Council sets priorities on '92 street projects

The city council Monday night finalized priorities on street work for next summer, and authorized advertising for bids to purchase three vehicles.

Two lists were proposed by city administrator Gary Jones, one for asphalt overlay and the other for slurry applications.

Each of the streets on the lists was numerically noted for priority.

we can possibly complete," Jones said, after Mayor Wayne House reminded the council that work would continue as long as funds budgeted permitted.

One dissenting vote was cast against approval of the final list. Alderman Bob Hamilton said he felt a portion of the 100 block of North Yosemite, which is not included on either list, should not

"We intentionally listed more than only be listed but also high on priority. His vote was overridden 4-1.

The vehicles to be purchased are for the police department, public works director and water meter reader.

An ordinance to replat Lot 1A, Block 69, Original Townsite, was ap-

The tract is the northwest corner of the block where Park West Shopping Center is located, and will soon be the location of a new business, Pizza Hut.

Hamilton suggested a portion of a sentence in the ordinance, "..otherwise known as 412 West Park," be deleted. He explained that the 400 block of West Park has never been opened as a street.

"How can we have in an official city document a reference to something

that does not officially exist," he asked. The address, House explained, was designated by the Postal Service for mail delivery.

Adoption of the ordinance, however, was unanimously approved.

The council, upon recommendation of the Planning and Zoning Commission, took no action on a request to permit carports at multi-family residences.

During a discussion, it was explained that residences, such as townhouses, have a problem meeting the setback from side line requirements.

Another ordinance approved related to the annexation of a nine-acre tract of land off FM 368 South. Date and time of a second required public hearing were established in the ordinance.

Jones told the council of a study being jointly carried out by himself along with leaders from Burkburnett, Vernon and Electra to adopt an alternative method to provide workers compensation insurance.

He said the effort should provide a savings of 20 to 30 percent for the municipalities involved.

The administrator also discussed plans to clean up and beautify the median on West Park.

The mayor read a proclamation requested by the Optimist Club, declaring Nov. 10-16 as Youth Appreciation Week in the city.





It's a comfort to us all to know we can go to bed at night with the knowledge that our neighboring town's newspaper is diligently covering and reporting any and all wrong doings here.

By golly, we can't complain we get no coverage from that daily publication. And we can't miss that coverage, as the stories outweigh anything else that happens in Wichita Falls, the area, state, nation and world.

We get front page reporting of Iowa Park news -- even if the paper has to spend over \$200 to send a reporter all the way to the state's capital for it.

And that coverage and space allotted is consistent. Man, I mean, it's right up there atop the front page, with a six-column headline and sub head.

You can't miss it. Of course, you Bowie. might miss a small, two-column headlined story at the bottom of the same page that told of a drug bust in which dozens of law officers arrested 12 per-

sons and confiscated two commercial buildings and three vacant lots -- all right there in our neighboring city.

I'm speaking of the coverage given the case of our school's athletic director, Lucky Gamble, who allowed his players to go to the fieldhouse on a Sunday to view films of the Graham football

Allowing them to do that is a violation of the University Interscholastic League rules -- on a Sunday, that is.

The complaint, initiated by an anonymous letter, allegedly written by a parent of a player, was taken up by the district executive committee. Out of that hearing, Supt. Glen Mitchell suspended Gamble from coaching, or even attending, the following week's game at

That had such news value the neighboring paper displayed it atop its front page -- and then felt so strongly about it that a short story also was re-

leased over the wire services.

I've heard of readers in El Paso, and even Indiana, seeing it in their news-

So, whatever happens in Iowa Park, or concerns Iowa Park people, apparently will now receive front page display in our neighboring daily newspa-

And, I would assume, the same would be true of any other community or school in the paper's circulation area. After all, that's only right, isn't it?

About that UIL rule prohibiting any types of gatherings on a Sunday, I plan to ask UIL athletic director Bill Farney when I see him at the state track meet next May about it.

I want to know how can it apply to students whose church recognizes a day other than Sunday as its day of prayer. Or even how an athiest can legally be affected.

I'll let you know when I find out.







In a 1 1/2 quart microwave safe casserole, stir together sugar, corn syrup and salt. Cook on high 5 to 6 minutes. Stir in peanuts. Cook on high 4 to 5 minutes, stirring after 2 1/2 minutes. Add margarine and vanilla; blend well. Cook on high 2 to 5 minutes. Peanuts will be lightly browned and syrup very hot. Add baking soda and stir gently until light and foamy. Pour into prepared cookie sheet. Cool 1 hour and break into pieces. Makes one pound.



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
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Season ends on narrow, 21-7 loss

Iowa Park's 1991 football season ended Friday night at Vernon, with a defensive battle that likely will remain the subject of coffee shop talk for months to come.

Eventhough their ranks were cut sharply by injuries, the Hawks, playing their first season under new Head Coach Lucky Gamble, lost by a narrow 21-7 margin to the Lions, defending state AAA champions.

It was the defense of Vernon that set up two of the Lions' three first-half touchdowns. And it was the Hawks' defense that scored Iowa Park's lone touchdown.

"The kids played real hard. They dominated the game the entire second half. We just made a couple of mistakes in the first half. After we got behind 14-0, we had to start throwing. They (Vernon defense) knew it and put the pressure on," Gamble said later.

Hawk fans got their first thrill when Brent Brown intercepted a Vernon pass on the Lions' second possession, giving Iowa Park possession on the Vernon 32. But three plays later, it was Vernon's time to intercept.

The Lions used only two plays, a long pass and run, to advance the ball from them own 27 to the Hawks' one. And they scored on the third play.

Just before the end of the opening quarter, Iowa Park quarterback Robert Denton was sacked and stripped of the ball at the Hawk 37. Three passes and three runs advanced the ball to the Hawks' three yard line, and they scored on the next play. But the extra point kick failed, giving the hosts a 13-0 lead with 10:28 remaining in the half.

Vernon scored its final points on the next possession, using a 24-yard pass to cap a 53-yard drive, and ran for the two-point conversion.

The Lions were allowed only three more first downs the remaining 27:43 of the game: one more before the half and one each in the third and fourth quarters.

Iowa Park scored after nailing the Lions with their backs to their own goal line midway through the final period.

With the line of scrimmage at the Lion 15, Vernon was attempting to punt. A hard rush from both ends of the line had Todd Pulley and Jason Miller converging on the ball at the same time. They blocked the punt, the ball rolled into the end zone, and Miller claimed it for Iowa Park's touchdown. Pulley kicked the extra point.

Vernon's vaunted running attack was held to only 79 yards by the Mean Green



defense, so the Lions had to turn to the airways. They completed 11 of 25 attempts for 154. Thus, the Lions, who had amassed 628 yards against Bridgeport, were held to only 233 Friday night. In fact, they had a net six yards offense in the final 12-minute

Iowa Park's longest gain play was a trick play designed during the preceding week's practice. Early in the fourth period, Gamble

hollered to Denton, who had the team up to the line of scrimmage, to come over. "I want to tell you something," he said. As Denton, walking down the line of scrimmage, neared the sideline, the ball was snapped back to Miller. Denton streaked down the sideline, caught Miller's pass, and was tackled for a to the sideline, was a trick.

So Denton joined seven other Hawks who had pass receptions in the game.

Denton joined Brown and T.J. Bean in intercepting Vernon passes.

"The kids played real hard," Gamble said. "They were very intense in practice and they tried real hard in the game."

With three starters already on the sidelines, the Hawks lost their leading receiver, Mike Brewer, on the first series of plays when he pulled a hamstring. "We just had too many players trying to go both ways," said the head Hawk.

SCHOOL SCENE

Information prepared by lowa Park School Counselors

This is the last week of the second six weeks grading period for the 1991-92 school year. Report cards will go out next week.

Some students and parents will undoubtedly be very pleased with the grades on those report cards, while others will be disappointed and perhaps very discouraged.

The Office of Educational research and Improvement of the U.S. Department of Education in Washington, D.C. has researched the area of student achievement in school and has determined that achievement may not be a question of I.Q. only, but of behavior and attitude. Research has shown that these qualities affect success in the classroom.

Parents can help their children be more successful students by teaching them strategies in the areas such as: paying attention; keeeping interested in school work; learning and remembering, and studying.

Children can learn the knack of paying attention. Never threaten or order them to "pay attention" in school as it won't work! Some simple techniques will. They are:

USING SELF-TALK AND POSITIVE IMAGES. Children can use words or phrases to help control attention. For example, they can tell themselves to keep their eyes on the blackboard while the teacher is writing on it to explain a problem. You can help them practice positive selftalk at home in various situations: when playing a game, helping around the house, or working at a hobby.

Help them stop negative self-talk ("It's hopeless"), and to be positive about themselves, to say, "I can do it." Positive self-talk might include the slogan: "Quitters don't win and winners don't quit."

No more negative images, either: Children can and must learn to see themselves doing well in school. Tell them to picture themselves answering questions correctly in class and feeling good about knowing the answers. Spend time talking with them about their successes (as well as their diffi-

ASKING QUESTIONS. This

helps children focus their attention while studying. When reading about World War II, students might ask themselves "Which countries were our friends and allies? Which were Germany's? Which countries did Germany occupy?"

You can suggest several questions to a child, such as: "What is this paragraph about? Who did what and why? Is the main point true or false? Asking questions can grab wandering

SETTING SPECIFIC STUDY GOALS. Your children can set goals that will help improve attention. Ask them to study a lesson until they can tell you the main point of the paragraph, or solve a specific math problem, or know specific names, dates, and places mentioned in the text. Discuss each goal. Remember that many small goals, one after another, are better than a single large one.

Further information about strategies for keeping interested, remembering, and studying will be addressed in future "School Scene" articles.







Great Britain study tour offered

Former Iowa Park resident and graduate of Iowa Park High School. Dr. Carol Rentschler Lowe, is one of two McLennan Community College instructors who will offer a study tour of Great Britain June 1-17, 1992. Dr. Lowe is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. John Rentschler of Iowa Park.

The tour is open to the public as well as to college students. Travelers may earn college credit or tour for fun. The tour will include stays in London, Bath, Stratford upon-Avon, the Lake District, York, and Edinburgh, Scotland.

Highlights of the trip will include tours of London sites such as the Tower of London and the Crown Jewels, Westminster Abbey and St. Paul's Cathedral; lunch at Ye Olde Cheshire Cheese, frequented by Samuel Johnson and other 18th century writers;

Also, a Thames River cruise; visits to Stonehenge, Tintern Abbey, Warwick Castle, Windsor Castle, Hampton Court Palace, Canterbury Cathedral; a steamer cruise in the Lake District; visits to the homes of authors such as Keats, Samuel Johnson, Milton, Wordsworth, and the Brontes: theatre performances in London and in Stratford, and an Elizabethan banquet

Courses offered for college credit are English 351 British Masterpieces I and English 332 British Masterpieces 11. Students may enroll in one of the courses for three semester hours college credit or in both courses for six hours credit.

Both courses are approved by the Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board and are fully transferable to other two-year colleges or to fouryear institutions.

The study tour will provide an opportunity for international travel, encouraged by the Coordinating Board of the Texas College and University System.

Students must have taken Freshman Composition I and II, at MCC or any other college, before they are eligible for these sophomore-level

Credit students will meet for four class meetings on the MCC campus before the tour begins: English 351 will meet May 19, 20, 25, 27; English 332 will meet May 19, 21, 26, 28,

Travelers who do not want college credit will participate fully in all tour activities and will have the option of attending lectures and participating in classroom activities and reading.

The instructor for British Master pieces I will be Dr. Lissette Carpenter, Chair of the Language Arts Department at MCC. She holds a master's degree from Baylor University and a Ph.D. with a specialisation in 18th century literature from Texas A&M University

Dr. Lowe will instruct British Masterpieces II. She holds a master's degree from Hardin-Simmons University and a Ph.D with a specialization in Victorian literature from Baylor University.

Both Dr. Lowe and Dr. Carpenter are experienced instructors and travelers. Tour arrangements have been made through a professional travel agency. Cost of the 17-day tour is

Missourian winds up in Texas via Montana

Born shortly after the turn of the century, George Daugherity has had a checkered lifestyle during his 90 years.

From Sumner, Missouri where he first saw daylight Aug. 5, 1901, until he finally settled down where he currently lives on Huntington Lane, he had varied experiences in career and in

From Missouri to ranch life in Montana in 1921, the harvest fields in North Dakota, the coal fields in Montana, and as the years passed, to the oil fields in Texas, back to Missouri, and then well into the century, back to Texas, he has had a good life and still is enjoying it.

Daugherity was the sixth in a family of nine children and he is the only one still living.

The farm land near Sumner where Daugherity was born was purchased by his grandfather in 1866 and remains in the family to this day.

Shortly after his father's death, Daugherity struck out on his own in 1921 for the northwest. He had some friends on the Knox Ranch in the legendary area of Montana.

He went to work on the ranch as a cattle driver. After he had worked a while they put him on a freight wagon hauling provisions. He went either to Forsythe or to Big Horn, which were about equal distance from the ranch.

He would spend the night in town after loading up, and one experience he remembers well.

"One morning I started back to the ranch and the temperature was 48 degrees below zero with snow on the ground. I walked most of the 38 miles to keep from freezing," Daugherity

For two seasons he went to North Dakota for the harvest. "I'd venture to say that close to 100 men would hook a freight train headed in the direction we wanted to go," he said.

Daugherity continued, "We didn't have to hide like the hobos did, because they knew where we were going. In the harvest I was paid 50 cents

an hour which was mighty good money in those days."

One of his later jaunts he wasn't so lucky. He and a buddy went to sleep in one of the freight cars. That happen to be one that was disconnected and left on a side rail to be filled with coal.

When they awoke and realized what had happened, they saw a house with a light, so they started walking toward it. It happened to be the foreman for a coal company who was working on his books.

But, Daugherity and buddy lucked out. The foreman had run out of cigarettes and they just happened to have some to give him. There was a bunkhouse nearby and they were allowed to stay there. The foreman also put the two to work shoveling coal into the boxcars.

He recalls another time when he and three others were put off a train and they stayed at a hobo camp. A creek ran through the camp and on the other side was a potato field. The men played pitch and whoever lost had to wade the creek to dig some potatoes for their meal. Daugherity didn't have to dig potatoes.

There were seven or eight men in the camp. The next morning a man came into the camp and said he needed just one man to hire to help with his harvest. Daugherity was lucky again and was the one hired.

Daugherity's next job was one he really liked and one that meant a lot to his future.

He was living next to a man who asked Daugherity if he would drive him to Texas where he had two sons working in the oil fields near Burkburnett.

Daugherity grinned and said,"I was happy to accept the offer. He had a young daughter I was pretty sweet on." That daughter was destined to be Daugherity's wife of 55 years.

"We were driving an Oldsmobile Eight, but we had some trouble on the road and were 14 days getting to Texas." That was in 1924.

When they got to Burkburnett,

Daugherity began working as a roughneck in the Burk oil fields. He remembers, "When you would look north of town, the oil derrick gave the illusion of a forest," he said.

"I was making the most money I'd made in my life, \$5 for 12-hour shifts, "he recalled.

Nov. 25, 1925 Daugherity and the "sweet young girl", Hallie Lower, were married in the Wichita County courthouse. They spent their first night in the old St. James Hotel that was located just off what was then the main street, Ohio Street.

The Daugheritys returned to the Missouri farm where they remained 14 years. The house at that time was the one built by his daddy in about

1919 and where Daugherity was born. It is two story, with four bedrooms upstairs and one downstairs. It also has a basement. The house is the one where the two Daugherity children, Don, an architect, and Nadine Greist, with whom Daugherity makes his home, were born. Mrs. Daugherity died in 1980.

In 1939 the Daugheritys returned to this area for a visit and decided to stay. Daugherity went to work with his brother-in-law, who had the Wichita Gas Engine Works, which some older residents may remember.

They bought 13 acres of land and built a house on the property where he still lives. His daughter remembers there was one other house south of them and that the owner raised goats.

Daugherity worked at SAFB during World War II as a disposal plant operator. After he quit there, he went into the carpenter business and built most every house on their block.

He worked for two different construction companies in Wichita Falls before his retirement in 1963.

Since his retirement he has done a little woodworking, some cabinets, and a unique shelf. When he was 89 he helped roof his daughter's house and his grandson declares he did a better job than the others.

His daughter's house is next door to his original house. In August 1982 his house burned. They salvaged a few things and stored them in his barn. A year and a day later the barn burned and that time he lost everything. He rebuilt the house and now his grandson is rennovating it and moving into it.

Paugherity's family say he is a practical jokester. He smiled and said,"Now, don't tell about the jokes I've pulled."

But, he went back in time and remembered one joke he pulled on a friend. He remembered with glee the time a friend borrowed his buggy for a date with his girl friend.

"I got to thinking what would I do if he took my buggy. So as they drove off I hopped on the back and went along, only they didn't know it. It was a bright moonlight night and about two miles down the road my friend turned a corner and his girl friend saw my shadow. They stopped and she was really mad. She wanted him to make me walk back, but he didn't."

It is easy to see how Daugherity, a witty, jovial character, is revered by his family.

His daughter said he is a coffee drinker. He commented, "Oh, I drink a cup now and then." She continued, any time he wakes up in the night he has to have a cup of coffee. She always makes fresh decaffienated coffee and leaves it in a thermos for him. "He always wakes up for a cupat midnight," she said.

He walks with a cane and Nadine said one morning about four o'clock he got up and went out to get the paper.

He fell and then couldn't understand why I couldn't hear him calling me, when I was in the back bedroom sound asleep.

Daugherity's son and daughter graduated Iowa Park High School and so have his five grandchildren. He has six great-grandchildren.

Daugherity was an avid reader until his eyes got bad. He liked to read true stories about the Old West and especially liked books by Louis A'mour. He also is a "Civil War nut", and read stories about it.

He watches television a lot now and his favorite show is Jeopardy.

A little of his independence shows when he says the reason he quit coming to the Friendly Door in Iowa Park is because since he can't drive he has to depend on a chauffeur, and he doesn't like that.

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


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
