but they just keep increasing," commented Iowa Park Police Chief Alan Sheffield.

While officers are busy patrolling homes while residents are away on vacation, the department this past week received complaints of six thefts, two cases of hit and run, three criminal mischief and one cruelty to animals.

Among the thefts reported were two lawnmowers. The first was reported Thursday from the 800 block of S. Yosemite, and the other Saturday in the 400 block of W. Texas.

Three thefts and an apparent attempted theft that was reported as a criminal mischief, took place in the same neighborhood, in the west part of town.

Three of the reports were received Monday. They included a car stereo and equalizer in the 800 block

of Park Plaza, an equalizer and five keys from a car in the 1300 block of Mockingbird, and a purse from a car in the 700 block of Mockingbird.

Tuesday, the owner of a car in

the 1300 block of Bluejay discovered the vehicle's stereo knobs and screws had been removed, but nothing was

Officers of the Iowa Park Police Dept. are openly frustrated with a situation concerning juveniles in a neighborhood, but admit their hands are tied until they can legally act.

Chief Alan Sheffield said the neighborhood includes Mockingbird, Bluejay, Park Plaza and Edgell.

He suggests the residents of the neighborhood secure their property and help watch out for each other, until some legal action can be taken.

At least four complaints listed on this week's police blotter are attributed to the youths, Sheffield believes.

He added his department is receiving little or no help from parents of the youngsters.

Problems have existed in that neighborhood over the past two years, but have become alarmingly more numerous during the past few weeks.

Members of the 23 Study Club met for a "Summer Cooler" at the home of Mrs. China B. Smith to honor a new member, Mrs. Charles Harrell.

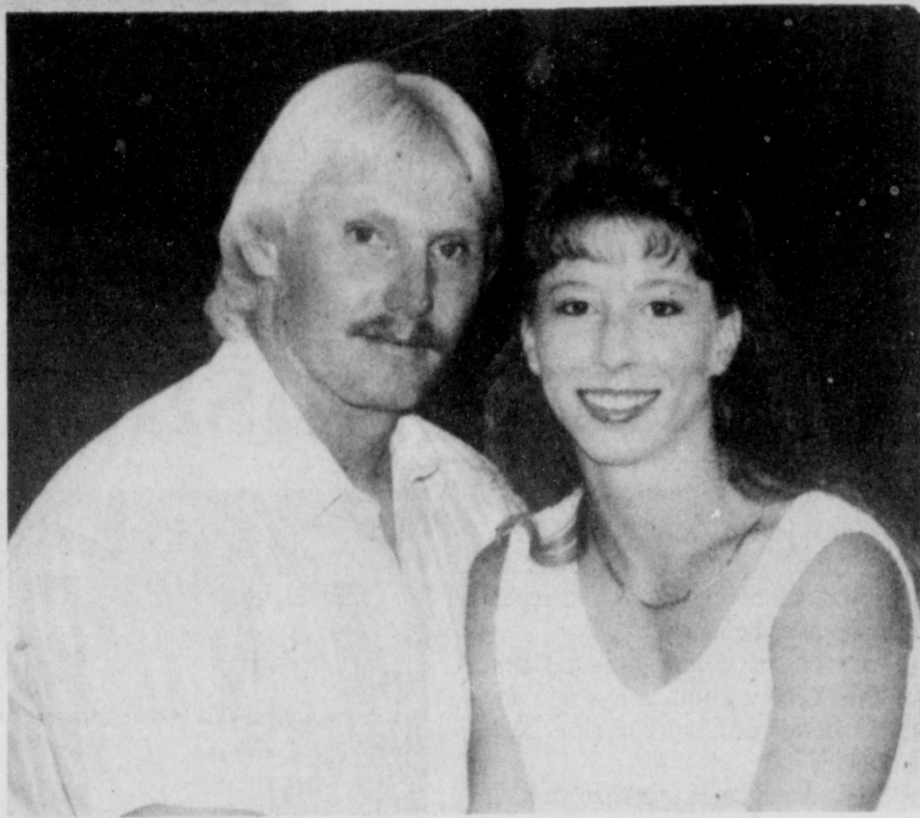
Mrs. Ernest Soell was co-hostess.

History of Children's Home told

Jim and Pat King, a husband and wife team, presented the program for the evening Lions Tuesday. They were introduced by Gordon Callahan.

Mrs. King, administrator of the Children's Aid Society gave a short history of the Children's Home in Wichita Falls which originated in 1912 as the Fowler Home, then became the Children's Home in 1949 and its present home was built in 1973.

She said it was structured for short time care and the average daily

attendance for last year was 19 children, who are abused, neglected, unwanted, or leave home to get out of an unhappy environment. She stated the home was funded by the Texas Department of Human Resources, Wichita County and United Way.

Mrs. King expressed a special concern for the teenagers who come to the home. She said that they were confused and looking for something which had often led them to dope, alcohol and cult worship. Under the short time care program, she said the home kept the children 30 days and longer in some cases, then placed them in foster homes or under the care of Child Protective Services if they could not be returned to their own homes.

King, who is supervisor of Code Enforcement Department of Wichita Falls, said his duties involved the conservation of neighborhoods, for the crime elements were using the deteriorating neighborhoods to plan their work. He said most of the children in the Children's Home where his wife worked came from the run down neighborhoods.

John Fouce of Burkburnett was a guest. Joe Kennedy conducted the business.

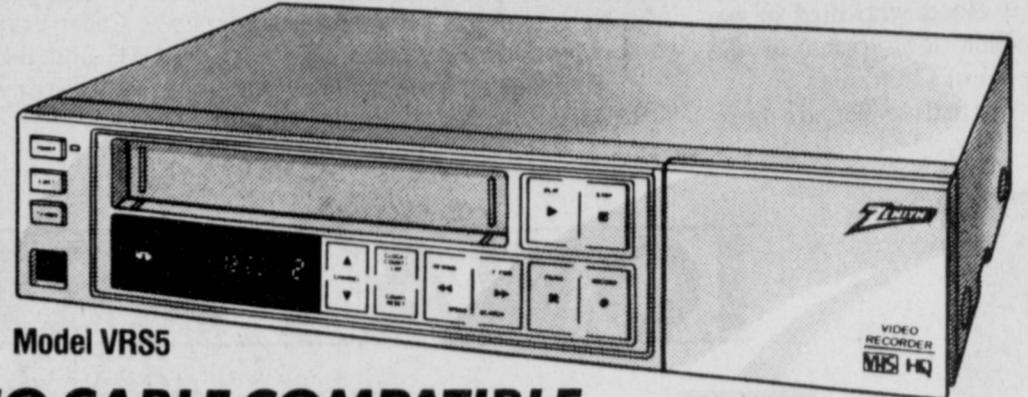

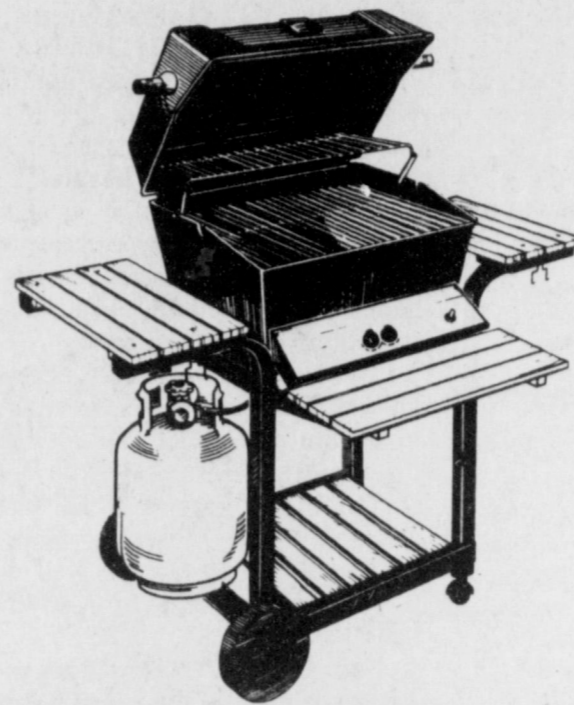

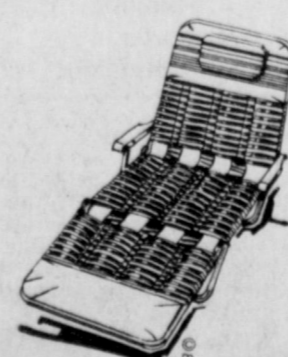

Residents of our community are still staggering to recover from the loss of two of its own within a short, four-day time frame.

Both of them had dedicated their lives to our protection.

I speak of Lt. Walter T. "Tommy" Collins of the Wichita Falls Police Dept., and Lt. Col. William

Charles Whittingstall of the U.S. Army.

Reports of both losses are on the front page of this issue.

I knew them both. But of course, I knew Collins much better, because his son, Joe Tom, is the husband of our youngest daughter, Kari.

As I said, both had dedicated their lives to the protection of us. Collins was a veteran of 31 years police work, and Whittingstall 18 years.

Both were good men and true professionals. They'll be sorely missed.

New conservation program offered

The Conservation Reserve Program is a voluntary USDA program designed to conserve the nation's soil and water resources by taking highly-erodible land out of crop production.

In addition, the program is ex-

pected to improve water quality in streams and rivers, curb production of surplus commodities, and enhance fish and wildlife habitat.

"The Conservation Reserve Program has the potential of greatly im-

proving wildlife habitat conditions throughout Texas over the next few years," says Michael Isbell, district conservationist in Wichita County.

"Landowners can further benefit wildlife by providing for specific wildlife needs when planning and implementing this program," he said.

Landowners who sign up for CRP enter into a 10-year agreement with the U.S. Department of Agriculture. The agreement carries explicit obligations for both parties.

The landowner agrees to establish and maintain permanent vegetative cover on his CRP land for the 10-year period.

The USDA guarantees that the landowner will receive rental payments for the 10 years, as well as 50 percent cost-sharing for cover establishment.

During the 10-year contract, CRP lands may not be grazed or hayed, but hunting is permitted. Access rights to hunt can be leased for additional farm income, or the landowner can reserve rights for family and invited guests.

Some CRP participants may prefer to simply see and enjoy additional wildlife.

"If you would like to improve wildlife habitat on your land through a CRP contract, it is important to identify the most important wildlife needs in your area and select approved conservation practices most likely to satisfy those needs," says Isbell.

The signup for CRP will be through Aug. 4 at the local ASCS office.

Worth Quoting

I'm told that some people didn't like the tongue-in-cheek, trade-at-home sermon I delivered a couple weeks ago in this space. A much larger number, however, said they agreed with me.

Bogus advertising warning

The State Firemen's and Fire Marshals' Association of Texas, the State Fire Marshals' Office and the Texas State Association of Fire Fighters are joining forces to warn Texas' communities of telephone solicitors claiming to represent firefighters.

In an apparent state-wide telemarketing campaign, individuals claiming to represent the Firefighters of Texas have been calling on area businesses trying to sell ads in a fire service publication.

It has been reported that when businesses decline the callers have become aggressive and unpleasant.

According to David Cox, executive director of the State Firemen's and Fire Marshals' Association, the two largest-circulation fire service publications in Texas are not involved.

"Our magazine, *Texas Firemen*,

is not involved and I know the firefighters' union publication, *The Texas Fire Fighter*, is not involved either.

"Fire departments are easy targets for this kind of fraud because so many of them depend heavily on fund-raising and donations," Cox said.

Union representative Mike Higgins said this problem is not new for the Texas fire service.

"We've had this problem in the past. This current operation is not part of any of our 70 affiliated local unions, or any of the other state organizations we're aware of. Such practices destroy the public's confidence in the fire service," Higgins said.

State Fire Marshal Ernest Emerson said he hopes anyone receiving these calls will check them out.

"The sad truth is that the firefighters of this state have spent years

building a relationship with their communities based on confidence and trust. I only hope anyone receiving calls like this will check them out with their local fire department," he said.

According to the state attorney general's office, although not uncommon, these practices are definitely illegal.

Anyone receiving such calls who feel they have been misled in any way can file a complaint with that office by writing: State Attorney General of Texas, Consumer Protection Division, Box 12548, Austin, Tx., 78711.

The Wimbledon Tennis Championships have just been decided or 1989. Maybe that's why the following article by Erma Bombeck caught my attention. She is usually very humorous, but this article really penetrates.

"On the first Saturday of last month a 22 year old U.S. tennis player hoisted a silver bowl over his head at center court at Wimbledon. On the day before, five blind mountain climbers, one man with an artificial leg, an epileptic, and two deaf adventurers stood atop the snow-capped summit of Mt. Ranier. It was a noisy victory for the tennis player who shared it with 14,000 fans, some of whom had slept on the sidewalks outside the club for six night waiting for tickets. It was a quiet victory for the climbers who led their own cheering. There was a lot of rhetoric exchanged at Wimbledon regarding bad calls. At Mt. Ranier they learned to live with life's bad calls a long time ago. In our search for heroes and heroines we often lose our perspective. Hero is a term that should be awarded to those who, given a set of circumstances, react with courage, dignity, decency, and compassion - people who make us feel better by having seen or touched them. I think the crowds went to the wrong summit and cheered the wrong champion."

We Americans worship the false god of wealth, power, and prestige. True success has more to do with how you treat people than how they treat you. Real success is more an issue of how God views you than how other people view you. Success is more a matter of inner qualities than external circumstances.

No doubt, before his death, the rick man in Luke 16 would have been labeled a success by most of us. Eternity gives us another perspective. Let's be careful to cheer the right champions!

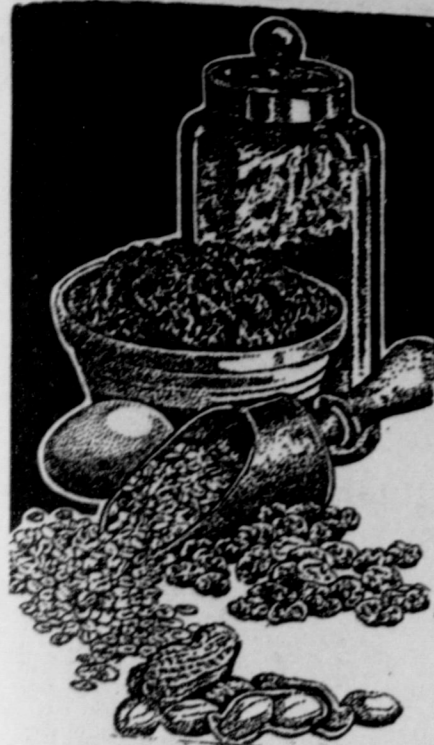

whip. Blend until smooth and spread over cake.

Step 3: 1 small box instant chocolate pudding, 1 small box instant vanilla pudding, 1 tsp. vanilla, 2 1/2 cups milk. Blend until all lumps are out and spread over cheese layer.

Step 4: Spread remainder of large container Cool Whip on top of pudding layer.

Grate large Hershey bar on top and refrigerate overnight before serving.

PEACH COBBLER

Crust:
2 cups flour
1 tsp. salt
3/4 cup shortening (Crisco)
5 Tbsp. cold water

Cut shortening into flour and salt. When well blended, add water and mix until dough forms a ball. Roll half of dough very thin and cut in strips. Line bottom of 9x13 pan with strips.

Filling:
1 quart peaches, peeled and sliced
Water
2 cups sugar, (sweeter peaches may require less sugar)
1 stick butter or margarine cut into pats.
Dash cinnamon

Pour peaches into saucepan. Add water to fill pan bottom to 1 inch. Add sugar and cook peaches until

tender and syrup forms. Remove from heat and add butter; stir until melted. Add cinnamon.

Fill pastry-lined pan with fruit and syrup (do not fill to top of pan, or cobbler will boil over). Roll out remaining pastry and cut into 2 inch strips. Cover fruit with pastry strips. Seal upper and lower crusts. Sprinkle lightly with sugar. Bake in 400 degree oven 30-40 minutes, or until pastry is golden brown. Very good!

CAJUN CRAP

In heavy iron skillet chop 3 celery stalks in small chunks and one medium sized onion. Cook slowly in a little oil until this is tender.

Add one package frozen broccoli (thawed) and one can of mushroom soup and let simmer about 10 minutes, stirring often.

Then add one jar Cheese Whiz and cook slowly about 15 minutes, stir often. Last add one cup cooked rice to this mess and simmer about 30 minutes, stirring often. (Do not let it stick). Serve hot or cold.

You can add a little salt and pepper to the mixture before adding rice, but not too much salt as it is not needed.

FRENCH FRIED ZUCCHINI

3/4 cup unsifted all purpose flour
1 tsp. salt

1/4 tsp. garlic powder
1/8 tsp. pepper
3/4 cup beer, at room temperature
2 eggs, separated
2 Tbsp. salad oil
3 medium (1 lb.) zucchini
Salad oil for frying (I use peanut oil)

In medium bowl combine flour, salt, garlic powder and pepper. In small bowl combine beer, egg yolks and salad oil. Add to dry ingredients

and stir just until combined (batter will be somewhat lumpy). Cover with plastic wrap, set aside 45 minutes. Meanwhile, cut zucchini into 2 1/2 x 1/4 in. julienne strips; set aside. Beat egg whites until stiff; fold into batter.

In large saucepan or deep-fat fryer heat 1 inch oil to 375 degrees on deep fat thermometer. Add zucchini a few at a time to batter. Stir to coat well. Then add a few at a time to hot oil. Fry, turning until golden brown. Remove with slotted spoon. Drain on paper towels. Makes 4 servings, 260 calories each.

ZUCCHINI BREAD

3 beaten eggs
1 cup cooking oil
2 cups sugar (or less)
2 cups grated zucchini
2 tsp. vanilla
3 cups flour
1 tsp. soda
1/2 tsp. baking powder
1 tsp. salt
2 tsp. cinnamon
1/2 cup chopped nuts (I use 2 cups)
Preheat oven to 325 degrees.
Grease and flour two loaf pans.

Beat eggs; add oil, sugar, zucchini and vanilla; add flour, soda, baking powder, salt, cinnamon and nuts. Bake 1 hour and 15 minutes.

VARIATIONS:
Add 1 small can crushed pineapple, not drained.
For chocolate zucchini, add 1/4 cup cocoa.

YELLOW SQUASH RELISH
12 cups grated yellow squash
4 cups grated onion
2 red and 2 green bell peppers
(You can substitute 2 large jars Pimentos for the red bell peppers.)

Mix and sprinkle 5 tablespoons salt over mixture and let stand over night. Wash with cold water and drain well. A colander is good for this. Boil 2 1/2 cups vinegar, 2 tsp. pickling spice, 1 tsp. celery seed and 1 tsp. tumeric. Strain mixture thru cheese cloth and add 5 cups sugar. Stir until it dissolves. Add vinegar mixture to grated squash and boil. Pack in jars and seal.

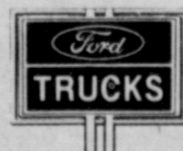

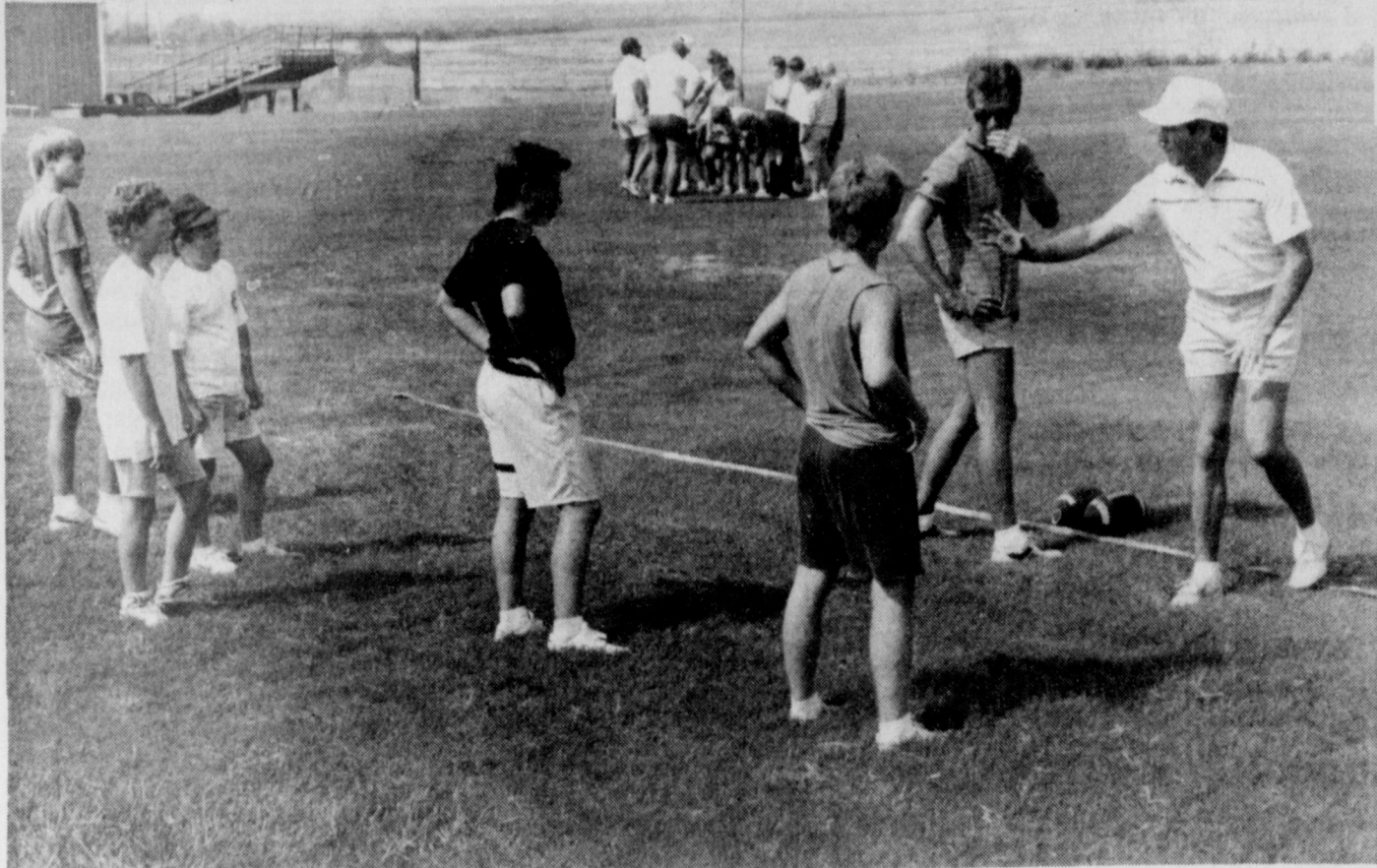

Carriker bill to help oil

A bill approved Thursday by the Texas senate will result in a needed and immediate boost to the state economy by moving up the effective date of Enhanced Oil Recovery legislation passed during the regular session.

A bill sponsored in the Senate by Steve Carriker and signed by the governor June 15, provides a 50 percent severance tax exemption for oil produced from new enhanced recovery techniques.

The legislation is aimed at recovering billions of barrels of oil still in the ground which can only be produced through enhanced recovery.

House Bill 40, also sponsored in the Senate by Carriker and passed on Thursday, moves the effective date of the enhanced oil legislation from Jan. 1, 1990, to Sept. 1 of this year.

"Many enhanced recovery projects have been on hold waiting for the new incentive to take effect," Carriker said.

The bill is headed to the governor for his signature.

According to the American Cancer Society, one out of ten women will develop breast cancer sometime in her lifetime. It is currently estimated that over 37,000 women die each year as result of breast cancer.

Ninety percent of breast cancers are diagnosed by women or their physicians finding a lump in the breast. Women who are diagnosed with a lump large enough to feel have a 50 percent five year survival rate. A woman who is diagnosed as having breast cancer by mammography, before a lump can be felt, has a 97% five year survival rate and a 90% 10 year survival rate. The cost is only \$60.

A mammogram can detect a cancer this small, even before it can be felt.



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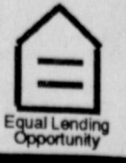
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Senior All-Stars' hopes still alive

Hunter course scheduled

The Texas Hunter Education Course will be offered at Henrietta, starting July 31, according to Lewis Simmons, instructor.

Simmons is a former reporter for the Iowa Park Leader and now editor of the Clay County Leader.

Persons interested in attending should pre-register by contacting Simmons at 538-4333. The class will be limited to the first 30 persons registering.

The course will be divided into four evening sessions taught from 6:30-9:30 July 31, Aug. 2-4 at the Henrietta schools administration building.

Cost is \$5, payable to the Texas Parks and Wildlife Dept. on the first night of class.

In order to gain certification, participants must attend all four sessions and successfully complete the examination.

Anyone may take the course, but certification is available only to per-

sons 12 years old and older. If a child younger than 12 takes the course, he must re-take the course after his 12th birthday to receive certification.

Texas is implementing mandatory requirements for the hunter education course. Beginning Sept 1, anyone whose date of birth is between Sept. 2, 1971, and Aug. 31, 1973, must have successfully completed the course to hunt in the state.

Many other states also require outdoorsmen to pass a hunter education course before being issued a hunting license. The course offered in Texas is recognized by all other states that have this requirement, Simmons said.

Understanding PMS... Premenstrual Syndrome

- Premenstrual syndrome (PMS) is a combination of physical and/or emotional symptoms experienced by some women before menstruation.
- Common PMS symptoms include headache, breast swelling or tenderness, bloating, weight gain, irritability, anxiety, fatigue, depression, food cravings, acne and constipation.
- It has been estimated that as many as 97% of women of childbearing age have some degree of PMS; 20-40% of these women have symptoms severe enough to interfere with their normal activities.
- The exact cause of PMS is unknown, but many researchers believe that it is related to the hormonal changes that accompany the menstrual cycle.

- Sufferers of PMS might also decrease symptoms by following some simple diet and exercise guidelines. Exercise moderately and regularly. Avoid excessive amounts of sugar, salt, caffeine, chocolate and alcoholic beverages.
- Extensive research on PMS is now underway. Women with this condition can expect better treatments to become available as the problem becomes more fully understood. Remember, PMS is not just "in your head."

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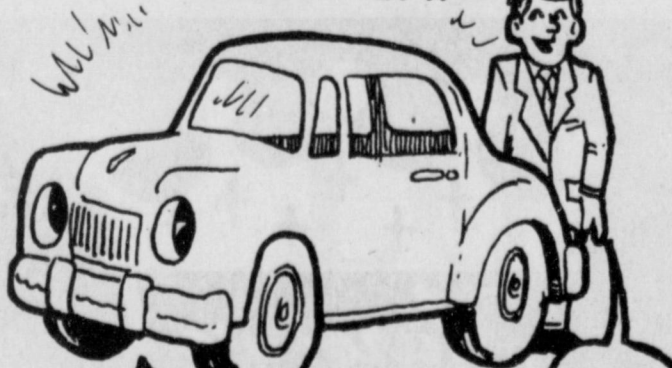
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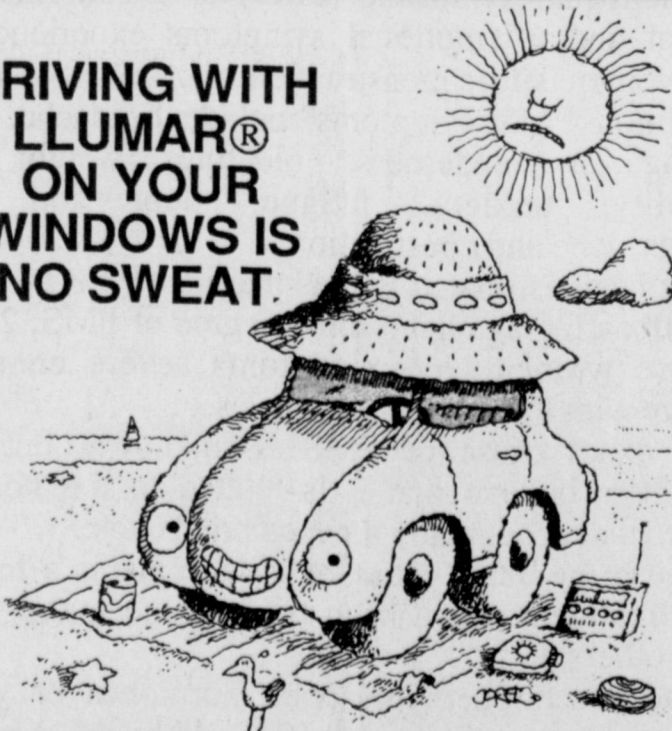

AREA OIL & GAS NEWS

The No. 90-A H. Reilly has been finalized by ATAPCO of Midland.

It is a developmental well in the Wichita County Regular Field. Drillsite is four miles west of Burkburnett. Location is in a 2,100-acre lease in the L.C. Dennison Survey.

Daily potential of five barrels of oil and 15 barrels of water was posted with the Railroad Commission. The well went to a 1,750-ft. bottom and will produce from perforations, 1,555 to 1,563 feet into the hole.

Scott, Stone & Stone of Holiday has filed first production figures on a new oil well in the Wichita County Regular Field. The No. 3 Jackson "A" showed potential to pump three barrels of oil and five barrels of water per day.

The operator has a lease with drillsite in the DCSL Survey, three miles northeast of Holiday. Production will be from perforations at 725 to 730 feet into the wellbore.

Three undrilled locations have been abandoned by Tri Core Oil & Gas of Irving at drillsites three miles north-northeast of Clara in Wichita County's Tricore Field. The ventures had been designated as the No. 10-B Dickinson, No. 1001 Kelly and the No. 1002 Kelly.

The No. 2 Andrews "B" has been finalized by Singleton Production Company of Iowa Park.

It is a developmental well in the North King Field, Wilbarger County. Drillsite is ten miles south of Vernon. Location is in a lease 1,136 feet from the east line and 425 feet from the north line of the H&TC RR Survey.

Daily potential of 36 barrels of oil plus 10 barrels of water was posted with the Railroad Commission. The well will produce from perforations 1,700 feet to 1,710 feet into the hole.

Drillsite has been staked for the No. 7 Fluhman "A", a developmental well in the Wilbarger County Regular Field. The operation will be located five miles south of Lockett in a lease 330 feet from the east line and 330 feet from the south line of the A. McKinney Survey A-1758. The operator is Wills Oil Company of Wichita Falls.

W.T. Waggoner Estate of Vernon is preparing to seek shallower pay at the No. 773 Fee "TE" in the Wilbarger County Regular Field. It is located two miles northwest of Electra in the M. McLaren #3 Survey. Location is 1,179 feet from the northwest line and 976 feet from the west line of the survey.

The No. 1-99 HBJV-Well, a 9,000-ft. wildcat well, is scheduled to be drilled in Hardeman County. Trio Operating Company Inc. of Wichita Falls is the operator. The well will be spudded in a lease five miles northeast of Quanah in the W&NW RR Survey. Location is 339 feet from the north line and 1,251 feet from the east line of the survey.

The well indicated ability to flow 71 barrels of oil per day, plus 212,000 CF casinghead gas. It will produce from perforations in a conglomerate, 7,359 to 7,366 feet into the wellbore.

The operation is in a lease in the H&TC RR Survey, 467 feet from the north line and 467 feet from the west line.

Hardeman County's Kadane Cato Field gained a new producer when Paul DeCleve of Wichita Falls completed the No. 1 Grange-Cato 8.5 miles south-southwest of Chilli-cothe.

Paul DeCleve of Wichita Falls has plugged and abandoned an unsuccessful wildcat well in Hardeman County, six miles southeast of Medicine Mound. The well probed to a dry bottom at a total depth of 8,145 feet. The well was known as the No. 1 Cato '96."

Pre-kindergarten class for disadvantaged and/or limited English proficient four year olds will be offered at Kidwell Elementary, according to Ron Woods, principal.

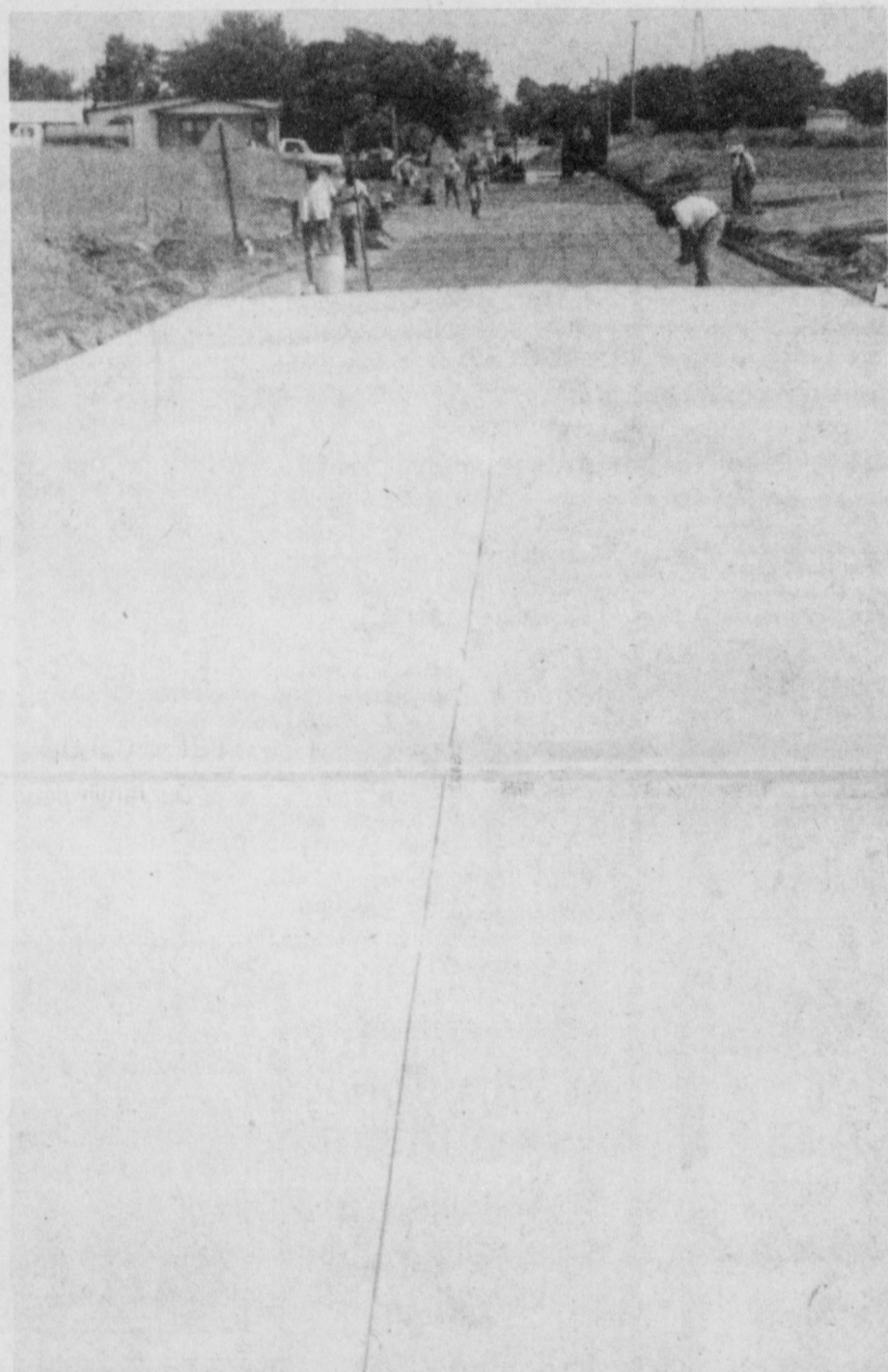
The class is required by the Texas Education Agency, but only if a minimum of 15 children qualify to attend.

NOTICE OF INTENTION TO CONDUCT WEATHER MODIFICATION OPERATIONS IN THE STATE OF TEXAS

1. Notice is hereby given that Irving P. Krick, Inc. of Texas, 754 Vella Road, Palm Springs, California 92264 has filed an application with the Texas Water Commission for a State permit to conduct weather modification operations to change or attempt to change the natural development of clouds for the purpose, objective, period and by the method summarized hereinbelow. Similar weather modification operations have been conducted in the area specified below under Texas permits on several occasions in the past, most recently in 1986.
2. Irving P. Krick, Inc. of Texas has a valid Texas weather modification license that was issued in May 1972 and renewed each year to the present (current License Number 89-3).
3. The purpose of this weather modification operation is to increase rainfall to affect and benefit rangeland and agricultural interests of the client. The period of the permit is for four years with the first year from about August 1, 1989 until about December 31, 1989, and with continuation of the program during periods beginning about March 1 of 1990, 1991 and 1992.
4. The proposed weather modification operation is to be conducted for and on behalf of Comanche County Weather Modification Association, Inc. (c/o Security Bank and Trust, P. O. Box 489, Lawton, Oklahoma 73502).
5. The proposed weather modification operation is to be carried out in both an "operational area" and a "target area" to cause the intended effects to occur only in the target area of Comanche County, Oklahoma. The operational area is that area described as the Texas counties of Hardeman, Wilbarger and Wichita, as well as the Oklahoma counties of Caddo, Comanche, Cotton, Grady, Jackson, Jefferson, Kiowa, Stephens and Tillman.
6. The area to be affected by the proposed weather modification operation is the target area described as Comanche County, Oklahoma.
7. The methods and materials to be used in conducting this operation are summarized herein: a licensed cloud seeding meteorologist/technologist will use standard meteorological analyses, forecast techniques, observations, and plume dispersion models to initiate the release of the seeding particles (silver iodide crystals) from a network of ground based generators at a time calculated to affect the formation of cumuloform clouds.
8. Persons interested in knowing more about the technical aspects of the proposed operation should contact the applicant or the Weather and Climate Specialist of the Commission (512/463-8270).
9. A public hearing on this application may be called by mailing a petition that requests a hearing to the Executive Director, Texas Water Commission, P. O. Box 13087, Capitol Station, Austin, Texas 78711. The petition must be signed by at least 25 people and contain (1) the signature, full name, address, and phone number of each person requesting; (2) a statement that each person is at least 18 years of age and resides or owns property in the operational area; and (3) a description of each person's interest and how that interest would be adversely affected. Request for hearing must be received by the Commission within 30 days of the date of the first publication of this notice. Check with Bell before digging

Southwestern Bell Telephone asks that anyone planning to dig or drill around buried cable call before starting.

The public should call repair service at 4102 so that the telephone company can identify the route of the cables in advance.

"We ask that everyone from contractors to homeowners take the time to locate telephone cables," he said.

Each year, thousands of buried telephone cables of all sizes are cut in Texas by people digging, trenching or drilling. The cable cuts interrupted service for hundreds of thousands of Texans.

In 1988, those who cut the cables were billed more than \$7-million.

Another common type of cable cut involves the wire from utility pole or terminal into a residence or business, sometimes referred to as a "drop wire."

"Cable cuts are a terrific waste for everyone involved," said Waits. "That's why Southwestern Bell offers a free service to help locate telephone cable for people or companies planning to dig."

Major telephone cable routes are marked by signs indicating that buried cable is nearby. After notifying Southwestern Bell, a crew will be dispatched to survey the area and mark the route of telephone cables.

The service is provided at no charge.

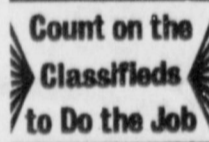

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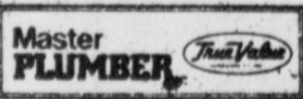
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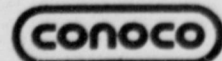


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
