Computers main component of technology plan for school

Iowa Park school trustees received copies of the "technology plan" during Monday evening's board meeting, and voted to increase bonuses of four staff members.

The state-mandated technology plan, which is prepared locally by committees of each campus, establishes a timetable of updating equipment which is intended to improve student skills.

Philosophy of the program, was in the prepared presentation. It stated:

"The Iowa Park C.I.S.D. believes we are rapidly moving into a world requiring the students who graduate from high school to have basic and advanced computer skills. The district believes it's students must be taught these skills during their years in the system.

"The district believes these skills are complex and diverse and must therefore be developmental in nature, requiring a continuous program from the very early grades through the higher level classes of the senior high school.

"In addition it is the belief of the district that computer skills should not just be taught in a laboratory situation, but, in addition, across a broad spec-

trum of subject areas including: business, science, mathematics, language arts, social studies, and vocational."

The state is providing \$30 per ADA (average daily attendance), to supplement local resources in acquiring the equipment.

First year estimated cost, of the five-year plan, was set at \$78,410. That would include \$12,754 at Kidwell Elementary, \$15,584 at Bradford Elementary, \$25,068 at junior high, and \$25,000 (with an option of \$14,991) at high school.

The presentation was made so that the board can take the figures into consideration when developing the 1992-93 school year budget.

Following a 51-minute executive session, trustees approved increases of bonuses for four staff members.

Both band directors were included. Greg Miller's bonus was increased from \$3,000 to \$5,000, and Ed Hefti's from \$2,500 to \$3,500, according to the motion that was approved.

Though the method in which the extra bonus is to be divided was not

included in the other motion, trustees approved increasing the extra pay for the two high school cheerleader sponsors from \$800 to \$1,750 this year.

One trustee, Wendall House, voted in opposition to that motion.

The board voted to oppose a proposal presented by a high school committee composed of students and staff personnel, concerning one issue in the dress code.

The majority voted to strike from the proposal allowing boys to be permitted to wear ear studs.

Trustee Sheri Kennedy voted against the motion to strike that provision.

Other dress code changes for the year, from last year's code, included not allowing tunic tops worn with leggings, and requiring biker shorts or spandex to be worn under baggy legged pants (Umbro type).

A discussion was held concerning establishment of a contingency fund, when developing the next year's budget.

Some trustees appeared to be in favor of establishing the fund exclusively for construction of additional classrooms, while others said they did not feel tying the hands of future boards would be proper.

When the board in a recent meeting approved moving of two additional temporary classroom buildings to Kidwell, to be used for the newly-approved all-day kindergarten classes, some trustees wanted to immediately begin planning for construction of permanent structures.

The first of the two buildings was moved to the campus Monday, and was toured by most of the board prior to the meeting.

Approval was given to a proposed policy governing the use and expense of private vehicles in transporting students on field trips and excursions.

Decision of when such vehicles would be permitted is left to the superintendent.

The resignation of LaVelle Turman, high school cosmetology instructor the

Sales tax report impressive

Iowa Park continues to be the city in Wichita County with the highest percentage of gain for sales tax collections this year.

The city this month received a check for \$13,982.71, representing sales taxes collected by local businesses during April, according to the state comptroller's office.

Though that is only a 14.88-percent gain over the same month in 1991, it raised the year's sum to \$101,684.93,

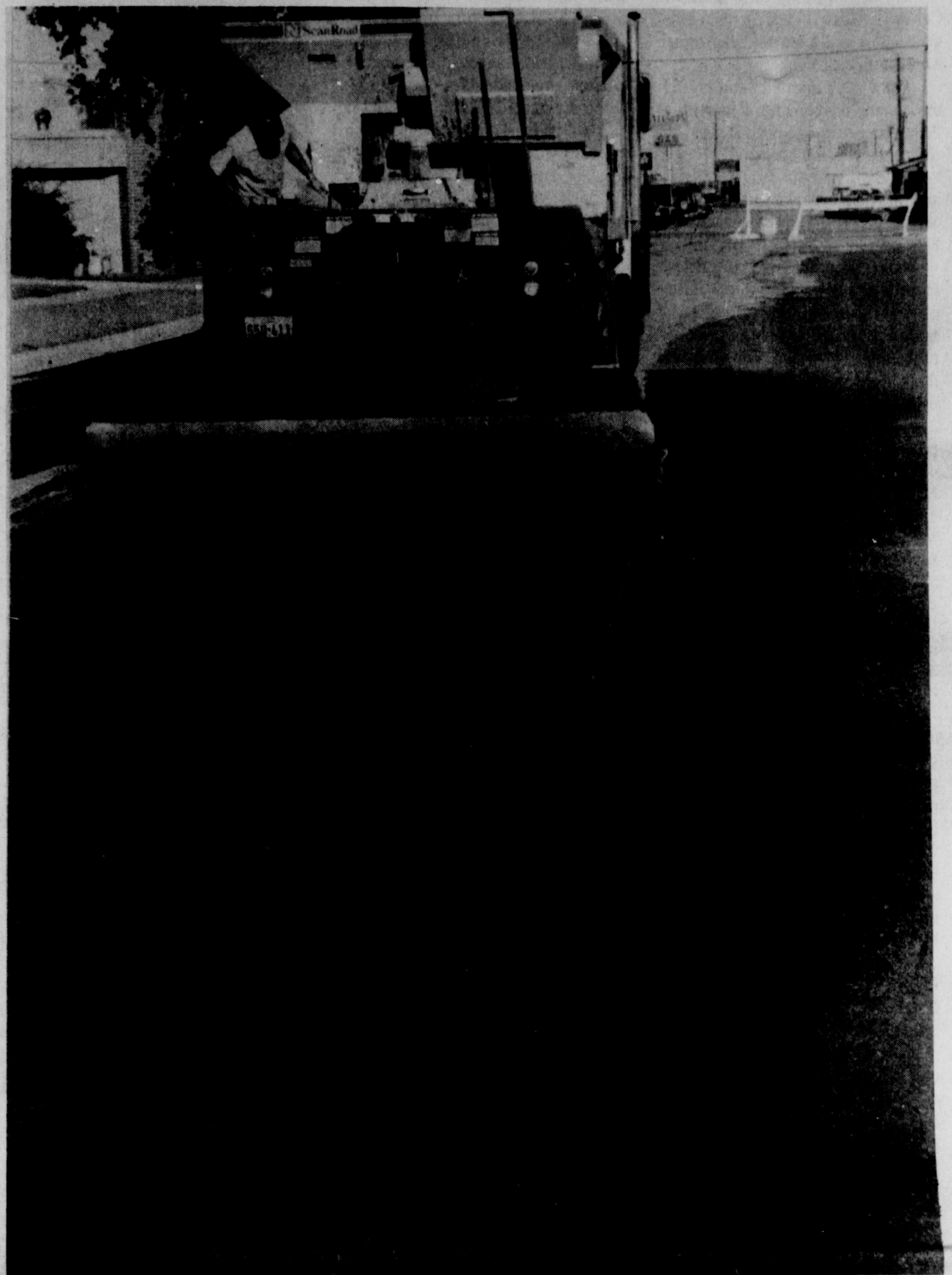
a 21-61-percent increase over the same period last year.

Electra is close behind Iowa Park, for collections over the year, with 13.90 percent increase. Wichita Falls is a plus 6.27 percent and Burkburnett 4.52.

It's just the opposite in Archer County, however. Every community is reporting a minus in sales taxes collected for the year. Holliday is a minus 20.49 percent, according to the comptroller's office report.

Summer street work schedule announced

Hot, dry weather has finally moved over the area, and the city's street crew has been able to launch its aggressive program of work throughout the community.

Streets to receive a slurry coating were identified by Mike Price, public works director, and the city council, using that list, set priorities for this summer's work.

The first street to receive a slurry coating was the 100 block of East Cash.

Crew workers began work early Wednesday morning, after an agreement was reached with Postmaster Ken Turman, as to the lightest traffic day his office experiences during the week.

An asphalt overlay is scheduled to be applied to a two-block area of South Wall. That portion was not included in a re-building project done recently by the highway department.

A portion of East Garden also is to receive an asphalt overlay, Price added.

When the crew moves onto a street to apply slurry, that thoroughfare is closed to all traffic for most of the day. Residents are notified in advance, in order for them to make alternate parking arrangements.

The street is typically closed between 7 and 7:30 a.m., and re-opened before 5 p.m., Price said.

Time during the day is used first to clean the street surface, apply the slurry, and then allow sufficient time for the coating to dry.

The city began its own applications of slurry last year. The procedure seals the asphalt surface, which normally is recognized as beginning to crack, and prevent further damage by weather.

Applying the slurry seal has been determined as the most efficient, both in extending the life of the existing asphalt paving and cost per block of application.

I've been waiting for some of those social critics to come up with an explanation of all that looting that took place last week in Chicago.

You've read or seen the reports, haven't you, about the celebration following the Chicago Bulls' NBA championship victory over the Portland Trailblazers?

And how, somehow, that celebration developed into the destroying of some vehicles, by fire and otherwise, and escalated to breaking in and looting of businesses in several parts of the city.

Those social critics were quick to explain the fires and looting in Los Angeles as being the outcome of the trial of police officers charged with beating a black man, and found not guilty.

Do you suppose they might attempt to explain that the Bulls didn't beat up on the Trailblazers enough?

They certainly can't complain that there was anything racial connected with the NBA championship, unless it was the fact there were more blacks playing in the game than whites.

Frankly, there seems to be an element in the larger cities of our nation that is ready to burn and loot, whenever they feel like it.

And they have no fear of the law. Much less respect for it.

Like many Americans I hear from and read about, I've had it with all this lawlessness.

But our hands are tied. After all, those committing all the crimes have the American Civil Liberties Union defending and winning their cases in the courts.

Meanwhile, law abiding citizens sit helplessly by, shaking their heads. Helplessly.

past three years, was accepted. She cited "personal reasons" in her letter.

Assistant Superintendent Robert Palmer reported that two old buses had been delivered to a state prison, to be completely refurbished. He also told the board he was not ready to recommend lowering the cost of school lunches at that time.

Supt. Glen Mitchell pointed out that the school year ended with 1,938 pupils enrolled. That was an increase over the 1,887 at the end of the 1991 year.

Tax collector Allen Shewmake reported to the board that 97.18 percent of the current taxes had been collected. Collections the previous two years, in the same month, were 96.19 and 96.73, respectively.

Multi-Purpose Center back on council agenda

For the third time in the past two months, a spokesperson for the proposed Multi-Purpose Events Center in Wichita Falls is to appear before the Iowa Park city council.

Kay Yeager, one of the leaders in the organization of volunteers working to make the Center a reality, is on the agenda for Monday's council meeting.

The meeting is to begin at 7 p.m. in council chambers.

Two resolutions, both concerning city employee benefits, also are on the meeting agenda.

One resolution, if passed, would establish an employee benefit trust, appointing a trust committee, and authorizes the transfer of funds to the trust.

The second resolution would, if approved, authorize the city administrator to enter into an inter-local agreement with Wichita Falls for employee and dependent health and dental care, as well as life insurance coverage.

Man jailed on charges

Police were called to a residence in the 700 block of East Cash at 1:07 p.m., where two men were reportedly arguing.

Events Center needed

Dear Bob,
I would like to thank you for your gracious meeting with Don Daugherty and me this afternoon. Although I have not seen a copy of your editorial/article, Don was quite upset with its direction. He was particularly concerned with the ideas that this was a "done deal."

As I tried to relay to you this afternoon, the Multi-Purpose Events Committee began its work and proceeded to its conclusions and recommendations to both the Wichita County Commissioners and the Wichita Falls City Council void of past encumbrances: i.e., past "promises" -- or lack thereof -- of leaders of Wichita Falls; previous studies of "outside experts"; the politics of both the County and the City. In essence we were not tied to any person or faction; or any preconceived or pre-determined ideas or conclusions.

As I stated this afternoon, I feel that there has been no pressure from any of the elected officials on the Committee -- or those that are not on the committee. We set our goals and objectives and proceeded to our conclusions in as totally unbiased and unprejudiced a manner as possible. Our aim, as I said, was to determine the need; and finding that, to design and present the best facility and the site that would best lend itself to the success of the complex.

I began this job in November unconvinced of the necessity of such a facility. Throughout all of our very intensive research and study, I have become more and more convinced, not only of the need, but also of the economic benefits to the entire county and area. With both governmental entities willing to commit to this with no tax increase on either side, it is difficult to not go forward. The jobs that this will create cannot be denied; the fallout or "trickle" effect on all areas of the county, I think, is real; the broadening and sta-

bilization of the county-wide tax base is solid.

I would like to suggest at this critical time in the life of our community that we put past differences aside: let us forget Iowa Park, Burkburnett, Electra against Wichita Falls or Wichita County. Let us unite as a whole community and commit to our future together.

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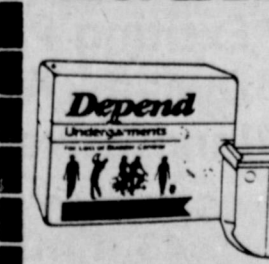


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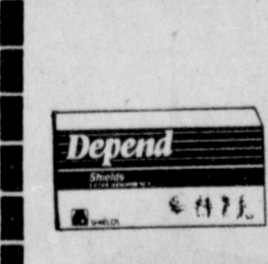


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

She says that she won his heart with a blueberry pie.

She chose that recipe, along with others she has received from family members, to share with the Leader readers this week.

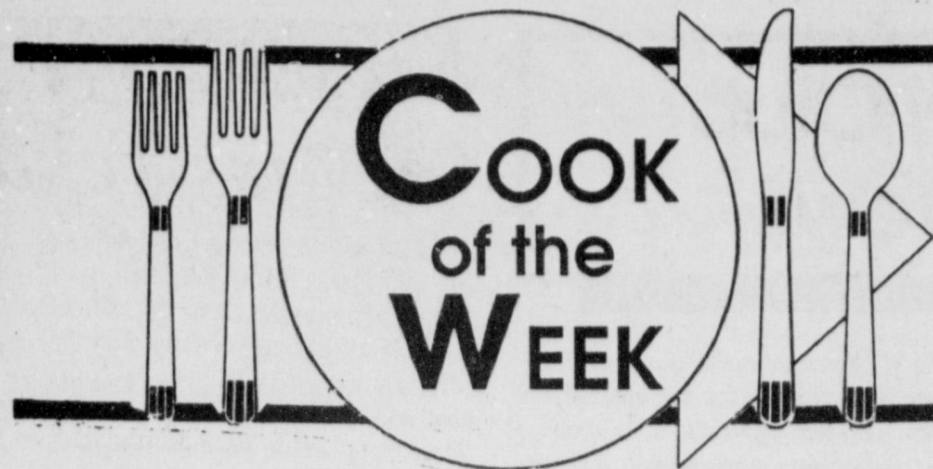
Blueberry Pie

Two-crust pastry:

- 1 3/4 cups all-purpose flour
- 1/2 cup vegetable oil
- 1 tsp. salt
- 3 to 4 Tbsps. cold water

Mix flour, oil and salt until particles are size of small peas. Sprinkle in water, 1 tablespoon at a time, mixing until all flour is moistened and pastry almost clears side of bowl. (If pastry seems dry, 1 to 2 tablespoons oil can be added. Do not add water.)

Gather pastry into a ball. Divide pastry into halves. Place one half cut side down and flatten into round. Place flattened round between two 15-inch lengths of waxed paper. Wipe table with damp cloth to prevent paper from slipping. Roll off top paper. Place



pastry paper side up in pie plate. Peel off paper. Ease pastry loosely into plate. Trim overhanging edge of pastry one-inch from rim of plate. Fold and roll pastry under, even with plate.

Filling:

- 1/2 cup sugar
 - 1/3 cup all-purpose flour
 - 1/2 tsp. ground cinnamon
 - 4 cups fresh blueberries
 - 1 Tbsp. lemon juice
 - 2 Tbsps. margarine or butter
- Mix sugar, flour and cinnamon. Stir in blueberries. Turn into pastry-lined pie plate; sprinkle with lemon juice and dot with margarine. Cover with lattice top.

Lattice Top:

After rolling circle for top crust, cut circle into strips about 1/2-inch wide. Pastry wheel can be used for more decorative strips.

Place 5 to 7 strips (depending on size of pie) across filling in pie plate. Weave a cross-strip through center by first folding back every other strip going the other way. Continue weaving until lattice is complete, folding back alternate strips each time a cross strip is added. (To save time, do not weave strips. Simply lay second half of strips across first strips. Weaving, however, creates a prettier pie.)

Trim ends of strips. Fold trimmed edge of lower crust over ends of strips, building up a high edge. Seal and flute. Bake in pre-heated 425 degree oven 35 to 45 minutes or until crust is brown.

NOTE:
Canned Blueberry Pie: substitute drained canned blueberries for fresh blueberries.

Frozen Blueberry Pie: substitute unsweetened frozen blueberries, partially thawed, for fresh blueberries.

Peach Cheese Pie

- 3/4 cup flour
- 1/2 tsp. baking powder
- 13 oz. box vanilla pudding (not instant)
- 3/4 cup sugar, divided
- 1/2 cup milk
- 1 egg

1 - 16 oz. can peaches, not drained
1 - 8 oz. pkg. cream cheese

Beat together flour, salt, baking powder, pudding, 1/4 cup sugar, milk and egg. Pour into greased 10" pie pan.

Drain peaches, saving juice. Place peaches over batter. Beat together cream cheese, 1/2 cup sugar and 3 tablespoons peach juice until smooth. Spoon over peaches to within 1 inch of pan edge.

Combine 1 Tbsp. sugar and 1/2 tsp. cinnamon and sprinkle over top. Bake 30-35 minutes at 350 degrees.

Power Cookies

Cream together:

- 2 cups brown sugar
- 2 cups sugar
- 3/4 cup butter (softened)
- 1 cup shortening

Add:

- 4 eggs
 - 2 tsps. vanilla
- Mix well.

- 3 1/2 cups flour
- 2 tsps. salt
- 2 tsps. baking soda
- 3 cups oats (quick)
- 2 cups coconut
- 2 cups raisins
- 1 cup chocolate chips
- 1 cup chopped nuts

Mix all dry ingredients together and add to egg and shortening mixture. Drop by spoonfuls on cookie sheet and bake 11 minutes at 350 degrees. Makes 7 dozen cookies.

Strawberry-Pretzel Dessert

- 2 cups pretzels, crushed
- 3/4 cup melted margarine or butter
- 3/4 cup sugar
- 8 oz. cream cheese
- 9 oz. or small ctn. Cool Whip
- 1 large pkg. strawberry jello
- 2 cups hot water
- 2 - 10 oz. pkg. frozen strawberries
- 1 - 13 1/2 oz. can crushed pineapple, drained

Blueberry Monkey Bread

- 2/3 cup sugar
- 1 Tbsp. cinnamon
- 4 cans buttermilk biscuits (10 biscuits to a can)
- 1 1/4 cup fresh or frozen blueberries, rinsed and drained
- 2/3 cup white or brown sugar
- 1 1/4 sticks margarine
- 1 tsp. vanilla
- 1 Tbsp. cinnamon
- 1 cup blueberries

Thoroughly grease 10"x4" tube pan.

Cut biscuits in quarters.

Mix 2/3 cup sugar and 1 tablespoon cinnamon. Roll each biscuit piece in sugar/cinnamon mixture. Layer biscuit pieces and blueberries in pan to create mosaic effect.

Combine last 5 ingredients and bring to a boil. Reduce heat and cook, stirring frequently, until sugar is dissolved. Pour over biscuits in pan. Bake at 350 degrees, 65 minutes or until done.

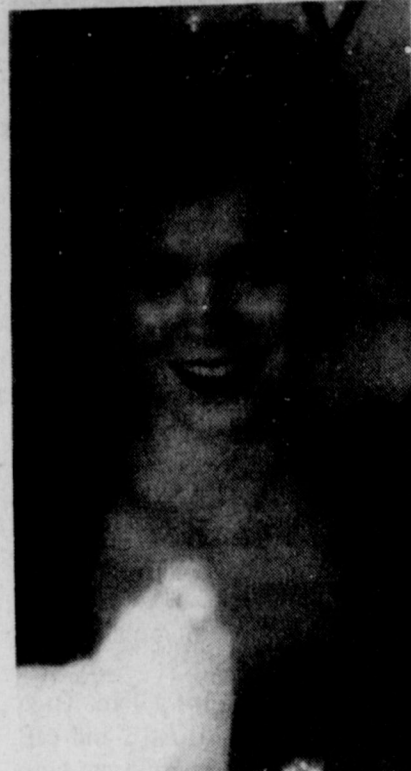

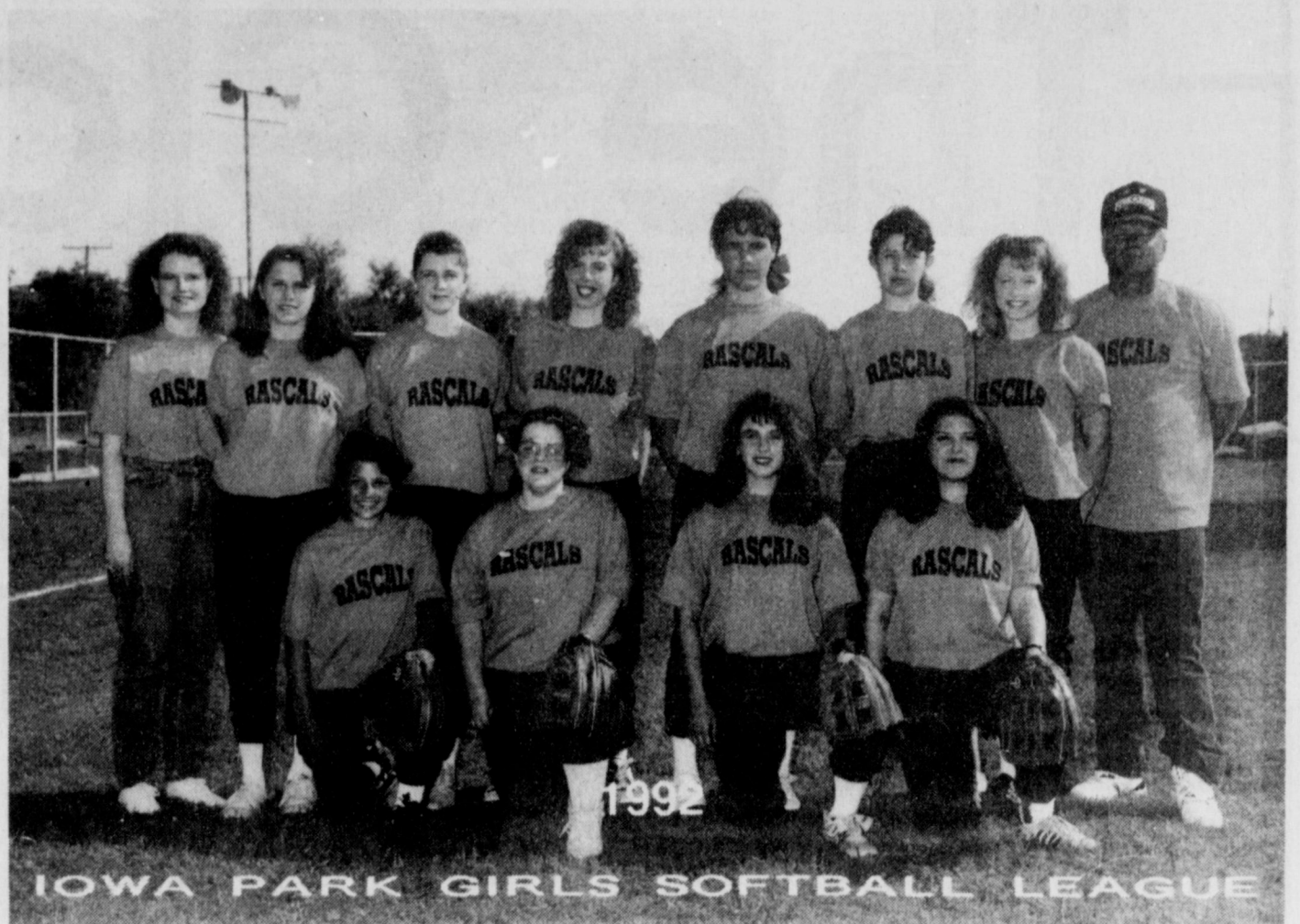

AUSTIN - Texas Democrats flexed their political muscle in Washington and Austin last week, combining to kill a proposed balanced-budget amendment and causing to retain leadership of the Texas House.

Proponents of the amendment, which was sponsored by Rep. Charles Stenholm, D-Stamford, fell nine votes short of the required two-thirds majority in a 280-153 roll call vote.

Republicans in the Texas congressional delegation were aided by several Democratic colleagues, but a group headed by Reps. Jack Brooks, D-Beaumont, and Albert Bustamante, D-San Antonio, prevailed in defeating the proposal. Bustamante was one of eleven co-sponsors who abandoned the measure.

Meanwhile in Austin, House Democrats convened their caucus and, in a show of unity sparked by fears of growing Republican influence, agreed to endorse one of their nine candidates after the November election, rather than risk divisiveness before the session begins in January.

Republicans Uncommitted
Only the week before, the House Republican Caucus met but failed to endorse a single candidate, all of which are Democrats.

Their strategy is obvious: with a heavier-than-usual turnover expected in the fall elections, they will count GOP heads after the election.

If they are short of the necessary 76 votes, they will determine which of the candidates is still standing and is most likely to share committee chairmanships and other plums of power.

Demo Party Purity
The second alternative is what has House Democrats alarmed; the pattern for victory for past speakers Bill Clayton and protege Gib Lewis has been to win by rewarding Republican allies.

Last week's meeting was apparently a maneuver to stop two frontrunners, Pete Laney and Jim Rudd, from doing that.

Some Democrats confessed worries that Republican gains might spawn a GOP candidate who could swap plums for votes from disgruntled Democrats.

Others fear that the Democratic party purity pledge will only in-form Republicans that they have nothing to lose by fielding their own candidate earlier than planned.

Rockefeller Endorsed
At the Democratic Party convention, state chairman Bob Slagle said he wants West Virginia Sen. Jay Rockefeller to be the party's candidate for vice president.

The likely nominee, Arkansas Gov. Bill Clinton, picked up several uncommitted delegates, and Texas Land Commissioner Garry Mauro, his friend since the 1972 George McGovern campaign, said Clinton was gaining "real momentum."

■ University of Texas regents approved the system's 1992-93 budget of \$3.6 billion for the next school year.
