The first, from a resident in the 700 block of Mockingbird, said a window of the home had been shot out. That call was noted at 10:11.



Sefcik enters plea; offers resignation

Ray Sefcik Jr. was placed under a three-year probation in 89th District Court Monday morning, and that evening his resignation as a teacher/ coach was accepted by the school board.

Sefcik appeared in Judge Temple Driver's court to enter a plea to felony information, according to District Attorney Barry Macha.

The plea was related to a charge of indecency with a child, a third degree felony, and was given probation under deferred adjudication.

During the probationary period, Macha explained, Sefcik will be required to attend and participate in regular sexual counseling sessions.

After successfully completing the probation, there will be no final conviction, but a record of the arrest will remain, Macha said.

A violation of probation could result in automatic sentencing to a prison for a two to 10 year period, and without

eligibility for probation.

"I feel like the public's best interest is being served," Macha stated.

Sefcik was arrested Aug. 27 after a complaint was filed in Wichita Falls that he had exposed himself to a woman and children at a convenience store in

He was placed on suspension from his duties at the school, with pay, until the issue was resolved.

Sefcik met with trustees at a called meeting of the board Monday night. The executive session was closed to the public from 7:30 to 8:50, during which time only he, the complete board and Supt. Glen Mitchell were in the room.

When the meeting was re-opened to the public, trustees quickly acted on two motions.

One was to accept Sefcik's resignation, effective Dec. 20. The other was

> With virtually no housing available on base, 1,250 families moving to their new jobs at Sheppard will have to find housing, both to purchase and rent.

> Of that number, which does not include more than 6,000 trainees, 50 will be officers, 850 enlisted personnel and 350 civilians.

- 2 cups frozen blueberries
 - Topping
- 1/2 cup sugar
- 1/3 cup flour
- 1/2 tsp. cinnamon 1/4 cup butter

Mix sugar, butter and egg. Sift dry ingredients and add with milk; mix well. Rinse blueberries and stir carefully into batter. Spread into greased and floured 9-inch square pan.

Mix topping ingredients together and sprinkle over batter. Bake at 375 degrees 45-50 minutes.





Students in grades nine through 12 are considered for the awards. They are nominated by teachers and counselors, and a committee of Optimist Club members make the final selections.





When you go to the polls here Tuesday, just to keep the record straight, before you vote, you ought to face east and bow three times.

Worth Quoting

He has consistently ruled in favor of the criminal and never on behalf of the victims of lawlessness and crime.

Judge Justice is the guy who has held our prison system captive for the past 15 years and ruled time and time again in favor of prisoners.

At one time in this state, our prison system was more or less self supporting. With the help of inmate labor, cotton was raised to furnish clothing and linens for all the inmates and dormitories, vegetables were grown and canned for inmate food, and both linens and food were furnished to state hospitals and institutions.

But along came Judge Justice who placed a can on inmate population, and demanded that our prisons contain law

libraries, cable television, two prison. ers to a cell, optional work programs and access to education facilities.

The power that rests in the hands of the judge is so absolute, so unchallenged so dictatorial, that the appointed-forlife judge has now set himself above Texas juries, Texas courts, and the US Supreme Court.

Recently, the judge ruled again in the Jimmy Paul Vanderbilt, Jr. case.

To refresh your memory. Vanderbilt, a former rookie police of. ficer in Amarillo, was convicted in 1976 of the abduction and murder of Amarillo teenager Katrina Moyer. His crime was discovered when Moyer's lifeless body was found abandoned on a rural road in 1975.

Twice Vanderbilt has been convicted of the crime of murder. Twice he has been sentenced by juries to die by lethal injection. Following the normal appeals, the U.S. Supreme Court has upheld the sentence.

But everybody stand aside -- here comes the judge. In 1988, Justice vacated that sentence because Vanderbilt in the judge's opinion, had not been properly advised of his rights before a psychiatrist examined the killer. Since '88, the judge has been holding the case in his court on a stay of execution.

Now, the Tyler pope has announced in a ruling that he is throwing out the death sentence imposed by the courts. His reasoning? That Vanderbilt is not a continuing danger to society. Since he's been sitting on death row since 1976. it's hard to see how he could have been otherwise.

Fifteen years and millions of dollars of tax money have been spent trying to carry out the sentence that a jury imposed on Vanderbilt -- and now Judge William Wayne Justice has tossed it all out the window.

And we wonder why the American people have lost respect for their government and especially the judicial

As long as we've got a movement afoot to limit the terms of our representatives in Washington, why not a program to limit the terms of federal judges to half a lifetime? It would go well with their half-baked, one-brickshort rulings.

Or maybe we could invite Judge Justice to eat regularly in a Luby's cafeteria.







AUSTIN - Texas Hispanics and Texas Republicans both called it a victory last week when the U.S. Justice Department threw out the Legislature's proposed redistricting plan for the Texas House.

But unless the federal court orders an interim plan, it's likely to be a short-lived win for Republicans because Democrat Gov. Ann Richards rejected calling the Legislature into special session to devise a remedy.

Instead, Democratic leaders in the House along with Attorney General Dan Morales will redraw political boundaries for approval by a state district judge (Democrat) in South Texas.

While House Republicans, as minority party, were virtually shut out of the legislative process, they will probably have even less voice in crafting the new plan.

Thus, the last hope for Republicans is to ask a three-judge federal panel to draw an interim plan which doesn't squeeze them to extinction.

Anti-Hispanic Bias

The Justice Department struck down the House map for packing and fragmenting Hispanic voters in new districts, particularly in South Texas, El Paso, San Antonio and Dallas.

The plan was basically a compromise to protect Anglo Democrats and ensure solid Hispanic majorities in new seats, but some Hispanic leaders sued to get the extra seats that population figures indicated were due them.

So did Republicans, who were basically cut down to nothing in the Democrat-dominated plan.

What Will Happen?

The course of future Texas politics will be decided by whichever court receives the issue.

To create the full measure of Hispanic seats, the new architect will have to thin out Democratic voters in several districts now held by Anglos

by Anglos.

If that happens, Republicans hope to win more seats at the ballot box; on the other hand, any compromise by Richards and her fellow Democrats will be designed to eliminate them, if possible.

Meanwhile, earlier predictions appear to be coming true: Hispan-

ics will dominate the Texas Democratic Party in the '90s.

Health Policy Task Force

Gov. Richards has established the Texas Health Policy Task Force, which she charged with developing a plan to address the health care and health insurance needs of Texans.

"I am urging the task force to explore comprehensive and meaningful reform — narrow little nips and tucks to pieces of problems will not do," the governor said.

Richards named Shirley Carter, president of Texas Women's University, Denton, to chair the 26-member task force.

The panel, which includes 14 public members and 12 lawmakers, is to issue recommendations for consideration by the Legislature in 1993

Cooking Hamburgers

Gov. Richards told Texas business leaders to get with it in the international market.

"I'll be darned if I am going to stand by as Governor of Texas and watch us kid ourselves that we can continue to grow economically by cooking each other's burgers and washing each other's hair."

Her speech preceded, by three or four days, the announcement that Houston's Brown & Root Inc. had won a \$7 billion contract to build a luxury resort in Japan.

Gas Pump Inspection

Texas Agriculture Commissioner Rick Perry is seeking proposals

from the private sector to inspect the state's 153,000 gas pumps. The inspections, currently done by the Agriculture Department, cost the state \$310,000 last year,

Wilson, author of the lottery bill and perhaps the most powerful member of the House Black Caucus, said he would be "naive not to seek passage" of his bill which died in committee last year.

- House Speaker Gib Lewis, facing two misdemeanor ethics charges, will go on trial in Austin on Jan. 27, unless his lawyers get his trial moved out of Travis
- Gov. Richards appointed Roy Lee Orr, a former Dallas County commissioner and long-time Democratic Party activist, to the Texas Alcoholic Beverage Commission. Orr, 59, replaces Louis Pearce Jr. of Houston on the three-member board.
- Former state Representative, now Houston city councilman Ben Reyes, plea bargained no contest to charges of theft and accepting illegal contributions. Reyes, a Democrat, received probation, then said he may run for the new congressional seat there.
