## Trustees work through lengthy agenda

School trustees worked through an lasted until almost midnight.
Among the major items of business they handled was accepting recom mendations prepared by the districtwide
educational improvement council, made educational improvement council, made some minor changes in the dress code, rejected bids to construct a new bus maintenance barn, and, following the reorganized the board.

Three different committees that made up the improvement council provided recommendations concerning computer needs, but finalized plans for at-risk program and homework policy were delayed until the June meeting. The reporting committee produced a detailed needs list for all four campuses, with an estimated cost , 193.
Recommended were the expenditures of $\$ 50,538$ for Kidwell Elementary, $\$ 50,957$ for Bradford Elementary,
$\$ 44,990$ for the junior high computer literacy laboratory, $\$ 50,343$ for the high school keyboard (replacing conventional typewriters) lab, $\$ 11,239$ for the high school math/English/science lab and $\$ 2,256$ for the journalism lab.
High school principal Richard Davis told the board, "We feel we're behind (other schools in the area), and need to calch up. He said he would hope in place when the next school year begins.

The question of where the money might come from to make the purchases was bantered for a lengthy period.

Keck began public performances
at the age of 15. He graduated lowa at the age of 15. He graduated lowa
Park High School in 1975, where he was named Best All Around Boy and received the 23 Study Club's Out standing Boy of the Year award. He sang in the choir and play
ne varsity basketball team.
His magical performances help finance his degree from Midwestern State Univ. and remained a solid hobby as he actively pursued a computer career over the past decade. "My nine-to-five profession is in computers, which can be just as
creative as magic," Keck said. "But I creative as magi,", Keck said. "But I intend to continue the mystery of
magic long after I retire from the magic long after I

Keck has been a magician si Kowa Park days and understands he boy's interest. Young Blankenship's creativity sprouted from cartoons and Keck, yet his prim motivator was a movie created for adults.
"My all time favorite is 'There's No Business Like Show Business' because everybody dances and sings all the time -- even through water fountains," Blankenship said. The apprentice entertainer mimics the lancers on the hardwood floors at his new residence.

Content with the new environment, the child now focuses on learning magic from Keck, who argets children and adult audiences. "There is a widespread percepion that magic is for children," Keck said. "But adults, even though they watching magic as children do" Magic has been labeled the Magio has bor labeld the most British magician Milbourne British magician Milbourne
Christopher's Panorama of Magic a 1962 book from Dover Publications in New York.
"Magicians are legitimate eceptionists," Christopher wrote. They challenge the mind, stimulate the imagination and offer a brief respite from worry and pressure." Yet Keck prefers to humor and ntertain audiences, not fool. "I think it's dishonest to claim Powers you don't have and I want honestly teach him how to pull rabbit out of hats," he added with a lugh out of hats, he added with a laugh
The apprentice magician has ome big footsteps to follow. The lur of entertaining people brought the boy's mentor to the stage two decade ago: persistence and achievements kept him there.

The six-foot-four magician received the Wizard of the Year Award in 1976 from the Wichita Falls professional magicians' group. In the
late 1970s he served as president of the International Brotherhood of Magicians in Wichita Falls, and in Fort Worth during the early 1980s. The International Brotherhood of

Magicians is more than 50 years old with chapters, known as rings, in mos members worldwide.
Keck entertained audiences throughout North Texas. His performances ranged from full-scale stage shows at plush hotels in Dallas to simple stand-up routines for small
school graduations.
His accomplishments earned him the Outstanding Young Man of Amerisa nomination in 1983 and 1985. He was nominated to Who's Who of American Men last winter Keck currently resides in historical Arlington, Massachusetts, with his wife, Jenny Blankenship, an award-winning journalist, and apprentice magician son.
